INTER-AGENCY AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE,
OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS,
NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF JUSTICE
WASHINGTON, D.C.
AND
CITY OF PORTLAND/PORTLAND POLICE BUREAU

I. <u>Legal Authority</u>

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) enters into this IAA under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, Title I, sections 202 and 807 of Public Law 90-351, 42 U.S.C. Section 3722 (c) and (d)(1) and 3788(b); Title II, Subtitle D of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (the "Homeland Security Act") (6 U.S.C. §§ 161-165); and 28 U.S.C. § 530C.

II. Background

Approximately two thirds of law enforcement agencies in the US are using computerized crime mapping to guide decision making in areas such as resource allocation. Several "off-the shelf" solutions have emerged which purport the ability to forecast the location of future crime. However, an unbiased, comprehensive comparative analysis has not yet occurred to determine how well these products perform relative to one another. Additionally, the field of data analytics is rapidly evolving in industries such as consumer behavior prediction, medical/anomaly detection, and informatics. The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) believes that many of the new data analytics methods could be further applied to crime forecasting algorithms which could foster rapid innovation in this field. To provide an unbiased, comprehensive comparative analysis, the NIJ is releasing the "Real-time Crime Forecasting Challenge." The goals of this challenge are twofold: 1. foster innovation by involving non-traditional "crime forecasting" participants; and, 2. provide a mechanism to compare available methods.

The City of Portland/Portland Police Bureau is entering into this IAA to provide the calls-for-service (CFS) data that will be used for the above described challenge. The data will be made publicly available for the purposes of applicants creating forecasting models to be submitted to above challenge. The CFS data will be provided at the address level (with the potential of data points moved to street segments directly in front of an address). All CFS data that occurs between 03/01/2012 – 05/31/2017 (5 years and 3 months) will be provided.

Exceptions for data categories are allowable (e.g., domestic violence, child abuse) where addresses are specific to victims or protected classes of individuals.

III. Statement of Work

The City of Portland/Portland Police Bureau (PPB) will be responsible to provide data to an NIJ contractor acting on behalf of NIJ for the purpose of preparing for the above mentioned challenge. In order for the data to be posted on data.gov. The following is the schedule of data deliverables:

- On September 1st, 2016, initial release of PPB CFS data for 03/01/12-07/31/16
- By September 7th, 2016, release of PPB CFS data for 08/01/16-08/31/16
- By October 7th, 2016, release of PPB CFS data for 09/01/16-09/30/16
- By November 7th, 2016, release of PPB CFS data for 10/01/16-10/31/16
- By December 7th, 2016, release of PPB CFS data for 11/01/16-11/30/16
- By January 7th, 2017, release of PPB CFS data for 12/01/16-12/31/16
- By February 7th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 01/01/17-01/31/17
- By February 17th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 02/01/17-02/14/17
- By February 24th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 02/15/17-02/21/17
- On February 27th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 02/22/17-02/26/17
- on February 28th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 02/27/17 and any CFS data for 02/28/17 that are available at time of last upload (3 p.m. eastern time).
- By March 6th, 2017 release of any PPB CFS data for 02/27/17-02/28/17 not yet released
- On June 7th, 2017 release of PPB CFS data for 03/01/17-05/31/17

Every attempt will be made to provide the call data as close to initial date as possible. CFS data will include fields agreed upon by both parties but at a minimum will contain:

- Date
- Time
- Location in a commonly available coordinate system
 - o Location will either by to the specific address or;
 - o Moved to the street line directly in front of the location.
- Police Beat (District)
- Police Precinct
- Clearance Code for the call
- Other informative codes related to the call (i.e. call priority etc.).
- Final Case Type (i.e. the type of call).

A data dictionary will also be provided explain the fields and including common language descriptions of any codes.

The data set will include call data which is not sensitive in nature (i.e. domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse etc.). Other specific exceptions may be agreed upon by both parties.

IV. Amount

The National Institute of Justice will commit \$30,000 towards administrative cost recovery.

IX. Period of Agreement

This agreement shall be effective September 1, 2016 through July 31, 2017.

X. Reports and Reimbursement Vouchers

Funds to be advanced to support an NIJ request to expedite work. Deliverables schedule is outlined above and no additional reporting is required.

XI. Right of Termination

This agreement may be terminated by either of the parties. The two parties shall agree on the effective date of termination, and in case of a partial termination, the portion to be terminated.

XII. <u>Disputes</u>

Should disagreements arise on the interpretation of the provisions of this agreement or amendments and/or revisions thereto that cannot be resolved at the operating level, the area(s) of disagreement shall be stated in writing by each party and presented to the other party for consideration. If agreement or interpretation is not reached within sixty (60) days, the parties shall forward the written presentation of the disagreement to respective higher officials for appropriate resolution.

XIII. Public Information Coordination

Public disclosure of information regarding projects and activities conducted under this Agreement will be subject to the Freedom of Information Act as codified at U.S.C Section 552. Prior to disclosure of requested information, the parties shall consult regarding any such proposed disclosure.

XIV. Modification

A. Amendments or modifications to this Agreement must be approved by each of the parties in writing in accordance with applicable policies, procedures, and legal requirements and signed by the appropriate authorizing officials.

- B. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days advance written notice to the other party.
- C. The Office of Justice Programs (OJP) also may terminate this Agreement should it have reason to believe that the Portland Police Bureau is mishandling funds or is unable to carry out the terms of this Agreement. OJP will give the Portland Police Bureau an opportunity to respond to a proposed termination for cause prior to taking final action. In the event the Agreement is terminated for cause, OJP will notify the Portland Police Bureau, specify the reason for termination, and accord the Portland Police Bureau a reasonable time to terminate operations under this Agreement. In the event of termination, any remaining unobligated balance will be returned to OIP.
