Purpose of proposed legislation and background information:

In November 2014, Portland City Council designated \$300,000 from 2014's fall supplemental budget for new master plans for eastside parks. In April 2015, Portland Parks & Recreation (PP&R), the East Portland Neighborhood Organization (EPNO) Parks Committee, and Commissioner Amanda Fritz engaged the community in a public outreach process to determine which sites should be prioritized as part of the eastside park master planning process. Based on a public outreach process and PP&R staff input, in June 2015 Commissioner Fritz chose three parks for improvement: Mill Park, Midland Park and the property at SE 150th and SE Division Street.

PP&R developed master plans for Mill Park and Midland Park in a concurrent process. The park designs were drawn from the thoughtful ideas and feedback provided by diverse communities in East Portland. Overall, there is great enthusiasm and strong support for improving Mill and Midland Parks. The design and plan for these parks deliver on the City of Portland's pledge to enhance parks in East Portland.

Financial and budgetary impacts:

The final master plan provides a planning level cost estimate of design and construction of park components. The improvements can be phased based on priority need but are unfunded at this time. A preliminary Operations & Maintenance (O&M) cost opinion (in 2017 dollars) is \$101,000 per year for Mill Park and \$34,000 per year for Midland Park. A final O&M estimate will be completed during the design phase of this project, and will be adjusted again after the park is completed and open to the public. PP&R will pursue a variety of funding sources to implement the master plan.

Community impacts and community involvement:

PP&R and its consultant team connected with community partners to gather valuable input with an intentional focus on engaging underrepresented, low income, refugee and immigrant communities in the area. The recommended designs for Mill Park and Midland Park reflect a collaborative effort involving neighbors and community groups to create welcoming spaces with activities for people of all ages.

A variety of outreach methods designed to engage interested Portlanders in this project comprised the public involvement effort including neighborhood canvassing, parties in the park, community- and language-specific focus groups, online project website and surveys, and community gatherings. Residents speaking Spanish, Vietnamese, Somali, Russian, and English participated in a multi-cultural and multi-lingual community design process.

Community Engagement Liaisons Program (CELs) enhanced the outreach process by providing language translation. PP&R tailored focus group discussions to the preferences and needs of the target group; focus groups included the Spanish-speaking community, the Vietnamese-speaking community, and low-income communities. PP&R made presentations to the Mill Park Neighborhood Association, Midway Business Association, and the East Portland Parks Coalition. Overall, there is a strong desire among the community to accelerate the development process.

PP&R and its consultant team also worked with a Project Advisory Committee (PAC) and a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC); these groups provided local perspectives and professional expertise that informed the designs and guided the planning process. The PAC consisted of representatives of community organizations including Human Solutions, Northwest Asian Sports (NWAS) Volleyball, Mill Park Neighborhood Association, Midland Library, Midway Business Association, Mill Park Elementary School, and youth. The PAC met five times.
