Challenges



Implementation Challenges

- Applicants are relied upon to provide accurate tree plans for most development permits (no arborist report required).
- Building inspectors are expected to confirm tree-related information on development sites.
- Possible unintended incentives to remove trees during demolition phases.
- Compliance is largely complaint-driven in non-development.
- Parks UF staff workloads result in response rates at less than acceptable levels in some cases.

Challenges

Overall Canopy Impacts

- Data suggest that trees being planted will not fully replace tree canopy lost, resulting in long-term canopy implications.
- Questions about ability of tree preservation standards to incentivize preservation of high-quality trees.
- Data to assess long-term effects of Title 11 on the urban forest are limited.

Next Steps



- Continue Bureau coordination and staff training
- Parks UF review of planting compliance for tree permits (currently complaint driven)
- Title 11 code amendments
 - RICAP 8 and 9 to address implementation issues
 - Potential future project to address larger policy issues

Next Steps

Examples of issues to be addressed by RICAP 8City Council, Feb 2017

- Exceptions to fencing requirement
 - Minor ground disturbance (window wells, deck footings)
 - Tree is far from development
- Clarification of protection requirement
 - Construction staging
 - Trees near designated Development Impact Area*
- Definitions (tree, building, attached structure, tree removal*, ground disturbance*)
- Add lien authority consistent with other City enforcement policies
- Increase ¼" pruning permit threshold*

Other Title 11 Code Issues

Categories	Examples
Tree preservation	 Incentives / flexibility for tree preservation in development situations Private tree preservation requirements (sunsets after 2019)
Tree removal	 Large, healthy tree removal when structure is within 10 ft. of attached structure in non-development situations Public notice/appeal for large, non-nuisance, healthy tree removal
Tree planting & mitigation	 Incentives for planting large and conifer trees Equitable tree planting requirements
Technical / Clarification	 Requirements for trees that straddle lot lines Allowances to remove trees within a grove
