












National Historic Preservation Act of 1966

- Signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson
- Reflected a broad coalition of groups (rural and urban)
- Established federal agency, state (SHPO), and local frameworks
- Preceded the passage of the National Environmental Policy Act by 3 years



If the preservation movement is to be successful...it must attempt to give a sense of orientation to our society, using structures, and objects of the past to establish values of time and place."

- Historic Districts: Height, FAR and Compatible Design
- Residential Neighborhoods: Demolition,
 Character, Equity, and Affordability
- Development Pressure on Streetcar
 Commercial Nodes
- Seismic Retrofit Project for Unreinforced Masonry Buildings
- Sustainability and Stewardship



ISSUE

- DLCD Rulemaking Process to revise Goal 5 Rules
- Legislative Agenda
 - Repeal the Owner Consent Agenda



- Continue to support the City's Participation in the DLCD's Rulemaking Advisory Committee (RAC)
- Recommend rejecting any dramatic expansion of the definition of "property owner"
- Recommend rejecting any attempt to weaken local protections on past or future National Register listings

ISSUE

- Incompatible height allowances in Zoning Code
- Proposed FAR bonuses
- Lower level reviews for affordable housing projects



- Right Size Zoning in Historic Districts – protect district character
- Provide Clarity to
 Owners/Developers
 Through Refining Design
 Guidelines and Ensuring
 Consistency with Zoning
 Code
- Create Inclusionary
 Housing Incentive that
 doesn't put pressure on
 contributing buildings in
 historic districts

ISSUE

- Demolitions
 150 to 400 residential demolitions per year
- Loss of Affordability
- Erosion of Neighborhood Character
- Wasteful

RECOMMENDATION

- Encourage retention of existing housing
- Design within a historic context
- Support the equitable creation of new historic districts

ISSUE

- Incompatible new development
- Lack of recognition that these historic streetscapes retain integrity and have community value

- Provide protections
- Incentivize rehabilitation

- Support creation of historic districts

ISSUE

- The requirements for seismic retrofits of historic resources require significant financial investment
- Lack of financial and regulatory incentives to offset costs

RECOMMENDATION

- Regulatory flexibility
- Lobby for state incentives
- Pursue FEMA funding for pre-disaster mitigation
