What is Permanent Supportive Housing?


Affordable housing is the solution to homelessness. A subset of people also need ongoing and integrated support services to be successful in that housing.

Permanent Supportive Housing combines deeply affordable housing with individualized services to support people who face the most complex challenges to live independently. This often includes people with disabling conditions who've experienced long or recurring episodes of homelessness.

Please note: Inclusive race categories to the left of the dotted line add up to more than 100%.


Culturally Specific PSH for the African American Community

The Urban League of Portland began offering culturally specific PSH through Project Haven in 2016. Urban League's PSH services are intentionally designed to meet the needs of Black and African American community members with disabling conditions who are experiencing long periods of homelessness.

What is Coordinated Access?

A process designed to coordinate housing resources for individuals and families experiencing homelessness.



Rather than go to every organization that might have a resource, the person seeking services can complete a **standardized assessment** at one organization and be placed on a **centralized list** for a range of resources across multiple organizations.


Intent of Coordinated Access

- Create a more equitable system that is easier to access and navigate
- Reduce duplication of efforts to serve clients better
- Direct limited resources to the people who need them the most
- Match households to housing resources that best meet their needs and preferences

Culturally Specific PSH at Renaissance Commons

Thirty (30) units of Permanent Supportive Housing with culturally specific PSH services provided by the Urban League.



Proposal for Renaissance Commons PSH Referrals from CA

JOHS, Urban League and REACH propose that the 30 units of PSH at Renaissance Commons are released from the N/NE Preference Policy and receive referrals from Coordinated Access. JOHS will work with Urban League and other community partners to identify eligible households who will most benefit from culturally specific PSH.

Benefits of this Approach

- Ability to refer households who need and want culturally specific PSH
- Relationship with households we refer and ability to support them through the lease-up and appeal process
- Ability for Urban League to maintain relationship with households from point of assessment through housing placement and retention
- Households more likely to engage in PSH services because of intentional referral process
