DESCRIPTION: This bronze equestrian statue of Joan of Arc depicts her in battle array holding a banner. It is mounted on a granite base 60" wide by 110 $\frac{1}{2}$ " long by 100" high. This statue is a replica of an original by the French sculptor, Emanuel Fremiet, which was erected in 1880 in the Place de Rivoli in Paris, France. "F. Barbedienne Fondateur Paris France" appears on the west base of the casting and "a gift to Portland from Henry Waldo Coe, M. D. 1924" appears on the east base of the casting. 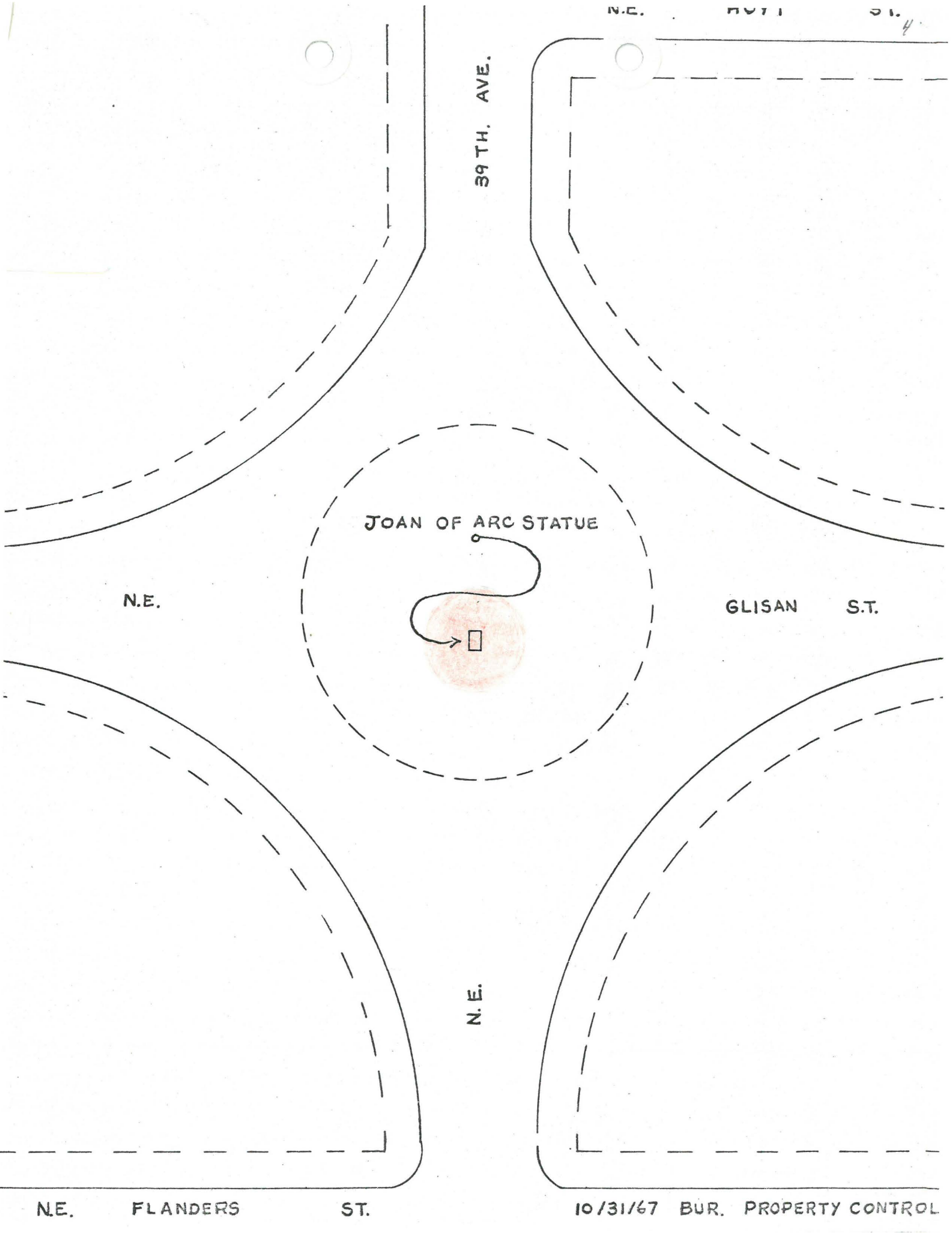

Gentlemen:

At the regular meeting of the Art Commission, Tuesday, August 26, 1924, the formal offer of Dr. Henry Waldo Coe to present to the City of Portland a replica of the Premiet equestrian statue of Joan of Arc, referred to the Commission by the Council, was read and discussed and by unanimous consent the Commission agreed to recommend to the Council, the acceptance of this work of art by the City of Portland, with full appreciation of the public spirit of the donor. However, the Commission feels that this statue is deserving of the finest setting and that the time allowed for recommendation is insufficient. The Commission, therefore, respectfully requests an extension of time of thirty days beyond the ten days allowed by ordinance for recommendation, in order that a full discussion of several proposed sites may be possible.

Gentlemen;

I am immensely interested in the subject of the location of the Jeanne D' Arc statue and notice from recent newspaper article that Dr. Coe is insisting upon placing the statue in the South Park Blocks, preferably in that block directly west of the Lincoln High School.

I am sure that you gentlemen, by virtue of the trust the public has placed in you, are desirous of perpetuating Portland's natural beauty. That beauty lies mainly in her lovely trees. I am only an adopted citizen of this city. I have lived in all four of the large cities on this coast and, while I am inclined to love Portland most, you will un-

doubtedly agree with me that Portland is outdone by the other cities of this coast in almost every way, with the exception of her lovely trees and her home atmosphere.

I have heard most severe criticism of the denuding of that South Park Block where the Roosevelt statue now stands. The statue itself is not of Roosevelt, the President and Statesman whom we revere, but of Roosevelt, a young man, whom most of us never knew. At no time in his career did Roosevelt stand on his military record, why then, a statue of him of that sort, for which so much of the city's natural beauty was destroyed? Now, Dr. Coe is insisting upon destroying another and absolutely the most beautiful block of all the South Park blocks to erect an "imitation" statue of Jeanne d' Arc, whom he claims to have been the Patron Saint of our American Doughboy. I was in the service myself all during the world war, ~~never~~ never at any time did I hear Jeanne d' Arc spoken of as "their patron saint" by any American soldier or sailor. Perhaps some Catholic boy may have considered her so, I cannot say as to that, for if any man did, he was not given to telling it. I have only ^{heard} criticism of the statue and objections from citizens from all different locations when it has been suggested placing the statue in their neighborhood. It seems the statue is neither appreciated nor wanted, and why sacrifice your city's wonderful trees to make room for it?

The writer is not acquainted with the maker of the statue and being an intense lover of God's outdoors, has no desire to know him. It, however, does occur to me that he is very insistent on doing away with Portland's natural beauty in order to erect "imitation" statues which the citizens neither want nor appreciate, in order to have his name in much evidence along their sides. Might we not suggest to the generous gentleman that he buy himself a park and there erect his statues and emblazon his name in letters a foot high, if he wishes, on their sides? There are many eyesores and most unlovely spots in this city which he can beautify in that manner if he is only satisfied in that way. Then the affairs will not be inflicted upon a long-suffering public who does not want them, and at the same time, the city officials of the city of Portland will be doing what the citizens depended upon them to do when they elected them, they will be preserving the natural beauty of the wonderful trees of the city, in which lies her only claim to supremacy as the home city of this coast. If all the unlovely spots and eyesores are allowed to remain undisturbed (and it seems this is done) and the most beautiful spots of the whole city uprooted to satisfy the seemingly selfish desire of some one individual for self-advertising, where is it to end?

The commission has studied and reported on all such matters as have been referred to it by the City Council including the gift of a Joan of Arc statue given by Dr. H. W. Coe and a proposed gift of a statue of Washington by Dr. Coe, and the gift of a drinking fountain by the D. A. R. The works of art and sites for same have been carefully studied and recommendations made on same to the Council.

The commission conducted a public exhibition of pictures of municipal art of various types which was held at the Central Library, Oct. 7 to Oct. 14, 1924.

The commission jointly with the Portland Chapter of the A. I. A. conducted a competition for a design for a base for the Joan of Arc statue. This competition was closed Dec. 9, 1924.

COE'S CIRCLE, home of Portland's Joan of Arc monument since 1925 at NE 39th Avenue and Glisan Street, has been equip-

ped with new traffic light which went into operation Tuesday. Circle is No. 1 on city's list of 10 most dangerous intersections.



Since 1925 this statue of Joan of Arc has stood in Coe Circle at the junction of N.E. 39th and Glisan as a monument to American doughboys who fought on the side of the French during WWI. It was given to the city by Dr. Henry Waldo Coe.

The statue of Joan of Arc which has been standing in Coe Circle at the junction of N.E. 39th and Glisan for over fifty years is one of several public monuments throughout the city of Portland that is often seen but seldom recognized for its historical importance.

It seems likely that the French statue, in particular, would raise a curious eyebrow from an occasional passerby who might wonder what a statue of the martyred Maid of Orleans is doing in a city like Portland, where the only link with French culture is a restaurant.

A recent visit to the Oregon Historical Society has unearthed some interesting facts about the statue's history.

The bronze replica of Joan of Arc, duplicated from an original by French artist Emmanuel Fremiet, was one of four statues given to the city by Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, a Portland physician who specialized in mental disorders and taught at Willamette University.

Coe chose the statue because he felt it was a fitting monument to the American doughboys who so closely allied with the French during WWI.

French Statue Has American History

The dedication ceremony, which was held in 1925, was recognized on a national level with President Calvin Coolidge sending dedicatory remarks for the unveiling of the statue.

Portlanders have grown

quite protective of the statue since it was first erected in the circular greenway named after Dr. Coe. In fact, in 1968 area residents successfully halted an effort by the city to remove Coe Circle because it was one of the

ten most dangerous intersections in the metropolitan area. Petitions, appealing on behalf of the aesthetic and historical value of the statue, were enough to save the landmark. Its future in the city now seems secure.

Coe's Circle Fight Rages On

A new general has taken the field in the battle of Coe's Circle.

Francis J. Murnane, fiery historic and cultural conscience of the Portland City Council, officially entered the fray Friday afternoon.

Coe's Circle, NE 39th Avenue and Glisan Street, has been the home of Portland's Joan of Arc monument since 1925. It is a replica, Murnane said, of a French statue that stands on the spot where the Maid of Orleans was wounded in 1431.

The circle, unfortunately, is Number 1 on the city traffic engineer's list of 10 most dangerous intersections. Its removal is one of several possible solutions to rush hour jam-ups that caused 76 accidents in 1966.

In finding a solution, the traffic engineer authorized a study of the situation and dispatched two city crews to take elevations. The appearance of a large work force, equipped with trucks, transits and flagmen aroused the neighborhood earlier this week to circulating petitions against removal of the circle.

City commissioners were inundated with calls from the aroused neighbors and Mayor Terry D. Schrunk pleaded with the press to assure them there would be no action taken on the matter until a full council hearing has been held.

Traffic engineers said Thursday they have not even started to evaluate their field data and have not reached any conclusion on the circle.

Murnane Friday researched the circle and its statue. He filed a two-page statement and brief history with the city auditor in the afternoon.

"We should not ignore the fact that cities were created for people," Murnane wrote, "and not as accommodations for machines, and particularly not to be surrendered to automobiles while the cultural and artistic aspects are obscured or destroyed."

The council will officially receive Murnane's report at its Wednesday meeting. It will probably not take any action, except to refer the whole matter to the Department of Public Works under Commissioner William A. Bowes.

Installation of the statue brought dedicatory remarks from both U.S. President Calvin Coolidge and French President Gaston Doumergue.

On Memorial Day, 1925, Doumergue sent a message which read: "On the day when, united in a sentiment of noble fraternity, you glorify the memory of our national heroine, I wish to send you in my name and that of France, the expression of my deeply moved and thoughtful sympathy."

Coolidge was moved by a kindred muse: "The erection of this memorial does honor alike to the friendly people of the great French Republic and to the fine American community which will be adorned by it. The cause of human freedom knows no national boundaries, and it is highly fitting that such a testimonial be dedicated by Americans to

the memory of the Maid of Orleans."

Speakers at the dedication included the Rev. William W. Youngson, former City Commissioner S.C. Pier and French Consul C. Henri Labbe.

Labbe, the records show, extolled the heroic deeds of Joan and the inspiration both Americans and French took from her during World War I.

But the main address was left to "the Rock of the Marne," Portland's Maj. Gen. Ulysses Grant Alexander whose troops held the Hun and received France's accolades a decade before.

Oregon Gov. Walter Pierce attended the ceremony as did the city's acting mayor, C.A. Bigelow.

Bigelow expressed Portland's thanks to the statue's donor, Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, and promised that the statue, "in its abiding place would always be kept worthily beautiful with grass and flowers."

Dr. Coe gave the city a number of other statues and monuments, including the casting of Theodore Roosevelt which stands in the downtown Park Blocks.

Murnane noted all of this for the council and also recalled, "The City of Portland made a promise to Dr. Henry Waldo Coe that his gift would be preserved and cherished at this location. So far, the city has kept the pledge in a most magnificent manner. Let us continue to do so!"

Murnane urged that whatever traffic plans are considered, the retention of Coe Circle and the statue should be of prime importance.

The insurgent leader was said to be Kemal Beg Vriont, who was understood to have the support of Bulgarian and Macedonian organizations in Vienna.

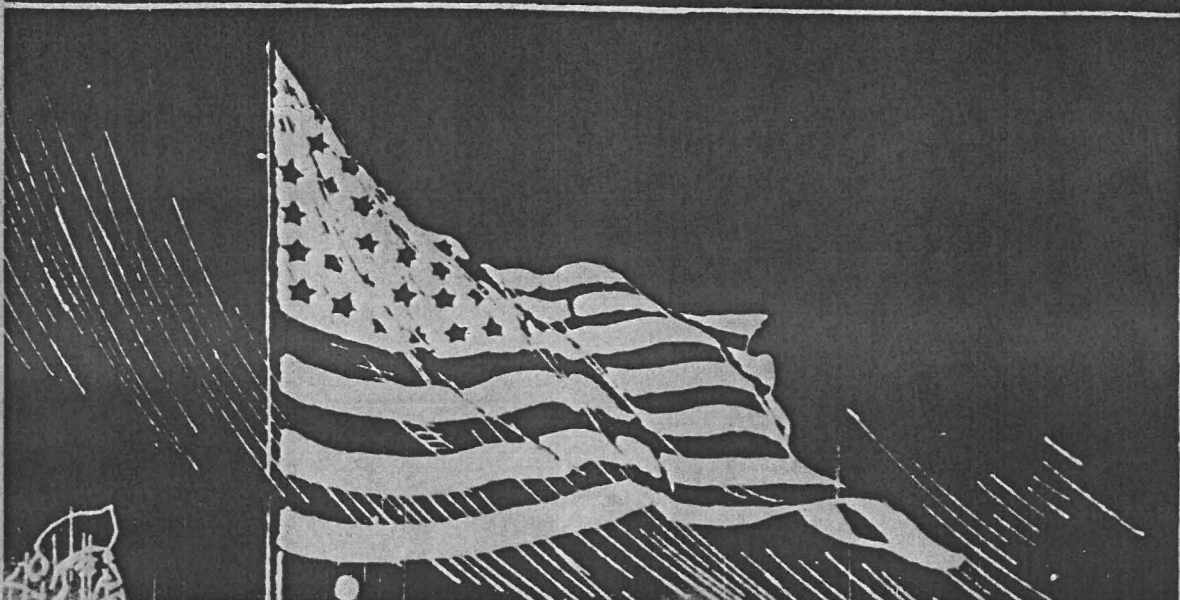
LOGAN QUITS PARIS POST

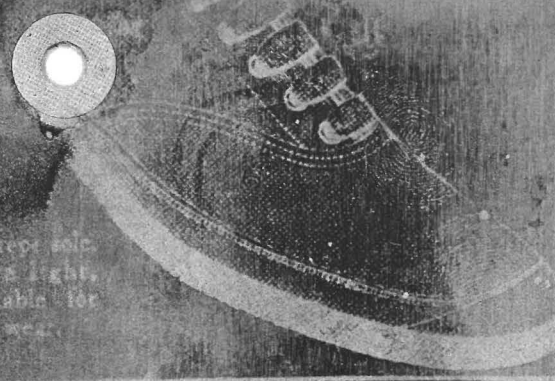
