Dear Sir:

Wednesday night, January 10th, or rather early Thursday morning, January 11th, last one C. N. Collins, who at the time was employed at the All-Nation Saloon at the Northeast corner of Burnside and Second Streets, was struck in the foot with a bullet from a revolver in the hands of a police officer. Mr. Collins had just left the place where he was employed on his way home when a number of officers and supposed-hold-up men were having a revolver duel on the opposite side of the street.

Collins was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital and there treated by the City Physician. He left there on January 27th, and since that time has been hobbling about with a crutch, being unable to return to work. He hopes, however, to be able to return to work within another ten days.

By reason of the wound he will have lost a month's time, not considering the paid that he has suffered by reason thereof, and I now write you and ask if an allowance could not be made by the City to him to at least cover loss of time. His wages at the time of the injury aforesaid amounted to \$15 per week.

Dear Sir:
