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MAYOR'S MESSAGE.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, PORTLAND, Or., January 1, 1886.

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Portland: GENTLEVEN-In accordance with the requirements of the City Charter, I herewith present you a statement of the affairs of the city, together with recommendations for your consideration. POLICE DEPARTMENT.

By the recent amendment to the city charter the care of the pellee department is in the hands of three commissioners, and the mayor and council are relieved from further trouble, except the farnishing of means for maintaining the same. Their estimated expenses for the current year are \$49,536.00.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

There has been no change in the board of commissioners. The council has been notified of the estimated expense of the department for the current year, viz. \$68,751.70.

RIVER IMPROVEMENTS.

In view of the present state of the finances of the city, I do not think it would be advisable to spend any money on repairs of the city dredger, nor in dredging in the Willamette until such time as there is some assurance that the channels in the Columbia River are to be kept open, and in a condition so that vessels may be able to come to the Willamette drawing over twenty feet of water. During the past year the Willamette has been lower than usual, and while it was at its lowest stage, there were vessels left Portland drawing twenty feet. But had it not been for contributions of money by a few of the citizens of this place, which was used in deepening channels in the Columbia, vessels could not have passed down the Columbia River drawing anywhere near as much water, as they could get out of the Willamette with. It is a notable fact that vessels have departed from Portand during the past year, deeper laden than ever before in corresponding months of former years.

HEALTH.

The past year has been remarkably healthy, and free from epidemics of any kind. In order to insure a continuance of good health, there should be constructed a large brick sewer down North Eleventh Street or some parallel street near, to carry off the water of Tanner Creek, and the sewage of that part of the city. There is also some work that should be done on sewers in the southern part of the city.

STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Considering the dull times, there has been a large amount of street improvement done during the past year, and there is scarcely anything of that nature done but what the city, directly or indirectly, is obliged to pay out large sums of money. I think the council should be careful in future about passing ordinances to improve streets where the city will be liable to pay out more or less money.

STREET CLEANING.

The street cleaning department seems to be efficient and a public necessity, and I don't see how that force can be reduced and do justice to all concerned. If there is any way to reduce expenses in this department without impairing its usefulness it should be done.

By the amendments to the charter there are several branches of the city government with power to incur indebtedness more or less according to their judgment independent of the council. But the council must furnish the money to pay their claims against the city. The council should endeavor by every honorable means to reduce expenses, where they have the power to do so.

CITY SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

CITY SURVEYOR'S OFFICE, PORTLAND, Or., January 2d, 1886.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of Portland :

GENTLEMEN :--- I have the honor to submit for your consideration the following annual report of the City Surveyor for the year ending December 31st, 1885, embracing tabular statements and exhibits of the amount of work done in the improvement and extending of the public highways and parks of the city during the past twelve months.

The amount of street work and the consequent necessity for a large force of assistants and employes in the office, has been much less than it was during the year 1884, and on that account and hy the direction of your honorable body, I dispensed with the services of Mr. C. E. Oliver, assistant surveyor, and Mr. Chas. Marston, rodman, at the close of the month of July, 1885. These employes had been competent, diligent and faithful, and the discontinuance of their services was an unpleasant duty.

The number of employes in this office now is less than the number employed and considered necessary fifteen or sixteen years ago, although it now requires a walk of more than eight miles to reach and return from the localities where the streets are being improved.

The amount of street work now contracted for, or for which ordinances are passed or are pending, is much more considerable than the amount on hand six months ago; and another noticeable feature is, that property owners on the confines of the city are more inclined to make street improvements on their own account than at any previous time within two years, which indicates a large amount of street work for the ensuing season.

STREET EXTENSIONS.

Within the year just closed, fourteen surveys and reports have been made by order of your honorable body, for the purpose of widening or extending streets in different portions of the city, the location and extent of such surveys being more particularly set forth in the following

During the past year estimates have been made by order of your honorable body, for the improvement of twenty different streets, and the work on most of such improvements has been completed according to contract and accepted by the city.

All improvements for which estimates were made and contracts awarded during the year 1884, have been completed and accepted during the season embraced within this report.

Two hundred and thirty three permits for the improvement of streets by private enterprise, were issued during the past year, by the Superintendent of Streets, and filed in this office, under which authority an unusually large amount of street work has

Under their appropriate headings in the annexed tabular statement will be found two streets, the estimates for the improvements of which were made and the contracts awarded during the past season, the work of which is unfinished.

Accompanying and forming part of this report are specific tables, more particularly setting forth the streets upon which estimates have been made and the amount of the different kinds of work to be done in improving the same; also the amount of street work done under the ordinances, permits and otherwise during the past year.

Estimates were made during the year for three street sewers, the amounts and cost of which will be found under the appropriate heading in the statement hereto attached.

With one exception all sewers ordered laid during the past season, have been completed and accepted by the city.

To the Honorable the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Portland. GENTLEMEN :- Herewith I submit respectfully the following annual report of the superintendent of streets, ending December 31st, 1885.

STREET CLEANING.

The work of cleaning the improved streets under the supervision of Mr. Fred. Mathews has been faithfully attended to, particularly in the business portion of the city, and taking into consideration the limited means at his command, the work accomplished is all that can be reasonably expected under the circumstances.

SEWERS.

During the year just passed the Jefferson street sewer, terra cotta pipe, 9 inches, from Fifth to Twelvth street, which will be completed in a few days, and the Clay street sewer, 12 inch pipe, have been laid aggregating 3870 lineal feet. There are at present 15½ miles of sewers in use ranging from 9 to 18 inches terra cotta pipes. These mains extend to the Willamette River, into which they discharge their contents in front of the city, to which disagreeable fact I have called your attention in my last annual report and yet demands your serious consideration to adopt a system by which the sewerage is carried beyond the populated portion, so detrimental to the healthy condition of our city.

STREET LAMPS AND ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

Five hundred and eleven oil lamps are in operation on the different streets, classified into :

177 B burners, or 1 inch,

334 D burners, or 14 inch,

of which thirty new posts and lamps have been erected during the year.

Forty-four gas lights are abandoned, being superseded by by electric lights, and 165 gas lights have been changed into oil lamps by your order, and 26 electric lights has been placed over the center of street intersections of each alternate block.

12 on First street, beginning on Market and First streets and terminating on Front, G and First streets.

11 on Third street, beginning on Clay street and terminating on F and Third streets.

1 on Second and Morrison streets.

1 on Fourth and Main streets.

1 on Second and Washington streets.

PERMITS

have been granted by this department during the year for the following proposes:

To dig up streets for sewer connections 102. To dig up streets for water connections 154. To dig up streets for Gas connections 26. To occupy streets for building purposes 122. For improving streets 233. For removal of buildings, 7.

· EXPENDITURES.

The sum of \$1169.92 has been expended in making repairs to streets and bridges. The most of this amount was consumed in the purchase of the different kinds of material required, the labor employed was performed by city prisoners. In compliance with an ordinance, number 4579, passed by your honorable body, \$447.95 has been expended in improving and beautifying the city plaza-blocks, by removing the fences, Macadamizing the walks and placing rustic seats at different points, which has proven to be fully appriciated by the general public and is a source of comfort to many of our citizens.

In the City Park a new roadway 2444 feet and a foot path 1000 feet in length, has been constructed at an outlay of \$1118.84, also a number of ornamental improvements have been made, which materially adds to the attraction of the park, but more is needed, and a reasonable outlay of money during the year judiciously expended will greatly enchance its popularity with our citizens and their families, as a summer resort and place of recreation; pure drinking-water being very essential, I would respectfully recommend, that water be brought in from a spring about one half mile West of the park, and also to erect fountains at suitable points. The construction of a propagating house for flowers and plants, would unquestionably prove to be of vast advantage in furnishing at very small cost at all times such plants and shrubberies so much needed at certain periods of the season for transplanting and ornamentation. In connection I take pleasure to call your attention to the efficient manner of all the duties performed by the present park keeper, Mr. Chas. Myers, and do not hesitate to predict that by a liberal policy on your part he will soon accomplish such improvements that will be a credit to the city of Portland.

By an ordinance passed, number 4695, Mayor Gates, T. L. Eliot, Henry Failing C. E. Sitton and Wm. Wadhams have been appointed a committee to locate and cause to be constructed a suitable Fountain to the memory of the late Stephen G. Skidmore, who willed \$5000 for that purpose. In accordance with the statutes, 30 days' notice has been published for vacating a sufficient amount of city property upon which to erect the fountain, expiring on January 6th, 1886. The committee has decided to place the fountain on the East side of First and Vine streets, considering it the most suitable location both as to public interest and also in honor and to the memory of a very estemable citizen and the liberal donor, who made that part of the city his place of residence for a number of years.

STREET RAILWAYS,

No addition of new street railway tracks have been made in the city during the year, leaving in active operation 5.7 miles of single track, and 2 miles of double track, as stated in my last annual report.

In closing this report, I desire to acknowledge my obligations to his Honor the Mayor for his official kindness. To the Common Council also I beg to tender thanks for the consideration and courtesies extended this department.
