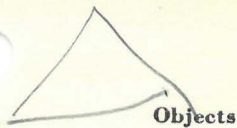

Dear Madam:

I am in receipt of your letter of January 6th, in which you request the privilege be granted to improve the strip of land on Nineteenth and Washington Streets with the ultimate view of erecting thereon a statue in honor of Mrs. Duniway.

I took up with the Council at the session this morning your request for use of this site, and find that a similar request has already been made to the Council for the purpose of erecting a memorial in honor of David Campbell.

I will make an effort to adjust this situation as soon as possible and to secure a site suitable for the purpose you have in view. I intend to take up the question with the David Campbell Memorial Committee and to do everything possible to secure an appropriate location for each. The movement in favor of the Campbell Memorial will have to be given every consideration as Mr. Campbell lost his life while in the discharge of his duty and their object is also a worthy one. I am heartily in accord with your efforts and assure you some plan will be worked out whereby all interested will be satisfied.
