Purpose of proposed legislation and background information:

Appoint three citizens to the Portland Parks Board. For these new appointments, one (1) will fill a vacancy left by the resignation of a member who did not complete his term, and two (Paul D. Agrimis, and Joseph A. O'Leary) will replace one current Board member (Ty Schwoeffermann) who requested not to be re-appointed and one current Board member (Sue Van Brocklin) who is term-limited out.

Four current members of the Parks Board (Patricia Frobes, Kendall Clawson, Gladys Ruiz and Jim Owens) will be reappointed for a three-year term ending June 30, 2020. Patricia Frobes, Kendall Clawson, Gladys Ruiz and Jim Owens will be serving their final terms on the board.

Financial and budgetary impacts:

This legislation does not generate or reduce current or future revenue coming to the City. There is no additional costs other than a small amount of materials which is already budgeted for Parks Board business.

Community impacts and community involvement:

The Board is made up of a diverse group of members representing all geographic districts of the City. The Parks Board advocates for equitable resources and makes recommendations that benefits all of the City of Portland.

Personal Statement

Four years ago, I volunteered at Peninsula Park Rose Garden. I was overwhelmed by the beauty of the place – the architecture, the central fountain, the roses and the fragrance that greeted me as I walked down the stairs onto the Garden floor. That said, the Garden was not all it could be – many of the roses were old and not disease resistant and the weeds were beginning to cover the Garden floor. With 2 other like-minded Master Gardeners, I formed the Friends of Peninsula Park Rose Garden to work with Portland Parks and Recreation to, among other things, improve the maintenance of the Garden. In three years, the Friends and Portland Parks, with the help of over 200 volunteers and wonderful partners in the business and non-profit communities, have planted over 5000 new, disease resistant and donated roses and tripled the size of the regular volunteer group that, with Parks, maintains the Garden.

My experience at Peninsula Park has reinforced my belief in the importance of public green spaces in creating the shared memories and experiences that build and sustain healthy communities. It has also taught me the power of public/private partnerships to make a positive difference in maintaining the incredible park resources we have and in extending those resources to underserved communities. There is a large gap between the public dollars available for park maintenance and new parks and what needs to be done to preserve what we have and create new parks for future generations. I believe public/private partnerships can play an important role in bridging that gap.

I sought to join the Parks Board to help in the establishment and implementation of new policies and funding opportunities to achieve the goals of the Parks 2020 Vision. I hope to be an advocate for neighborhood and volunteer involvement and for public-private cooperation in the enhancement of existing and new facilities.

Kendall Clawson

Kendall Clawson is currently the Director of Executive Appointments and Senior Policy Advisor for Arts and Culture for Oregon Governor John Kitzhaber.
