To the Honorable Common Council of the City of Portland, Or .:

Gentlemen:—In pursuance of the requirement of section 36, of the City Charter, I present herewith a statement of the affairs of the municipal corporation at the close of business on December 31, 1901, and also such comparative statements and comment as may be of interest to you at this time.

It should be a source of gratification to the taxpayers of the city to know that within the beginning of the present fiscal year the balances in the several funds are sufficient to pay every outstanding claim and leave a net surplus of \$44,157.94. This is the first year since 1893 that there has not been a floating debt in excess of the moneys in the treasury applicable to the payment thereof. This has resulted from the careful scrutiny which you have exercised over the city's finances. You have very wisely limited appropriations to the most urgent requirements of the several departments.

The receipts from the special 2-mill tax levy for the year 1901, authorized at the last session of the Legislature, amounted to \$57.824.85, of which \$27,181.86 was applied in payment of judgments against the city; \$15,000 was transferred to the street repair fund, and the balance of \$15,642.99 was credited to the bonded indebtedness interest fund. In addition to the \$27,181.86 of debt of former years paid from the special 2-mill tax fund, the sum of \$20,007.27 was expended either directly or by transfer from the general fund in settlement of numerous judgments and claims, for which the city was liable, some of which had been outstanding for more than ten years.

There has been expended in street improvements in front of property owned by the city the sum of \$5357.60, which is in excess of the total amounts expended for the same purpose during the six preceding years. I believe that these improvements will meet with public approval. The public property should be cared for and the streets and sidewalks abutting thereon should be the best.

The Board of Public Works has rendered the city very valuable service. The meetings have been well attended, and in the making of contracts, the inspection of public work, and the management of the departments under its control, the several members have manifested a most commendable civic spirit. The City Engineer's Department is under the joint control of your honorable body and the Board of Public Works. The Council directs the surveys, estimates and preliminary work and the Board of Public Works carries into effect the ordinances providing for improvements. Street improvement has been confined almost entirely to macadam on the west side and gravel on the east side of the river in residence districts. The total cost of those improvements has been \$124,663.25. It is to be hoped that our citizens will soon realize that Portland is to be a great city, and that macadam, gravel and planks are not suitable materials for streets either in the business center or the more favored residence districts. Permanent street and sidewalk improvements will add to the health, cleanliness and beauty of the city, and will materially lessen the cost of other branches of the government.

The better improvement of the streets along the lines of the street-car companies is a perplexing problem in this as in most other cities. Numerous promises are made in this matter by the several companies, and we have reason to believe that a decided improvement will be made in the ensuing year. The demand for a better car service for the public is also becoming so persistent that it cannot be resisted. This is a transitory period with us. From a big town we are becoming a modern city, and the changes are often rapid and expensive, but I feel that the corporations that profit most from the public privileges and franchises should pursue a most liberal policy in improvement.

The year has been marked by unusual progress in sewer construction. The construction of the Beech-street district sewer and the extension of the Holladay-avenue and East Oak-street systems has been supplemented by 4½ miles of laterals. The total cost of these sewers was \$113,186.55. The demand for these sewers has been very great, and is evidence of rapid improvement in residence districts.

The balance in the street repair fund on January 1, 1901, was \$761.72, and the receipts of the year were \$22,960.20. The cost of the street repairs during the year was \$16,797.46. A very considerable portion of this was expended on bridges and elevated roadways. The city has about eight miles of bridges which are now old and for which it seems impossible to assess the abutting property for renewal. The sub-structures of these bridges are now becoming very bad, and require constant repair to keep them open, and in safe condition for public travel. The money so expended is put out of sight of the general public, and can be appreciated only by those who are cognizant of the actual conditions. Many of these places should be filled and the bridges substituted by permanent improvements. The first experiment in this line is now in progress on Sixteenth street, between 106 feet north of the north line of Pettygrove street, and 79 feet north of the north line of Quimby street, and I think will demonstrate fully the extravagance of attempting longer to maintain the wooden roadways.

The service of the Street-Cleaning and Sprinkling Department has been as effective as possible with the number of men employed and the quality and quantity of equipment. During the summer months the sprinkling service was the best ever given to the city, and was generally appreciated. Ten horses and a new rotary broom were purchased, and 12 new carts were built by the repair men in the barn, all of which cost \$1,861, and is included in the total annual expense of the department.

The two lots and barn on Seventeenth street, purchased and paid for during the year, are a valuable acquisition, and will contribute to the efficeincy and convenience of the department. I am in favor of increasing the efficiency of this branch of the public service, and would therefore recommend for your special consideration the estimate of the requirements for the ensuing year submitted by the Board of Public Works. The management of the minor departments under control of the Board of Public Works only emphasizes the systematic and painstaking attention which is given by its members for the public good. A very large item of expense in this department is the cleaning of streets where occupied by building materials and the refuse from sidewalk repairs. This should be done either by the contractors doing the work or the property-owners, and a more vigorous enforcement of the law in this particular would have a salutary effect.

The efficiency attained by the Fire Department is a subject of general congratulations among our citizens. The department is well organized, and the men are brave, prompt and capable. The economy with which this department is managed is a matter of surprise in other cities. Pursuant to my recommendations of one year ago a new engine and some other new equipment has been purchased, a new company has been put in commission in the manufacturing district in the north end of the city, and some of the most necessary repairs to the houses of this department have been made. The provision under the charter for this department was wholly inadequate, and you have given in excess thereof the sum of \$31,032 76 from the general fund. The better equipment of the department during the ensuing year is desirable, and I am confident that a judicious expenditure in this direction will meet with public approval.

I would recommend a special appropriation, if possible, for the purchase of another engine and a water tower. If these are provided the board of fire underwriters promises a reduction of 5 per cent in insurance rates. A fire boat is much desired, and the additional reduction in insurance rates promised by the board of fire

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underwriters makes it the wisest economy to secure it as soon as possible.

The police department is too small. The expenditures of this department have been less than those of any other city in the Union of like size, either in population or area. The patrolmen are brave and capable men, but are not sufficient in number to render adequate service. Some of the crimes committed during the year are much deplored, but they neither exceed in number or atrociousness the records of previous years or of other cities. General arrests and severe punishment by hard labor of the vagrants will keep away many of the vicious and criminal class. The appropriation for the Police Department for the ensuing year will doubtless be larger than for last year, and the service will be correspondingly improved.

The work of the Auditor's Department has increased largely during the year. A new system of registration of claims and warrants was adopted and new forms of pay-rolls and claims were introduced, all of which contribute to the protection of the city and the clearness and simplicity of the records. You have been assisted in your work by the prompt and accurate information concerning the finances of the city, which the Auditor has presented to you at each Council meeting.

The number of cases pending in the Attorney's Department on January I, 1901, was 67, and 11 new cases were brought during the year. Forty-five cases were tried and disposed of, which leaves but 33 now pending. Some of these were of very great importance to the city, and to them the Attorney's office devoted the utmost care. The decisions have been as favorable as could be reasonably expected. The City Attorney deserves credit for unusual diligence in the scrutiny of the preliminary proceedings for street improvements which has reduced litigation of this character nearly 75 per cent.

The Treasurer has made proper accounting of the funds of the city at each regular Council meeting. He has adopted new and improved forms of records, and the public has received uniform courtesy from his office.

The Health Department has done excellent work throughout the year. The number of smallpox patients has been large, but they have been taken to the City Hospital promptly and treated successfully. Many of these were indigent persons sent in from outside districts. They involve a large expense for the city, but they must be cared for promptly and humanely.

The parks of the city are under control of a commission created in pursuance of a general state law, but they so much concern the people, and are so integral a part of the municipality that I deem some account of them opportune at this time. The balance in the park fund January I, 1901, was \$463 76; the receipts were \$14,567 13, and the expenditures \$11,513 32, leaving a balance on January I of the present year of \$2,576 39. The members of the Board of Park Commissioners are deeply interested in the work entrusted to them. They have been conservative in expenditures during the past year, but have prepared the way for more extensive improvements by careful study of the requirements of the city. I am confident that their work this year will greatly enhance the beauty of the parks and the attractiveness of our city, and will meet with appreciation by the people.

In conclusion I wish to say that the city has received from the members of your honorable body a service as faithful, conscientious and valuable as any community has ever received from a body of public officials. The financial condition now, as compared with one year ago, should distinguish this year from all previous years in our city's history. The results of the year are attributable to the constant attention to details which you have given. I desire to thank you for the daily assistance you have rendered me and the courtesy and consideration you have shown me at all times. In your deliberations over the estimates of expenses of the several departments, and in the levy of taxes for the ensuing year I have few recommendations to make, for I have implicit confidence that you will provide for a wise and economical administration of the public affairs.

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT

OFFICE OF CITY ENGINEER.

Portland, Or., December 31, 1901.

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Portland, Oregon-

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report for the year 1901.

STREETS.

During the early part of the year quite a number of streets were improved with gravel and macadam, mostly on the east side of the river. They were well constructed, and are good streets for light traffic, but I regret to say that almost no improvements have been made in the center or business part of the city.

During the year my suggestion made a year ago in regard to filling low bridges has been acted upon to a limited extent. The gulch spanned by the North Sixteenth street bridge has been filled with earth and ballast, and several others are now in contemplation.

There is an awakening among the people in regard to the improvement of streets and the general appearance of the city, which, so far, has not resulted in more than an aroused interest, and generous criticism of existing circumstances.

It is hoped that the interest will reach the pay stage very soon, and that general improvement may be made, especially in the heart of the city.

STREET CLEANING.

While the Street Cleaning Department has done excellent work, considering the number of men employed, it has not been able to keep all the streets clean all the time. I believe this department should have double the number of men it now has. Allow me, in this connection, to suggest a more liberal allowance for water in the sum-

mer time, not only for the comfort of the people, but for the good of macadam and gravel streets.

Summer built macadam and gravel streets, in our climate, are sure to break up under the traffic unless kept wet during the first summer. It is considered by authorities that the cost of water is more than made up by the additional life of streets, caused by the liberal use of water in the summer time. Much of the untidy appearance of some of the streets is due to poorly-built street railways. I am informed that considerable first-class track will be put down during the summer of 1902, especially on Third-street and Burnside street. It is hoped that track on Washington street will also be rebuilt.

As a general system, I suggest that a district be established, say bounded by Glisan street on the north, the Willamette river on the east, Jefferson street on the south, and West Park street on the west, and within that district none but first-class pavements be constructed, and that first-class pavements be built on all thoroughfares leading into the country, or to large manufacturing districts. Such thoroughfares would be Washington street, Jefferson street, a line to the Macadam road, one to the St. Helens road, Corbett street, and one through the milling district in the north part of the city.

On the east side, main thoroughfares leading away from the bridges to the county roads, say Williams avenue, one leading to the Sandy road, one to the Base Line road, one to Milwaukie street, and probably Belmont street, and possibly other streets on both sides of the river.

The district lying between the main thoroughfares might be improved with cheaper material.

As a rule, pavements of low first cost are not economical in annual cost, where the traffic is large. While pavement of large first cost are in the end economical.

TREES.

There are many unsightly trees in the city, some of them in the business center. They should be dug out. Trees are out of place on business streets, especially when the street is only sixty feet wide.

While quite a number of the troublesome poplars have been re-

moved or girdled, many still remain. They are not only not beautiful, but damaging to the sewers, curbs and walks. Indiscriminate and injudicious planting of trees is almost as great a sin as indiscriminately cutting them down.

SIDEWALKS.

Much has been done in the improvement of sidewalks, but our mileage of wooden walks is so great that long stretches of bad walks are still to be found in all parts of the city. It is very gratifying to note that more stone walks have been put down during the year than in seven or eight years previous.

For part of the year sidewalk inspectors were provided, and their work has been so valuable that I hope they may be continued.

In addition to their sidewalk work they have acted as building inspectors, in the matter of requiring permits to be taken out by the owners or contractors.

In my last year's report I called attention to the need of equipment. The authorities have not yet found means to supply the necessary machinery and horses, and we are still building macadam and gravel streets without steam rollers and other machinery.

SEWERS.

We have probably advanced more in sewer construction than any other public work, and the coming year promises to be one of great activity in this direction. Some of the older sewers have made a great deal of trouble, and cost. on account of the roots of poplar trees entering them and growing until the sewer was closed. Some of these older sewers are much too small for the work they have to do.

LIGHTS.

The lights we have are satisfactory, but the growth of the city is such that many new arc lights are needed. Some of the outlying districts, having a large population, are entirely without lights.

CREMATORY.

During the year 1901 there was reduced at the city crematory: Horses, 236; cows, 35; dogs, 765; sheep, 1; hogs, 1; camels, 1; garbage,

14,180 cubic yards. There were 982 loads of sawdust and 185 cords of slabwood consumed to accomplish this result.

Between the first of the year and at the date of this report— February 15th—six cases which were pending in the Supreme Court of the State have been disposed of favorably to the city; three cases have been disposed of in the Circuit Court, two favorably to the city, and one—the Isakson case—against the city. Two other cases have just been set down for argument in the Supreme Court which will be disposed of before March 1st, which will leave practically but two cases pending in the Supreme Court of the State, and fourteen, all told, in the State Circuit Court.

Over three thousand cases have been tried in the Police Court during the fiscal year of 1901, several of which have managed to get into the Circuit Court.

The work necessary to bring suits under the curative act is exceedingly laborious, and requires a great deal of time. Some of these cases have fifty and sixty defendants, and it takes one whole day to investigate the title of one single defendant. If the curative act had permitted us to proceed to make re-assessments through the Common Council, an immense amount of work would have been saved, and that which we had to do would have been greatly simplified. As it is, in bringing these suits it is practically necessary to abstract every lot involved, as to the then owner and present owner, and in some cases it is hardly possible to find out who the owner is. The department, however, is finishing this work with as much speed as possible with the present force.

The method pursued by this department of investigating everything before incurring liability or expense for the city also entails a great deal of extra work, but the result can be readily seen in the reduction of the number of cases brought against the city, and the almost uniform success the city has had in all cases brought since this method has been pursued.

When I took this department, in July, 1898, there were pending

about ninety cases, many of which have found their way to the Supreme Court of the State, and one to the Supreme Court of the United States. To get rid of all these cases has been a very expensive and laborious task. The number of cases was reduced seventy-five per cent. last year. Reduction in the number of cases has also resulted in reduction in the expense of this department—a reduction so very material that I deemed it advisable to ask for only \$600.00 at the first of the year to meet the expenses of this department for the coming year.

There are no cases pending now, either in the Circuit Court or in the Supreme Court, the result of which can in any material manner affect the city. All the cases that could in any way injure the city have been disposed of, outside of the policemen's cases, which were ratified by the Legislature at its last session, there has been no judgment obtained against the city. So that we start out the first of the year 1902 with a practically clean slate in the law department.

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Annual Report

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council-Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit to you my fourth annual report of the Department of Health for the year ending December 31, 1901.

I shall endeavor to call your attention to the work performed by this department during the past year, and make such recommendations as, in my judgment, are practicable and that will be conducive to the betterment of the health of the city.

There has been a total of 1,143 deaths during the year from all sources.

This is an increase of 234 over last year. This increase occurred during the early months of the year. The latter part of 1901 averaged about the same as the prior years.

The United States census two years ago gave the population of Portland 90,426. During the past year it is estimated that there has been at least 1500 new residences erected and occupied. All dwelling houses, new or old, are full to overflowing; hence we may conservatively estimate our population at 100,000, thus making the death rate 11.43 per 1,000 inhabitants. While our death rate shows an increase over the year previous, we can still class ourselves as one of the healthiest cities of the United States. The deaths in public hospitals and private sanitariums, which are from the non-resident class, contribute very materially to the mortality record of Portland. The city is equipped with the finest hospital service on the Coast, and we serve for a large area of country, whose sick are sent here.

SMALLPOX.

During the past twelve months we have had to combat with 62 cases of smallpox, none of which has proven fatal. Eighty per cent. of these cases have come to the city with the disease, or had been exposed to the contagion elsewhere. I regard it as highly satisfactory that there has been very few recurrent cases in any given house. This can be accounted for only by reason of the precaution invariably practiced by this department, viz: immediate removal of the patient, vaccination of all persons whom we could trace that had been exposed, burning of bed clothes, and thorough fumigating with formahilde gas.

While we have had more numerous cases than for several years past, I feel that Portland is to be congratulated on having escaped an epidemic on more than one occasion the past year.

It is possible the general public does not fully appreciate the amount of work that each one of these cases bring to the Health Department, and the value of such work from a health standpoint, as well as the business of the city at large.

We have had as many as 14 patients in the contagious hospital at one time, and our efficient and faithful nurse, Mrs. Tout, has cared for and nursed all without assistance. Her long experience with smallpox cases has been of untold value to the city during the past three years. Our contagious hospital, being located outside of the city limits, in an isolated place, requires such an experienced person in superintendence without the constant presence of the City Physician. This officer has the entire city to look after, and his time is very precious. In the emergencies we have met during the year, we have found Mrs. Tout an exceedingly valuable aid. The fact that no deaths have occurred from this disease insures the statement that the patients have been properly cared for from a medical standpoint.

The City Physician has been careful and painstaking with his

work, handling the patients most of the time without assistance. He has been occupied for days at a time going in answer to calls all day and all night.

My assistant, William Beutelspacher, has been untiring and faithful in the work of fumigating rooms and houses, attending to quarantines and handling the cases which have from time to time been committed to the contagious hospital.

The Plumbing Inspector has conducted his office in a highly efficient manner, and the results, I think, speak for themselves. Businesslike methods are followed in the inspection of plumbing and drainage, and there has been less complaint from that branch of the work than at any time during the establishment of the office.

SEWERAGE.

During the year there has been a large number of sewers put down. These will be of inestimable benefit to various sections of the city which have lacked this improvement until this past year. There is no doubt but that the general health of the city has been bettered. The building of the Beech-street sewer system has supplied a great want for sewerage. During the coming summer many houses will be attached and old cess-pools and outside vaults in this district will be abolished and filled up. This sewer cost a large sum of money, but the direct benefit to the residents will more than off-set the cost. The building of the Bancroft avenue and the Hamilton avenue sewer will supply a much-needed want.

There is still a district that is in great need of a sewer. It is known as the Brooklyn district, in the southern portion of East Portland. This is mostly low ground, and the water is close to the surface. Cesspools and vaults overflow during heavy rains. The area of the district is about 1,800 acres of land. I hope your honorable body will duly consider the importance of this much-needed improvement in the near future, at least during the summer.

MARKET PLACE NEEDED.

The public streets and sidewalks around the plaza blocks are used for a vegetable market every morning by from 80 to 200 wagons from the country. They assemble at this point for barter and sale, and distribute to the smaller peddlers their produce. They congregate

around the fountain erected by the Hon. D. P. Thompson, and scatter refuse vegetable and debris that causes the Street Department a great amount of work that really could be avoided. Besides this, however, the custom of allowing this marketing to be carried on near the plaza blocks makes the thoroughfares look very untidy, and I believe that it is not conducive for the best health of the city. It is a disgrace to the city. It requires the services of a man and a cart to clean up the street after these people.

The point I wish to emphasize is, that the block owned by the city, known as the old Mechanics' Pavilion, should be fitted up for a public market place, where the farmers could congregate and meet the produce buyers of the city. This need of a central market place has long been evident. It ought to be done, and thus take from the streets this huckstering crowd, who, in the pursuit of their business, quite naturally disturb the residents in that neighborhood in the early morning hours.

CITY GARBAGE.

Disposal of the city garbage during the past year has caused this department less trouble than ever before. Mr. Davis, the foreman at the crematory, is the right man in the right place. He has kept the scavengers within the proper limits of time, as nearly as it has been possible to do, and the dry dump has been kept in proper condition.

A number of scavengers have been arrested and fined for not keeping the contents of their wagons separated. The summary proceedings had a good effect, and there has been no trouble in that respect to speak of since. There is an inclination on the part of some of the scavengers to haul dry garbage and rubbish and dump the same in the gulches about the city. This custom makes the gulches look very unsightly to the surrounding neighborhood. I expect to notify every garbage man to abate this practice, which is growing into a positive nuisance. The city provides proper dumping grounds for all garbage and refuse of the streets, and it must be hauled to these places or arrests will follow.

AMBULANCE.

In my last annual report I suggested the importance of the need

of an ambulance wagon for the exclusive use of the Health Department. A humane conveyance for contagious patients was long needed, especially since the prevalence of smallpox. There was always dauger in taking a smallpox patient through the streets in an open conveyance of the ordinary sort that the infection would spread. In bad weather, too, it was very inconvenient to transfer a sick person to the contagious hospital without an ambulance. I am glad to say the Health and Police Committee took the matter before the Council, and within due time a first-class covered and enclosed ambulance wagon was provided. It was manufactured in Portland, and is up-todate and first class in its appointments. It is a great convenience to this department.

SANITARY RECORD OF HOUSES.

If a sanitary record of every house in the city could be obtained for the information and guidance of the Health Department incalculable benefits would be secured in the way of preventing sickness and deaths from infectious diseases.

In order that this record might be obtained, it would require a house-to-house inspection. All buildings that have been constructed in recent years would have to be carefully gone over in order to find defects, and to ascertain if their construction, especially in plumbing, has been in accordance with the sanitary regulations of the city. There are many old buildings that have been reconstructed and in some of them I am satisfied that there is faulty work, which may breed sickness and disease. Houses of all kinds with old-style plumbing and drainage should be renovated in accordance with later regulations.

I recognize that this will be an impossibility until such time as the necessities of the Health Department are appreciated and the working forces of the office are increased so as to take care of this feature of inspection in the interests of the city's general health.

MILK AND MEAT SUPPLY INSPECTION.

Portland has a population of 100,000 people, and we have the unenviable distinction of being about the only city of like population and modern progress that does without meat and milk inspection.

The ordinance under which the city health is guarded provides that adulterated milk, or any impure food, shall not be sold, nor offered or displayed for sale, but, as I have suggested before, in order to take up such work effectively it must be carried on in a systematic manner. It would require one or two inspectors to devote their entire time and attention to the work of inspection of foodstuffs on the markets of the city. With the present working force of this office this would be impossible. It should be understood that at least twothirds of all children under one year of age have to be artificially fed. It should be further understood that a large per cent. of the dairy cattle is affected with tuberculosis. Statistics show conclusively that consumption, typhoid fever, diphtheria, and other diseases, are communicated to the human family through the milk supply. I think it is of paramount importance that this city should take up this work at as early a date as possible.

MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

It is demonstrated from the records of the Health Department that contagious diseases prevail to a much greater extent during the continuance of the school period than at any other time. It has been given as a reason that the children are aggregated together at a time of life when all boys are girls are most susceptible to contagious diseases.

Recognizing the importance of medical inspection of schools as a means of protecting the pupils, the health departments of a majority of the larger cities throughout the country have taken this means of preventing the origin and spread of all sorts of contagious afflictions, and with considerable success, among children who are mentally or physicially below the normal. It is not infrequently found that children from the poor families return to school after some unreported illness where no physician had been called to attend it. Inspection of these children, who are generally said to have "only a little sore throat," or "a cold," disclosed that there is the bacilli of diphtheria in their throats. Others of this class are found to be in the disquamanting stage of scarlet fever.

It will readily be seen that the suggestion that schools should be under regular medical inspection is not overdrawn, and the time is close at hand when a thorough system of this sort will be established in all cities with congested school population throughout the country. It is not to be overlooked that in view of the crowded conditions in the Portland public schools there is a danger, if care is not exercised by principals and teachers and parents, to keep watch of their charges and, for the sake of the others in the schools, keep them at home when there is a likelihood of danger from sickness of an infectious nature.

VACCINATION.

The efficacy of vaccination has been thoroughly demonstrated during the continuance of smallpox in this city in many cases where a number of people have been exposed to this disease, after having been vaccinated. Where the vaccination was effective the patient invariably escaped, and where the vaccination did not "take" the person exposed usually took the disease.

The same testimony comes from all the health departments throughout the country. There is only one way to stamp out smallpox, and that is through the medium of vaccination.

If our laws are not sufficient to compel people to be vaccinated, such laws should be amended, or new laws should be enacted at an early date. From a recent decision of the Judiciary Committee of the Board of Directors of our public schools, it appears they cannot compel children to be vaccinated unless the parents of the pupils so desire, upon entering school.

If an epidemic should get started and get beyond the control of the Health Department, and this decision of the School Board is the law, then this department would be powerless to cope with the disease.

The mildness of the disease, as it usually appears now, causes people to become careless. They do not go out of their way to avoid it, and while we have not had any deaths from this contagion within the past three years, it is an unprecedented condition for any city of this size, having a like number of cases. The disease seems to be growing more severe in the Eastern states, and deaths from it are reported more frequent. It is well to take due warning from this fact.

BIRTHS.

There were reported during the year 1,156 births—610 males and 546 females. This is an increase of 104 over the preceding year, 1900.

I have experienced considerable difficulty in getting births reported at the proper time. Many doctors have the impression that it is optional with them whether they report births or not, and I have to keep after them every month. Often no doctor is called in confinement cases. People pay little attention to what the law requires. I am of the opinion that if all births were reported, the record would show quite an increase over the present returns.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

During the year there has been reported to the Health Department 1,172 cases of various kinds of contagious diseases—174 cases of diphtheria; 220 cases of scarlet fever; 60 cases of typhoid fever; 634 cases of measles; 22 cases of chicken-pox, and 62 cases of smallpox. Total number of cases in 1900 was 626, the principal increase being measles and smallpox, during the first four months of the year. In the early part of the year there was quite an epidemic of measles of a very mild form. A comparison of the two years' record will be found in the table of contagious diseases.

Annual Report

-OF THE-

Plumbing Inspector.

To the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Portland-

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the tenth annual report of the Plumbing Inspector's Department for the year ending December 31, 1901.

It is a gratifying indication that the sanitary science has developed at the present day, in its application to the preservation of and promotion of municipal health is quite distinct and requires special knowledge and special training. The following propositions cannot be refuted: That health is of the highest importance to the welfare and prosperity of a community; that contagious and infectious diseases, which arise from unsanitary plumbing and drainage, are the most costly and disastrous calamities—both to business interests and personal happiness—to which mankind is exposed.

Beyond doubt, this has been the busiest year since the office was created in this rapidly-growing city. The importance of its work can scarcely be overestimated, and it is to the credit of our health and police committee that our efforts to enforce the laws have been sustained.

This is a transitory period of improvement throughout. It has been a great year for building construction. The greatest responsibility has been in connection with the many changes in sewerage and drainage systems. The work of changing over the drainage system of the older style houses to connect with the public sewer is going on constantly in the recently sewered districts and in the re-arrangement of the plumbing the general tendency is to comply with the law. The extension of public sewers has of course increased the work of this department very much. This, together with the amount of new building going on at the present time, makes it very difficult to handle the work with the present assistance. Upon the efficiency with which these duties are performed depends the general health of any city or community. When such have poor drainage the air of the city is more or less contaminated with foul gases emanating from defective sewerage and house drainage. These escaping odors from faulty sanitary construction find entrance to the dwellings; there is a lowering of the vitality of the inmates and a consequent increase of sickness from their inability as a result of such weakness to successfully resist the exposure to contagion. If those who occupy rented houses would demand from their landlords a certificate of inspection from the Plumbing Inspector much discomfort, sickness and exposure might be avoided.

All new plumbing reported for inspection at this office has been constructed according to the rules of the ordinance. In all cases where the attention of the Plumbing Inspector has been called to it by the presence of typhoid fever or diphtheria the plumbing and drainage of the house have been inspected and the defects corrected.

I have already stated that in many instances we find defective plumbing in typhoid and diphtheria houses and that impure air is the predisposing cause of infection. With proper sanitary arrangements in and about houses we have a right to promise much less contagious disease and much better health, generally, for the occupants.

During the year perplexing questions have arisen in regard to the interpretation of the plumbing regulations, some portions of the old ordinance having been found, through experience, to be ambiguous. There is now under consideration a revised ordinance clearing up all points on which plumbers entertain doubts, which ordinance I have recommended to the Health and Police Committee for passage in the Council. The measures therein provided I regard as important in the operation of this Department.

I would also recommend that the Plumbing Department be supplied with a smoke-testing machine for testing defective plumbing. It is an appliance highly recommended for the use of detecting defective plumbing. It has been of great assistance in other cities in detecting bad workmanship when it is impossible to discover it by other means; also, in aiding in the discovery of defects that are concealed under floors and in partitions where the pipes have become rust-eaten and porous, permitting the escape of sewer gases into residences and public buildings. Improper and imperfect plumbing is the cause of many diseases which are preventable. That diseases from sewer gas frequently result fatally there is no question. I desire to urge this suggestion as being a very important sanitary measure.

SUMMARY.

In submitting our report, required by section 97 of the Charter, which outlines the expenses and operations of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1901, and showing also the estimated amount required for the year 1902, we have exercised our best judgment, and practiced the closest economy consistent with the service required. Since our last report one extra first-class metropolitan engine has been added to our equipment, and its value and good work has been duly tested and recognized in several instances at recent fires. We have purchased a number of horses during the year, and the improvement acquired thereby is noticeable and has much to do with the efficiency of the service. The placing of an engine company in North Portland, in the manufacturing district of the city has been highly commented upon, and gives general satisfaction in that busy and wide-awake portion of the city.

The department has responded to 388 alarms during the year, which is a record of 33 more than during any year since the organization of the partially paid service, and the losses, insurance, value of property involved, etc., will be found in the report submitted. The houses of Engine Company No. 3 and Chemical Engine Company No. 3 have been thoroughly repaired, and are in as good condition in every respect as though entirely rebuilt, and the house of Engine Company No. 6, being new and but recently occupied, is, of course, in first class condition.

The estimate of amount required for the coming year, whilst in excess of the amount expended in the last year, provides for considerable new material, all of which should be furnished with as little delay as possible.

We are still in need of a number of horses to replace worn out animals that have seen years of service, and are of little use, as they cannot be depended upon when prompt action is required.

As a very small amount of hose was purchased during the year, it is now necessary that some now on hand which gives evidence of its worn condition at almost every fire, should be replaced by new and serviceable stock.

The urgent requests for hydrants made by the residents of all portions of the city should be considered at once, as no increased protection has been given in that line for several years, and the laying of long lines of hose at fires certainly places the department at a disadvantage, so that no satisfactory results can be obtained.

The fire alarm system demands immediate and serious attention, as new battery plates should now be on hand to replace those that have been in use for the last three years or more.

Reconstruction of lines cannot be much longer delayer to insure prompt and safe service, and the addition of alarm boxes with keyless doors, as heretofore recommended, is a matter second to no other improvement suggested or anticipated for the betterment of the department's work.

The great number of buildings erected in the vicinity of Sunnyside during the last few years compels us to recommend the placing of an engine company where Hose Company No. 5 is now located.

Although not included in our estimate for 1902, we recommend the purchase of another extra first-class metropolitan fire engine and a water tower, similar to those now in service in all the large cities of the country. We also reiterate our recommendation for a fire boat, and in view of the fact that many and extensive improvements have been made along the river front, it seems almost criminal to delay this matter much longer. The demands of a fire boat are so urgent, so necessary and of so much importance to our shipping and mercantile interests that if no provision can be made for one by the city, the Legislature should be appealed to to devise means whereby this project could be carried out.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

Portland, Oregon, January 1, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Fire Commissioners, Portland, Oregon-

Gentlemen: I have the honor of submitting herewith my annual report of the operation of the Fire Department during the year ending December 31, 1901, being the nineteenth year of the Paid Fire Department of the City of Portland.

ORGANIZATION AND EQUIPMENT.

The Fire Department as now constituted, under the control of **your** honorable body, consists of:

One chief engineer.

One assistant chief engineer.

Two district engineers.

One superintendent of fire alarm telegraph.

One fire alarm repair man.

One supply driver.

Seven steam fire engine companies, manned by 60 men. Four chemical engine companies, manned by 10 men.

Four hook and ladder truck companies, manned by 34 men.

Five hose companies, manned by 26 men.

Sixty-one horses.

Three reserve steam fire engines, one in good condition and two in poor condition.

One reserve hook and ladder truck, "Hayes," fourth class, in good condition.

One two-wheel hose cart, in poor condition. One battery.

FIRE COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

AUXILIARY VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANIES.

Our Fire Department is supplemented by the following Volunteer Fire Companies in suburban districts, to which we have furnished respectively, hose reels and the village truck, with the following amounts of hose:

Portland Heights Hose Company—One hose reel and 600 feet of hose.

Tibbetts' Addition Hose Company—One hose reel and 600 feet of hose.

Fulton Park Hose Company-One hose reel and 600 feet of hose.

Sellwood Hose Company—One hose reel and 900 feet of hose, together with one volunteer aerial hook and ladder truck, equipped with four babcocks.

Multnomah Hose Company-One hose reel and 600 feet of hose.

FIRE HOSE IN SERVICE.

In the Paid Fire Department we have 17,100 feet of cotton rubberlined hose and 2,500 feet of rubber hose. In addition to this we have in the auxiliary fire companies as above; a total of 3,300 feet of rubber hose, making a grand total of 22,900 feet of hose in actual service.

FIRE ALARMS.

Total number of alarms during the year was 388, consisting of: Bell alarms, 157; still alarms, 82; telephone alarms, 149; actual fires, 176; false alarms, 28.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Under this head I desire to offer the following recommendations, trusting they may receive your consideration and approval. For the proper protection of Sunnyside property, I recommend that one firstclass steam fire engine be purchased.

One fireboat. One water tower. 4,000 feet of cotton hose. 100 new hydrants. 30 new keyless door fire alarm boxes. Three ground extension truss ladders. 150 feet of 1½-inch cotton hose, added to each company. Overhaul and paint most of the fire houses. In closing this report, I desire to tender my thanks to His Honor, Mayor Rowe, the City Council and the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners, for the active interest they have manifested in all matters pertaining to the success of the department. I also desire to thank the secretary of the Board of Fire Commissioners and the other officers and members of the department for the faithful performance of duty, and their hearty co-operation in improving the discipline and work of the department. I also desire to express my thanks to the Chief of Police, and the members of his force, for the manner in which they have assisted this department in the discharge of its duties on all occasions.

REPORT

OF

Superintendent Fire Alarm Jelegraph

Portland, Oregon, December 31, 1901.

To the Honorable Fire Commissioners-

Gentlemen: The annual report of a year ago consisted principally of an epitome of the defects in the fire alarm telegraph system and the telephone service. It seems advisable to again call your attention to the same subjects, as the experience of the past year has accentraated the need for a radical departure from the present methods. The fundamental defect in the fire alarm system lies in the attempt to make two practically independent "village" firm alarm systems serve the purposes of a "metropolitan" system. The fundamental difference between the two systems is that in the "village" system an attempt is made to make automatic machinery, consisting of so-called "non-interfering devices and automatic repeaters," both of which have failed time and again and will continue to do so, take the place of human intelligence employed in the "metropolitan system." The great trouble with the telephone service comes from trying to rely on operators who are not under the control of the fire department and who cannot, from the nature of their employment, know the needs or spare sufficient time to properly handle the calls or do the dispatching for "still alarms." As answering companies, have been delayed and are in continual danger of delay in answering bell calls, through the failure of automatic machinery, and through having to wait to do their own reporting and dispatching by telephone in case of still alarms. I would recommend that the two fire alarm systems be combined into one system; that all automatic machinery be done away with; that telephone exchange be obtained and installed in connection with the fire alarm system and the operators be employed to care for both. In order to maintain the present fire alarm system in a reasonable, safe and efficient manner there is much line work that ought to be moved from the electric light poles to the telephone poles, so as to avoid "high potential" currents. Aside from the ordinary danger of burn-outs from having the lines on the electric light poles, there is the great danger that a pole will be burned down at a fire and the fire alarm circuit destroyed by contact with the electric light wires. thereby making it impossible to call for more apparatus. This was exactly what happened at the hotel fire in Lower Albina on the 14th of last November. In the excitement of the moment people made three separate calls, so that plenty of apparatus arrived, and fortunately no more was needed. It is not at all probable that this danger would occur if the lines were on the telephone poles and one should burn down, for the telephone currents are not of sufficient high potential to damage the fire alarm circuits. It is estimated that about \$650 would make the necessary changes. Many of the engine houses are supplied with only one circuit and if service on that circuit is interrupted in any manner the companies cannot receive a call until repairs are made. Two cases will serve as illustrations: If circuit No. 2 is broken, chemical No. 1, hose No. 1, engine No. 6 and hose No. 6 are thrown out of service. The same thing occurs to truck No. 2 and engine No. 4 and No. 5 if circuit No. 4 is broken. If the line work can be reconstructed it is probable that additional circuits can be provided for most of the engine houses without further cost. It is now three years and seven months since the storage batteries were installed. Some of the plates have given away and many others are much the worse for wear. It has now become imperative that a new set be ordered as soon as possible, for while it is expected that the majority of the present plates will last for some months, their exact life is problematical. The cost will be about \$850. Fifty new keyless door boxes would not be too many to supply the present deficiencies. I wish to thank you, the Chief, and officers, and members of this department for the many kindly courtesies extended during the past year. I am, respectfully,
