NOTICE OF DETERMINATION
Campaign Regulation Complaint No.: 2020-29-TD
- Violation and Civil Penalty -

Dear Tom Drewes:

On July 29, 2020, the City of Portland Auditor's Office received the complaint named above, alleging campaign contribution violations under [Portland City Charter Section 3-301](#) and corresponding [Portland City Code \(PCC\) Section 2.10.010](#). Specifically, the complaint alleged that the Friends of Ted Wheeler campaign's receipt of contributions made by you exceeded campaign contribution limits and thereby violated City campaign finance regulations.

After an investigation, I find one violation of City campaign regulations. I am issuing you a fine in the amount of \$200. A corresponding fine in the amount of \$200 is also issued to Friends of Ted Wheeler for this complaint, as addressed in Complaint No. 2020-29-TW.

Complaint: Violation of City Campaign Finance Regulations
Aggregate individual contributions exceeded contribution limits

Complaint No. 2020-29-TD alleged you made one \$1000 contribution and a second \$100 contribution to Friends of Ted Wheeler in the same election cycle period, thereby violating campaign contribution limits for the current elections cycle.

City campaign finance regulations limit contributions to a candidate from an individual to \$500 during the applicable current election cycle. See [City Charter Section 3-301\(a\)-\(b\)\(1\)](#) and [PCC Section 2.10.010 A.- B. 1.](#) On May 4, 2020, the City Auditor's Office began enforcing these provisions,¹ finding violations

for aggregate individual contributions exceeding \$500. Candidates qualified to appear on the ballot for the May 19, 2020 Primary Election were given notice on April 29, 2020 of the change in law and the new enforcement date.²

For candidate Ted Wheeler, the current election cycle runs from July 6, 2016³ until the date of certification for the results of the November 2020 election. A review of the Oregon Elections System for Tracking and Reporting (ORESTAR) revealed the following transactions during this timeframe between you and the Friends of Ted Wheeler campaign:

** On August 6, 2020, the campaign refunded you \$100 (Transaction 3530470). However, in that instance, the campaign retained possession of the corresponding contribution for a significant period of time and thus the \$100 contribution on June 22, 2020 is unlawful.*

Based on the transactions detailed in the table above, I find that the \$100 contribution made to Ted Wheeler and Friends on June 22, 2020 raised the aggregate contribution total to \$1,100, thereby violating the \$500 limit for contributions from an individual during the current election cycle.

Penalties

The City campaign finance regulations require financial penalties following violations of campaign contribution limits. In particular, each violation of City Charter Article 3 and corresponding City Code Chapter 2.10 requires a fine of “not less than two nor more than twenty times the amount of the unlawful Contribution or Expenditure...”⁴ In determining the required penalty within the range allowed, I considered the following factors: This was the first instance of an isolated violation occurring in the same election cycle, the cooperation of the parties with the investigation, the amount of any penalties issued in similar circumstances, and the City’s definition of Elections Cycle differs from the State of Oregon’s campaign finance regulations. Based on these factors, the fine issued is the lowest amount allowed, or two times the unlawful contribution of \$100, resulting in a total fine of \$200.

Tom Drewes shall pay \$200 to the City Auditor’s Office by September 28, 2020.

NOTE: Late payments for fines may be subject to an increase in fee.


