This letter is being submitted as public testimony in reference to city council agenda item 343 Construction of Forest Park Entry Project.

I would like to draw to the attention of City Council grave concerns as articulated by Representative Mitch Greenlick in a letter to Adena Long in April 2020, about the Forest Park Entrance Phase 1 project. These concerns are shared by many Forest Park advocates and neighbors. Representative Greenlick was instrumental in acquiring state funding being used for this project. Please see attached. Phase 1 will fund repair of a short uphill segment of Firelane 1 while providing no funding for repair of the long transverse section that is crucial for access by fire trucks in the event of major Forest Fire. in discussion of this site as a Regional Trailhead, the 1995 Forest Park Natural Resources Management Plan identified repair of Firelane 1 as a necessary part of creating a trailhead at this location. 26 years later, situated across an active landslide zone, the firelane is so degraded that in many sections it is no more than a single track trail. The minimum standard for firelanes in Forest Park is 12 feet wide.

Increased recreational pressure on Firelane 1 as a result of the 30 car parking lot will accelerate the degradation of this already compromised firelane. During the fire emergency in fall of 2021 there was a fire in Forest Park near Germantown road that required assistance from a second fire truck to be extinguished. Fortunately the fire was close to road access. The risk of catastrophic fire in Forest Park is real. I ask City Council to budget for repair of Firelane 1 as Amanda Fritz requested in 2018 before building the parking lot. Let's not exchange one environmental catastrophe for another.

Dear Mitch,

I hope you and your family are well. Catherine and I are grateful for your years of service in the legislature, particularly considering how contentious that has been recently. Hopefully in leaving you can enjoy a lower level of conflict.

I have contacted you in the past about the Forest Park Visitor Center and Nature Area and you understandably have felt that what happens next is out of your hands. I wanted to follow up with some new developments that raise concerns and I am hoping you might be willing to communicate to our new Parks Director, Adena Long, about them.

Recently Adena Long sent a letter to you describing the planned start of phase 1 in 2021, which would be to build a 30 car parking lot and bus turn around at the St Helen's property. The letter, which is duplicated on the Parks Website states there will be widening and regrading of Firelane 1 and signage for the pedestrian and cycling trails.

What the letter failed to elaborate are the following.

^{*} The environmental review for this property is limited to the parking lot. Although we have opposed the Visitor center at this site for a number of reasons, to embark on a project of this nature without acquiring the necessary waivers to build in a wetland by a stream for the whole project seems ill advised.

- * The plan to repair the firelane is limited to the portion on this small property, not the entire length of Firelane 1 which rises 600 feet and traverses a mile to reach the Forest.
- * There are currently no other trails from this site other than the firelane and the city engineers who reviewed the project determined that the original multiuser trail envisioned for this property could not be built due to environmental impact.

The concern I am writing to you about today is the importance of Firelane 1 for access to Forest park in the event of a fire. After the Eagle Creek fire we know that no forest is safe and firelanes play a critical role in responding. Firelane 1 is the only firelane in Forest Park that runs across the base of the Forest. All others run from top to bottom of the ridge and are considered less useful in the event of a forest fire. Firelane 1 is in terrible condition. In some spots it is only about 3 feet wide due to small landslides that have occurred. A parking lot adjacent to the base will lead to accelerated degradation because of increased foot and bike traffic. Although City Council acknowledged that Firelane 1 needs repair in 2018, there is no budget to make repairs. Elizabeth Kennedy Wong, who is managing this project confirmed that repair to the firelane is not part of this project and is not under her purview. To make matters worse there are homeless camps below Firelane 1, increasing the likelihood that a fire could be started. A fireman from station 1 told us that they respond to smoldering ground fires resulting from abandoned campfires in Forest park with some regularity and must carry fire fighting equipment on their backs.

Please look at the attached document with a map of Firelane 1, some photos taken in 2017 of the Firelane (which remains unchanged), and a picture of a nearby homeless camp. I don't know whether you feel it would be appropriate, but I was wondering if you might be willing to suggest to Adena Long that repairs to Firelane 1 should be a prerequisite to building a parking lot at that location? Given your prior support and the State funding you secured, I was hoping your letter would have influence in their decision making.



Dear Commissioners

I would like to add testimony to an issue that will be decided at Wednesday, May 12, 2021, City Council Hearing:

Item 343: Construction of Forest Park Entry Project: to authorize a competitive solicitation and contract with the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for construction of the Forest Park Entry Project.

This project, which, I believe, over 4 million dollars has been allocated to construct a 30-car parking lot at the confluence of St. Helens Highway (highway 30) and Yeon Avenue, is an unfortunate allocation of funds. This is known as "Phase One" of the Forest Park Entry Project. Phase Two, which has not been approved and likely will not due to many negative constraints, is the building of a Visitor Center. The construction of a parking lot which **does not connect with any passable pedestrian trail in Forest Park** seems a poor allocation of hard-won tax-payer dollars.

Rather, may I suggest an alternative that is noted in the *Forest Park Natural Resources Management Plan*, which is a city ordinance #168509, and land use law, regarding the management and governance of Forest Park.

4 million dollars could go a long way to providing one of the major goals for Forest Park: HIRING TWO FULL-TIME, PORTLAND PARKS AND RECREATION STAFF MEMBERS. The park is in great need of such staffing, as is <u>noted in the ordinance on Pages 93-94:</u>

"At a minimum, Forest Park needs two full-time staff members: 1: an Arboriculturist for park management, project direction and neighborhood coordination and 2: a Park Attendant with experience in natural resource management and volunteer coordination. (Additionally) A natural resource enhancement crew of 6 to 10 people is needed seasonally to handle natural resource improvement projects. ... Without additional staff, information and equipment, it will not be possible to protect the park as in the past. New demands will require more active management to accommodate increased use and to protect natural resources.

" If current levels of staffing, funding, maintenance and management are continued, both the recreation facilities and the natural resources of Forest Park will suffer."

I truly hope you may reconsider the use of your funds, exchanging the construction of a parking lot that will not make the park accessible to users but will likely be a magnet for illegal camping, (as is already a significant problem at this very site), and allocate these dollars to a higher and greater use to serve the people of Portland-- staffing two, full-time professionals, as mandated in the ordinance, specifically for the health and protection of our city's greatest natural resource: Forest Park.
