Contrary to their claims, SWNI does not do much service to the community. It has evolved into an organization that exists only to serve itself.

The SWNI board makeup stifles the voice of neighborhood associations by having five or more committee chairs and four officers as voting members. The committees are very sparsely attended but claim to take issue positions in the name of all the neighborhood associations even though decided by a very few individuals.

The president of SWNI spends her time maligning other board members in emails, skewed emails, articles and presentations with claims and false conspiracy theories with wanton regard to the truth.

SWNI leaders openly make wild claims of bias and dishonesty against the independent auditor hired by the city, certain city employees and elected officials. SWNI attacks anyone that holds different opinions and has consistently for a long time.

SWNI received a 65K PP loan under mostly false premises. The extent SWNI was impacted by COVID-19 was minimal. SWNI did nothing for its constituent neighborhood associations nor provide any COVID-19 relief for anyone else in SW Portland. They misrepresented their situation to the Fed, the Bank and the city. One neighborhood association objected to SWNI taking the PPP loan and has been since ostracized by the SWNI board.

SWNI is spending their existing limited resources on paying a lawyer. Why did SWNI hire a lawyer to represent themselves to the city? Because SWNI lied and refused to submit documents to other SWNI board members and to Civic Life even though they have an obligation to do so. SWNI continues to fight against transparency to this day. SWNI leadership has brought the lack of funding upon themselves. SWNI has shown itself unable to abide by their city contract, unable to be transparent, honest and accountable.

The audit on SWNI has clearly documented not only a toxic culture but mismanagement of funds and willing non-adherence to oversight policies. This methodology is pervasive to the organization. I served on the SWNI executive and financial committees under least four different presidents and the audit tells the truth. The adherence to policies and expected norms of accounting are not practiced. Existing policies were not even known by most of those members who participated. The procedures I witnessed were sloppy and non-consistent. Budget explanations were often murky and misunderstood. This was the way things were done. The latest regime at SWNI is the most unethical I have ever witnessed in my experience with this organization. I have no confidence in the truthfulness of the Executive Director.

I am sorry to have to submit such a long letter but there is so much wrong with SWNI that is beyond the realm of being fixable. Our tax dollars need to go to an honest, transparent, accountable and equitable organization. SWNI is not one of those and does not even strive to become one.

I have seen members of the SWNI board filibuster to prevent a vote to adopt a racial equity policy. I have seen members of the SWNI board demonize and ostracize other board members who worked to get the racial policy adopted. I have heard SWNI board members make comments against bringing equity principals into the organization while at the same time expressing not knowing what equity was. On numerous occasions, I have witnessed the SWNI board vote against getting any equity training brought into the organization. SWNI now gives lip service to equity practices now only to get funding. It hasn't and will not incorporate principles into the organization.

SWNI is led by a gang of bullies. SWNI perpetuates exclusion even in the way it recruits for board elections. Only selected people of those who have run or held previous positions and friends of existing board members are sought out to run. This has been the nominating practice for years and years.

The current SWNI president was witnessed assaulting a 'troublemaker' in the hallway by a staff member. The president and the ED have not taken any actions when a member reported being demeaned by a SWNI officer. The list of unacceptable behaviors of SWNI leaders goes on and on. It is a litany of shame.

Please assist the neighborhood associations to find other fiscal sponsors. Do not fund SWNI with public money. It wastes our money in a time when every dollar is precious. Dear Portland City Council Members:

I am writing you, Mayor Wheeler and Council members, to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020. As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

- "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.
- "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. SWNI's leadership demonstrated being willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and ethics."
- The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the lack of accountability for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, a lack of transparency, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.
- Critical financial controls were not followed as there was a 97% error rate for the month-end financial checklist used by Finance Committee Treasurer and Executive Officers.
   SWNI currently mismanages 7.35%

of their base grant funding from Civic Life every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage attributed to embezzlements.

- In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. Forensic examination findings were that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate applying for the PPP loan. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.
- Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were not sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws, standards and fiducial oversight requirements of board members.
- Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010. These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model." The time for change is right now. I ask the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer funded financial mismanagement and to end funding to SWNI. I ask the Mayor and City Council to instead fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland. This would be the right thing to do.

On behalf of the board of the Southwest Hills Residential League (SWHRL), I am writing to urge you to defeat proposal 966 to transfer district coalition funds to Southeast Uplift and instead to continue funding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc (SWNI).

While we recognize that the recent forensic audit by Marsh & Minick identified a number of areas for improved oversight, management and equity education, it found **no evidence of fraud** or other criminal activity over the past ten years. We are concerned about the lack of due process in City Council's decision to withhold funds based solely on allegations of *potential for* financial mismanagement. We understand that SWNI has offered to undergo an audit by an external CPA to provide a complete picture. To transfer SWNI's funding and responsibilities before that process is complete would be a rush to judgment without a fair hearing of all evidence. Further, the rush to transfer responsibilities without sufficient forethought or planning would create chaos at a time that is already taxing everyone's abilities to cope with the constant change. The damage will fall not just on SWNI, but equally onto the 17 neighborhood associations who rely on SWNI and its staff to provide essential services, from filing government reports to IT and communications support to providing educational forums on issues affecting our neighborhoods.

We therefore ask that you stay your decision to transfer funding of SWNI until you are able to hold a comprehensive hearing of all the evidence and render a determination on the issues the organization needs to address as well as the remedies that would most reasonably and effectively accomplish those goals.

SWNI has been a part of southwest Portland for 41 years, serving the people who make up the diverse population that is southwest portland. Land use questions are asked, candy is given out to the children at Halloween, schools issues, all sorts of issues are asked and answered not by the city bureaus but by SWNI.

As a three time elected president of SWNI I signed the Grant Agreement #32001238 in June of 2015 which covered the five year period of time up until June 30, 2020. I am writing in opposition to the ordinance proposed by Commissioner Eudaly to transfer SW neighborhood district coalition administrative responsibilities to the SE Uplift coalition for the remainder of the 2020-21 fiscal year. I would like SWNI funding to instead be restored.

Item 966 of the City Council Agenda for the meeting on December 9, 2020, proposes to introduce the results of a financial audit of Southwest Neighborhoods Inc (SWNI) and then to remove funding from that organization and transfer that funding to another organization.

Two issues are important here:

1. The scope of the financial audit includes a time period for which a financial crime was committed, discovered, successfully prosecuted, and resolved. That crime occurred back in 2010. The perpetrators were caught and penalized. SWNI changed and improved its financial procedures since that time. No evidence of financial fraud or financial crime has occurred associated with SWNI since that 2010 crime. It is inappropriate for the financial audit to include any information about that 2010 crime when it was fully resolved and has nothing to do with the financial operations of SWNI today or in recent years. If anything, the report should be used as evidence to support the fact that SWNI is being operated quite properly today and in recent years. Please do not be misled by a report that focuses on fraud that occurred in 2010 and which has already been discovered, successfully prosecuted, and resolved.

2. SWNI provides critical support and services to citizens and neighborhood organizations in southwest Portland, has done so for many years, and the citizens and organizations of southwest Portland will suffer harm if SWNI is "de-funded" and those support funds transferred to another organization based in another part of the city. I am writing to you to express my strong support of the SWNI. I am the treasurer for the Ashcreek Neighborhood Association and know firsthand the critical support SWNI provides for our association in terms of supporting the treasurer's function. From attending the Ashcreek monthly meeting (open to anyone who wants to attend and automatically member if you live in the Ashcreek area) I have learned of SWNI's importance of coordinating the actions of the southwest neighborhoods in land use, school, trails, NET teams for example. As an indication of the Ashcreek Neighborhood Association support of SWNI an unanimously vote was given to donate funds to SWNI to help cover their payroll for December. I have learned that when this need was identified to the community funds to cover the total shortfall was raised in short order, a sign of community support.

The requested financial audited by the Portland City Council was converted by the by Portland's Office of Community and Civic Life (OCCL) into an inaccurate and bias opinion report which lack any possible creditability in the public view since SWNI was not offered an opportunity to respond to the many flaws with in audit before its public release. The lack of creditability to the public as demonstrated by the funds raised to support SWNI salaries and the discussion at two meeting I attended where not a single word to support the audits findings and in fact most of the meeting was spent discussing how to prevent any action base on this biased "audit".

The only acceptable outcome is to full fund SWNI and disavow the OCCL audit. I will follow your vote on this important matter.

Portland City Council,

I urge you to vote down the hastily-drawn ordinance to defund SWNI. As a response to the SWNI audit, it is too much, too soon.

First, this ordinance is too much.

Yes, the audit found problems with SWNI management, but are they so horrifying that SWNI deserves the death penalty? I am a native Portlander. I moved into the Ashcreek neighborhood in 1980. During that entire time Southwest Neighborhood Association has provided assistance to the Ashcreek Neighborhood Association.

Today, I am appalled. I recently learned that Chloe Eudaley is proposing that immediately the SWNI be totally defunded. Earlier this year, she requested an audit of the organization based on a request from a former disgruntled board member. I think legitimate independent audits are very helpful.

I later learned that Chloe Eudaley had suspended all payments under the SWNI contract. This made it difficult in providing the great service they have offered for the past 40 years. So I sent a letter to all the members of the City Council, requesting that the audit be expedited as to not permanently damage SWNI. My letter was ignored by all except Amanda Fritz, who thanked me for my concern. The audit took almost half a year with no funding provided to SWNI during that time. I am certain that the ulterior motive was to bankrupt the organization and lose its staff. However, the Neighborhood stepped up and help partially fund operations

Even more troubling was what I read in the bogus Audit report. It

appears that they took talking points from the former Board member and wove in data linked to negative irrelevant information. With a bit of research, I discovered that former volunteer has extracted several hundred thousand dollars from other Oregon public agencies by filing lawsuits. The Council should investigate how such a biased audit could become part of the public record. I expect the Bogus report was not cheap. You should question its credibility and review letters submitted by other Neighborhood associations detailing the erroneous information

Chloe Eudaley is proposing defunding SWNI and turning over the duties to the SE Uplift Coalition. When researching the SE Uplift organization (which I had never heard of , I find that they have financial problems, staff turnover and the biggest issue is they have no knowledge of what the Southwest Portland residents need or want. This would be a no-win situation for SW residents. We are already suffering from the defunding debacle The needs of SE Portland are dramatically different than SW Portland. Believe me I know I grew up in Lents.

I think that Southwest residents deserve the opportunity to express how they can be supported and not having former commissioners completely demolish the infrastructure built to support residents over the past 40 years.

Dear Portland City Council Members,

This written testimony is in regards to Agenda Item 966: I am in support of the continued funding of SW Neighborhood, Inc with financial oversights in place and for it to remain at its current site at the Multnomah Art Center in SW Portland. My name is Andrea Wall. I am a Hillsdale resident, neighborhood volunteer and activist. I am also the steward of the SW 25th Ave Community Trail. This trail is a safe route to school and is used by a diverse group of people to safely navigate the area. I work with a committed group of volunteers and under 8 grants to do restoration work along this trail. Four years ago, I had no project funding, few volunteers and could not identify a native plant. Now with the assistance of over 400 volunteers and a contractor, and 8 community grants, over 16,000 sq ft of invasive plants have been removed and replaced with 2000 native plants. Sylvia Bogert, Executive Director of SWNI, Inc taught me how

to apply for community grants and my first for this trail project was a small grant awarded to me by SWNI. So she helped get me started and is supportive of my efforts.

Erik Horngren, Manager of the Westside Watershed Resource Center, based until recently out of the SWNI office at the Multnomah Art Center, has taught me about native plants, invasive plant removal, storm water management, and loans tools to me and the trail volunteers to get the job done. We have developed a power point presentation together about the importance of urban green spaces. We also work together to provide free nature education along the trail to children from nearby schools, some underserved, that we hope will begin again post-covid.

These relationships and tools are important to me as I work to help my neighborhood and the environment.

SW Portland has special needs due to its hilly topography, clay soil, and storm water management issues. Moving the

SWNI office to SE Portland just does not make sense. Moving the SWNI office across the river will likely decrease SW citizen involvement in their neighborhoods. This contradicts their mission statement which is to encourage more community involvement.

I recommend that the SWNI, Inc office remain in SW Portland, that its funding be restored and that there be financial oversight of their budget and expenditures. That way, this organization can remain in the neighborhood to help its residents help their neighborhoods and also be fiscally responsible.

#### Hello:

I have been an active member of my SW Portland Neighborhood Association for close to 10 years, spent time on the NA board and represented the Transportation Committee. The past 2 years I've been a member of the SWNI board. SWNI is an amazing organization that supports SW Portland in many ways. The SWNI staff has done an excellent job in facilitating the many volunteer hours needed to support SW Portland with:

- Monthly publication of SW News to educate and inform people about issues that affect people in SW Portland and events and activities in our local neighborhoods;
- Periodic all-household mailings to reach those in the community who may be interested in the services such as the early responses to COVID;
- Committee support to help people advocate on issues of concern, such as transportation, public safety, parks, equity and inclusion, schools, watersheds and land use, and periodic local workshops and trainings on timely topics;
- Building and maintaining trails through our neighborhoods;
- Fiscal sponsorships for neighborhood projects such as parks work parties and community building events;
- Building up a Neighborhood Emergency Response network;
- Being informed about and advocating for all of us on important issues;

This Letter refers to these agenda topics:

- 1. SWNI has had no loss of City of Portland funds.
- Transferring to the <u>SEUL</u> the city's \$145,000 contract with <u>SWNI</u> for January to June, 2021, the remainder of the 2020-21 contract. This envisions firing all but 2 of SWNI's 6 staff and SEUL taking over all of SWNI obligations to 17 neighborhood associations and a 20 organization Board. SEUL already oversees 20 neighborhood associations and a 27 person board.

3. Calendar Item 996 - "reassess the district coalition model for fiscal year FY 21-22 to simplify administration and reduce duplication; embody the City's values of anti-racism, equity, transparency, communication, collaboration and fiscal responsibility; apply an equity and resiliency focus as adopted in the City's response to pandemics of racism and COVID-19; and comply with City procurement and grantmaking policies."

### 1. There has been no loss of money to the City of Portland.

The City's auditor Marsh & Minick was hired to perform a forensic audit covering over a 10-year period that produced unsubstantiated findings aimed at discrediting SWNI. Findings lacked context and documentation to support its findings of \$179,000 of financial mismanagement for the scope period, particularly since SWNI learned its lesson and implemented strong fiscal controls beginning in October 2010.

SWNI has not been given an opportunity to respond to the audit nor respond to Civic Life's proposal to shift its grant funds to another coalition. There has been no opportunity for the civic dialogue which should be the basis for major funding decisions such as this proposal. Civic Life's claims of dysfunctionality among SWNI Board members overlooked efforts taken by the SWNI Board in 2019-2020 to improve communications among its Board members.

### 2. Transferring the SWNI contract to SEUL

This relates to the Forensic Audit Rhee commissioned to examine 10 years of SWNI's records. It found "evidence of financial mismanagement," though it did not find any actual theft, embezzlement or fraud beyond the 2011 confirmed embezzlement; at most it describes sloppy bookkeeping and insufficient board oversight.

Regardless of the Audit findings, transferring SWNI's contract to SEUL is a very bad idea, it is poorly thought out, and the last gasp attempt of an outgoing Commissioner and Civic Life Director to weaken a coalition they do not like and the coalition system in general:

- Any specific financial mismanagement and lack of internal controls the audit found should be addressed and fixed by SWNI. Proper bookkeeping and financial management controls are not rocket science, the purpose of an audit is to give a roadmap how to fix such problems.
- What happens after 6 months, the contract is given back to SWNI?
- SEUL in no way has the capacity to administer SWNI's contract; hire, train, and manage 4 new SWNI staff; take on 17 more NAs, a 20 person board, and oversee 7 SWNI committees; and continue to oversee its own 20 NAs, a 27 person board, and numerous board committees. In the last 2 years SEUL has eliminated 2 full-time positions and is currently 1 person understaffed from 2 recent staff departures. Plus, it would have the added role of reorganizing SWNI and implementing the financial management/internal controls the Audit says are weak or lacking in an organization that the SEUL Director and staff are totally unfamiliar with.

- It violates the procedures in the <u>ONI/OCCL Standards</u> V.E. for NAs to realign with a different coalition:
  - "Change in organizational affiliations for Neighborhood Associations and District Coalitions is a major issue which entails considerable time, communication and dollars. Such action must not be undertaken lightly nor as a result of momentary problems or personality disputes." Standards V.E.
  - "Realigning a Neighborhood Association with a District Coalition with which it does not currently share a boundary is not allowed." Standards V.E.3.b
- It violates <u>SEUL's Bylaws</u> which limit it to serving only the SE area. For SEUL to take on SWNI's contractual obligations exposes it and the SEUL Board to potential grievances and lawsuits by people in either the SEUL or SWNI boundaries for breach of their fiduciary duty of loyalty to its 20 Board Members organizations and the duty of obedience to comply with its Bylaws and the city's Standards.

**3. "Calendar Item 996 Reassess district coalition model for fiscal year FY 21-22"** This issue is completely unrelated to the SWNI audit. The audit in no way addresses any administrative, transparency, or equity issues with the coalition model in general. Suk Rhee and Eudaly are trying to bootstrap onto the SWNI matter a last minute extreme truncation of their previous plan for a 3-year process to update Code 3.96 and reexamine the coalition model that involved creating community and stakeholder engagement plans. See attached Code Change and Coalition Reassessment Timeline.

The next Commissioner and Director overseeing OCCL should design and oversee the reexamination of the coalition model.

The City's formally adopted values of anti-racism, equity, transparency, communication, collaboration and fiscal responsibility, the equity and resiliency values adopted in relation to racism and COVID-19, and its procurement and grant-making policies are already requirements Civic Life is bound to follow and apply to its contracts with the coalitions.

Dear Mayor Wheeler and Members of City Council,

As a former nonprofit executive director (of Oregon Walks), nonprofit co-founder and Board member, and someone who has been involved in civic engagement in Portland for 20 years, I am writing to call on you to reinvest the funding traditionally budgeted to SWNI and to instead invest in one or more nonprofit organizations dedicated to civic participation with a better track record of accountability, transparency, and equity. I believe the draft ordinance accomplishes that near-term goal. We also need to recognize that there is a more structural issue that we need to address in the new year.

The <u>issues recently brought to light through an independent forensic audit</u> conducted by Marsh Minick, P.C. are endemic in quasi-governmental relationships, as <u>Jim White of</u> <u>Nonprofit Association of Oregon penned last year in his letter of support of code change</u> <u>3.96</u>:

"Nonprofits must be treated as independent businesses regularly reconfirming the support of their communities through constant interactions and evolution. We must compete for community support by offering the best opportunity for community-led solutions to be recognized and supported financially through community fundraising and, when contracted by government, competitive processes...Creating direct-line funding into specific organizations is unhealthy both for government and for the nonprofit's long-term sustainability."

The recent independent forensic audit findings regarding SWNI's financial practices as requested by City Council on July 9, 2020 are troubling. Here are just a few findings that I find particularly concerning:

SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life *every year*.

Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

"SWNI's leadership demonstrated being willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and ethics."

I have coordinated independent financial audits as part of my past work in nonprofit management. The fact that SWNI has not engaged an independent auditor in the last 10 years, particularly after a felony embezzlement, is shocking to me. If my organization had received audit findings like those described by Marsh Minick, P.C., I would immediately organize a finance committee with the express purpose to advise our board and overhaul our financial manual to incorporate all elements of the management letter. What I would certainly NOT do is suggest that the audit gave us a "clean bill of health," which is how SWNI Board President Leslie Hammond characterized the audit.

Further, SWNI has special privileges not afforded most other community-based groups land use appeal waivers and an exception to registering as a lobbying group with the city, as just two examples—which further obscure the reality that SWNI is an independent nonprofit that has no greater accountability mechanisms to the public than any other 501(c) (3) nonprofit.

The findings of the forensic audit clearly demonstrate that SWNI has been neither accountable nor transparent in their governance. As an independent nonprofit, it is SWNI's Board's responsibility to review findings and take corrective action as they (and ultimately the IRS) see fit. As a grantmaker, it is the City's responsibility to review findings and make fiscally responsible funding decisions.

Now is the time to more equitably distribute those funds dedicated to civic engagement. It is time for City Council to stop rewarding bad behavior and instead invest in more equitable, fiscally responsible community-based efforts.

#### City Council Members:

I am writing to support the on-going funding of Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. (SWNI). I am Treasurer of the Hillsdale Neighborhood Association and have been active in HNA matters as a Member and/or Officer for about 15 years. I support continued funding of the 17-NA Member coalition for two different but complementary reasons. (1) SWNI has organized and in other ways support a broad range of specific events, programs, and activities which have benefitted NAs and Southwest residents: insurance which protects NAs from lawsuits relating to projects/activities; monthly publication of the SWNI News with information that residents and NAs use to track the work of colleagues in all SW neighborhoods, civic events, business reports; support for National Night Out each August; candidate forums preceding elections; annual program to recognize police contribution to our communities; assistance in writing and updating NA by-laws; funding of small-grant program for neighborhood goodwill projects; establishment of an equity and inclusion committee and workshops for the public; organizing and staffing the twice-annual SOLVE cleanup of neighborhoods; supporting the efforts of the Schools Committee to bring technological equity to under-served families within the SW, including residents of Stephens Creek Crossing and through SW schools. Dear Mayor Wheeler and Members of City Council,

Civic engagement is a powerful way to rebuild our government institutions and practices to be more fair, just, and in service of all Portlanders. That work belongs to us all, not just to a few independent organizations that have had the benefit of decades of no-bid contract funding from the city.

As aa active Portland community member, I am writing to call on you to reinvest the funding traditionally budgeted to SWNI and to instead invest in one or more nonprofit organizations dedicated to civic participation with a better track record of accountability, transparency, and equity.

The <u>issues recently brought to light through an independent forensic audit</u> conducted by Marsh Minick, P.C. are endemic in quasi-governmental relationships, as <u>Jim White of</u> <u>Nonprofit Association of Oregon penned last year in his letter of support of code change</u>:

"Nonprofits must be treated as independent businesses regularly reconfirming the support of their communities through constant interactions and evolution. We must compete for community support by offering the best opportunity for community-led solutions to be recognized and supported financially through community fundraising and, when contracted by government, competitive processes...Creating direct-line funding into specific organizations is unhealthy both for government and for the nonprofit's long-term sustainability."

This issue is an inevitable outcome of a calcified city code 3.96. The recent independent forensic audit findings regarding SWNI's financial practices as requested by City Council on July 9, 2020 are endemic, and troubling. Here are just a few findings that we find concerning:

SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life every year.

Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

"SWNI's leadership demonstrated being willfully blind to noncompliance with

governance documents, standards and ethics."

SWNI has special privileges not afforded most other community-based groups—land use appeal waivers and an exception to registering as a lobbying group with the city, as just two examples—which further obscure the reality that SWNI is an independent nonprofit that has no reliable accountability mechanisms to the public.

The purpose of Civic Life's funding should be to connect people and communities with their government and facilitate exchanges through programs and partnerships that are responsive, at times iterative, accountable to community concerns, and that reflect an equitable distribution of public resources in order to benefit our community as a whole.

The findings of the forensic audit clearly demonstrate that SWNI has been neither accountable nor transparent in their governance. As an independent nonprofit, it is SWNI's Board's responsibility to review findings and take corrective action as they (and ultimately the IRS) see fit. As a grantmaker, it is the City's responsibility to review findings and make fiscally responsible funding decisions that will benefit the community at large.

Now is the time to more equitably distribute those funds dedicated to civic engagement. It is time for City Council to stop rewarding behavior that is not accountable nor transparent, and instead invest in more equitable, fiscally responsible community-based efforts.

My name is Steve Mullinax. I have been a volunteer for the Bridlemile Neighborhood Association for the past twenty-two years. I have served as a board member of that association for the last ten years, including several years as chair. I have served on the SWNI Board, currently as first vice president, earlier as Parks and Rec Centers Committee chair. In 2020, to-date, I have logged over 340 volunteer service hours for SWNI.

SWNI has provided insurance coverage, materials and organizing support for many Bridlemile NA events, such as National Night out and Movie Nights, over my years in Bridlemile.

Over a period of about ten years, Bridlemile NA volunteers, organized as the Bridlemile Creek Stewards, did restoration work for local streams. We removed many truckloads of invasive plants, and planted thousands of native plants. We successfully completed several Portland BES Community Watershed Stewardship Program grants, for which SWNI was the fiscal agent and provided supporting letters. SWNI provided insurance coverage, tools and publicity for dozens of restoration events.

SWNI has been a part of southwest Portland for 41 years, serving the people who make up the diverse population that is southwest portland. Land use questions are asked, candy is given out to the children at Halloween, schools issues, all sorts of issues are asked and answered not by the city bureaus but by SWNI.

As a three time elected president of SWNI I signed the Grant Agreement #32001238 in June of 2015 which covered the five year period of time up until June 30, 2020. This agreement has many needs that were required by the City of Portland to be accomplished. Never in this time has ONI or Civic Life expressed any problems. ## Subject: Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) Forensic Audit Findings and Funding

Mayor and City Council Members,

I am writing to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020.

As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

- "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.
- "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. <u>SWNI's leadership demonstrated being</u> <u>willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and</u> <u>ethics</u>."
- The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the <u>lack of accountability</u> for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, <u>a lack of transparency</u>, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.
- Critical financial controls were not followed as there was a <u>97% error rate</u> for the month-end financial checklist used by Finance Committee Treasurer and Executive Officers.
- <u>SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life</u> every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage attributed to embezzlements.
- In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. <u>Forensic examination findings were</u> <u>that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings</u> <u>adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and</u>

paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate <u>applying for the PPP loan</u>. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.

- <u>Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were</u> not sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws, standards and fiducial oversight requirements of board members.
- Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "<u>In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model.</u>"

## THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer funded financial mismanagement and to end funding to SWNI.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to instead fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland.

I urge the City Council to reject Commissioner Eudaly's proposed resolution to immediately defund Southwest Neighborhood Inc. (SWNI). Please reject item #966 and fund SWNI now.

For the past several years I have served as the President of the Crestwood Neighborhood Association. Before that I was the leader of the Dickinson Park Stewards. In both positions I have relied on SWNI, and specifically Executive Director Sylvia Bogart for guidance, direction, reminders, and her deep knowledge of my neighborhood. I began as a raw volunteer who was upset with national politics and decided that I needed to focus on the area I could actually impact; my own neighborhood. SWNI and Sylvia were instrumental in my education for serving this neighborhood.

With their support, I led the annual Dickinson Park at the Movies for over 10 years, and hosted the first scheduled movie site for the newly created program that became Summer Free For All. Finally, as a cyber security expert for nearly 20 years, I have conducted and participated in many audits. The City of Portland should be embarrassed to have paid for such an inaccurate, arbitrary and capricious work product from Marsh Minick, P.C... Issues include a lack of clear timelines or narrative; not making clear that the embezzlement issue was long in the past; and that strong fiscal controls were put in place at that time. Mayor Wheeler and Council members,

After living and raising a family in Washington DC for 40 years, I moved to Portland Homestead neighborhood in 2017. In those 40 years in Washington DC, I lived in an area east of Rock Creek Park that was majority black, with a growing Latinx community and a smaller number of non-Latinx white families and mixed ethnic families. There, I helped found a multiracial neighborhood association and then later represented a larger area as an elected Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner for 4 years in the late 1980's. Our Carter Barron East Neighborhood Association was particularly welcoming to alternative uses of the larger homes along 16th ST NW including ethnic churches, alternative schools, and social services, unlike many NIMBY Neighborhood Associations in DC, and sought to support and build our whole community in troubled times.

After retiring from NIH and moving to Portland, I was excited to engage in my new neighborhood. I started attending the regular Homestead Neighborhood Association meetings. There I was excited to find the depth of knowledge of city government and collaborative spirit of its active membership. I also joined the board of Friends of Terwilliger with their focus on helping preserve and maintain the natural and historical values of its parklands. More recently, at the urging of our NA, I took on the role of establishing a Homestead NET where we previously had never had one. These organizations of volunteers have consistently been well supported by the staff of SWNI and the varied support systems they provide. Compared to my prior experience in Washington DC, I have been impressed by the quality of the SWNI support system that consistently empowers residents' involvement in effective volunteer organizations and their collaborative interactions with Portland's government.

Having spent the majority of my life living as a white minority in largely black city, adjusting to the overwhelmingly white culture here in Portland and understanding its past history has been sometimes troubling. So I do understand some of the desire of underrepresented groups to institute systemic change.

However, I am deeply concerned that Portland's strong reactions to the divisive politics In Washington and desire for change are coloring your own responses that could destroy highly functioning links between the city government and local communities such as SWNI and our neighborhood associations. The political and financial attacks on SWNI and its component NAs are extremely damaging to community life and affects many active volunteers in our southwest communities. Defunding and destroying SWNI as a functioning community support hub is exceedingly poor political decison-making.

All governments must be very careful not to demonize any volunteer group in order to achieve greater influence. We must find how better to work together using greater involvement of all community organizations and members.

As a 37 year resident of and participant in neighborhood activities in Southwest Portland, I write in support of restoring funding to SWNI, the coalition that has held our neighborhoods together and fostered outreach to our underserved residents. Over the years, I have been President of the Homestead Neighborhood Association, Secretary to Southwest Neighborhoods Executive Board, member of Southwest Neighborhoods Executive Committee, Outreach Chair for Homestead and its Parks Committee representative. I organized our National Night Out events. I have volunteered at SWNI's semi-annual neighborhood clean-up events. But for the Covid-19 pandemic, I would have become active in my new southwest neighborhood following our recent move.

Homestead is a challenging place to reach out to the underserved (not a few of whom live in our parks). Per the 2010 census, 2/3 of Homestead residents are renters (mostly students and other temporary residents drawn by OHSU and the medical facilities on Marquam Hill). Over 45% of the neighborhood is wooded parkland. Through the city's small grant program, SWNI helped us develop partnerships with park friends groups and care for this precious resource. Through its cleanups, SWNI helped our neighbors, especially the elderly, get rid of trash and bulky waste. Our major outreach program, our annual National Night Out picnics, would not have been possible without the advice, equipment, publicity and guidance about city rules which SWNI provided. Because most residences are owned by landlords, actually reaching the people who live in Homestead by mail was a daunting challenge: SWNI arranged a special mailing list so that our outreach brochures went to the people who actually lived in Homestead, not the non-resident landlords.

In short, SWNI support was essential to promoting the coming together of our disparate

neighborhood. The neighborhood associations in Southwest Portland depend on SWNI support just to carry on important activities from safety protections, social activities, and caring for the place we live. I ask you to restore funding to this vital support for our citizens.

Mayor and Commissioners - I write to you about Agenda Item 966, which in effect proposes the elimination of SWNi, and places the administration of its member Neighborhood Associations with Southeast Uplift.

SWNI provides many essential back-end services for coalition members; without that office and the body of knowledge it has built up through the years, each NA would find itself in an endless cycle of re-inventing the wheel, and relearning all the tasks required to properly run their Association.

Simply dumping those responsibilities onto another umbrella group would be disadvantage enough,through operations and workload problems, as well as convenience and access issues, but their very names - SOUTH WEST Neighborhoods, Inc. and SOUTHEAST Uplift point to the true harm. The staff at Southeast Uplift no doubt are extremely well-versed and knowledgeable in the issues before their coailition members, as they are lived experiences for them; each NA in this city has commonality in many things, but each are unique in others - for the southwest, we share their concerns for the unhoused, equity, and street fatalities, but our issues are compounded by lack of infrastructure, terrain, and little access to transit. The solutions used east of the Willamette are not a one-size-fits-all, and often will simply compound our problems if applied here willy-nilly; will our concerns be taken seriously, or will our voices be minimised by an organisation which does not daily live these realities?

As for the charge that SWNI has failed to sustain the trust of member neighborhood associations, I think rather the opposite is true; most of the NAs realize how much work is done for them by SWNI. While individuals at SWNI may sometimes have had unfortunate policy positions, and have certainly been tone-deaf, to say the least, on equity, that can happen anywhere, and those are issues resolvable by personnel changes IN the organization, NOT by destroying the organization itself; when a company has employees or board members causing issues, they are dealt with and refresher training on the appropriate issues is performed. Civic Life would rather throw the baby out with the bathwater.

Last, I am not an accountant - but neither are Marsh Minnick PC; before any action based on their report is taken, an actual *audit* by state-licensed accountants should be performed, via a properly-bid contract. Should that find actual malfeasance, then appropriate measures such as enumerated in this Item would certainly be called for. If the audit finds that, at worst, well-meaning mistakes were made, i trust apologies to the relevant people will be forthcoming.

Although I worked with several neighborhood associations while I served as Environmental Affairs Manager at the Port of Portland in the 1990's and subsequent to that as a contractor to the City of Portland, I no longer hold these positions today and for the record, I also am not a resident of Portland. Even so, my experience with the neighborhood associations is relevant to the proposed changes before the City Council today.

Over my years working in Portland, the neighborhood associations were a lifeline. I was invited and at times invited myself to rooms full of people to test the waters for Port-associated permits and programs. What I found was a room filled with diverse people who had used the time to vet some of their frustrations regarding the Port. I listened and I learned. No contractor or intermediary could have substituted for the information and honest dialogue and I hope trust, I gained from these meetings. Whether I was at the meetings on Port-related business or on a revitalization project for Laurelhurst Park as a consultant, these neighborhood association meetings provided me an opportunity in a give-and-take setting to refine and make more effective project designs and project goals. The neighborhood association meetings where local stakeholders had an opportunity to voice their concerns and their ideas.

What comes to mind as an example was a Port mitigation project. The project resulted in a dialogue starting with one neighborhood association, and because of questions raised by the Audubon Society, resulted in the Port considering a different location, which brought in another neighborhood association. With competing interests, we were able to have a respectful dialogue with people who were to be directly affected by the Port's decision. We accomplished much in a timely manner and with efficiency.

With respect to Laurelhurst Park project, I served as a contractor to the City to revitalize Laurelhurst Pond. I worked with the local neighborhood association, a group of people who lived directly across the street from Laurelhurst Park and within the near vicinity. These were people who visited the Park often and had visions of what they wanted to see accomplished. They were the "boots on the ground" and their observations informed me of Park operations and visitors and what would work for the neighborhood and what would not. Slowly my design changed and the project turned into a success story.

If in any of these instances the neighborhood associations had not existed, the nature of the projects would have changed and changed to their detriment.

Portland has a wonderful uniqueness in its neighborhoods and in the passion of the people who live there. The associations today are a culmination of years of devoted Portlanders to improve their neighborhoods and to improve their respective associations. Portland's unique neighborhoods have not gone unnoticed. Several years ago, Portland hosted a group of mayors from several cities across the country. One of those mayors was my cousin from Sarasota, Florida, LouAnn Palmer. She came specifically to see for herself Portland's unique neighborhoods and to learn how the neighborhood associations work. She was excited about what she saw here and when she returned home, determined to integrate some of what she learned in Portland, into a future plan for Sarasota.

Portland's unique neighborhood structure and respective associations represent the vibrancy of Portland. To rip apart this cohesive tapestry without careful planning and vetting, jeopardizes the

communication network throughout Portland. Yes, it can be improved but it should not be replaced. It has taken the neighborhood associations years to become effective organizations and any major changes would undermine Portland's two-way communication networks - at a time when social unrest is so prevalent. Neighborhood associations can be tasked with not just support for brick and mortar projects, but their input can be beneficial for community policing, social justice issues and so much more. Respectfully, I request that Portland's neighborhood associations be retained, be better supported by the City, and be adequately funded. ### Hello,

I am emailing to let you know that strongly oppose Council Item 966. I ask you to reject this ordinance. This call to defund SWNI requires further analysis as well as public review, not just a few minutes discussion at a city council meeting.

I have been a resident of SW Portland since 2017. I lived in NE for nearly 20 years and I served on the Kerns Neighborhood Association board. For much of my time on that board, I served as communications and outreach. In that capacity, I worked to ensure that as many neighbors - be they renters, homeowners, landowners, businesses or non-profits - as possible were alerted to our meetings, events and issues and invited to join our e-newsletter. I know that other volunteer members of the board also worked hard at improving neighborhood community livability and dealing with significant issues. Neighborhood associations are important conduits of information and discourse about issues.

District coalitions such as SWNI and SE Uplift are important aids to the volunteers who serve on these neighborhood associations. They offer assistance and expertise to the volunteers who work on the board. There are so many things neighborhood associations would not be able to do without their district coalition's support. And these district coalitions can help other neighborhood groups. For instance, when I lived in NE, they assisted a group of neighbors who wanted to paint our street (NE 26th & Everett) as a speed deterrent. SE Uplift served as a fiscal agent and got us liability insurance, as well as traffic cones for the painting party and subsequent repainting parties.

This ordinance will damage all city neighborhood groups but especially SW neighborhoods, who depend on SWNI for support services, supplies for our events, liability insurance, meeting space, counsel on thorny issues. - Lack of minority representation on the SWNI board and a significant number of resignations from SWNI board members citing bullying including the Indigenous Equity Committee Chair stating she was resigning in June 2020 due to "threats and public denigration" by the current SWNI President
- 5 SWNI board members have resigned from the SWNI board due to bullying or intimidation by SWNI Officers in just over a year 2 of which were POC and from my assessment 1-2 POC remain of the 32 total SWNI board member positions
- SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their funding annually; these are MY taxpayer dollars that are unaccounted for and in any company I work for this would be waste, abuse and potentially fraud that would REQUIRE accountability
- Troubling these findings is that the known embezzlement of a decade ago should have ensured greater oversight and accountability of SWNI who should be doing internal audit reporting and be the model coalition instead SWNI has shown a pattern of behavior that demands action by City Council to secure our taxpayer funds with an organization that has a proven track record of fiscal management; anything else emboldens SWNI to continue their flagrant disregard of unchecked abuse of money and power

I am a 30+ year resident and member of the Collins View Neighborhood Association (CVNA), one of the 17 neighborhoods within Southwest Neighborhoods Incorporated (SWNI). I serve on the CVNA Board as the Public Safety Chair and have done so since the mid-1990's.

As one of their many contributions to the safety and livability of the Southwest (SW) Portland neighborhoods, SWNI sponsors a Public Safety Committee which is comprised of members from each of the neighborhoods within the coalition. Throughout this period, I have attended these monthly public safety meetings, where along with public safety committee chairs from the other SWNI neighborhoods, SWNI's Executive Director, and when available, a district patrol officer and one of the deputy district attorneys, meet to engage in collaborative problem solving to address a myriad of issues facing the SWNI neighborhoods and the City of Portland as a whole. These meetings provide a forum where numerous guest speakers have come to share their expertise, from pedestrian and bicycle safety to earthquake preparedness, all of which serve to improve safety throughout our community.

SWNI's Public Safety Committee provides an effective networking opportunity to share current issues and valuable information from all over the City benefiting not only Southwest Portland residents, but local law enforcement as well. Information gleaned from the monthly Public Safety meetings is then passed down as a regular agenda item to residents attending monthly neighborhood association meetings as well as in written format in SWNI's monthly newsletter which is distributed electronically to its many subscribers.

Additionally, SWNI has for many years continued to sponsor annual safety-related events such as National Night Out, a get-to-know-your-neighbor event in each neighborhood which is well attended by the many residents of SW Portland, Emergency Preparedness Fairs, and a Bicycle Rodeo, among others. Mayor and City Council Members,

I am writing to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020.

As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

- "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.
- "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. <u>SWNI's leadership demonstrated being</u> <u>willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and</u> <u>ethics</u>."
- The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the <u>lack of accountability</u> for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, <u>a lack of transparency</u>, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.
- Critical financial controls were not followed as there was a <u>97% error rate</u> for the month-end financial checklist used by Finance Committee Treasurer and Executive Officers.
- <u>SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life</u> <u>every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage</u> <u>attributed to embezzlements</u>.

- In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. Forensic examination findings were that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate applying for the PPP loan. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.
- <u>Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were not</u> <u>sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws,</u> <u>standards and fiducial oversight requirements of board members.</u>
- Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model."

# THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer funded financial mismanagement and to end funding to SWNI.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to instead fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland.

Thank you for all that you do for the love of our city and all of its residents. I am sure I cannot begin to understand all of the work you put in, and especially at this time.

I am a parent and a community college student who lives in SW Portland. I do not pretend to have any real grasp of the history, politics, equity ramifications, or potential various long-term consequences of the decision you are slated to make tomorrow regarding dissolving SWNI. I try to keep up with things, but I am not even at the margins of the conversations and at the beginning of my learning about so many things. My involvement in SWNI and my neighborhood association has been limited to attending the annual National Night Out — which has felt very important to me as a way to begin to meet and form relationships with my neighbors — and reading the SW Neighborhood News, which I didn't even know about how to find in its new online-only format until today. I am very grateful that you are all deeply committing to this work in your service. This feels rushed to me, and in my life generally, that tends to feel like a red flag. If that might be true, and if any of you reads this and thinks it might be, please consider slowing down, taking a breath, and regrouping at a later date. I realize that means there will be different leadership in place, and maybe that's okay, too. If I am wrong about the "feeling rushed" bit, then I apologize — my vantage point on this is admittedly murky.

I would love to be invited into an opportunity to learn and understand more, as a resident of Portland and SW Portland, specifically.

Thank you for the consideration, and for all that you do. I wish all of you the best and express my sincere gratitude for all of your efforts.

Mayor and City Council Members,

I am writing to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020.

As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

• "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.

• "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. SWNI's leadership demonstrated being willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and ethics."

• The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the lack of accountability for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, a lack of transparency, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.

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• SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage attributed to embezzlements.

• In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. Forensic examination findings were that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate applying for the PPP loan. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.

• Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were not sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws, standards and fiducial

oversight requirements of board members.

• Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010. These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model."

THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer-funded financial mismanagement and vote yes on Ordinance 966. I call upon the Mayor and City Council to fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland.

- 1. An audit of Southwest Neighborhoods Inc.(SWNI)—conducted under the authority of OCCL and current-Commissioner Eudaly;
- A request from Commissioner Eudaly to execute a grant amendment to Grant Agreement (Contract) #32002080—effectively transferring responsibilities for management of Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and its grantmaking authority to Southeast Uplift (SEUL).

I urge the Council—in the strongest terms possible—to reject or table consideration of both the <u>ten</u>-year Audit of SWNI and the proposed Amendment to the SEUL contract.

My reasons are as follows:

- The Forensic Audit initiated by Commissioner Eudaly amounts to extreme overreach. Clearly, SWNI has management issues that need to be dealt with. SWNI needs help to put its house back in order, not broad-brush, devisive accusations of malfeasance.
- SEUL does not have the resources to take on responsibilities for management of another—equally large but very different—Coalition of Neighborhood Associations. Adding \$145,000 to the SEUL budget would not begin to address the demands of taking on SWNI management responsibilities. As far as I know, neither SEUL nor SWNI was consulted by OCCL in the drafting of Commissioner Eudaly's proposal.

Please, set these issues aside until the new year, for more thoughtful consideration by the newly constituted Portland City Council.

We have lived in the Far Southwest Neighborhood of Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. for 43 years, and have attended Neighborhood Association (NA) meetings, coalition candidates forums, workshops designed to inform and gather input from residents on plans for designated Town Centers and other Land Use projects, areas of traffic congestion, and changes in City Codes such as the Tree Code, and the botched attempt to change the City Code dealing with Neighborhood Associations in 2019, as well as other topics.

Over the past 20+ years I've served as Secretary of the FSWNA, Chair on two occasions totaling 7+ years, representative to the SWNI Board for 10+ years and Public Safety committee representative for most of the 20 years. Have also proofed the SW News for about 5 years, represented FSWNA unofficially at SWCP meetings for about 8 years (both Steering Committee, CAC and other meetings), and helped at SWNI Spring and Fall cleanups, Multnomah Days parades and other coalition events over the years. Along with other FSWNA officers, we took part in "Neighborhood Association Leadership Training" seminars put on by SWNI for incoming Board officers.

SWNI was of great help when FSWNA put on NNO events, worked to inform neighbors of SWCP decisions that would seriously affect FSWNA (tunnel on SW 53<sup>rd</sup>, tram over 53<sup>rd</sup>) and provided guidance in opposing LIDs and Land Use proposals that weren't in the best interest of FSWNA as determined by the affected residents.

SWNI has worked not only with the 17 NA's that comprise the coalition, but with many minority communities within those NA's, working with them and their leaders to help with housing, transportation, translators and access to community services, inviting and encouraging them to participate in the larger community outside of their own, **in full compliance with City Code 3.96.040 (D)** – **functions of district coalition to promote, encourage and support participation of members of diverse communities.** Over the years those "diverse communities" have been awarded N'hood Small Grants by SWNI which they richly deserved and benefitted from. Does that sound discriminatory? Contrary to claims that SWNI and its Board resisted "equity and inclusion", it established just such

a committee years ago, encouraged Board members to attend a multi-day conference on E & I held in north Portland about that same time, and partnered with Wilson HS to hold a workshop on bullying last year.

Another false claim was that financial information was not fully disclosed to the SWNI Board. In all the years I sat on the Board on behalf of FSWNA I found the monthly reports to be complete and accurate, as were the annual reports. The Board often voted on financial matters that were presented for its consideration, following thorough and thoughtful discussion. I feel certain the dozens of other Board members during those years, many with extensive business, financial/accounting and/or auditing experience, would say the same.

I find it ironic that the audit would accuse SWNI of 'being blind to governance documents, standards and ethics" when Commissioner Eudaly and Director Suk Rhee are ignoring the "Standards and Practice for District Coalitions" which **specifically prohibits the action sought by Ordinance #966 transferring control of SWNI to SEUL.** Are there other governance documents, standards and ethics that THEY have ignored while trying to do away with SWNI, and Neighborhood Associations in general ?? There has been <u>no</u> thoughtful process (required in the Standards) that SWNI residents are aware of, let alone any attempt to determine if the 17 NA's in SWNI even

<u>WANT</u> to be under the control of SEUL. And what does SEUL have to say about the proposed transfer ??

Others are documenting the errors in the audit findings. In all the years I have been involved with SWNI I have always found the staff to be helpful, courteous, respectful to all people (even those who gave <u>them</u> no respect), discriminating toward none, patient with difficult people, not saying a cruel or unkind word to or about anyone (even if they deserved one), and completely a-political. Sylvia Bogert, Executive Director, has mentored not only her staff, but the Boards of all 17 NA's as they rotated into their positions of responsibility. She was always available for questions and was extremely knowledgeable about Rules of Order and City Code guidelines for coalitions and neighborhoods, and did her best to inspire others to gain an appropriate level of knowledge as well. With the exception of one staff member 10 years ago, who paid the price for her actions, Sylvia and the other members of her staff (past and present) have acted with honor and integrity. The esteem in which SWNI is held was reflected by a recent anonymous donation, and matching donations by members of the SWNI community, to make up a small portion of the funding wrongfully withheld from SWNI since July.

The selfish actions of one or two people have wasted time and money, and sullied the reputations of good people who don't deserve it. Withholding funding is negatively impacting tens of thousands of residents in SWNI. The way this audit was conducted is an embarrassment to the City of Portland and Office of Civic Life.

We ask that you vote NO on Ordinance #966, and reinstate all funds withheld from SWNI.

#### **Restore Grant Funding to SWNI**

In authorizing grant funding to the neighborhood district coalitions for FY2020-2021, Civic Life did not support funding SWNI because of alleged mismanagement of City funds, with the most damaging allegation being "concerns about continued suspicious activity after a known fraud incident."

Because of these serious allegations, the City Council stipulated that "Funding for Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. (SWNI) (for FY 2020-2021) will return to Council for consideration upon the completion of a forensic audit."

Civic Life contracted with Marsh-Minick to perform a forensic audit on grant awardee SWNI. MM completed their audit and issued their Forensic Audit Findings Report to the City of Portland on November 13, 2020. The forensic audit did not indicate any issues of fraud or malfeasance since **the 2010 fraud.** The Forensic audit disputes the most damaging allegation of "suspicious activity" which led to the freeze on SWNI's grant award.

Additionally, the audit also found no **serious mismanagement of resources.** It did point out areas in SWNI's fiscal procedures that need to be addressed, which will be.

The results of the Forensic audit support the grant award funding for SWNI for FY2020-2021. This leaves us with 6 months to provide desperately needed support and services to our SW neighborhoods

Cancel the Ordinance. The solution is not in the best interest of the SW Community. More chaos. We are talking about 6 months of program operation under this contract. There is no need to make this drastic of a change at this time.

As someone deeply committed to helping make Portland work better for ALL of its communities, I am writing to ask that you DO NOT accept this proposal regarding the transfer of funding from SWNI to SE Uplift. I am very knowledgeable about both the strengths and weaknesses of our current system and this approach will only add to the problems our city is facing. This opinion is based on my 20+ years of effort to support and improve public engagement here in Portland. To that end I have served as a neighborhood association board member and officer and am a past co-Chair of the Southeast Uplift Board. Some of my other efforts include service on the committee developing Community Connect, the Comprehensive Plan Community Involvement Committee, the Public Involvement Advisory Council and most recently the Code Committee.

While the goal of creating a more efficient and effective coalition system is one that many of us have supported for a long time, such needed improvements cannot be accomplished by hastily moving a single set of funds from one nonprofit to another.

No matter how well meaning the intentions behind it, there is no way it should be implemented at year's end in the midst of a change in the make up of the City Council.

Such a move is counter to everything the City espouses in regard to consulting and listening to those being impacted by a government decision. There has been no opportunity for the SWNI Board to systematically address the questions, concerns and findings of the recent audit. Neighborhoods being served by SWNI have had no chance to weigh in on their needs and preferences along with suggestions for improvements to whatever system might serve them. The SE Uplift Board has not been consulted and has not had an opportunity to discuss or voice an opinion on this proposal. Nor have the neighborhoods & other organizations it serves. Good morning Mayor and City Commissioners

Thank you for giving members from the SWNI Board and the neighborhoods an opportunity to testify today on the role SWNI plays in the Southwest area. We are 17 neighborhoods and three business associations strong.

First of all, we embrace working more closely with the city and the Office of Community & Civic Life. We are a service organization which has been in service to the city for more than 40 years of fulfilling our contractual and performance obligations. SWNI has grown and improved based upon the advice it receives from the city and the quality of its membership. We work collaboratively to achieve the city's goals of civic engagement.

As a recognized District Coalition organization, where 80,000 people live, we provide views on city initiatives and goals, honestly and cooperatively, and have for many years which is the purpose of civic engagement. As our neighborhoods change, our points of view and suggestions for improving the livability of the neighborhoods has changed. The letters we send to you are the result of fresh or heavily researched perspectives of your community members.

Has SWNI made mistakes or taken missteps? Of course we have, but we also have a solid history of dedicated service to the residents of SW Portland. We are a volunteer organization whose membership changes from year to year. We rely upon staff to keep us informed about the city's Civic Life Standards and our own Bylaws. We are a participatory group who welcome all who wish to join the organization. We have recruited and elected people from under-represented groups to our Board, Executive committee and staff. The allegations in the audit do not reflect the actual stewardship of our program and financial responsibilities or what SWNI has accomplished in its grant agreement with the city of Portland.

We have spent more than 40 years strengthening and enhancing the Southwest neighborhood voices and projects. The **newspaper** is a vital link for neighborhoods to share what is happening positively in their particular part of the larger southwest. **We help neighbors find meeting space**, answer questions, provide landscaping equipment which improves our watershed, **provide a venue for transportation and land use issues**, have developed NET teams addressing public safety throughout the Southwest, **have an Equity committee**, of five years duration, to help educate individuals and groups among many other services we provide. We have partnerships with 42 community groups where we help amplify their voices and concerns.

Dissolving the SW Neighborhoods coalition without time and a full public engagement process is not consistent with how Portland serves its neighborhoods. Disbanding a coalition, without a thoughtful process, has consequences for the entire city apart from what the effect would be on SWNI. We

encourage you to work with us and restore our full funding. Laying off our capable staff, who have served the SWNI organization for many years, violates this traditional season of good will. SEUL is not equipped, even with additional financial resources, to serve the Southwest neighborhoods.

We embrace working with the city and Civic Life for the remaining six months to make improvements which might be a model for other groups and will further the code revision.

2. A quarterly discussion of what money has been spent from our four budgets and what we see for the next quarter;

3. A quarterly discussion based upon our performance report about what has been achieved in the previous quarter to meet requirements under the Civic Life contract.

   Access to review Reconciliations for: Restricted Bank Account, Operations Bank Account, Credit Card, and PayPal accounts (bank statements include photos of all checks with two required authorized signatures)
   Fiscal Tracking forms authorizing payment of expenses (includes proper

authorization of payment, invoices, and receipts)

• Balance Sheet (includes all funds held by SWNI, including Restricted NA accounts)

Three (3) Profit and Loss Statements (Combined, Operations, and Restricted)
 Monthly Operations Report Income and Expenses for all Operation funding compared to budgets: SWNI Board, Civic Life, BES Watershed Resource Center Grant, West Multnomah Soil & Water Conservation District Grant for Stormwater program, and Civic Life Small Grants

• Monthly "Year to Date" Operation Reporting Income and Expenses for all Operation funding compared to budgets: SWNI Board, Civic Life, BES Watershed Resource Center Grant, West Multhomah Soil & Water Conservation District Grant for Stormwater program, Civic Life Small Grants

• Note: The Audit report mentioned a month-end financial checklist for Finance Committee members. The checklist was signed by the SWNI Treasurer and ED, but not always by every Finance Committee member even though all the reports were discussed during the monthly meetings. Moving forward SWNI will ensure all Finance Committee members sign the checklist.

• After review and clarification of any questions the above reports are posted to the monthly Board of Directors meeting folder with a Treasurer's Report

## **Quarterly Reports:**

• SWNI Sends a Quarterly Financial Report and Reimbursement Request to Civic Life based on Fiscal Year Grant Agreements. The Financial Report is reviewed by Civic Life's grant manager and supervisor, and then sent to Civic Life' s Financial Analyst for review and processing before it goes to the City Auditor.

• Prior to FY 18-19 SWNI submitted Quarterly Performance Indicator Reports and a Narrative Report based on grant goals. Starting FY 18-19 Civic Life reduced reporting to 6-Month Narrative Reports, which SWNI always submitted on time. SWNI has never received any concerns or questions on these reports

 It is important to note that SWNI annually submits an "Operating Budget" to Civic Life. Civic Life grant funds do not cover all SWNI's Operating costs, so the SWNI Board raises additional funds to cover expenses. The Operating Budget includes income it expects from Civic Life, others grants, direct fundraising efforts, advertising revenue, fiscal administration fees, etc. Once the Civic Life Grant Agreement is approved by city council we divide the Operating Budget to indicate what approved line items will be paid for by Civic Life and what expenses will be the responsibility of the SWNI Board through fundraising, grants and donations.

### Annual Reports:

• SWNI sends in a full Financial Report to Civic Life of all expenses paid by the Civic

Life grant. Prior to this report and our final 4th Quarter Reimbursement Request, the SWNI Finance Committee looks at end of year cash flow projections regarding the Civic Life grant. As with any budget, we find some end of year adjustments. SWNI always requested permission from our Civic Life grant manager and financial analyst before making adjustments. Usually these involved moving unused funds into postage (to help pay for an all-household mailing of our newspaper, or NA event postcard mailings) or funds to pay for meeting room reservations at the Multnomah Arts Center.

• Annual Narrative Report to Civic Life on accomplishments during the Fiscal Year

With the upcoming charter review, Portland voters will likely be presented with a proposal to elect city commissions by district. One of the reasons for this proposed charter change is so commissioners elected from within districts can better and more efficiently represent the people and issues within a specified district. The same is true for district neighborhood coalitions which provide a local avenue for public engagement. For a direct line of communication and efficiency of access, coalition directors and paid staff need to be in offices that are located within the geographical boundaries of the coalition. Board members should be elected representatives from the neighborhood associations and other groups also from within the geographical boundaries the coalition serves. Although not perfect, this world renown system of civic engagement in Portland has worked well for over 40 years.

The embezzlement of funds at SWNI took place nearly ten years ago. It is my understanding the person involved was arrested and jailed. It is also my understanding that the SWNI's books are now being maintained by a CPA. CASE CLOSED!

Please accept these comments and the forwarded email below (11/20/2020) for inclusion in the City Council record for Agenda 966, "Amend Grant with Southeast Uplift...." (December 9, 2020 City Council meeting).

I strongly disagree with the findings in the draft ordinance, forensic audit and impact statement in Agenda 966, and strongly oppose the Office of Community and Civic Life's proposal to transfer funding for the coalition support functions of Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. (SWNI) to Southeast Uplift (SEUL).

# I strongly support amending the ordinance and Exhibit C to grant Civic Life's full coalition funding to SWNI to serve the people of Southwest Portland for FY 2020-21 and beyond.

Civic Life's proposal to redirect support of Southwest Portland's neighborhood associations to another coalition is in violation of the city's "Standards for Neighborhood Associations, Business Associations and District Coalitions and the Office of Neighborhood Involvement" adopted by Portland City Council on July 13, 2005 (ordinance 179418). Civic Life has not consulted with SWNI's neighborhood and business associations about this proposal and has not notified the groups that received the August 17, 2020 (Exhibit B) of this proposal to defund SWNI and provide coalition benefits through another coalition. Portlanders certainly deserve better dialogue on this draconian funding proposal and an opportunity to discuss and respond to the contents of Agenda 966 with more than five days notice.

The Office of Community and Civic Life shared its issues with SWNI in its July 9, 2020 City Council testimony rather than through dialogue with SWNI or making any collaborative effort to improve performance. Civic Life contracted with Marsh & Minick to perform a forensic audit of SWNI in August 2020. Civic Life expanded the scope of the audit to include more than a 10-year period, and the audit makes several unsubstantiated findings aimed at discrediting SWNI that obfuscated actions taken at the time SWNI discovered theft of funds in October 2010 with the actions taken after strong financial controls were immediately put in place. I served on the SWNI Board during this time (2008-2014) and noted examples in the email below where Marsh & Minick manipulated information to come to its findings.

Civic Life's grants have enabled SWNI to provide valuable resources and support to the people of SW Portland (see Exhibit C). In particular, SWNI's monthly newsletter *SW News* informs people in our community about local issues and events from both local partners (i.e. Neighborhood House) and government entities (i.e. the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability, Bureau of Transportation, Bureau of Environmental Services, Parks and Recreation, Metro, TriMet and Oregon Dept. of Transportation). Civic Life's services (Exhibit B) do not notify people of local issues and, as Vice President of Crestwood Neighborhood Association, I can only recall one bureau using Civic Life's list to notify neighborhoods as required.

Civic Life and Marsh & Minick's allegations that SWNI has misused \$179,332.34 of city grant funding lack transparency in how the audit came to that conclusion. I did a keyword search on this number and it only appears in Civic Life's findings #4, Marsh & Minick's Cover Letter and Executive Summary, and Civic Life's Impact Statement. There is no documentation to base this allegation in the forensic audit report. Marsh & Minick did not perform a review of SWNI's current fiscal management system and how SWNI funds are managed, and instead made "findings" using language intending to discredit SWNI. Civic Life's Impact Statement mis-characterized the impact of this proposal on the people of Portland.

There has been no loss of money to the city of Portland. This is extremely important to note because SWNI staff and volunteers have worked diligently over the scope of the audit to make sure SWNI grant obligations have been met each year, and Civic Life has raised no financial issues until this year. The audit findings lacked context and documentation to support its findings of financial mismanagement for the scope period, particularly since SWNI learned its lesson and implemented strong fiscal controls beginning in October 2010. Audit claims of financial mismanagement are largely based on incidents that occurred 10 years ago and did not focus on the financial management system and controls in place today.

Civic Life's claims of dysfunctionality among SWNI Board members overlooked efforts taken by the SWNI Board in 2019 to improve communications among its Board members. Marsh & Minick did not quote language from the SWNI Board minutes, particularly during the September-October 2019 time-frame; instead it quoted language by the two Board members who rebuffed SWNI's efforts and became intent on discrediting SWNI.

SWNI demonstrated its commitment to ensuring diversity, equity and inclusion over the past five years by forming an Equity and Inclusion (E&I) Committee and initiating a series of educational programs and conversations focused on issues of race, place and civic life. SWNI had planned to expand on these efforts in the scope of work in Exhibit C. In September-October 2019 Shannon Hiller-Webb bypassed SWNI Bylaws and the E&I committee and issued a Request for Proposals without a budget or prior consultation with SWNI's E&I, Finance or Executive committees. This proposal was sent back to the E&I committee but never taken back to the Board, as documented in the minutes of SWNI Board meetings but mis-characterized in the forensic audit report.

Civic Life's proposal deserves more public dialogue. Please amend the Ordinance and Exhibit C to fully fund SWNI for FY 2020-21 to support the valuable services SWNI provides, and allow SWNI and Civic Life to work on resolving issues of concern. And please involve all Portlanders in dialogue about the role of Neighborhood Associations and locally-focused District Coalitions during the budget discussions for FY 2021-2022.

Dear Mayor Wheeler and members of the Portland City Council:

I want to convey my perspective on what I believe is a very biased forensic audit report released this week by the Office of Community and Civic Life. I am Past President of Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. (SWNI, 2011-2014) and Vice President of the Crestwood Neighborhood Association (2017-present), and serve as Crestwood Neighborhoods' alternate to the SWNI Board as of last fall. SWNI provides much-needed services for the people in SW Portland, and I am asking you to fund SWNI before the deferral of city funding forces the SWNI Board to lay off its staff members. SWNI enables people to work together on local issues, coordinates communication about local issues through its monthly *SW News* and electronic communication services, and provides assistance with neighborhood projects that improve and maintain livability in SW Portland. Civic Life cannot perform those functions for our neighborhood associations. Our neighborhoods and SWNI need to move forward with SWNI's mission to support the people in SW Portland through these trying times.

Last fall I observed bullying behavior by Shannon Hiller-Webb and Marie Tyvoll during SWNI Board meetings. SWNI President Leslie Hammond and other Board members asked both of them to follow SWNI grievance procedures and they refused. Shannon and Marie created an atmosphere that was intimidating. They both demanded extensive records without explaining a reason for reviewing these records; many of the records they requested were not readily available and many are exempt from public disclosure. It appears they took their case to Civic Life Director Suk Rhee, who had already threatened city support for coalitions and neighborhood associations through the its Code Change project (which fortunately did not move forward) and it appears Shannon and Marie found a sympathetic ear within Civic Life.

At City Council's July 9, 2020 meeting Shannon Hiller-Webb orchestrated a 72page power point presentation that contained numerous errors and materials taken out of context. I found those same errors and accusations in the Marsh Minick Forensic Audit which seemed to have biased their analysis. The MM audit report did not say who they intended to interview, but I was one of the people interviewed for the audit. I can state for a fact that I provided MM with information that seems to have been deliberately omitted in the final report. In addition, often the audit report discussion lacks context over its 10 year scope.

SWNI needs time to prepare a response to the audit. SWNI needs funding to continue to serve the people of SW Portland. Please provide both, as soon as

# Marianne Fitzgerald's Perspective on March Minick's Forensic Audit: Findings Report for Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc.

The Marsh Minick (MM) audit is full of unsubstantiated allegations using inflammatory language that seems intent on damaging SWNI's reputation. Here are a few examples where I believe they manipulated information to justify a desired outcome.

- The forensic audit statement that "The allegations of harassment, bullying and feeling unsafe appeared to be a problem over the last decade" (p. 103) is unsubstantiated." Page 102 contains two documents to support that claim. Regarding the August 25, 2011 complaint, <u>Lemailed MM the</u> <u>documentation that SWNI took swift action on September 28, 2011 to</u> <u>remedy the August 25, 2011 complaint, but MM omitted this information</u> <u>from the report.</u> The other document on p. 102 was dated July 6, 2020. There is no evidence that this has been "a problem over the last decade."
- 2. Former SWNI Board member Jim McLaughlin testified to City Council on July 7, 2020 that it was "his opinion" that "the fiscal mismanagement of taxpayer dollars stems from lack of oversight...". Shannon Hiller-Webb's July 9, 2020 testimony/presentation with doctored up information claims that Jim McLaughlin sent an email making this allegation to the SWNI Board on Sept. 28, 2011. I have a copy of Mr. McLaughlin's September 28, 2011 email, and it was never sent to the SWNI Board, nor did anyone ever make that statement to the SWNI Board. I sent MM documentation that the SWNI Board discussed the SWNI credit card in Executive Session in November and December 2010 that was omitted from the report. For your information, the Executive Director explained that in 2005 it was not clear any credit card fraud or theft occurred; it appeared SWNI had simply accumulated and failed to pay the principal on a high credit card balance and she took personal responsibility for not being aware that the debt had not been paid off. When the Executive Director discovered financial irregularities in October 2010, the Executive Director and SWNI Board took immediate action to remedy the issues. The SWNI Board was satisfied with the Executive Director's explanation in 2010, and no one raised it to the SWNI Board again, including Mr. McLaughlin. Isent MM documentation of Executive Session Minutes and a memo describing what happened that were omitted from the MM report. Instead. MM made unsubstantiated accusations in their findings based on Mr. McLaughlin's allegations. I also sent MM documentation of the SWNI Board's action on September 28.

2011 to terminate its Board Officer without cause (see #1 above) which was <u>coincidentally the same day Mr. McLaughlin's sent his email to another</u> <u>individual, not the SWNI Board.</u>

- 3. Regarding the forensic audit's Executive Summary, <u>MM does not</u> differentiate between actions that were taken prior to October 2010, actions taken between October 2010 and October 2011 to formally remedy financial management through the adoption of policies and recovery of funds, and actions taken in the recent past. MM uses inflammatory terms such as "willfully blind to noncompliance", "errors, mismanagement, waste, abuse and fraud of financials" and "financial mismanagement for the scope period" (p. 5) that are not supported by facts nor recognition that SWNI took corrective and preventive measures to address financial management issues prior to October 2010.
- 4. During October 2011, SWNI properly deposited insurance loss claim checks and managed its accounts. SWNI signed a confidentiality agreement regarding the insurance settlement and MM has violated that confidentiality agreement in this report. SWNI was in close contact with the Office of Neighborhood Involvement (ONI) at the time and ONI did not expect the money to be returned. SWNI documented thousands of volunteer hours to prepare and negotiate the insurance claim and manage SWNI affairs to address the theft and prevent it from happening again in the future, including rebuilding its accounting system. The document in the audit report page 23 is doctored up (see attached original, this letter is in the public record for the pre-sentencing report). MM asserts that the "methods of theft...directly affect expenses that SWNI would have passed along for reimbursement to ONI" (p. 24). I strongly disagree. SWNI staff and volunteers made sure that SWNI's grant obligations were met. As the attached letter notes, SWNI used salary savings to replenish the SWNI accounts that its former employee stole from and volunteer hours to provide its services to the residents and business in SW Portland and fulfill its city grant obligations.
- 5. The forensic examination of documents from 2010-2011 makes allegations about SWNI's financial management at a time the SWNI staff, Board and volunteers were doing their best to recover from being a victim of financial fraud, which is not relevant to SWNI operations today, yet it seems to be the basis of many of MM's inflammatory statements. During the past decade, SWNI has submitted regular financial and program reports to the ONI/Civic Life and none have raised any issues of financial mismanagement.

These are just a few specific examples of bias in Marsh Minick's forensic audit

about SWNI during the time I served on the SWNI Board. There are many others but it will take time to prepare a response. Please allocate funding to Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. for FY 2020-2021 as soon as possible, and please allow SWNI an opportunity to respond to the audit.

I am writing this letter to express my support for City Ordinance 190044 introduced by Commissioner Eudaly which would redirect funds and resources away from Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) to Southeast Uplift organization. By this letter I would also like to join those Portland residents who voiced their concerns regarding the results of the forensic audit of SWNI operations and demanded that community involvement funding be redirected to organizations with a track record for accountability, equity and transparency.

I currently live in SW Portland and am quite familiar with the SWNI organization as I have been a member of the Hillsdale Neighborhood Association for the past three years and have met and worked with SWNI Director Sylvia Bogert and SWNI President Leslie Hammond on numerous occasions. Last year I briefly served as SWNI Board Secretary but resigned as soon as I realized that anyone who tried to challenge SWNI to become a more open, inclusive and to follow its bylaws and ONI standards, and expect the same from the neighborhood associations SWNI is currently servicing, is not going to be welcomed as a part of the SWNI team.

SWNI's commitment to ensure diversity, equity and inclusion is nothing more than a stack of empty shell policies which never go beyond conversations during meetings of its Equity and Inclusion Committee to which I was invited a few times as a member of the Russian-speaking community. I couldn't help but notice that while SWNI promoted ethical diversity at these meetings, a diversity of opinions was not tolerated.

Over the last three years I had multiple conversations with Mrs. Bogert and Ms. Hammond regarding disappointing experiences which I and many of my Hillsdale neighbors have had with our neighborhood association. I flagged numerous bylaw violations, an autocratic culture and a condescending attitude by the association's perpetual board directors which left many residents voiceless and frustrated during neighborhood meetings. Many of them admitted that they would never return to association meetings as the last time they attended the meeting they felt shut out from the decision-making process. I was also told that some residents left the meetings in tears. My concerns have never been addressed and not even taken seriously by SWNI leadership, and the most common refrain that I heard from its leaders was "let it go."

I highly encourage you to review pages 101-103 of the audit report which very accurately depicted SWNI's culture and organizational conduct. I was never interviewed by the auditors, but based on my personal experience, I can firmly state that this is a self-serving organization which does more harm than good to the neighbors in South West Portland and it should not be funded with taxpayers money.

The proposed ordinance to amend the SEUL contract is a blatant, last ditch attempt by outgoing Commissioner Eudaly and Civic Life Director Suk Rhee to undermine Portland's acclaimed neighborhood system after their inept and embarrassing failure last year to update Code 3.96.

The Commissioner is using SWNI as a scape goat through an unsubstantiated and misleading forensic audit that found no evidence of theft, embezzlement or fraud since the embezzlement that was fully adjudicated ten years ago. If anything, there were some indications of sloppy bookkeeping and lack of sufficient board oversight – easily correctable by SWNI if even true. Casting aspersions on SWNI through this questionable audit is being used as an excuse to transfer its contract to an organization that is ill prepared to take it on.

This transfer would cause the firing of some SWNI staff and have the expectation that SEUL would be able take on the obligation of supporting 17 additional neighborhood associations in addition to the 20 it already serves. SEUL would have to hire and train incoming staff from SWNI, take on oversight of its board and seven committees in addition to its own committees and board, and further to potentially implement financial management/internal controls referenced by the audit as weak or lacking in an organization with which SEUL is unfamiliar. SEUL itself in the last two years eliminated two full-time positions and is currently one person understaffed from two recent staff departures. It is not feasible for SEUL to take on additional obligations beyond what it already has.

Furthermore, SEUL's bylaws stipulate a limitation to serving only southeast. Taking on SWNI's contract would be a violation of its bylaws leading to potential grievances and lawsuits by people within either organization's boundaries for breach of their fiduciary duty of loyalty to its member organizations and the duty to comply with its bylaws and city standards.

In addition to violating SEUL's bylaws, this attempt to transfer the contract is a violation of the following ONI standards:

#### Standards Section IV.E.

"Change in organizational affiliations for Neighborhood Associations and District Coalitions is a major issue which entails considerable time, communication and dollars. **Such action must not be undertaken lightly nor as a result of momentary problems or personality disputes...**"

#### Standards Section IV.E.3b

"Realigning a Neighborhood Association with a District Coalition with which it does not

currently share a boundary is not allowed."

Reassessing the coalition model in this proposed ordinance is unrelated to the SWNI/SEUL contract. A reassessment of the coalition model which failed in the toxic 3.96 process last year is worthy of consideration, but not until the new City Council is formed and a new Commissioner is in place who oversees Civic Life.

This proposed ordinance is a hasty and ill-conceived attempt to push through changes that require far more thought and deliberation with greater attention to unintended consequences. Please vote no!

Mayor and City Council Members,

I am writing to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020.

As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

- "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.
- "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. <u>SWNI's leadership demonstrated being</u> <u>willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and</u> <u>ethics</u>."
- The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the <u>lack of accountability</u> for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, <u>a lack of transparency</u>, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.
- Critical financial controls were not followed as there was a <u>97% error rate</u> for the month-end financial checklist used by Finance Committee Treasurer and Executive Officers.
- <u>SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life</u> <u>every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage</u> <u>attributed to embezzlements</u>.

- In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. Forensic examination findings were that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate applying for the PPP loan. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.
- <u>Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were not</u> <u>sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws,</u> <u>standards and fiducial oversight requirements of board members.</u>
- Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model."

#### THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer funded financial mismanagement and to end funding to SWNI.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to instead fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland.

Dear Mayor Wheeler and Members of City Council,

We need a new more transparent approach to funding civic engagement in the City of Portland, a process that is open to all community organizations and Portlanders, not just to a few neighborhood district organizations that have had, for decades, the benefit of no-bid contract funding from the City.

I am writing to encourage the City to reallocate funding traditionally budgeted to the troubled Southwest Neighborhoods Incorporated (SWNI) toward developing participatory budgeting (PB) processes that would be open to all organizations and bureaus and all Portlanders. Applying the reallocated SWNI funds to support PB in Portland would help ensure those City funds and future funds are expended with greater accountability, transparency, and equity. In the near term, reallocated funds could support evaluation and future expansion of the pending PB processes centered on Black communities and organizations or houseless Portlanders. But the benefits of PB in terms of building community and interracial empathy and understanding, in advancing genuine participatory equity, and bolstering trust and new leadership among and within underrepresented groups are too great to limit it to small pockets of money or specific subpopulations. While is important that underserved and underrepresented communities be centered in the design and implementation of PB, the City of Portland should aim to engage all Portlanders and allocate a growing share of the General Fund with PB. The City should start planning for this expansion of PB now. PB puts the people and communities, instead of organizations, in charge of the purse strings of government. A robust, Citywide participatory budgeting process will help address the chronic issues of accountability and trust that plague many City Bureaus and Cityfunded organizations from SWNI to the Portland Police Bureau. And it will still allow these Bureaus and organizations to secure funding if they can demonstrate their values and benefits to the community.

The purpose of Civic Life's funding should be to connect people and communities with their government and facilitate exchanges through programs and partnerships that are responsive and accountable to community concerns, distribute public resources equitably, and give all Portlanders equitable voice and participation in decisions over public resources by centering those least represented. Good Morning Mayor and Council:

My name is Allen Field and I am testifying in opposition to agenda item 966.

I'm on the Boards of the SE Uplift District Coalition and Richmond Neighborhood Association but I am not speaking on their behalf.

The proposed Ordinance is not well thought out since SEUL's Bylaws prevent it from taking over SWNI's contract.

With my experience on the SEUL Board and having worked with SEUL staff for over 15 years, I can say that SEUL in no way has the capacity to take over SWNI's contract for the remainder of the 2020-21 contract.

To hire, train, and manage 4 new SWNI staff as the Ordinance envisions, under Covid restrictions and limited Zoom interactions; to take on 17 more Neighborhood Associations, a 20-person board, oversee 7 SWNI committees and manage another building, in addition to overseeing its own 20 NAs, a 27person board, and numerous board committees -- is simply not possible.

SEUL would have the added role of correcting the deficiencies in SWNI's bookkeeping and Board oversight described in the Audit in an organization it knows nothing about. In the last 1 ½ years SEUL eliminated 2 full-time positions and it is currently 1 person understaffed from 3 recent staff departures. In our SEUL Board meeting Monday, the Director explained that staff do not have the capacity to take on this extra work, 3 of whom are recent hires still being trained.

SEUL's Bylaws prevent it from taking over the SWNI contract since it limits SEUL to serving the SE area up to I-84. Taking over SWNI's contract exposes the Board to grievances and lawsuits by people in either the SEUL or SWNI boundaries for breach of their fiduciary duty of loyalty to its members and duty of obedience to comply with its Bylaws. I will advocate strongly to my fellow board-members to reject taking over the SWNI contract.

This last-minute Ordinance rushed before Council before Commissioner Eudaly's departure doesn't give the 24 organizations on the SEUL Board enough time to consider and vote on this. SEUL has become more strict the past year that something like this needs to be discussed by their member organizations before SEUL can vote.

The next Commissioner and Director overseeing Civic Life should oversee the reexamination of the Coalition model along the lines of the 3-year process that was previously presented to Council by Commissioner Eudaly for revising Code 3.96 and the Coalition system.

Dear Mayor Wheeler and Members of City Council,

We need a new more transparent approach to funding civic engagement in the City of Portland, a process that is open to all community organizations and Portlanders, not just to a few neighborhood district organizations that have had, for decades, the benefit of no-bid contract funding from the City.

I am writing to encourage the City to reallocate funding traditionally budgeted to the troubled Southwest Neighborhoods Incorporated (SWNI) toward developing participatory budgeting (PB) processes that would be open to all organizations and bureaus and all Portlanders. Applying the reallocated SWNI funds to support PB in Portland would help ensure those City funds and future funds are expended with greater accountability, transparency, and equity. In the near term, reallocated funds could support evaluation and future expansion of the pending PB processes centered on Black communities and organizations or houseless Portlanders. But the benefits of PB in terms of building community and interracial empathy and understanding, in advancing genuine participatory equity, and bolstering trust and new leadership among and within underrepresented groups are too great to limit it to small pockets of money or specific subpopulations. And it will still allow these Bureaus and organizations to secure funding if they can demonstrate their value and benefits to the community.

The purpose of Civic Life's funding should be to connect people and communities with their government and facilitate exchanges through programs and partnerships that are responsive and accountable to community concerns, distribute public resources equitably, and give all Portlanders equitable voice and participation in decisions over public resources by centering those least represented. PB is a demonstrated model of achieving all those goals. It is time for City Council to stop rewarding bad behavior and instead invest in more equitable, fiscally responsible community-based mechanisms like participatory budgeting.

Mayor Wheeler, Commissioner Eudaly, Fritz, Hardesty and Ryan, and Auditor Hull Caballero:

My name is Janet Hawkins and I am the Board Secretary for Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc. (SWNI).

I disagree with the findings in the draft ordinance, forensic audit and impact statement in Agenda 966. I also oppose the Office of Community and Civic Life's proposal to transfer funding for the coalition support functions of SWNI to Southeast Uplift.

As SWNI Board Secretary, I am responsible for the production of meeting minutes for both our Board of Directors and Executive Committee meetings. I am also responsible, along with the Executive Director, for responding to records requests. I have served as the Board Secretary beginning in October 2019 to the present day.

My role is to provide accurate and complete meeting records that are informed by both SWNI's bylaws and in compliance with the city's 3.96 Code standards. I also work with the Executive Director to ensure that SWNI's recordkeeping is following its "Document Management Policy," which was created in March 2011. SWNI has maintained its records in accordance with that policy for nine years.

The Marsh Minick Audit report did not fully detail the amount of public information that SWNI has posted on its website nor did it clarify that the city of Portland also has a formal role in SWNI's document management system. Nearly thirty years of SWNI's paper records dating from the 1980's to 2010 are currently stored in city archives.

The audit also described findings related to a "lack of transparency" related to records. This statement can be challenged when you can view the full scope of the organizational content contained on SWNI's website. SWNI has done an excellent job of ensuring the public can access its Board of Directors and committee meeting documents. Board of Directors and committee records that are accessible on the SWNI website, include:

- Board of Directors meeting packet materials dating from 2000 to the present, including agendas, minutes, and other documents.
- SWNI's seven standing committees Land Use, Equity & Inclusion, Public Safety, Schools, Transportation, Watershed, and Parks – all have their records and meeting packet materials posted. Some of the committees have materials posted that date back twelve years.

- The SWNI Board Handbook is posted and it includes thirteen important Board governance documents ranging from articles of incorporation to bylaws to personnel policies.
- SWNI also posts a link to the Civic Life website showing Grant Agreements with the city of Portland.
- SWNI Grant Reports submitted to the Office of Civic Life are on the SWNI website.

Are there new approaches that SWNI can implement to improve our existing recordkeeping practices? I assure you we are interested in process improvement and would willing work closely with the Office of Civic Life in 2021. As SWNI Board Secretary, I would look forward to working on those efforts.

I strongly support amending the ordinance and Exhibit C to grant Civic Life's full coalition funding to SWNI to serve the people of Southwest Portland for FY 2020-21. Please restore funding to SWNI.

I write in opposition to Item #966. Assessing the district coalition model is a good idea -- but suddenly and peremptorily altering the role of two coalitions <u>before such</u> <u>assessment</u> does not make managerial sense.

Our very competent city auditor can suggest an interim remedy for SWNI until a thoughtful, well planned assessment of the neighborhood coalition system is carried out.

I write on my own behalf as a resident of Portland, but I should note that I chair the land-use committee of the Brentwood-Darlington Neighborhood Association.

Dear Mayor Wheeler, Commissioner Fritz, Commissioner Hardesty, and Commissioner Ryan,

In recent months Portland has seen how much disruption and damage can be done by a few individuals intent on creating mayhem, hiding their true motives behind the language of social justice. Sympathetic to the very real need for justice and change, many normally responsible residents and government leaders allowed this to go on far too long. We now see that violence and thuggery cannot be allowed to continue.

An analogous situation is now unfolding in Southwest Portland. In this case, the district coalition of neighborhood associations, Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) has been subject to a campaign of allegations of malfeasance and bias by a handful of disgruntled individuals, fueled largely by their personal bruised egos rather than legitimate factual concerns. Unsupported accusations reminiscent of the tactics of Senator Joseph McCarthy have been made by these individuals. Commissioner Eudaly and Suk Rhee, her Office of Civic Life director, enabled these groundless accusations, perhaps secondary to their lingering resentment toward SWNI and many Southwest neighborhood associations stemming from their failed attempt to weaken the work of neighborhood associations in Portland.

The few disgruntled individuals making these misrepresentations have a documented history of impossible demands and disruptive behavior. Supported by Commissioner Eudaly and Ms. Rhee, their charges created enough confusion that City Council withheld SWNI's annual funding contract pending a forensic audit. Eudaly and Rhee handpicked the audit firm and defined their scope of inquiry. The audit turned out to be a hatchet job, cherry-picking any detail that remotely suggested possible errors while ignoring evidence that suggested alternative reasonable interpretations. The report characterized Innuendo as fact and reached conclusions based on mere allegations. Even a minimal internet search reveals the audit firm has a history of such questionable reports.

It is a well-known fact that more than ten years ago, SWNI was victimized by a long -term trusted employee who, over several years, managed to embezzle a significant amount of money. When discovered, this individual was publicly revealed and the crimes prosecuted; she was convicted and incarcerated. Nothing was kept from the light of day. More important, SWNI adopted new stringent financial policies and procedures following the recommendations from professional accountants. Subsequent audits by the IRS and annual city reviews have confirmed the effectiveness of these changes. It is telling that the recent audit, flawed as it is, did not find any evidence of financial discrepancies since that time. Nevertheless, an unfavorable audit report, regardless of how biased or unsupported by factual evidence, still does serious harm to the reputation and efficient functioning of any organization. We urge you, as ultimate decision makers for the city, to recognize such clearly unfair and unsubstantiated allegations. No matter how civic minded those behind these accusations try to appear, their crusade of personal vendetta is readily apparent to the vast majority of neighborhood leaders in Southwest. We urge City Council to not be swayed by the biased audit report and to approve the previously withheld contract with SWNI. This vital organization should be allowed to continue providing their essential support for the benefit of all the residents, businesses, and neighborhood associations in Southwest Portland.

I have previously sent the following communication to each of you on the City Council. Please accept this as my formal testimony for Wednesday's consideration of SWNI continued funding.

As a lifelong resident of Portland and an active participant in the Hayhurst Neighborhood Association for many years, I am writing to express my support for continued funding of the Southwest Neighborhoods, Inc.

My experience whether as the NA chair in the 1990s or now as the Land Use Co-chair is quite different than what is being portrayed in opinions written by one person in particular.

SWNI has long supported efforts for NAs to reach out to our own local area and beyond to create a sense of community across the population of residents. In the summer of 2019 for example, Hayhurst, supported by SWNI had a very successful Movie in the Park. Families came from near and far to attend a great event in Pendleton Park. I was privileged to meet most of those who attended and hear a bit about them. And until this year, our National Night Out was heavily attended with the support of SWNI and our wonderful community partner Alpenrose Diary.

SWNI and its member NAs have also been intimately involved in the community conversations about race that have occurred before the pandemic prevented such valuable in person events. While we have much more work to do to make our communities the model of what we want our future to be, SWNI and the NAs have certainly contributed to a strong culture change.

SWNI is critical in communicating about activities, events, issues and opportunities that residents could never track on their own. Often, the first notice of such is found in the newsletter that has now been converted to digital format.

I have attended SWNI Board meetings and have noted that the discussions are open to a variety of opinions and decisions are made in an appropriate way to reflect the majority or, in many cases, the overwhelming majority of views. I attend the SWNI Land Use Committee every month and have the same experience. Disparate points of view are expressed, the staff are objective and fair about issues that come before us and the issues of how land use decisions will affect ALL in the community are front and center.

I formerly led a statewide organization that had two large Political Action Committees and was both a professional and labor organization. As such, I was responsible for our yearly audit, the Department of Labor annual filing and the Secretary of State quarterly filings. I am well acquainted with how audits are conducted and how findings are handled. In every organization, improvements can always be made. And any organization should routinely examine its own practices. **Objective** audits against clear statutes, rules and accepted practices are very helpful in that examination.

Rather than withhold funding from an organization that has done so much good, I strongly recommend that such financial support be restored with any **<u>fact-based</u>** recommendations for procedural improvement that are necessary.

The Honorable Mayor Wheeler, Honorable Commissioners:

You are being asked to withhold taxpayer funds from SWNI and to instead divert funds to Southeast Uplift. SEUL would then supposedly provide support services to residents of southwest Portland and their neighborhood associations. This would be an unworkable and discriminatory arrangement.

The rationale for defunding SWNI is the audit of SWNI recently done by Marsh & Minick. This audit is terminally flawed. A personal vendetta by two - a mere two - individuals in southwest was the initial excuse for the audit. The bruised feelings of these two was used by Commissioner Eudaly and Civic Life Director Suk Rhee to launch their attack on SWNI. Eudaly and Rhee have a strong animosity toward SWNI stemming from last year's attempts to weaken the role of Portland's neighborhood associations. SWNI, its NAs, and many residents in southwest vigorously opposed this action. Despite their clear anti-SWNI bias, Eudaly and Rhee were allowed to select this audit firm, define the scope of the audit, and provide feedback and instructions to the firm throughout the audit process. It's often said, "you get what you pay for" and so in this case the audit report exactly fit what Eudaly and Rhee wanted, paid for with the public's money.

For 0ver 40 years SWNI has provided vital services to Portlanders in southwest and critical support to their neighborhood associations. They have done this well, with a very dedicated and hard-working staff. The embezzlement of SWNI funds by a trusted employee more than ten years ago was thoroughly vetted, legally prosecuted and punished. This recent audit simply rehashed that situation and used implication and inuendo to accuse other SWNI staff of involvement. But the audit could find no factual evidence of financial crimes or misbehavior in the decade since. A few petty bookkeeping discrepancies, perhaps, of the type inevitable in a very small organization with much of its work done by volunteers. Nothing anywhere near serious enough to warrant the destruction of SWNI that's being proposed.

I urge you to see through this sham and to restore funding to SWNI this fiscal year under the current contract. If you feel there needs to be some level of additional financial scrutiny going forward, then provide such provisions when the contract is renewed for next year. And it definitely should be renewed, because SWNI and staff provide faithful and valuable service to city residents, and should be allowed to continue doing so.

Mayor and City Council Members,

I am writing to share my concerns regarding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc. (SWNI) and the findings in the forensic audit requested by City Council on July 9, 2020.

As you know, Marsh Minick P.C. recently released the results of the audit in November 2020 and they include the following:

- "In total, four primary bank accounts were forensically analyzed with the SWNI's financial system records and supporting documentation, which resulted in \$179,332.24 of financial mismanagement and an additional \$174,265.25 from the period of embezzlement culminating in a total loss \$353,597.49 in mismanaged taxpayer funds.
- "There was evidence SWNI had mismanaged financials. There were occurrences of misapplied and unallocated money. <u>SWNI's leadership demonstrated being</u> <u>willfully blind to noncompliance with governance documents, standards and</u> <u>ethics</u>."
- The root cause of the financial mismanagement was the <u>lack of accountability</u> for financial duties, outdated financial policies and procedures, non-adherence with governing documents, providing incomplete and inadequate records to all Board members, <u>a lack of transparency</u>, unperformed financial statement audits and reviews, and irreconcilable difference among Board members.
- Critical financial controls were not followed as there was a <u>97% error rate</u> for the month-end financial checklist used by Finance Committee Treasurer and Executive Officers.
- <u>SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life</u> <u>every year. The City expects 0% and 3-5% is the average percentage</u> <u>attributed to embezzlements</u>.

- In 2020 SWNI received \$66,300.00 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funding citing "COVID impact to budget & services. Forensic examination findings were that SWNI had marginal direct impact from COVID of \$3k, had \$80k in savings adequate to cover 3 months of payroll therefore SWNI's staff's job security and paycheck funding was not in jeopardy due to COVID that would necessitate applying for the PPP loan. In addition, all grant funding was secured at the same FY 19/20 levels for FY 20/21.
- <u>Treasurer reports, financials and board materials provided to the Board were not</u> <u>sufficient enough to determine compliance with governing documents, laws,</u> <u>standards and fiducial oversight requirements of board members.</u>
- Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

These results echo concerns expressed in 2016 by the Portland City Auditor in a report titled, "Community and Neighborhood Involvement: Accountability limited, rules and funding model outdated," and found that "In this audit we found a lack of accountability for how community engagement funds are spent and an outdated City Code and funding model."

#### THE TIME FOR CHANGE IS NOW.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to put an end to decades of taxpayer funded financial mismanagement and to end funding to SWNI.

I call upon the Mayor and City Council to instead fund a new or existing organization with a confirmed track record for transparency and accountability in all matters and that is guided by values that include diversity, equity and inclusion for supporting and engaging marginalized and underserved populations in SW Portland.

We all benefit from its many services to the community. Management of the SWNI coalition should remain where it belongs – in the southwest, not in SE Portland. This proposal makes no sense.

On behalf of the board of the Southwest Hills Residential League (SWHRL), I am writing to urge you to defeat proposal 966 to transfer district coalition funds to Southeast Uplift and instead to continue funding Southwest Neighborhoods Inc (SWNI).

While we recognize that the recent forensic audit by Marsh & Minick identified a number of areas for improved oversight, management and equity education, it found **no evidence of fraud** or other criminal activity over the past ten years. We are concerned about the lack of due process in City Council's decision to withhold funds based solely on allegations of *potential for* financial mismanagement. We understand that SWNI has offered to undergo an

audit by an external CPA to provide a complete picture. To transfer SWNI's funding and responsibilities before that process is complete would be a rush to judgment without a fair hearing of all evidence. Further, the rush to transfer responsibilities without sufficient forethought or planning would create chaos at a time that is already taxing everyone's abilities to cope with the constant change. The damage will fall not just on SWNI, but equally onto the 17 neighborhood associations who rely on SWNI and its staff to provide essential services, from filing government reports to IT and communications support to providing educational forums on issues affecting our neighborhoods.

We therefore ask that you stay your decision to transfer funding of SWNI until you are able to hold a comprehensive hearing of all the evidence and render a determination on the issues the organization needs to address as well as the remedies that would most reasonably and effectively accomplish those goals.

Dear Mayor Wheeler and Members of City Council,

Civic engagement is a powerful way to rebuild our government institutions and practices to be more fair, just, and in service of all Portlanders. That work belongs to us all, not just to a few independent organizations that have had the benefit of decades of no-bid contract funding from the city.

As a 25-year Portland resident and small business owner, I am writing to call on you to reinvest the funding traditionally budgeted to SWNI and to instead invest in one or more nonprofit organizations dedicated to civic participation with a better track record of accountability, transparency, and equity.

The <u>issues recently brought to light through an independent forensic audit</u> conducted by Marsh Minick, P.C. are endemic in quasi-governmental relationships, as <u>Jim White of</u> <u>Nonprofit Association of Oregon penned last year in his letter of support of code change</u>:

"Nonprofits must be treated as independent businesses regularly reconfirming the support of their communities through constant interactions and evolution. We must compete for community support by offering the best opportunity for community-led solutions to be recognized and supported financially through community fundraising and, when contracted by government, competitive processes...Creating direct-line funding into specific organizations is unhealthy both for government and for the nonprofit's long-term sustainability."

This issue is an inevitable outcome of a calcified city code 3.96. The recent independent forensic audit findings regarding SWNI's financial practices as requested by City Council on July 9, 2020 are endemic, and troubling. Here are just a few findings that we find concerning:

SWNI currently mismanages 7.35% of their base grant funding from Civic Life *every year*.

Financial statements have not been reviewed or audited by an independent accountant since the \$175k embezzlement in 2010.

"SWNI's leadership demonstrated being willfully blind to noncompliance with

governance documents, standards and ethics."

SWNI has special privileges not afforded most other community-based groups—land use appeal waivers and an exception to registering as a lobbying group with the city, as just two examples—which further obscure the reality that SWNI is an independent nonprofit that has no greater accountability mechanisms to the public than the Evergreen Curling Club.

The purpose of Civic Life's funding should be to connect people and communities with their government and facilitate exchanges through programs and partnerships that are responsive, at times iterative, accountable to community concerns, and that reflect an equitable distribution of public resources.

The findings of the forensic audit clearly demonstrate that SWNI has been neither accountable nor transparent in their governance. As an independent nonprofit, it is SWNI's Board's responsibility to review findings and take corrective action as they (and ultimately the IRS) see fit. As a grantmaker, it is the City's responsibility to review findings and make fiscally responsible funding decisions.

Now is the time to more equitably distribute those funds dedicated to civic engagement. It is time for City Council to stop rewarding bad behavior and instead invest in more equitable, fiscally responsible community-based efforts.

#### Dear Mayor and Council Commissioners,

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to respond to Ordinance 966. All I can see is that the office of Civic Life is validating two disgruntled individuals who harassed me because as the chair of the SWNI Equity and Inclusion Committee, I told them to follow the fiscal procedures of the organization. When they went to the SWN Board (who provided fiscal oversight to prevent fiscal risk), they were denied funds because, among other things, they refused to go before the SWNI Finance Committee. They then bullied me and others on the board in an attempt to intimidate us. They were not whistleblowers.

I am a Native American elder and as chair of the SWNI Equity and Inclusion (E & I) Committee with the support of my committee, the SWNI Board, and SWNI staff had worked hard to develop the SWNI Racial Equity Policy and the Equity and Diversity Best Practices for Neighborhood Associations. All of which supports the City's committment to anti-racism, equity, communication, collaboration and fiscal responsibility. I have had a 43-year commitment to community development and equity in Portland commencing in 1979 with the publication of my book, The Portland Planning Commission an Historical Overview.

The Audit took SWNI to task for taking four years to develop these documents. Well, I say, at least we got it done, nobody else has. This is why I oppose being transferred to SE Uplift. Additionally, we spent these four years offering trainings and hosting speakers in order to educate and raise awareness about racism. It was necessary to do this because. 1) we were introducing a new program, 2) there were no existing models so we had to invent our own thru trial and error, 3) the E & I committee was unlike any other committee because we were building relationships with marginalized communities impacted by historical trauma. The other committees were project-driven and dealt with specific issues such as land use and transportation. It was necessary to explain the process in order to ensure its success. Similarly, if one were planting seeds, one would prepare the soil to give the seeds the best start.

For example, a similar thing is happening in the Natural Sciences. There is a growing awareness of the value of Indigenous Ways of Knowing. Western Science is beginning to acknowledge the value of working collaborately with Indigenous Communities. But it didn't happen overnight. Lots of work had to be done to facillitate this process before you could start to see some progress. For instance, this year the E & I Committee is to hosting an Eena Festival to introduce folks to Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK).

Finally, I need to address the Resignation Letter I sent. At the time I wrote it, we were in the middle of the pandemic. I did not fully comprehend what was happening. In hindsight, I should have filed a grievance against the two disgruntled board members who were harassing me and refusing to follow SWNI fiscal procedures. And were in fact, attempting to pressure the board to take on fiscal risk without proper scrutiny by the finance committee. So, it is ironic that the Audit allowed them to frame the narrative. I hope SWNI is given the opportunity to respond to the Audit so we can arrive at a balanced perspective in going forward.

I request that funding be restored to SWNI because S W neighborhoods are best served by our

present staff in regards to implementing the Racial Equity Policy and Equity and Diversity Best Practices for Neighborhood Associations. I have received support from the staff, in particular, Sylvia Bogert. Without her dedication and professional expertise, I doubt the E & I Committee would have come this far.
