To the Hon. the Common Council.

Gentlemen, I herewith return an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to prevent Chinese being employed on City Contracts" without my aproval for the reason that in my opinion the same conflicts with the laws and treaties of the United State,

By what is known as the "Civil Rights act" all persons are equal before the law - without regard to race or color - and by the treaties with the Chinese Empire, the citizens of the United States visiting China are entitled to all the privileges and immunities awarded to the most favored nations and reciprocally the Chinese are awarded the same rights in the United States as the subjects of any other nation except the privilege of Naturalization.

The power to act in this matter in
my judgment lies solely with the
Congress of the United States.
