

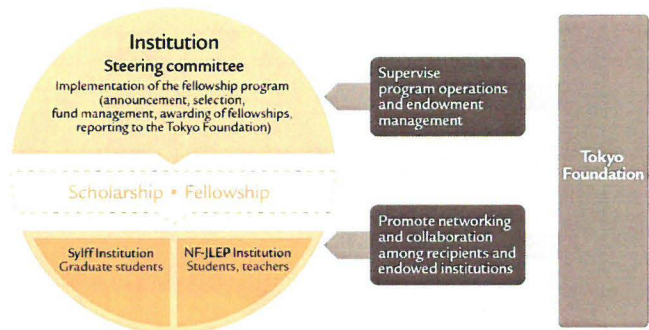

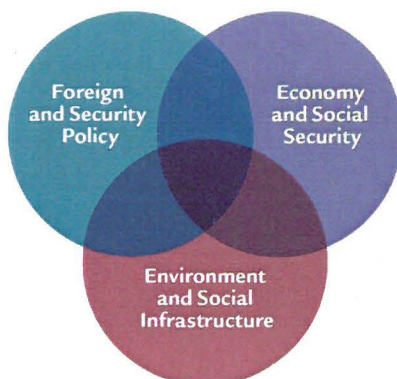

### Policy Research

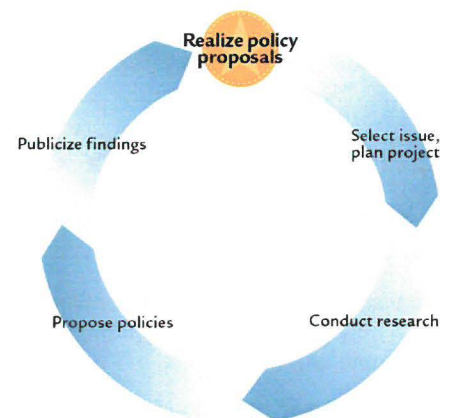
