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

Dear Commissioner Schwab:

I am pleased to submit for your review the 1983-84 Annual Report for the Portland Fire Bureau. The Bureau continues to maintain and improve a high level of fire protection and E.M.S. services within our City.

Our ability to continue meeting our primary mission of limiting the catastrophic effects of fire loss and life-threatening emergencies will in large part be contingent upon the future stability of the City's overall financial capabilities.

Highlights of the services provided by the Bureau during the fiscal year included the following:

- Continued efforts to prevent the occurrence of fires by conducting 20,670 inspections resulting in the abatement of 17,455 violations.
- Responding to 26,005 alarms including 15,092 medical emergencies and the suppression of 2,460 fires resulting in a total loss of \$9,842,430.
- A week long strategic planning session to plot the future course of the Bureau into 1990. Thirty-five members holding the rank of Captain or above were involved in the planning process.
- The addition of five (5) Basic Life Support vehicles to reduce the use of fire apparatus for E.M.S. responses. No additional personnel were added.
- The replacement of an aerial ladder truck, in a residential area, with a five man squad wagon responding into a large geographical area to supplement manpower at the scene of emergencies.

- The replacement of a pumper and an aerial ladder truck with a six man quad, (an apparatus with pump, hose, booster and a compliment of ground ladders to 40' in length).
- The closure of Station #28 at N.E. 56th & Sandy Boulevard and co-location with RFPD #10, Station 40 at N.E. 60th & Going.

As indicated by the above, there has been a continuation of efforts to both improve and economize fire services. I am optimistic that this trend toward improved fire protection services will advance in the years ahead. I wish to thank you for your continued support of the Bureau in what has been a difficult time. I feel that we will continue to work together toward the achievement of the common goal of providing the citizens of Portland with excellent fire protection services.



# **OFFICE OF THE FIRE CHIEF AND MANAGEMENT SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION**

The Office of the Fire Chief is responsible to the Commissioner of Public Safety for assuring the fulfillment of Council policy and the achievement of the Bureau's mission through the direction, coordination, and evaluation of four operating divisions. It is also the responsibility of the Fire Chief's Office to: ensure compliance with State and local fire regulations; provide liaison with the Council and the Managers of other City services; continually evaluate and refine bureau operations; respond to citizen information inquiries and complaints; coordinate internal bureau operating committees; develop and maintain mutual aid agreements with bordering fire service jurisdictions as well as fire service protection contracts; develop and maintain the general orders governing bureau operations; and provide liaison with State and federal fire service organizations. In addition to the Fire Chief, the Office consists of a Secretarial Assistant and Staff Captain.

The Management Support Services Division is one of four major divisions reporting directly to the Fire Chief. The Division, which is directed by the Management Support Services Officer, is responsible for recommending the management policies and practices essential for the efficient operation of the overall bureau. This is accomplished through the provision of financial, budget, information, planning, research, and general administration services in support of Bureau operations. In addition to the Management Support Services Officer, the Division is staffed by a Staff Captain, Public Safety Analyst II, Management Analyst, Administrative Assistant I, Associate Accountant, Research Technician, Secretarial Clerk I, and two Secretarial Clerk II's as well as part-time personnel.

Major activities of the Management Support Services Division during the past fiscal year included the following:

- Coordinating the preparation and administration of the annual budget for the Bureau which was approved at over \$25 million and included 667 positions.
- Participation in the City's Urban Services Task Force which is responsible for the coordination of proposed annexations.
- Completion of an intergovernmental agreement between Multnomah County RFPD No. 10 and the City of Portland for the provision of fire protection services within the former's jurisdiction.
- Development of the annual five year Capital Improvement Program for the Bureau, directed toward the elimination of existing and projected service deficiencies identified within the Station Location Study, as well as improvements of existing Bureau facilities and equipment.

- Facilitating development of a long-range strategic plan with the participation of Bureau officers.
- Assistance to the Chief in administratively reorganizing the Bureau.
- Participation in the City's master lease program to permit upgrading of Bureau facilities and equipment.
- Assisting in the acquisition of a quad, a squad, and five rescue vans.
- Development of a new map system for use by suppression companies.
- Provision of staff support in the continued development of a building information system for the Prevention Division.
- The acquisition of automated office equipment for the purpose of increasing output and filing capabilities.
- Installation of computer equipment and the implementation of the All-in-One professional software program.
- Work toward development of an automated personnel control system and building maintenance work order system.





ORGANIZATIONAL CHART (FUNCTIONAL AREAS)




FIRE BUREAU BUDGET



# **EMERGENCY OPERATIONS**

The primary function of the Emergency Operations Division is to save life and property from fire and other emergencies. Every reasonable and practical effort is made to control fire losses through fire prevention measures. However, complete control through code enforcement is an ideal not likely to be achieved. Accidental and arson fires continue to be a fact of life. The high incidence of false alarms also places a heavy burden upon the Division. Such trends have emphasized the need for a well organized and highly trained force of fire fighters, ready to respond twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

Budgetary problems have reduced the Division to 544 officers and fire fighters. One hundred eighty suppression personnel per shift are assigned to 26 stations with a total of 25 engine companies, 10 truck companies, 1 squad company, two fireboat companies and 3 rescue units which are cross manned by both the truck and engine company personnel where they are quartered.

The Division is organized into three work shifts, each shift on duty 24 hours and off 48 hours, averaging annually a 56 hour work week. The Division has an Executive Officer, 3 Deputy Chiefs, 12 Battalion Chiefs, 29 Captains, 90 Lieutenants, (includes 2 Travelling Lieutenants), 6 Pilots, 3 Engineers, 18 Fire Fighter EMT's and 382 Fire Fighters, of which 18 are Temporary Travellers.

The City is divided into 5 battalions with each shift being supervised by a Deputy Chief. The Deputy Chief commands the core battalion. A Battalion Chief commands the shift in the other four battalions. Station house administration is directed by Fire Captains and/or Fire Lieutenants on each shift.

During this fiscal year, the Portland Fire Bureau was called into action an average of 71.25 times per day in response to emergencies. Some of the many reasons requiring Fire Bureau response were 1,177 structural fires including 21 greater alarms, 2,833 false alarms, 15,092 first aid runs which included everything from drug overdose to major heart attacks. Response was made to 10,913 other incidents, both emergency and/or public service. A detailed description of all responses is provided in this annual report.

The three rescue units in the Emergency Operation Division are an integral part of the Division. Each rescue unit is manned by at least two EMT III or EMT IV qualified technician/fire fighters per shift. The rescue units are fully equipped to handle basic as well as advanced life support to include resuscitation and stabilization of heart attack victims. During this fiscal year they responded to 5,228 medical emergencies.

In addition to emergency services, members of the Emergency Operation Division spend a great many hours in non-emergency duty, performing such tasks as fire prevention, inspection of homes and businesses, pre-fire inspections and planning; hydrant inspections; street and area familiarization; developing response routes; learning the operation and limitations of fire protection systems; fire fighting apparatus and equipment; first aid and rescue training; drills in individual and company skills; maintaining the fire stations; public speaking; and civic projects such as the Toy and Joy Program. All members of fire companies are qualified in crash injury management. The Emergency Operation Division is actively engaged in Emergency Medical Technician training. Fifty-six firefighters were certified EMT-I in June.

The Fire Alarm Dispatch Center receives and evaluates fire and distress calls and immediately dispatches appropriate equipment and personnel to cope with the many and varied emergencies. A Staff Captain supervises a staff of 12 Fire Dispatchers who are responsible for around-the-clock communications and dispatch.



Fiscal Year 1983-84




Building Fires

# FIRE PREVENTION DIVISION

The Division's first goal is to prevent fire through public education and prevention efforts. Our second goal is to ensure adequate egress from commercial occupancies and endeavor to provide built-in fire protection features. In order to accomplish these goals we have adopted the 1982 Uniform Fire Code and are constantly updating our local fire code. We also enforce the State Fire Laws and are deemed to be assistants to the State Fire Marshal.

The Division is tailored to attack the City's fire problem in seven (7) functional areas: public education, routine prevention inspections, investigation, plans review, special hazard inspections, research and development and the battalion district inspection program. All these are supported by the office staff and are tracked by monthly activity reports.

The Fire Prevention Division, led by the Fire Marshal, consists of forty (40) uniformed personnel and four (4) civilian office personnel. Two (2) police detectives are also assigned to the division to assist the Arson section.




NUMBER OF ARRESTS AND CONVICTIONS




COMPARATIVE LOSSES LAST TEN YEARS




FIRE DEATHS

- 3) DEBRA GOLDBERG, 35 years, November 29, 1983. Died due to 85% burns over the body. Cause: Victim poured kerosene over herself to commit suicide inside of an automobile.
- 4) PAULA P. LADSON, 35 years, December 2, 1983. Died due to smoke inhalation. Cause: Smoker's carelessness inside a duplex.
- 5) ROBERT L. LENZ, 14 years, January 19, 1984. Died due to smoke inhalation. Cause: Smoker's carelessness in a single family dwelling.
- 6) FRANCES MOORE, 80 years, February 21, 1984. Died due to burns to the upper torso. Cause: Smoker's carelessness in a convalescent home.
- 7) RACHAEL HOLT, 1 1/2 years, April 4, 1984. Died due to smoke inhalation. Cause: Probable juvenile with fire in a single family dwelling.
- 8) NETA I. KIRKPATRICK, 67 years, June 6, 1984. Died due to burns to head and legs and smoke inhalation. Cause: Smoker's carelessness in a single family dwelling.



### FIRE FATALITIES


Fiscal Years 1974-1984



# PERSONNEL RESOURCES

The Personnel Resources Section is charged with providing training to Bureau members in the areas of fire suppression, fire prevention, hazmat incident management and emergency medical service. Developing and maintaining competency in these complex and diverse areas requires that Bureau members must spend a considerable amount of time in training.

Training commences when recruits enter the Bureau and continues unabated throughout their careers. During the probationary period, training is intense and encompasses all the basic skills necessary to provide emergency assistance to the public. Upon completion of probation, training is continued on a daily basis in the form of company and multi-company drills supplemented by video cablecasts and special training programs. As firefighters progress through their careers, they receive training to prepare them for new responsibilities and assignments. In addition to basic fire suppression skills, firefighters receive training in such areas as fire prevention, fire protection and alarm systems, emergency driving and pump operation, hydraulics, fire science, rescue and extrication, emergency medical care, management techniques, fire investigation, hazardous materials management, water safety and dive rescue.

The goal of the Personnel Resources Section is to assure that Fire Bureau members receive high quality training in these diverse areas, so that they may serve the public in a safe and efficient manner. The Personnel Resources Section is composed of a chief training officer, one training captain, one training lieutenant, one apparatus instructor, one video production manager, and two video production assistants.

#### COMPANY TRAINING

The Training Section schedules required drills for all companies. Evaluations of company proficiency in all subjects is an on-going project. By this process, weak areas are identified and training efforts concentrated where they are most effective.

The Training Section also identifies, evaluates and disseminates new emergency management techniques for the Bureau.

#### CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Training Section encourages the continuing education of Bureau personnel by tuition reimbursement through local community colleges, universities and professional seminars. It is the policy of the Training Section that educational opportunities are given wide distribution.

In addition, many Portland fire officers are trained each year at the National Fire Academy located in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

#### FIRST RESPONDER/EMT TRAINING

In fiscal year 83-84, first responder certification was maintained for over 600 uniform personnel. This training also includes yearly recertification in C.P.R. and shock treatment.

Due to an increased demand for first responder service by the Fire Bureau, a training program was initiated which will result in the certification of all uniform personnel as Emergency Medical Technicians. In the first phase of this program, over 100 firefighters will be trained. Completion of this program is projected for fiscal 86-87, at which time approximately 800 personnel will be certified as EMT I's by the State of Oregon.

#### PARAMEDIC TRAINING

The paramedic training program continued with in-service classes for EMT III's and IV's at Providence Medical Center. In addition to the in-service classes, the Center also provided initial training for potential EMT III's and IV's.

#### FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS SUPPRESSION TRAINING

Flammable liquids/LPG fire training was conducted for Portland fire companies and outside agencies at the Linnton Oil Fire Training facility.

#### PHYSICAL FITNESS

The physical fitness program was continued in order to identify heart attack risk factors, assess the overall physical condition of the Bureau relating to fire fighting tasks, and maintain a solid foundation for the physical agility portion of the fire fighter entrance exam.

The physical fitness program includes an annual hearing test and a physical fitness test composed of a cardiovascular examination (blood pressure and EKG under stress) as well as a job related physical agility demonstration.

#### MEMORIAL SERVICES

The Training Section plans, organizes, and conducts memorial services which represent the Fire Bureau at the funerals of deceased members. The Campbell Memorial Service for members who have given their lives in the line of duty is also coordinated through the training section.

#### LIBRARY

A library of films, slides, texts and other printed materials is maintained by the Training Section for the convenience of instructors and members preparing for promotional exams. Projectors and other visual aids are also maintained to be used by company officers in preparing for station drills.

#### PROBATIONARY TRAINING

A new 40-hour week recruit academy training format was developed for entry level training. Beginning in July '84, probationary training in basic fire suppression and other skills will be completed in a 12 week cycle prior to assignment of personnel to suppression duties.

#### TELECOMMUNICATIONS TRAINING

Telecommunications training is designed to supplement administrative and skills training at the company level. Programs are developed for those areas which particularly lend themselves to a visual format. The use of the cable video system for training assures that information is distributed uniformly and in a timely manner.

All programs are cablecast three times a day for each shift. This provides for a minimum of conflict with emergency calls and other programs of the Bureau. Programming at other times is available upon request. Two live programs of topical interest are cablecast each month ("Chief's Corner" and "Firefighter Digest"), along with live special interest programs, such as major fire critiques.

#### INCIDENT COMMAND TRAINING

During the period of this report, the Training Section was responsible for developing and implementing an incident command system. The system was designed to meet the needs of emergency scene commanders in dealing with complex operations. Maintenance of this program requires on-going training of company and command officers.

#### HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENTS TRAINING

Training of personnel in hazardous materials management was obtained by bringing in the U.S. Coast Guard Pacific Strike Team for live incident simulations. Additional HAZMAT training of personnel was conducted through Marylhurst College, N.W. Natural Gas Co., Portland Community College, and the Oregon Department of Energy.

A Hazardous Materials Certification Program was developed in cooperation with Portland Community College. In fiscal 84-85 approximately 20 personnel are scheduled to be trained under this program. Upon completion, they will have received 31 credit hours of instruction and be certified as HAZMAT Incident Managers.

#### APPARATUS DRIVER/PUMP OPERATOR TRAINING

The apparatus driver and pump operator training program was continued. The goal of this program is to keep Fire Bureau drivers certified in defensive driving techniques and updated on aerial, pump and tiller operation.

#### SCBA/SMOKE CHAMBER TRAINING

SCBA and Smoke Chamber training was conducted for both Fire Bureau personnel and outside agencies. The purpose of this training is to assure that personnel are familiar with safe operation of breathing apparatus and techniques for operating in areas of diminished visibility.

#### AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

The Personnel Resources Section actively supports the recruitment of qualified minorities and women for fire service careers. The Division continues to work actively through high schools, community colleges, city affirmative action and civil service to achieve this goal.

# LOGISTICS

The Logistics Section is comprised of Logistics Headquarters, Apparatus Maintenance Section, Building Maintenance Section, Bureau Stores Section and fire Alarm Maintenance Section with an annual budget of approximately \$2,430,018. This Section is responsible for the continued reliable operation of the physical equipment of the Fire Bureau 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The Section operates with three uniformed officers and twenty-two civilian personnel based at the Fire Bureau Maintenance Warehouse located at 1135 S.E. Powell Boulevard.

LOGISTICS HEADQUARTERS is staffed by a Battalion Chief, one Staff Lieutenant, and a Secretarial Clerk. It is responsible for the direction of all sections in this Division, prepares budget, and operates with an annual budget of approximately \$232,157.

APPARATUS MAINTENANCE SECTION is staffed by a Superintendent of Apparatus, one Air Mask Repair Mechanic, four Automotive Mechanics, two Automotive Servicers and one Clerical Specialist I. This section is responsible for the writing of specifications, the purchasing of all apparatus, routine maintenance and preventative maintenance of all fire apparatus and fire support vehicles of which we have 140 at a purchase cost of approximately \$3,731,060 and operates with an annual budget of \$932,912.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE SECTION is staffed with one Staff Captain Supervisor, three Carpenters, one Plumber, three Painters, one Electrician and one Building Maintenance Mechanic and is charged with the routine maintenance and preventative maintenance of all Fire Bureau properties of which we have thirty-six, valued at approximately \$12,729,246 and operates with an annual budget of \$483,394.

BUREAU STORES is staffed by a Storekeeper responsible for the purchasing and dispensing of all Bureau uniforms and most first aid and medical supplies for the companies and rescue units. Bureau Stores operates with an annual budget of \$118,450.

FIRE ALARM MAINENANCE SECTION is staffed by one Lineman II-Foreman and one Lineman I. This section is charged with the routine and preventative maintenance of alarm boxes for the Fire Bureau and operates on an annual budget of \$174,917.

### APPARATUS MAINTENANCE SECTION

The Apparatus Maintenance Section is comprised of one Fire Apparatus Superintendent, four Automotive Mechanics, one Air Mask Mechanic, two Automotive Servicers and one Clerk. This section provides twenty-four hour on-site or in-shop repair, maintenance and service to fifty-eight units of fire apparatus, three fire boats and seventy-nine fire support vehicles.

In addition to emergency and routine repairs, preventative maintenance, modifications, and annual apparatus testing, this section procures, maintains, tests, evaluates, and distributes fire fighting, medical, and rescue equipment, tools, agents, and supplies and fire apparatus used by the fire fighting division. Upgrading of equipment and apparatus is ongoing.

During this fiscal year, an antique steam pumper was completely renovated with volunteer labor provided by members of this Bureau.

A new forty foot aluminum fire boat, the George Williams, was put into service to replace patrol boats that had limited firefighting capability.

Also, a new rescue was put into service that had been ordered during the previous fiscal year, a pumper was modified to a quad configuration and put into service as Engine 5, two pumpers were repainted and two almost new cars were purchased in place of new cars as a means of reducing expenses.

An aerial section had to be replaced on a 1959 Seagrave aerial, due to a crack located during maintenance. This unit, along with other aerials, tested satisfactorily and is currently in service.

Specifications were submitted for one new 100 foot rear mounted aerial and five new first responder rescue vans.

**MAJOR PROJECTS:**

One major project was Engine 28, which was opened as a temporary station located at 4334 N.E. 148th Avenue to serve the newly annexed South Shore and Argay Terrace area. A permanent station will be built in the near future at a location on N.E. 158th Avenue. The temporary station consists of a mobile home for living quarters and a 40' x 60' metal building to house the engine. Preparation included grading and paving the lot for the mobile home and renovating the metal building to accommodate the engine. The creation of new Battalions resulted in some major remodeling at Engine 22 and some remodeling at Engine 5 to accommodate new Battalion Headquarters.

The on-going goal of energy conservation was continued this fiscal year. Some related projects were

- Double-glazed windows were installed at Engines 2 and 4.
- The kitchen was redone at Engine 26.
- The kitchen was upgraded at Engine 24.
- A radiant ceiling heater and controls was installed at Engine 19.
- A broken water service line was repaired at Engine 4.
- Two tile showers at Engine 4 were repaired and three showers at Engine 12 were repaired by putting in new bottoms.
- A new Class A roof over the apparatus floor at Engine 7 was put on and the south side of Engine 6 was reroofed. Roofs at Engines 3, 5, 13 and 20 were resealed.
- The concrete apparatus driveway ramp was removed and replaced at Engine 19. Repaired damage to the brick wall at Engine 19 which was damaged when a car ran into it.
- Seal coat was applied (22,413 sq. ft.) to the parking lot at the Maintenance Building. In addition, seal coat was applied to the parking lots of Engines 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 19, 23, 24, 25 and 26.
- A Murphy-Rogers Dust Collector was purchased and installed in the carpenter shop of the Maintenance Building.
- Nine wooden apparatus doors were replaced with insulated steel apparatus doors at Engine 21. In addition, the apparatus doors at Engines 4 and 13 were replaced with insulated steel doors.

- Approximately 1,600 sq. ft. of torginal and 550 sq. ft. of epoxy flooring was installed on the apparatus floor of Engine 21.
- Mini Venetion blinds were installed in several rooms at Engine 21.
- A door opener was purchased and installed for Engine 21. Door closers were purchased and installed for office doors at Logistics.
- Fifteen barrels of styrofoam was installed under the float of Boat 2 to raise it at least 11 inches out of water. A metal shed was also built on the float for Boat 2.
- Arborvitae shrubs were provided for Engine 6.
- Three 12 ft. door sections were replaced at Engine 12.
- Eighty-five PEMKO automatic door bottoms in various sizes and quantities for door weatherization were purchased.
- The pump shed was torn down and the pump pit area was paved over and a 12,000 gallon concrete underground water tank was installed at the old pump pit area site.
- Curbing was installed around Maintenance Building parking lot and ramp and plants and landscaping was completed along the west and south ramps.
- Landscaping was completed on the south berm of Engine 12.
- The interiors of Engines 3, 4, and 21 were completely painted and the exteriors of Engines 3, 8, 17, 19 and 26 were painted.

This year an asbestos survey of all Fire Bureau facilities was conducted by Lt. Hyland. The survey consisted of inspection, sample analysis and exposure assessment of each facility. The results of the survey were very positive and no hazards were noted. A systematic program of encapsulation has been organized and will be completed in FY 85-86. Budget restraints have magnified our awareness that fiscal responsibility and the necessity to increase productivity, yet maintain quality control, is of prime importance.
