City Council Testimony Google Fiber Franchise Agreement Amendment Matthew Timberlake, DCA IT *June 29, 2016*

Thank you, Mayor Hales and Commissioners. I'm Matt Timberlake, IT Portfolio Manager for Multnomah County. Thank you for this opportunity to speak in support of the amendment to the Google Fiber Franchise Agreement.

Multnomah County is excited about the work that's being done to transition our Digital Equity Action Plan from strategy to action, and we're committed to supporting this work.

This amendment can create a critical source of much-needed funding for digital equity in our community.

The Digital Equity Action Plan, which was adopted unanimously by this Council and by the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners, has been hailed as a model for its collaborative approach to fostering digital inclusion, and for its emphasis on concrete actions by a wide complement of organizations and stakeholders.
