

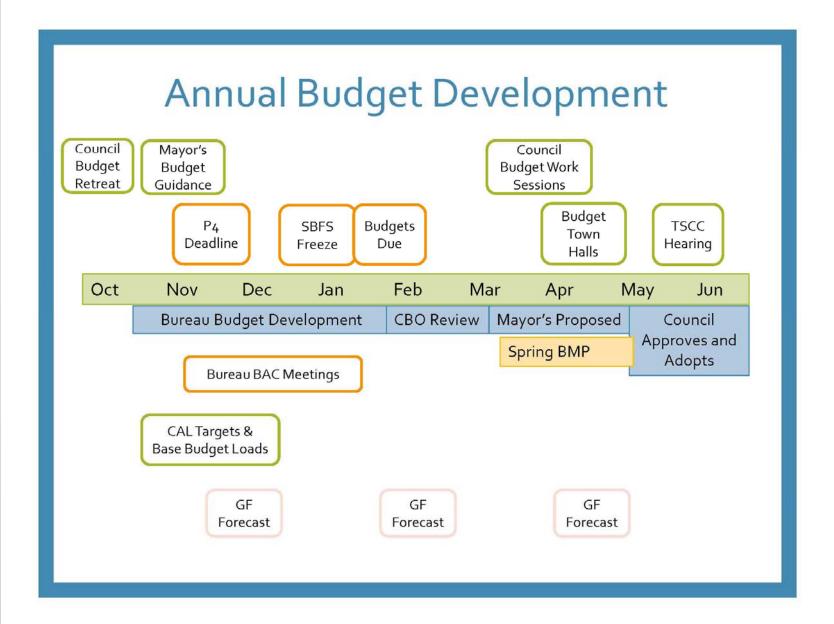

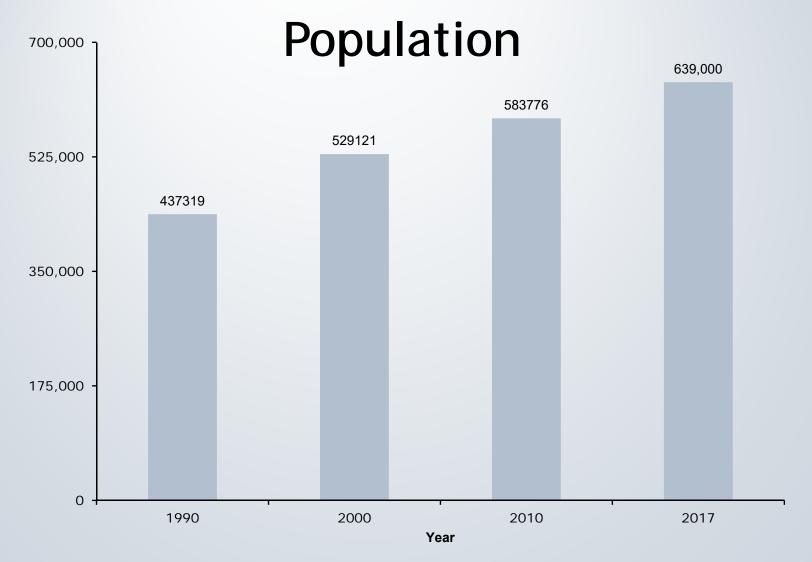




BAC Process and Outcomes

142,000 new jobs added to the 370,000 existing jobs*

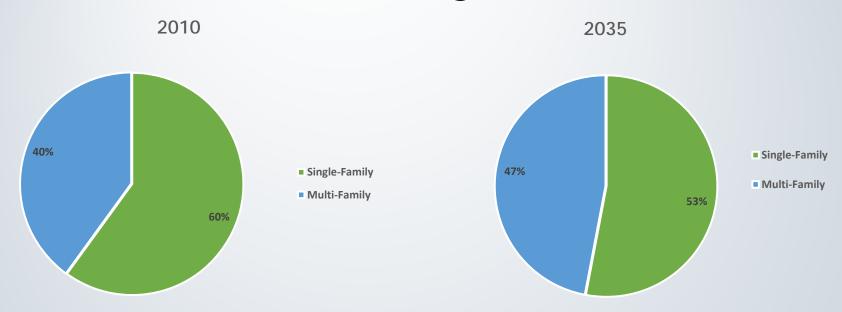
2010 Employment - 369,440 2016 Employment - 436,425 2010-2016 Job Growth - 67,000 jobs!

Housing Mix



Portland currently has about 265,000 housing units, of which about 60 percent are single-family.

Between now and 2035, about 80 percent of new housing units are anticipated to be multi-family.

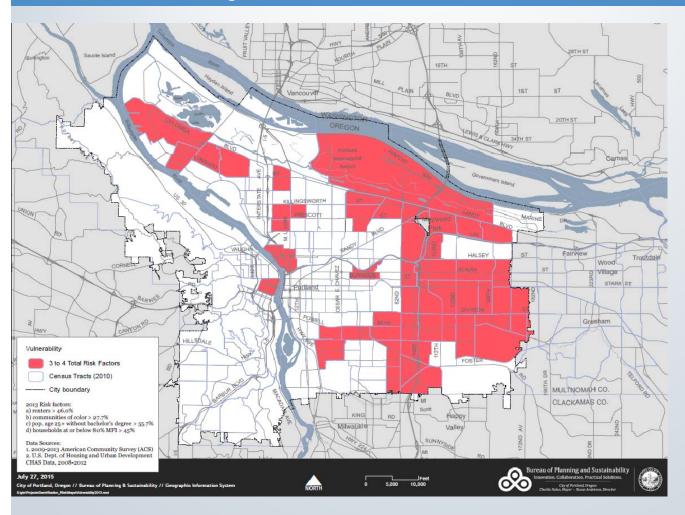
By 2035, Portland will have more multi-family units than single-family households.

- Housing affordability, especially in popular, healthy connected neighborhoods
- Persistent income disparities by race
- Population gain and increasing diversity
- Smaller households, older population
- Employment opportunities for people without college degrees
- Climate change



Vulnerability: Census tracts with at least three risk factors

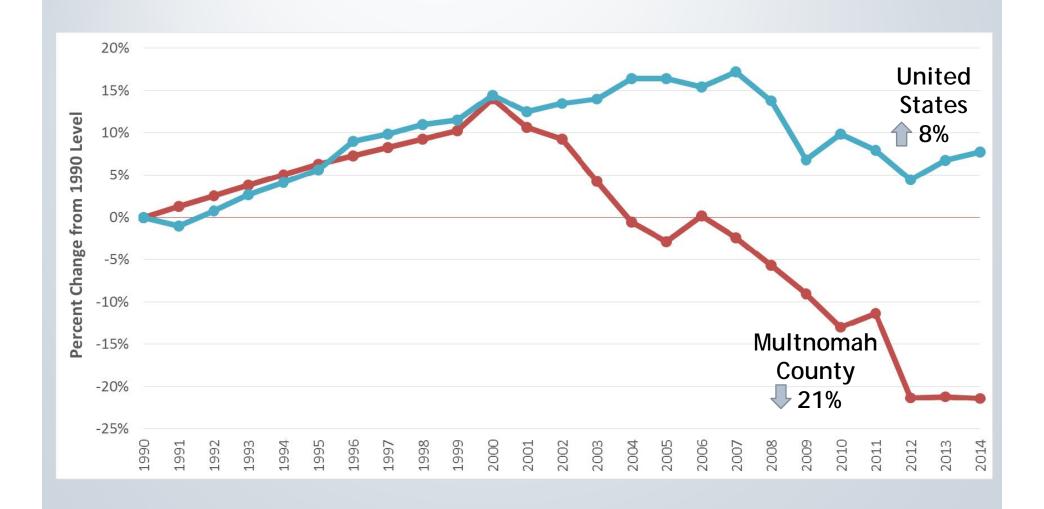


Vulnerability risk factors

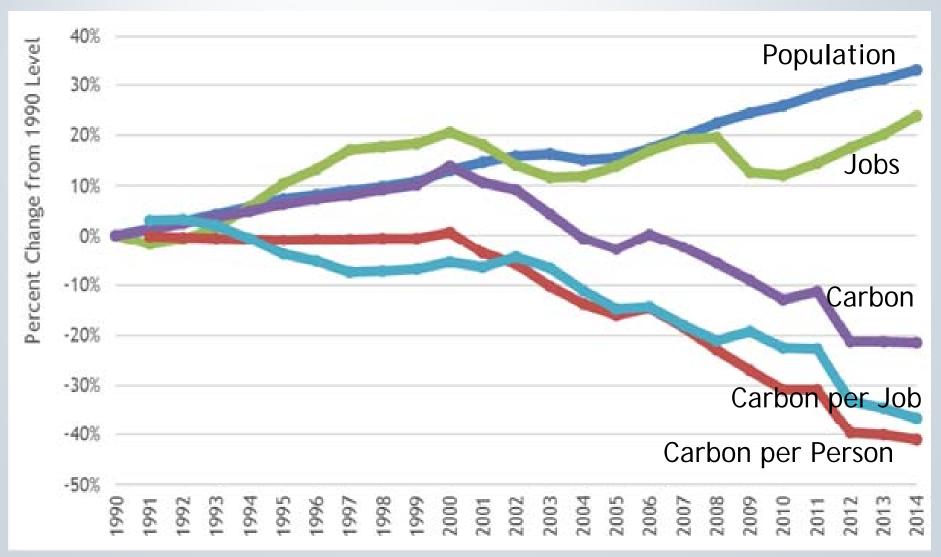
- Renters >= 46%

Local carbon emissions have departed from national trend

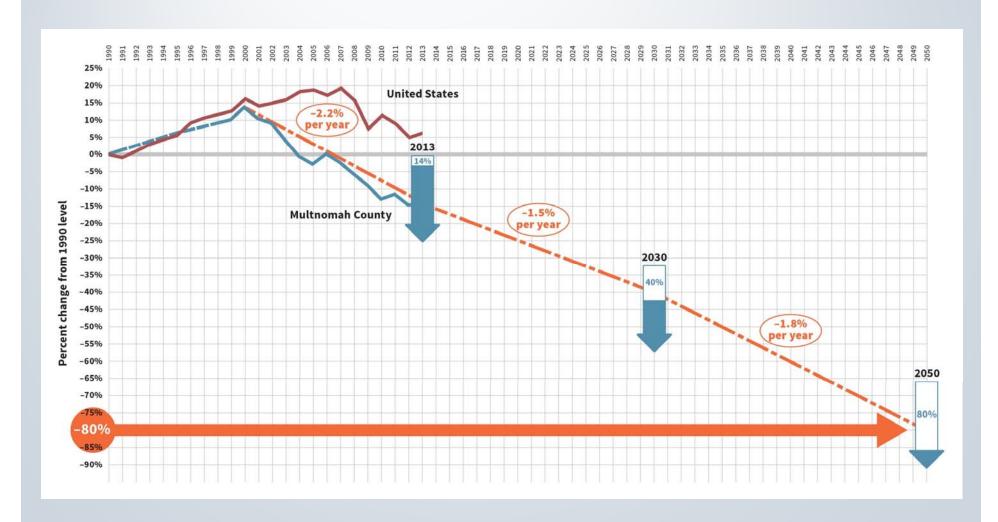


People and Jobs Up; Carbon Down





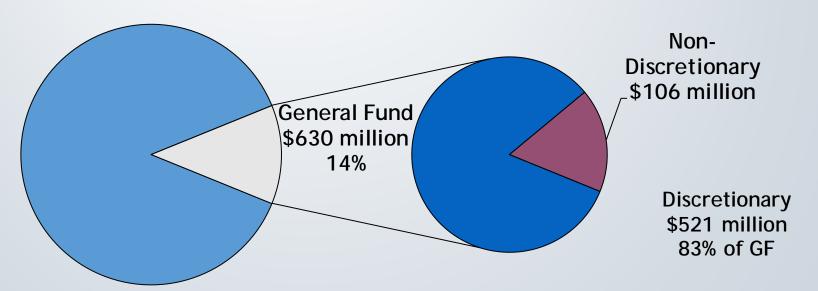
But we have a long way to go



Total City Budget (FY17-18)

Dedicated, \$3.9 billion 86%

Dedicated & Non-Discretionary: only used for specific purpose (Parks fees pay for parks, Water/Sewer for water/sewer system maintenance and improvement, etc.)



General Fund Discretionary: Council chooses where to spend, including: police, fire, parks, administration, community development (includes ONI), etc.

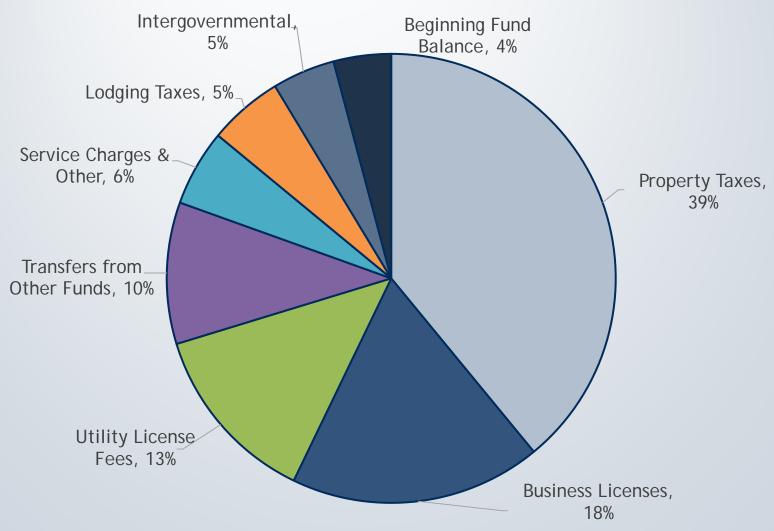

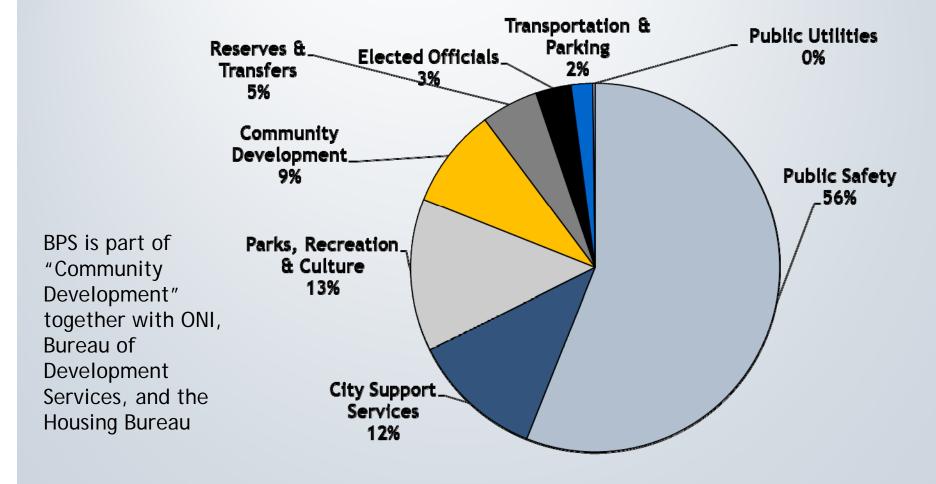
Where does General Fund come from?

FY18-19 Budget Guidance

General Fund Reductions

- 5% reduction for all General Fund bureaus
- Identify efficiencies, reduce or eliminate noncore services or services that do not scale well, eliminate City-imposed mandates that have not resulted in demonstrable benefits, and reduce indirect costs and administration that do not harm front-line services.

New Funding Requests (Ongoing)

Council will consider programs that are demonstrated to have a direct and measurable impact on the following key priorities:

- Increasing housing options and reducing homelessness;
- Maintaining the City's critical infrastructure;
- Enhancing livability;
- Increasing public safety and police accountability; and
- Continuing to pursue innovation and strengthening our resiliency posture.

New Funding Requests (One-time)

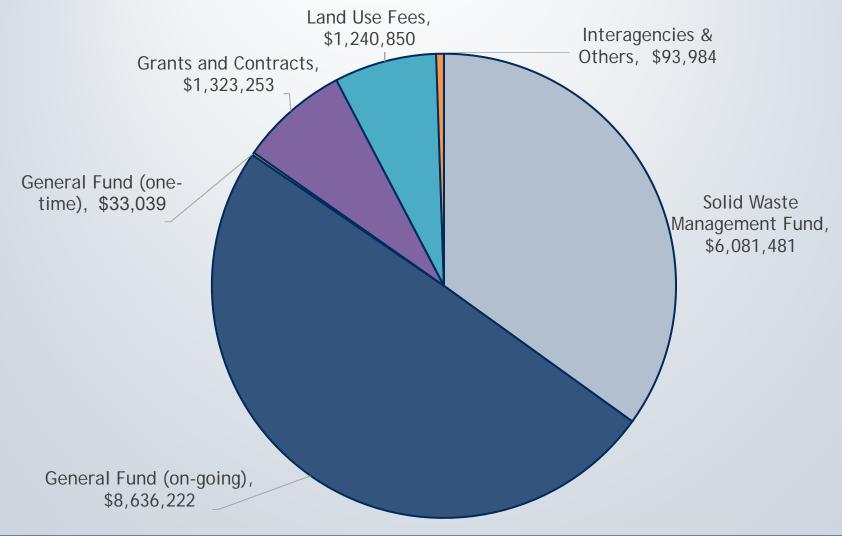
The following priorities will be considered:

- Technology investments or investments in other operational efficiencies that reduce ongoing costs in the future;
- Projects or other one-time efforts that will increase General Fund revenues;
- Infrastructure investments that reduce future major maintenance needs; and
- Bridge funding for ongoing reductions.



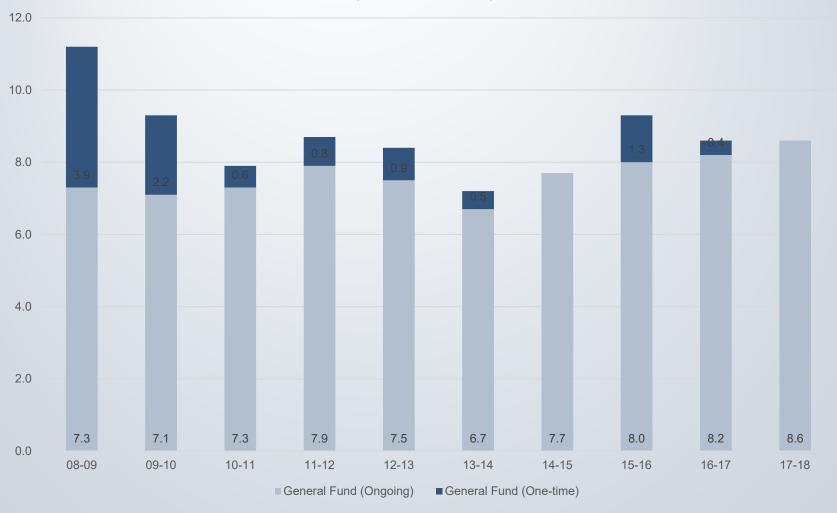


BPS Funding Sources \$17 million in FY17-18

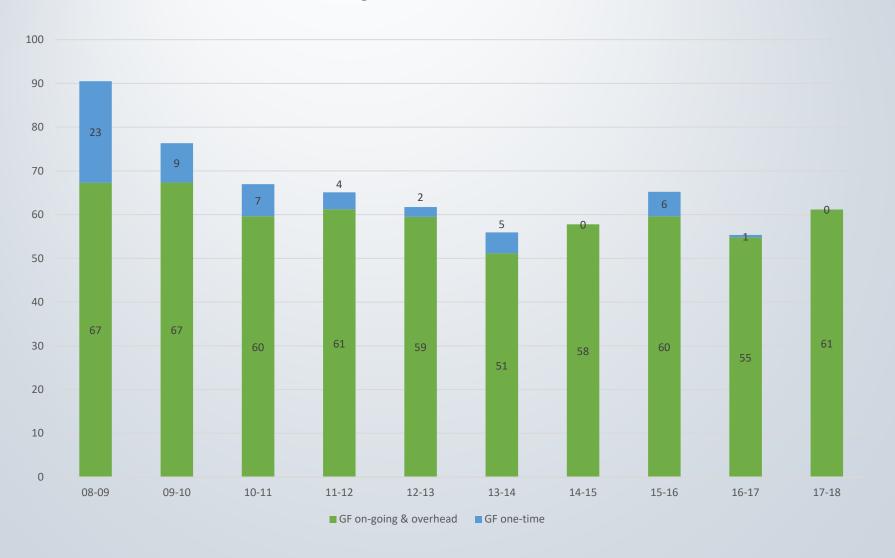


BPS General Fund Resources
