MAYOR'S MESSAGE

MAYOR'S OFFICE. PORTLAND, OREGON, January 6th, 1892.

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Portland:-

GENTLEMEN: —A year has passed since the last annual message and reports of the city officers were submitted to your honorable body—a year fraught with many changes in the municipal life of Portland. A new charter has been provided, under which we are working. Consolidation has been consummated of the three cities—Portland, East Portland and Albina—under the one name and title of Portland. From three municipalities we now have one government and a city of 80,000 inhabitants, with all of its interests and responsibilities resting upon your honorable body. The trust you have in your hands is one of a grave character, and we trust that He, who guideth and determineth the fate and progress of nations, may endow you with wisdom, that you may so legislate that through your enactments all of the great interests that make a city great may give to Portland a name and reputation of which every citizen may be proud.

The last year has been one of unexampled progress and growth. Many buildings of permanency and solidity have been built, of which any city might feel proud, and many more are projected and are now in process of erection. The City Hall, which will be the future home of the Council and city officers, will, during the coming season, doubtless be pushed with vigor.

The Chamber of Commerce is now beginning to make progress, and will be a splendid monument to the push and enterprise of the commercial men of our city.

Mayor's Message.

The Public Library building, the Arlington Club building, and others, are striking illustrations that our public-spirited citizens are determined to make of Portland a city of which its citizens may justly feel proud. And last, and by no means the least of the strides of progress, we have a "free bridge," the accomplishment of which is due to this Council, through their committee, to whom be all honor for their indefatigable labors in bringing about the desirable result, after weeks of labor.

And we trust the Bridge Committee, composed of a number of our stirring and enterprising public men, may soon fulfill their mission, that the pledges they made to our sister cities on the East side, when consolidation was before the people, may be fully redeemed.

Herewith are submitted the reports of the Auditor, Treasurer, Superintendent of Streets, Surveyor, Police Department and Fire Department, to which your attention is called. The increase in the expenses of the different departments is owing wholly to the great increase of work entailed by the consolidation of the cities and the complications arising from the hnrried legislation of our sister cities during the last few weeks of their existence as separate city governments. Our city officers and the committees have been faithfully working to bring order out of disorder, and to reconcile the complaints of the dissatisfied.

· STREETS.

Much complaint is made about the condition of our streets. The public do not seem to understand, and visitors to our city do not know, that this body has not the power to improve streets at will, in manner and of material that you in your own judgment should deem best. They do not realize that you can only improve a street on petition of property owners along said street desired to be improved, and at least one-half of the property owners must sign said petition, and that the petition shall indicate the material which shall be used in said improvement. Want of this knowledge by the public, and those visiting our city, brings upon this body much censure for want of enterprise, when you are really powerless in the matter. The censure should lie with the property owners who alone are to blame in the matter.

SUGGESTIONS IN REGARD TO STREETS.

I desire to make some suggestions in regard to street improvements which in my opinion would save our city very much expense in the keeping of our streets in repair and save us from much of the criticism that we now have to submit to. My suggestion would be that when a street is ordered improved and paved that all connections should be made of sewer, gas and water pipes, extending to the curb, and the expense of such connections be assessed to the owners of the property with the cost of the street improvement. When the street has been finished and accepted by the Superintendent of Streets and the Street Committee let it become the property of the city, to be by them kept in repair. Very few men can keep such a street in repair. If of Belgian Blocks, when a depression of a few basaltic blocks occur, a wheel-barrow of sand and an hour's work will place it in as good condition as when at first laid down. On a street improved with macadam, a cart load of sifted rock put in the depressions as they are worn in street will keep it in repair, whereas our present system permits a street to become almost impassable before any improvement is made, and then at a considerable expense. I am aware that we would require an act of the Legislature to authorize this change in the management of our street improvement, but I consider the matter worthy of thought, and you may conclude it judicious to petition for the same at the next sitting of our Legislature.

SEWERS.

As the portion of our city on the East side of the river is yet almost without sewerage, I would suggest to your Honorable Body, that a plan be adopted after careful survey of the territory

to be benefitted, and as rapidly as possible that the main sewers be built, and as a sanitary measure that the lateral sewers be connected as soon as possible, and that our police and health officers enforce the connecting of all private houses with the sewers. Our city is considered a healthy one and by due observance of the sanitary laws and regulations it can be preserved so.

GARBAGE QUESTION.

In this connection I would call your attention to the garbage question. The party who has the contract for cremating the garbage reports that his facilities are entirely inadequate to make disposition of the quantity that is delivered to him, and he is not disposed to build new furnaces without a contract with the city allowing him additional compensation, justifying him for erecting increased facilities. As our city increases in population there is a consequent increase of garbage which, as a sanitary measure must be disposed of. I would suggest that the Committee on Health and Police act at once in the matter and make their recommendations to your Honorable Body.

STREET CLEANING AND SPRINKLING.

The Street Cleaning and Sprinkling Department seems to have been managed with care, and has kept the streets in as good order as the facilities at the command of the department would admit. The greatly increased area of our city will unquestionably for the future demand an increase in this department to render it fully competent to give satisfaction to the different portions of our growing city. And the sooner we can have our streets paved with material that will have solidity and permanency, and be able to dispense with the macadam covering of the streets that we now use, so much the more effective will be this department.

PUBLIC WORKS.

A rather peculiar condition of affairs exist in the projected public works of our city. We have a Water Commission for the purpose of laying pipes, building acqueducts, etc., for furnishing a supply of good, wholesome water, with authority to issue the bonds of the city to the amount of \$2,500,000. A City Hall Commission, to provide a home, with suitable accommodations, for all of our municipal officers, with authority to issue bonds in the sum of \$500,000, in addition to the \$175,000 already issued for this purpose. A Bridge Commission, whose functions are to acquire bridges, affording *free transit* between the two sections of our city divided by the Willamette river. They have authority to issue bonds in the sum of \$500,000. We have a Port of Portland Commission, whose duties are the deepening of the channel of the Willamette and Columbia rivers, giving a depth of water sufficient for the largest ships to have free ingress and egress to and from our harbor, carrying our products to the markets of the old world and bringing the manufactures and products of Europe and Asia to our port.

The responsible duties resting with the honorable gentlemen composing these different commissions, you are relieved of, and we have reason to express confidence that the onerous duties devolving on these gentlemen will be discharged to the satisfaction of the public whom they serve.

We have, in addition to the commissions given above, a Board of Fire Commissioners, a Board of Police Commissioners, who have in charge the Fire Department and the Police Department of our city.

Your honorable body, elected by the people of the City of Portland to take charge of their interests, have nothing to say in regard to the conducting of either department, but the *privilege* is extended to you to pay all salaries in each department that you have no voice in fixing—to pay all bills contracted, in which you are not consulted. And while the police force is supposed to be employed by the city to enforce the laws, state and municipal, we have gambling houses running, but few arrests, and still fewer convictions; violations of the saloon ordinance, arrests rare and convictions almost an unknown quantity; brothels in

certain portions of our town, the unfortunate denizens soliciting the notice of passersby, without arrest or rebuke. There seems to be a strange apathy or blindness or indisposition with those who should see these violations of the law, and it is marvelous, when an election occurs, the phenomenal activity developed by the members of the Fire and Police Departments in carrying out the commands and desires of their leaders.

TAXES.

The charter under which we are working limits our general expenses to be confined within the amount of money that a three mill tax will raise. While we recognize one fact, the amount is insufficient to properly administer the different departments of the city government, the fact remains, and your honorable body will have to cut down expenses in the different departments until we can make our expenditures come within our income. There may be much dissatisfaction among the people at being denied some improvements your honorable body would gladly make, yet an explanation, I am satisfied, will be received by them in the spirit in which it is given.

SPECIAL WATER AND LIGHT COMMITTEE.

Much praise is due your special committee who have had in charge the water and light plant on the east side of the river. They took charge of the business when in process of construction, and have faithfully and well discharged their duties, devoting much valuable time to the interests of the citizens of that portion of our city, which is doubtless fully appreciated by those benefited, as well as by your honorable body.

CITY PARKS.

A provision in Section 189 of our Charter provides that the city may issue bonds of \$250,000 for the purchase and improvement of city parks. I would suggest that your honorable body take steps at an early date to secure land for this purpose. The steady growth of our city for the last year has enhanced the value greatly of all real estate, and from the present indications the longer this matter is deferred the more difficult will it be to purchase in a desirable locality.

I feel, gentlemen, that I cannot close my message to you without complimenting our city officers—the Auditor, Treasurer, Superintendent of Streets and Surveyor, for the able manner in which they have discharged the duties of their respective offices, and the uniform courtesy in which they have listened to the complaints of those feeling themselves aggrieved, and the patience they have exercised in trying to satisfy those seeking information in their several departments.

And the City Assessor, after months of arduous labor, much ot the time working day and night, has at last brought his labors to a close with gratifying results. He has had the almost herculean task of trying to satisfy everyone as to the justice of their assessment.

In closing, gentlemen, permit me to express the hope that this coming year may be one of great prosperity to our city, and that your deliberations may be characterized by peace and harmony, and that all your enactments may add to the prosperity and greatness of Consolidated Portland.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS.

OFFICE OF THE SUPT. OF STREETS, PORTLAND, OR., January 2, 1892.

To the Hon. Mayor and Common Council of the City of Portland:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to herewith submit my report as Superintendent of Streets for the year ending December 31, 1891.

Since the last annual report was furnished from this office the size of the City has materially increased through the effect of an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, incorporating the city of Portland by consolidating the three cities-Portland, East Portland and Albina.

The present boundary of the city embraces an area of about 243/4 square miles, of which about 71/4 square miles are on the west side of the Willamette river.

This office has prepared a table, accompanying this report, showing the amount and character of street improvements now existing, from an inspection of which it will be seen that the lately added territory lying on the east bank of the river makes a very creditable showing.

The amount of street work carried on during the past year shows a slight falling off over that of the previous one, owing partly to the fact that under the provisions of the present city charter it requires the petition of the owners of more than one-half the property affected by the proposed improvement before any action can be taken by the Common Council, while formerly a petition signed by the owners of one-third was sufficient.

The improvement in the character and the increased cost in the construction of business blocks, has naturally served to make still more urgent the demand for better and more permanent

street pavements. For streets where the traffic is exceptionally heavy and where the noise is not a serious inconvenience, Belgian Block pavement, well laid on a good foundation of concrete and filled in with Asphalt, while expensive, would probably be advisable. This pavement as it has been laid here on a foundation of sand spread over rolled earth surface and filled with coarse sand soon becomes rough, noisy and dirty, especially where disturbed in the laying of sewer, water and gas pipes. Brick pavement is now being used quite extensively in some of the eastern cities and good results obtained. It is claimed that we have in the vicinity of Portland suitable material for the construction of good paving brick, but until that fact is established and it is clearly shown that they can be economically manufactured it is not probable that many experiments will be made in this direction. The most urgent demand however is for a smooth, durable pavement that can be easily cleaned and is practically noiseless. There is no question but that Asphalt or Bituminous pavements come nearer filling these requirements than any other form of pavements now in use. The Trinidad Asphalt, as laid in Washington, Buffalo, New York; Chicago and other eastern cities is claimed to be the best, but its cost may prevent its use in this city for some time to come. The Bituminous Rock pavement has been extensively used in San Francisco and Oakland during the past five or six years, and in the main has given good satisfaction. Washington street in this city was improved with similar material to that used in San Francisco, and while it has not been laid down a sufficient length of time to give it a fair test as to its wearing quality, yet the presence of holes in the surface at different places in the street gives opportunity for considerable adverse criticism. The greater portion of the street, however, appears to be wearing well, which would indicate that in all probability where the street is defective, the material used was not properly worked when laid or the ingredients of which it is composed were not in the right proportion. The contractors on this work have given a bond to keep the street in good repair for a

period of five years, and as they will have an opportunity during the warm days of the coming summer to thoroughly roll the surface of the street its entire length with a 12-ton roller, it will be well to wait before passing judgment.

The time when a street is to be improved and the character of improvement to be adopted rests almost entirely with the property owners, but there is a growing desire among many of them, in the business part of the city at least, to replace our worn-out streets with pavements more in harmony with the necessities of the times, and I am confident that Portland will witness during the next few years a marked improvement in the condition of her streets.

During the year 23 ordinances were enacted on the west side and 21 on the east side for the improvement of streets, making a total of 44.

Plans and specifications have been prepared by this office for 51 different sewers, bridges, etc.

Besides sewers shown in the tabular form, plans and specifications were prepared just before the close of the year for sewers in the following streets: Mitchell street, Ord. No. 6999; Chapman street, Ord. No. 6905; Sellwood street, Ord. No. 7088, all in Albina district.

SEWERS.

During the past year the amount and cost of sewers completed and accepted is less than during the previous year. This is owing to the fact that Tanner Creek sewer extension, 4000 feet in length, was not completed and consequently not accepted until after the beginning of 1892. Work was also carried on on several other sewers, which if finished a month earlier, would have increased the cost of sewer construction more than \$50,000.

When the three cities consolidated Albina had several sewers laid which with those since constructed makes a total length of nearly 3½ miles. East Portland had no sewers but they had procured the services of Mr. Rudolph Hering, of New York, an eminent Sanitary Engineer, who made a visit here, and from his examination and from maps, profiles, street grades and other information furnished him by Mr. Bellinger, the City Surveyor, prepared a plan for the sewerage of said city, which, together with detailed drawings, etc., are on file in this office. Sewers were not provided for in certain portions of East Portland owing to the fact that the land, in some instances, had not been laid off into blocks and in other places the grades of streets had not been established, making it impracticable, with the information at hand to determine with certainty the location and size of such sewers.

Since the plan was prepared, Sunnyside has been added to the East Portland district and is embraced within the city limits. Irvington, lying just east of the former city of Albina, is also within the city, and the greater portion of sewage and storm water from this locality will have to be disposed of through the sewer in Sullivan's gulch. Owing to these facts it becomes necessary to make some additions, alterations and modifications to the plans prepared. This office has been engaged on this work

during the past two months and in a short time expects to have everything in proper shape for providing plans, etc., for the construction of any sewers that may be needed. The work in this connection was necessarially tedious as in many streets levels had to be run, profiles made and probable grades determined on before an approximate estimate could be prepared of the amount of sewage and storm water which it would be necessary to provide for the disposal of in the several districts. For more particular information regarding sewer work, see the following statement.

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ELECTRIC LIGHTS-(WEST SIDE)

On December 8th, 1890, the city was paying for 786 incandescent lights, nominally of 16-candle power, at the rate of \$2.05 per month; 33 arc lights, nominally of 2000-candle power, at \$15.00 per month, and 20 such arc lights at \$10.00 per month. On December 8, 1891, the city was paying for 721 incandescent, 25-candle power lamps at the rate of \$1.98 per month, and 199 arc lights of 2000-candle power at the rate of \$9.72 per month, an increase of 146 arc lights and a decrease of 65 incandescent lights. On May 13, 1891, a contract was entered into by the City of Portland with the Willamette Falls Electric Co. (to take effect April 8, 1891) which provided, among other things, that the 16-candle power incandescent lamps then in use should be discontinued and 25-candle power lamps substituted therefor. Up to this time the city was paying \$15.00 per month each for 31 arc lights and \$10.00 per month each for the balance of the arc lights, and \$2.05 per month each for incandescent lights.

OIL LAMPS.

During the year 12 old lamps and fountains have been sold to the town of Klaskanue for \$42 and the money turned over to the City Treasurer.

PARK BLOCKS.

For several years no attention has been paid to the condition of these blocks, save such as was necessary to keep the sidewalks and crosswalks around them in a fair state of repair. The trees in and around the blocks should be carefully trimmed and the ground dug up and enriched.

The Chapman and Lowosdale squares are a great resort during the summer months and it is the intention of the Park Committee at an early date to have the band stand repaired and painted. Two drinking fountains have been purchased by the city, one for each square, which are to be placed in position in a short time. A contract has also been made for supplying seats, and with a moderate outlay for trimming trees, procuring additional shrubbery and improving the walks, these squares can be made very attractive.

THE CITY PARK

Has been improved very materially during the past year. Considerable new ground has been broken and cleared up, shrubbery thinned out, pathways made and additional landscape gardening carried on. The roadway leading through the Park from the entrance at Jefferson street should be macadamized during the summer, as during the past winter, being only a dirt road, it was impassable for teams, and persons visiting the Park in vehicles were obliged to enter and return by the Washington street entrance. The extension of the cable railway out Jefferson street, which will be completed by May, will afford increased facilities for visiting the Park as there will be a stopping place at the south end, while the terminus of the road lies about 300 yards west of the Park.

The following improvements were made in the City Park during the year 1891: 8 acres grubbed, ready to be sown; 5 acres seeded and in grass; 800 feet of flower beds; 600 feet of road macadamized; 2000 feet of pathways; 300 loads of ashes for the above; 300 loads of manure for flower beds; 1 Rustic bridge, 60 feet long, and 40 garden seats.

The following houses and cages were also built: I green house, 42x18 feet; I animal cage, 32x16; I monkey cage, 22x17; I pea-fowl cage, 30 feet in diam.; I pheasant cage, 24 feet in diam., and I bird cage, 24 feet in diam. A very handsome fountain was also purchased by the city at a cost of \$495. As soon as the weather will permit, the fountain and basin will be constructed and the fountain properly set and painted.

On the east side of the river the city has, in what was formerly Albina, a tract of land embracing 30 acres, purchased for park purposes, but no improvements have been made upon it. The city also has a tract of about five acres in Holladay's addition to what was formerly East Portland, but no improvements were ever made save fencing in the same and trimming up the trees, and at the present time the title to said tract of land is in litigation.

To the Hon. the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Portland :

GENTLEMEN :—In accordance with the provisions of the City Charter, I herewith submit my annual report of this department for the year ending December 31, 1891, in tabulated form, of Street and Sewer work, done and estimated, together with Street Extension Surveys, work done under permit, and inventory of property.

This report shows, as concisely as possible, work in detail, to which it is perhaps unnecessary to add more than a few passing remarks.

In this connection I would say, that under the consolidation act some seventeen square miles of territory was added to the city, increasing its area about four and one-half times its original size. As is well known, a large portion of this acquired territory is comparatively new and unimproved. The rapid development of that section renders a vast amount of surveying necessary; for instance: In order to carry out your instructions to establish grades on various streets throughout the city, some 95 miles of levels have been taken, and profiles

platted. This work is very necessary, as without those, no intelligent and comprehensive system of grades and drainage could be adopted.

A large number of monuments located throughout the city, and many more are needed. This is a work which requires considerable time and care to successfully accomplish with accuracy, as in my opinion too much pains cannot be taken establishing monuments.

In closing, I desire to thank your Honorable Body for many courtesies shown.

We also herewith submit our estimate of the cost of conducting the Police Department for the year 1892, as required by section 73 of the City Charter. Said estimate was made after a very careful consideration of the matter. Owing to persistent

demands and numerous petitions of taxpayers and residents in the outlying districts of the city, it will be necessary, in order to give a portion of the police protection prayed for, to materially increase the number of regular policemen on the east side of the river. This will entail considerable expense in the fitting up of jails and offices and putting in a call box system for that portion of the city.

The Police Commissioners have been laboring under considerable disadvantage during the latter half of the year just past, occasioned by the providing of additional police protection for the east side of the river, for the payment of which no appropriation was made by your honorable body. The carrying ont of various matters which the Board of Police Commissioners had in view for bettering the Police Department on this side of the river had to be abandoned, in order that the money intended for that purpose might be applied to the payment of police for East Portland and Albina. 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ANNUAL REPORT

S. B. PARRISM, CMIEF OF POLICE.

For the Year Ending Dec. 31, 1891.

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE, PORTLAND, OR., Dec. 31, 1891.

To the Honorable Board of Police Commissioners of the City of Portlaud:

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit my annual report of the workings of the Police Department for the year ending December 31, 1891, as follows:

During the year just past there has been nothing of importance occur to this department, except the taking effect of consolidation of the three cities of Portland, East Portland and Albina, which has called for the utmost care in the financial management of all the branches of the Police Department in order that the fund, which was estimated at the beginning of the year 1891 as sufficient for said year, should not be exhausted by reason of the extra expense of putting in a police system on the east side of the river. Owing to the uncertainty of any relief coming from the Common Council to meet this extra expense, many needed repairs and improvements in and around the police station were omitted; and yet, with all these and other precautions, there is a deficiency in the Police Department Fund of some \$1800 at the present time, and as a part of this is for salary due the members of the Police Department, I respectfully recommend that some action be taken by your honorable body towards providing means to meet said deficiency.

Police Commissioner's Report.

Another matter of some importance was the completion of the police alarm telegraph system. It seems proper for me, in this report, to make some reference to this matter, although the electrician, Mr. A. J. Coffee, in his report to your honorable body, has fully covered the same.

When the system was first introduced and operated by this department it, like most other innovations, failed to give entire satisfaction; but at this time, after a year's trial, I have nothing but praise for the system, as it is now in good operation and rendering excellent services; its value for police purposes can hardly be overestimated, for by means of it instantaneous communication can be had with every policeman on beat on the west side of the river. The importance of this in cases of great disturbances or riots can readily be understood.

THE POLICE TELEPHONE AND SIGNAL SYSTEM.

The system, in brief, is the establishment of telephone stations at intervals along the beat traveled by the patrolman, so that the latter, if he desires to communicate with the station for the purpose of calling assistance, or for any other reason, simply stops at the first telephone box and makes his wants known to the officer in charge. It is unnecessary to point out to any one who has been connected with the police service the immense advantage of the new system. The patrolman is often miles away from his station, and while he is making the trip, perhaps to report some trivial occurrence, the district is open for all kinds of crime. Suppose some terrible crime has been committed, or say a dangerous riot threatened, and it becomes necessary to at once notify all officers to look out for the criminal, or to rally to resist public violence, how utterly inadequate are the old methods.

The district connected with a station is divided into any number of posts or beats. On each of the beats there is erected a box, or house, similar to a sentry-box, octagonal in shape, two feet five inches in diameter and about seven feet high, painted a bright color. The doors of the boxes are secured by a patent trap lock that retains the key, and as none but police officers are in possession of the release key, the person opening any of them must await the arrival of an officer or lose his key; and, as each of the keys is numbered and a record kept of the name and residence of the person holding it, any one giving a false alarm can be easily detected. Inside of the house, or sentry-box, described there is a box about the size of a fire alarm box, and through an opening in the end of this box projects a lever; inside of the box there is a telephone and the usual mechanical contrivance for transmitting the arbitrary call. None but officers are in possession of keys for the inside boxes.

All inside boxes are connected with the station in the same manner as the fire alarm, and the signal is registered on the same kind of a register in use in all electric fire-alarm systems. A person wanting the services of a policeman opens the outside door and pulls down the lever at the side of the box, and the signal is immediately registered in the station, where there is a detail of three men with a horse and wagon, who are furnished with all the facilities for quick hitching, and who immediately respond to all calls. The officer on post is required to report by telephone once an hour at night and day. He can also receive information of crime committed in any other part of the city, and is required to report all that comes to his notice of any importance, at any time during the day or night, without leaving his post. In cases of emergency he can use the arbitrary call, which will bring the patrol wagon to any box, or he can use the telephone and have assistance at any place that he may designate.

The fire department bell is used also as an alarm bell for the police station, and in case of murder, burglary, larceny or other crime of which the entire force should be notified, immediately a signal will be struck. On hearing this, every officer on duty will report at the box on his post, when all can be informed of what has been done, and the officer in command can bring all his men to any given point if required.

The system is capable of almost indefinite extension, as the signal boxes can be placed in business houses, banks, private residences, etc., thus communicating directly with the police

station. The results of the workings of the system, where in use, are in the highest degree satisfactory. The arrests have nearly doubled, and there has been a marked decrease in the crimes reported.

The patrol wagons are models of convenience and adaptability for the work. They combine lightness and strength. They are fitted with an alarm gong similar to the fire department vehicles, and can go in a hurry for an alarm. Under the seats, which run lengthwise on each side of the box, are compartments for handcuffs, comealongs, clubs, blankets, canvas stretchers, ropes and other articles that are found necessary or convenient. The stretcher is ingeniously arranged and is the most perfect device for the purpose desired. The stretcher, when not in use, is rolled up on the poles and placed in one of the compartments under the seat. When required for use, the stretcher is drawn out through a small door at the end of the wagon, and four hooks which accompany it are fitted in their proper places, two at each side of the wagon. In these hooks the poles attached to the sides of the stretcher are placed, and the canvas hangs free between the seats of the wagon, so that the jolting of the wagon is overcome. The stretcher can be lifted from the wagon and carried without disturbing the patient. For obstreperous prisoners there is a ring in the floor of the wagon box, to which the belligerent party can be tied down and secured.

I am so impressed with the usefulness and manifold advantages of the system that I thought it proper and for the best interests of the city to recommend that, as soon as it is possible, the system be introduced across the river, and that it be extended on the west side thereof. I feel certain that the lasting benefit, in the increased security to life and property which the people will derive from its use, will more than compensate the extra expense.

I presume it is unnecessary for me to remind your honorable body that the city has outgrown its police force beyond all reasonable proportion. If the use of the police alarm telegraph is provided for, it will probably supply immediate necessities; if not, the police force must soon be largely increased. The fact that our present force is numerically insufficient to discharge the constantly increasing amount of service required is too well known to call for any argument here. All there remains to say now on the subject is the plain statement that the city of Portland would need to-day not less than seventy-five policemen. It is difficult to imagine how thirty-six patrolmen—the number at present employed—can reasonably be expected to perform work that should more appropriately be allotted to the former number.

PATROL WAGON AND TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

The introduction of the police patrol wagon and telephone system into the department has proved to be of incalculable benefit.

One of the most important features of the system is the instantaneous communication the officer on the beat has with his commander. By using the telephone apparatus in the patrol box, he reports at intervals of an hour, daily and nightly, the condition of his beat and receives orders from the station to which he is assigned without having occasion to leave his post.

Again, when it is necessary to call the wagon in case of riot or tumultuous gatherings, the loud-sounding gong and quickly driven wagon, dashing up with a fresh relay of officers to the scene, not only astounds the rough element, but disarms all resistance, and in a moment the prisoners are being whirled away to the calaboose and peace reigns once more, the officer on the beat remaining and continuing his patrol. Contrast this happy state of affairs with the old style. Heretofore, a turbulent drunken case would engage the attention of two or three officers, who would laboriously haul and drag their prisoner for squares to the station, leaving their beats exposed and returning blown and exhausted from their labors. The danger of such a proceeding during the night time, when no passing vehicle can be pressed into service, can be readily seen.

Such a dilemma as the foregoing has been discussed for years by practical police officials, and no remedy discovered until the police patrol wagon and telephone system came into vogue. I

predict that this valuable feature of the department will gain the strongest support from our merchants and all law-abiding citizens, and we shall have the satisfaction of witnessing a net-work of telephonic communication that will act as a trap to the thief, tough and chronic law-breaker, rendering them powerless or comparatively harmless.

SUGGESTIONS.

I submit that the department should be put in the highest state of efficiency that can be reached by means of proper expenditure of the police fund. The increased size of the city and the great number of dwellings erected in the outskirts call for an extension of the police patrol. This extension cannot be made with the present force without depriving the more central portions of the city of the protection to which it is entitled. In my judgment the remedy lies in a mounted police patrol, which should consist of not less than five men. The city should own the horses and keep them in good condition. The mounted police officer could give proper police service to a district many times as large as can be served by a patrolman on foot. respectfully suggest that if there are funds enough available out of the appropriations for this year, interiors of the ground and top floors of the police station be entirely removed, and the space be cleaned out, ventilated and remodeled so as to provide for the accommodation of the different classes of arrests made by the department. As it now is, both the top and ground floors, and in fact the entire police station, is in a filthy condition, being full of cockroaches, lice and other vermin, beside being badly ventilated. It is desirable that when it becomes necessary to make an arrest of a citizen in good standing, on suspicion, that there be some decent quarters for his detention, and also a presentable place for the incarceration of witnesses.

Again, some steps should be taken for the better ventilation of the entire station.

The roof the patrol shed in the rear of the jail building is in a leaky condition, and the interior badly arranged for the accommodation of the patrol wagon and horses. There ought to be a complete re-arrangement of the same so as to better provide for the operation and care of said branch of the Police Department.

POLICE TELEGRAPH SYSTEM.

This branch of the service has been of incalculable value to the department since its adoption, and has given general satisfaction. Some difficulty has been experienced in the use of the telephone at night from the excessive induction caused by our wires being in near proximity to the electric light and power lines. The trouble is now greatly reduced, our lines having been moved away as far as practicable from the disturbing currents, and with a few changes yet to be made during the coming year, and the addition of a cut-out signaling and telephone switch, this difficulty will be practically removed. The signaling system is always available and is very reliable.

We have moved during the year nine and one-half miles of double line, one booth, and re-set three booths where sidewalks were re-laid. The system has been kept up to the standard at all times, and all line interferences were promptly removed, and at present is in first-class condition.

We have received over the wires from the several booths 262,813 reports. Each officer is required to report hourly. The patrol wagon has responded to 3371 calls from the booths.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

During the coming year it will be necessary to give the booths a coat of paint and to renew the local batteries in the booths, as those we have been using are exhausted. Regarding the placing

of new booths on the west side, and extending the system to the east side, which should be done without delay, I would recommend that 15 booths be purchased and located on the east side, and that an additional circuit be constructed connecting the same with the central and east side stations. Also that booths be purchased for the west side and placed at the required localities, our present circuits to be extended to connect with them.

To make this addition to the system it will be necessary to construct about nine miles of double line—seven on the east side and two on the west side—at an average cost of \$150 per mile, and a double wire cable under the Madison street and steel bridge draw spans, 800 feet of cable in all, at a cost of \$350. The boxes and booths will cost \$230 each, and the necessary central office apparatus for the stations \$200, making a total of \$535c.

ESTIMATE FOR 1892.

The cost of maintaining the present system during the coming year—with the addition of a four-circuit signaling and telephone switch, removal of 25 booth batteries, line work, battery material and labor—will be about \$1500; with the addition of the east side, about \$1600.

Of the latter a greater part was so trivial as not to need a written notification, and the remainder was of personal spite, of which we cannot take part in.

The consolidation of the cities has increased the boundaries to such an extent that the present force is not able to cope with it as it should, and as one man should take the office work and see that the ordinance relating to infectious and contagious diseases is complied with, and to keep a record of the same and issue burial permits.

I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the present force is limited, and would suggest that the same be doubled, as the work now covers such a great scope (22_{100}^{73}) square miles), and in instances where one man attended to seven or eight complaints in a day, it now takes the greater part of a day to attend to one in many of the outlying districts.

REPORT OF CAPTAIN OF DETECTIVES.

S. B. Parrish, Chief of Police:

I submit to you for your consideration the following report, showing to some extent the work referred to the detective branch of the police force under your charge, also somewhat of the work accomplished during the year ending December 31, 1891 :

The year just closed has been a very busy one for the detective force, and due to the increase of population and territory of the city, and depredations committed as reported at this office somewhat exceed those of the preceding year.

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Police Commissioner's Report.

BURGLARIES.

The number of burglaries committed in the city during the last twelve months and reported at this office somewhat exceed in number and value of property stolen (but not to any alarming extent) those of the preceding year, and property so stolen consisting mainly of jewelry, silverware, watches and money from residences and some merchandise from a few stores, amounting in value to some \$10,461, against \$9596 of the preceding year.

LARCENIES.

Petty thieving, such as stealing clothing, overcoats, etc., from residences, out of hallways when doors are not locked, and tools, etc., from buildings in course of construction, has about kept pace with the preceding year, and property so stolen and reported at this office amounted in value to some \$2093, against \$2068 as per last year's report.

Quite a number of both classes of the above-mentioned offenders have been arrested and convicted, others are still in jail awaiting trial, and property to the value of \$5385 has been recovered and returned to the rightful owners.

FORGERIES.

The most prevalent crime during the year was that of forgery and issuing fraudulent and worthless checks. An astonishing number of these worthless papers were received at this office, and other cases reported, and the money that merchants and others here were defrauded of by these forgers amounted to several thousand dollars. A great deal of the time of the detectives was consumed in looking up such cases, and quite a number of these offenders were arrested and convicted.

ROGUES' GALLERY.

The rogues' gallery in this office, of which mention was made in last report, received some 129 new copies of criminals, held to answer and convicted of felonies during the last year, in addition to the 220 copies as per last report.

FUGITIVES FROM JUSTICE.

Aside from looking after crime at home, the detective force is called upon almost daily, by telegram and otherwise, from officers from other states and territories to intercept and arrest fugitives from justice, Some 303 telegrams were received during the year, chiefly relating to fugitives from justice, and in accordance with requests therein, some 35 persons as fugitives were arrested here and held for the proper officers, and on their arrival delivered to them. A fugitive record is now kept at this office, showing name of person, by whom arrested, by what request or process, and whom delivered to, with the papers, telegrams and letters attached in each case.

1.ETTERS.

Besides the criminal business, some 545 letters of inquiry received at headquarters were referred to this office—letters from all parts of the world and chiefly relating to missing friends and relatives. These letters are all properly filed in this office, and in every case the best possible information furnished in compliance with the request therein stated.

FIRE BOAT.

We again recommend adding a fire boat to the effective apparatus of this department. The city now has fifteen (15) miles of river front, covered with large and increasing values, to which add the shipping in port and river craft, all subject to fire exposure, which can best be protected by an apparatus working from the river. Such a fire boat would also afford great aid in time of fire to points beyond the immediate frontage. The boat also would be of occasional public service in breaking up ice obstructions in the river as well as for capturing or effecting lodgment of heavy drift in times of great freshets, which might endanger the bridges. We estimate that a suitable boat can be procured, fully equipped, for about sixty thousand (\$60,000) dollars, and if your honorable body considers the subject favorably, we would be pleased to afford you closer information concerning construction or purchase from data that we have at hand.

FIRE APPARATUS.

The companies of the department now consist of:

Eight fire engine companies (steamers.)

Three hook and ladder companies.

Four hose companies.

Arrangements have been commenced to put in, both at ward six (6), East Portland, and at ward eight (8), Albina, a hook and ladder company; the apparatus has been ordered, and the contract price appears in the estimates. The house for same at Albina is ready for service, and a brick house for the East Portland hook and ladder company is near completion.

We recommend that an engine company be located in Holliday's addition, ward seven (7). The cost of the house, lot and furnishings is in the estimates. We have an engine (steamer) on hand to place there. The city now owns a lot, purchased for fire purpose by the late city of East Portland, on the corner of Fourth street and Holladay avenue, but the lot being but twentyfive (z_5) by fifty (z_6) feet, is too small; this lot should be sold and a larger lot purchased. We would further advise you that the service for a supply wagon is so much more increased by the extension of the department, that the one-horse truck now in use is insufficient. At present we are at an expense of three hundred (\$300) dollars per annum to haul away the debris from a portion of the houses on the west side. A larger team could do this work for both sides of the river, as well as hauling the company supplies, without an increase of the pay roll.

FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.

We would make this explanation relating to the estimate for fire alarm telegraph purposes The estimates are for the purpose of putting in a complete system of twenty-five (25) signal boxes in wards six (6), seven (7) and eight (8) in continuous circuit with the central station on this side, that we may command at all times direct communication with the central office and east side companies.

The estimates also propose placing two two thousand (2,000) pound fire bells on the east side.

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CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

OFFICE OF CHIEF ENGINEER P. P. F. D., PORTLAND, OREGON, DEC. 31, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Fire Commissioners :

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith my [eighth] annual report as Chief Engineer of the Portland Paid Fire Department for the year 1891.

The exhibits herewith, and made part of this report, will furnish you all details of this service during the period, showing, classified, the cost of maintenance and extension of the Department; the fire record; inventories of city property in use by the companies; numbers and location of companies; hydrants and cisterns, and other information relating to the service.

Chief Engineer's Report.

COMPANIES.

The companies of the Department in the regular paid service at this date consists of 8 fire engines, (steamers), 3 Hook and Ladder trucks, and 2 hose wagons. On the first day of the coming year, two more hose companies, one at East Portland (Stephens' Addition), and one at Albina (Vancouver Avenue), will be put on service. About the first of April, two more Hook and Ladder companies, with Hayes' patent extension ladders, will be added to the Department, one to be located at the corner of Third and I streets, East Portland, and the other on Borthwick street, Albina.

About July 1st, 1892, it is expected that a fire engine company will be located in Holliday Addition, East Portland.

The companies when in commission, numbering 18 in all, will complete the fire protection of the city as now contemplated.

The total manual force of the Department will then be: I chief engineer, 4 assistant engineers, I relief engineer, 80 members of engine companies, 50 members of Hook and Ladder companies, 32 members of hose companies, I driver supply wagon, I superintendent fire alarm telegraph, I lineman, Fire Alarm Telegraph and I secretary Board of fire commissioners; total, 172.

DEATHS AND ACCIDENTS.

Three members of the Department died during the year 1891. V. D. Behrens, assistant foreman of Engine Co. No. 4, of consumption, on the 23d of April. He joined the Department Jan. 1, 1883. Thomas O'Keefe, acting foreman of Hose Co. No. 1, was killed Aug. 21st, by falling from and being run over by hose carriage while going to a fire. He joined the Department Aug. 7, 1884. Ignatius Frainey, extraman, Engine Co. No. 1, of typhoid fever, on the 28th of December. He joined the Department Jan. 11, 1890. All the above deceased were buried by the Fireman's Mutual Relief Association. There were no other serious accidents during the year, to the members while on duty.

CONDITION OF HOUSES AND APPARATUS.

During the past year all of the houses and apparatus have been put in complete order, and expenses, other than for ordinary repairs, are not anticipated during the coming year.

SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.

1891.

PORTLAND, OR., Dec. 31, 1891.

To the Honorable the Board of Fire Commissioners of the City of Portland, Oregon:

GENTLEMEN :—In accordance with the rules and regulations (Sec. VI) I have the honor to submit herewith the ninth annual report of the Fire Alarm Telegraph, and to make for your consideration such recommendations for the new year as will be necessary to maintain the efficiency of the system, and to keep pace with our rapidly growing city, and also to extend the service to the east side of the river. We have changed over from the old to the new poles of the electric light and telephone companies about 18 miles of line and 34 alarm boxes, taking out all the base line wire, excepting along Morrison from Fifth to Twelfth streets, and now the lines are practically above all other wires and out of harm's way.

The ten new boxes ordered in the latter part of 1890, were all located as set forth in my last year's report. This work was finished about February 1, 1891. Another signal box was ordered and placed at the corner of Multnomah street and First avenue.

Five new 18-inch gongs were ordered and placed, one each in the quarters of Truck Company No. 3, Engine Company No. 7, Engine Company No. 8, Hose Company No. 3 and Hose Company No. 4. Also, nine new electric horse unhitchers were placed in these houses, with the necessary relays, switches and batteries.

The six-circuit repeater and general apparatus has worked well during the year and has given universal satisfaction.

Reference will be had to the following pages for a complete list of the location of boxes, inventory of apparatus, line, battery and tools.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Now that East Portland and Albina have been consolidated with Portland, it is essential that this portion of the city should be properly protected by extending the fire alarm system over these districts. In order to do this it will be necessary to establish twenty-five signal boxes with the required line, gongs, tower bells, and strikers and recorders, necessary to connect the same with the department houses and the repeater and battery at the central office. I have estimated the cost of completing this system at about \$9,112.50, and I earnestly hope this amount will be available for this work. With the application of the fire alarm telegraph, it is a well known fact that large and destructive fires are not so liable to occur, for a speedy and timely notification to the department of the existence of a fire nearly always prevents it from spreading and thereby the loss of property and sometimes of human life is saved.

There are yet a number of localities on the west side that require fire alarm boxes, principally at Fulton and in the extreme north and south portions of the city, and in the western district, also in the vicinity of Sixth and Stark, and Second and D streets. To do this work it will require six new signal boxes and about a six and a half mile extension of our present overhead lines. The city is growing rapidly away from our outlying station and in order to keep pace with the improvements, it will be necessary to constantly add new signal boxes to the system. I wish to renew my recommendations of last year regarding a private system of small bells in operation for notifying the call members of the department of a fire. These bells are placed in the residence, workshop or office of the call members, and maintained by them; connection is made with the nearest department house. These lines and bells are paid for and owned by the firemen and have become a necessity. As they are at best a very unreliable affair, and since the old electric light poles have been removed, destroying many of their lines, a number of the firemen are without any means of hearing an alarm, especially

in the north and south ends of the city, and I would earnestly recommend that either the system of small bells be rebuilt in a substantial manner and cared for by the department, or that two 2000 pound tower bells with suitable striking apparatus, be put up, one at Engine Co. No 5 and the other at Truck Co. No. 3. By this means the tower bells could be heard in any district of the city, which is impossible at present with our one bell. By this arrangement reliability will be assured and subsequently the attendance of the member, which we want more than his fine.

In conclusion, I tender my most sincere thanks to your Honorable Body and to the officers and members of the Fire Department for the earnest support you have always given me, also to the members of the several municipal departments, and to Messrs. P. F. Morey, General Manager Electric Light Co., J. H. Thatcher, Manager Telephone Co., and their employes, for the many courtesies shown me in the discharge of my duties.
