Communists may talk but they cannot advertise in the city, the council decided yesterday when it turned down an application for an advertising car for the Multnomah committee of the communist party to gather a crowd at Viking park September 4, when William Z. Foster, national chairman, and Earl Browder, executive secretary, will speak.

Commissioner Ormond R. Bean was perfectly willing for the communists to talk, but he felt they could do their advertising in other ways than by a car through the city streets. Clayton Van Lydegraf, chairman of the picnic committee at Viking park, asked for the permit and put up the \$10 fee, which will be rebated. O. and everything connected with it, has raised the cry of communism against the Workers' Alliance because it has an agreement with the C. I. O.
