DESCRIPTION: A bronze figure of Lincoln depicting him as he would have appeared during the days of the Civil War; head bowed and shoulders drooped, a sad but kindly expression on his face. The figure is ten feet in height and stands on a rectangular granite base 3' by 4' by 4' high. The sculptor was George Fite Waters. The inscription on the north face of the base reads as follows:

Four years before the actual dedication of the Lincoln Statue, Dr..Henry Waldo Coe appeared before the City Council on December 19, 1924 and offered a statue of Abraham Lincoln under the same conditions which he offered the statues of George Washington and Joan of Arc; the City to bear the expense of site mounting and base for the statue. (C. P.Book 78, Page 223).


Of the four statues, Lincoln, Washington, T. Roosevelt and Joan of Arc that Dr. Coe presented to the City, probably more communications were addressed to the Council as to a site location for its placement than any other three statues, According to Council proceedings, petitions of various individuals and organizations were numerous.

The design for a statue of Lincoln by George Fite Waters was initially rejected by the Art Commission because the portrayal was judged not typical of Abraham Lincoln; however, upon reconsideration, the design was approved March 24, 1926 (C. P. Book 81, Pages 474, 475). Finally on June 20, 1928, Ordinance #54789 accepted the statue of president Abraham Lincoln from Wayne W.. Coe, son and representative of Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, the donor of the statue. The ordinance officially placed the statue in park block #8, which was named Lincoln Square July, 1928 by Ordinance #54894. The area known as "Lincoln Square" is the block defined by Main and Madison Streets in the South Park Blocks. Official dedication took place October 5, 1928 with Dr. William Wallace Youngson presenting the statue to the City of Portland of behalf of the Coe Family. It was received on behalf of the City By Mayor Baker. The committee in charge of unveiling was composed of Stanhope S. Pier; City Commissioner in charge of Parks; William L. Verry, Principal of Lincoln High School; and C.S. Baker, Assistant Adjutant of the Grand Army of the Republic, Department of Oregon. The unveiling was done by William Clemmens, Department Commander of the G. A. R. and Mr. Baker. Among the organizations participating were the Grand Army of the Republic, the Sons of Veterans, Woman's Relief Corps, Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, and Ladies of the G.A. R. The dedication date was derived from the October 6, 1928 edition of the Oregonian.

Ordinance No. 54894

An Ordinance to amend Section 2 of Ordinance No. 1039, relating to park blocks.

The City of Portland Does Ordain as Follows:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Ordinance No. 1039, entitled "An Ordinance to designate the park blocks by letters and numbers", passed July 26, 1871, approved July 28, 1871, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The tracts of land lying between Park and West Park Streets and the streets hereinafter named shall be designated and numbered as follows: The tract between Salmon and Main Streets as "Park Block 7"; between Main and Madison Streets as "Lincoln Square"; between Madison and Jefferson Streets as "Roosevelt Square"; between Jefferson and Columbia Streets as "Park Block 10", and so on consecutively as far south as said Park Streets extend.

Ordinance No. 54789

An Ordinance accepting a statue of President Abraham Lincoln from Wayne W. Coe, son and representative of Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, deceased, the original donor of said statue, authorizing the placing of the statue in Park Block No. 8, and declaring an emergency.

The City of Portland does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the Council, for and on behalf of the citizens of the City of Portland, hereby accepts a statue of President Abraham Lincoln from Wayne W. Coe, son and representative of Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, deceased, the original donor of said statue, and authorizes the placing of said statute in Park Block No. 8, conditioned that no trees in said park block shall be cut down or unnecessarily trimmed. The exact location of the statue in said park block shall be designated by the Commissioner of Finance in charge of the Bureau of Parks.

Section 2. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the City of Portland in this: That the statue is in the City of Portland ready to be placed in the park block, and in view of the patriotic gift; therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage by the Council.

Subject Cal. 1648, petition of Daughters of Union Veterans of Civil War requesting cement pavement be constructed around the Lincoln monument in the Park Blocks.

Dear Sir:

Returning herewith calendar No. 1648, would recommend that this be brought to the attention of the 1936 budget committee of the Council. Going further on this question I am of the opinion that to pave a small area around the statue would be of very little benefit. The entire center walk through the block should be paved with some better surfacing material and I am prepared to recommend that when any improvement is offered it should contemplate covering the walk through the block.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Commissioners:

The undersigned respectfully petition your body for the installation of a cement walk around the Lincoln Statue in the Park Blocks, similar to the walk around the Roosevelt Statue. The overall dimension of the paving should be 15' x 45'. This organization has in mind the preservation of the memorials to our great leaders in the proper and dignified manner, and particularly so that of the Great Emancipator.






