Annual Action Plan Meetings

 Need more language and culturally specific services and outreach

More affordable housing that meets specific needs such as accessibility, or family sized housing, accessible to good jobs, schools, and services.
More investment in infrastructure, transportation and services in East Portland
Enforcement of tenant protections and more affordable legal assistance of all kinds
Enforcement of habitability codes without causing evictions or displacement
Connecting housing to physical and mental health services and systems
Reducing rent and transportation burdens to stabilize households
Remove barriers to housing from negative debt

Increase and preserve affordable housing choice. Affordable housing choice includes; safe housing, quality housing, home repair, down payment assistance, support for new housing development, affordable housing development, rental housing rehabilitation and permanent supportive housing.



Reduce and Prevent Homelessness

Projects include supportive and emergency services, transitional housing, shelters, homelessness prevention, Housing First models, Fair Housing enforcement, cultural and population appropriate program delivery and activities to increase self-sufficiency, e.g., job training, employment readiness and education.



Economic Opportunity

Programs to improve employment outcomes and household economic stability include employment training, referral and self-sufficiency and economic enhancement programs, micro-enterprises and business development, as well as, public facilities, parks and transportation improvements.
