Opinions of Doctors regarding Influenza Situation.

Dr. Besson: No change. Receiving practically same number of cases each day. Has great faith and feels encouraged over use of vaccine.

Dr. Bilderbach: (Children Specialist) Very few children having it; only those who have been in direct contact with adults.

Dr. Marsh: Cases subsiding a great deal. Received no new cases yesterday. Finds the vaccine very effective.

Dr. Margason: No improvement, receiving just as many cases.
Cases less severe when inoculated.

Dr. Kaadt: Situation improving. Cases milder than at first.

Dr. Trommald: Situation better. Fewer cases. Where vaccine administered cases more mild; no serious complications.

Dr. Booth: Fewer severe cases. Crest of epidemic not reached. Receiving just as many, but called in earlier. No serious complications develop where vaccine has been used.

Dr. Short: Condition better. Cases more mild than when epidemic first broke out.

Dr. Meyers: Is of the opinion that the influenza had lost its force. It seems to be attacking some of the better class now; not so forceful or virulent.

Dr. Rybke: The cases are not so bad as at first and recover quicker.

Mr. Bechtold, Mgr. of National Hospital Association: Condition in outlying districts better. No change in number of office calls. Vaccine has not prevented influenza, but cases are less severe.
