I am informed by the auditor that he has been careful and conservative in his estimates, and it is possible that more than the amount of these estimates may be received, and it is also possible that the estimated amount of disbursements may be reduced, but to accomplish these ends it is necessary that there should be a vigorous and thorough collection from all the sources of income to the city and a rigid economy exercised in disbursements as far as the interests of the city will permit. It is desirable if possible to reach the end of the fiscal year without a deficiency.

To manage the affairs of this city, in view of the multiform, complex and conflicting interests, requires the utmost deliberation and care of all concerned in its government. Our duties are largely enhanced by the preparation we are expected to make for the great Lewis and Clark Centennial which is to take place in this city in 1905. One, and perhaps the most important of these duties, is the improvement of streets. Portland in this particular is behind its prosperity and growth in

other respects. Many of our streets and sidewalks are in a very secondition and we must put forth every effort possible for the provement. We need and hope to have the co-operation of our disc but if necessary must take the responsibility of overraling as for the the law will allow, the objections of those who would delay or birt these improvements.

Subdivision 5 of section 32 of the charter confers upon the Com-Council power and authority to prevent and suppress have been I refer to this unpleasant subject to say that while it may note be the power of the city government wholly to suppress this cill to within our power and our plain duty to protect public decare, all that end it is my opinion that the cribs on the streets between the railroad depot and the hotels and elsewhere on our main street shell be suppressed and their inmates compelled to guit their busines of move into more secluded quarters. Something at least would be supfor the appearance of the city if these people would occup house the have an air of respectability. The present situation in respect to the matter is a disgrace to the city of Portland, and I recommend the pesage of an ordinance to give effect to this suggestion.

One of the most difficult vices with which we have to deal is the of gambling. Ordinance No. 3883 is very comprehensive and figit pothis subject, but to a considerable extent seems to be a deal letter is do not propose to enter upon any Utopian scheme of reform as to the matter, but, I can see no reason why this ordinance may not be a forced so as to prevent the running of such games as faro, roulette at the like which are necessarily more or less of a public nature.

I want to see a stop put to professional gambling at place have and advertised hy pimps and procurers into which the young havperienced and unwary are enticed to be robbed and frequently mind-There is a current rumor in this city that certain persons connect with the Police Department have received money from gambles and others to overlook their violation of law. I do not attach much value to mere rumor, but if any one has any reliable evidence of such official misconduct I should like to have that evidence submitted to me.

As to the liquor traffic. I have this to say: I recognize the necessity of a well-regulated license system. We have a considerable number respectable men in Portland engaged in the saloon business and av judgment is that the granting of licenses should be restricted to the

class of persons. I am also of the opinion that the saloon business as a general rule should be limited to the business portions and not extended into the exclusively resident districts of the city. As long as licensed saloon keepers conduct their business in a lawful and orderly manner they will have no trouble with me, but I shall insist upon the revocation of any licenses granted to those who convert their saloons into dens of drunkenness, debauchery and vice.

Portland is becoming a popular place for the meetings of societies and conventions, and our citizens should strive with each other to multiply its attractions. Our climate and surrounding scenery are all that can be desired, and our desire should be to make our improvements correspond with our natural advantages.

I should feel proud, and so I presume would a great majority of our people, if when travelers and tourists and especially those who attend the Lewis and Clark Exposition go away from our city, they would go saying that Portland is not only a prosperous and beautiful city, but that it excels in the public spirit and good conduct of its citizens.

The receipts of the street repair fund will be increased by the licenses received for vehicles, which is estimated in the receipts of the general fund. Any additional deficiency in this fund must be provided by transfer from the general fund.

The difference between the estimated receipts from the levy of

taxes for the bonded indebtedness interest fund and the interest to be paid from this fund during the fiscal year is provided for by the payment from the Water Department of the interest on the East Portland water bonds.

It is probable that many of the estimates set forth are in excess of the actual requirements of the several departments and I most earnestly desire that the same will be carefully scrutinized by your honorable body before any appropriations therefor are made and that appropriations shall be limited to the strictest economy consistent with

the judicious management of the public affairs. In fact, the appropriations must be less than the estimates submitted, for the deficiencies in certain funds, for which the tax levy is made, must be provided by transfer from the general fund, and addition thereto a transfer of about \$15,000.00 must be made to the improvement bond interest fund to meet the deficiency therein caused by certain bonded assessments not bearing interest. I would also call your attention to the fact that the clerical work formerly done in the Police, Fire, Water and Park Departments has heen transferred to the Auditor's Department, and that the estimates for those several departments, especially the Fire and Police, include the pay for such service.

I would also recommend to your honorable body that taxes be levied to the amount of seven mills on each one dollar of valuation of the property assessed, and that the same be apportioned to the lighting fund, the Fire Department fund, the Police Department fund, the street repair fund, the public library fund, and the park fund, and that in addition to said seven mills, that there be levied a tax of two and onehalf mills on each one dollar of valuation of the property assessed, to meet the payment of interest accruing on the bonded indebtedness of the city.

To the Honorable, the Mayor, and Common Council of the City of Portland—

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit to you an annual report of the Board of Health, in accordance with the provisions of the City Charter, and the usual custom, giving a resume of the work done by the department during the past year, together with some recommendations for your consideration, which will, in my opinion, result in bettering the service in the city, and enable this department to maintain a position in the front rank with health departments in other cilies of our class.

#### CARE OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

One of the most important branches of the work of this department is the care and prevention of the spread of contagion.

During the year just passed, there were reported to this department 893 cases of all forms of contagion. Seventy-one of these resulted fatally. In all cases a quarantine was established, and the premises thoroughly fumigated. Sixteen hundred and sixteen (1616) rooms were fumigated.

### HEALTH COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

All contagious diseases are most prevalent during the continuance of the school period, when children are more exposed by being aggregated together.

Children frequently return to school, after a mild illness where no physician had been called, convalescing from measures, scarlet ferr or diphtheria, and spreading the contagion.

Regular inspection should be established in all cities where a congested school population exists.

Children that manifest symptoms of an infectious nature should be sent home at once and placed under proper medical supervision. Cabinets are now manufactured for disinfecting books in the public schools. A large number of diseases are contracted by scholars from books, especially where the free book system is in use. The cost of disinfecting books does not exceed ten cents per hundred books. Each school should contain one of these cabinets.

#### DIPHTHERIA AND MEMBRANOUS CROUP.

I take the subjects of diphtheria and membranous croup together for the reason that bacteriological research has conclusively proven that they are both due to infection, with the Kloebs-Loeffler backlus. There were twenty-four deaths from this disease out of one hundred and sixty-nine cases reported. This is a high mortality, bad sanitary environments are usually responsible for it.

#### A TYPHOID FEVER YEAR.

In a review of the typhoid fever situation in the United States, shows that 1902 will be known elsewhere than Portland, as a typhoid fever year.

In Brooklyn, a twenty-five per cent. increase is reported. Chicago and some Pennsylvania towns are reporting alarming epidemics. Eighty-five cases and thirty-three deaths were reported, which is a fifteen per cent. increase. One peculiarity of its manifestation has been that its greatest incidence is no longer among the residents of the poorer and congested districts, but also in the abodes of the wealthy where sanitary conditions are supposed to be the best obtainable. There is no obvious explanation, and I can only advise the sterilization of milk and water and the exercise of cleanliness of food supplies and care in their handling and preparing.

#### SCARLET FEVER.

During the year there were eight deaths from this disease out of 250 cases reported. A rigid quarantine has been imposed in all cases, until such time as desquamation of the skin was complete.

#### MEASLES.

It is a mistake to look upon this disease as a triffing malady. Parents frequently expose their children that they may contract it. Of eighty cases reported there was one death, it proved to a more formidable disease than smallpox, and it gives me great comfort to announce a 500 per cent. decrease from the year 1901.

#### SMALLPOX.

There were reported to this office 246 cases of smallpox. The type of disease that has been prevailing over this country was very 149

mild, and in many instances it has manifested itself, to those inexperienced with the disease, in unusual forms. In many cases it never went beyond the vesicular stage before drying up and falling off. There are comparatively few physicians, who, until within the past two years, had opportunities to see or study this disease. The rigid precautions taken to prevent the spread, and its care have contributed very largely to the expense of this department. Smallpox exists today in many places throughout the State of Oregon, it is therefore impossible that we should keep entirely free from the disease, as unfortunately occasional cases run in on us, and spread the germs. The department has endeavored to watch the situation very closely, and quarantine all persons exposed, until the period of incubation has elapsed. Compulsory vaccination in our schools should be rigidly enforced. I believe that thirty-five per cent. of the children of this city are unvaccinated.

#### BIRTHS.

There were reported during the year, 1199 births. This is an increase of forty-three over the preceding year, 1901.

I have had considerable difficulty in getting all births reported. Often in confinement cases, where no doctor is called, people neglect, others do not know the requirements of the law, and therefore fail to report. If all these were reported, the record would show a slight increase over the present returns.

### DEATHS.

Eleven hundred and fifty-one deaths were reported. This is only an increase of eight over the year 1901, and as the population of Portland has increased by about 15,000, our death rate is consequently greatly reduced; making Portland one of the healthiest cities in the United States. Estimating our population at 115,000, thus making the death rate only 10.01 per cent. per 1,000 inhabitants.

Consumption was responsible for 124 deaths. This is a very high mortality for a single disease, and shows the importance of its prevention. Since Prof. Koch discovered une bacillus tuberculosis, reliable data has been obtained as to the way in which the disease is disseminated. Although it is known that a predisposition to tuberculosis is transmitted from parents to children, and that an ordinary cold may prepare the way for phthisis, the cause of the infection is now generally sought in the transmission of living germs. These germs pass out of the patients' bodies with the excretions and can be found in the dust of their sleeping apartments and rooms used by patients suffering from tuberculosis. Therefore, the excretions of consumptives should he rendered innocuous, and intercourse with such patients with healthy persons should be avoided as much as possible. Their linen and utensils should he thoroughly boiled after using; their rooms should be kept free from dust, and should he disinfected before being occupied by other people. All sputum should he deposited in spittoons, when a spittoon cannot be used, as in walking through the streets, for example, patients should carry little hottles with them for the reception of sputum where it can be easily destroyed by combustion or disinfection. They should not expectorate upon the streets or sidewalks, nor into pocket handkerchiefs.

### SANITARY DUMP CART.

All scavengers should be required to use the sanitary dump cats in place of the leaky, old wooden boxes now in use, which drop as much garbage on the streets as they carry off. These carts are made of sheet steel, so tightly riveted that not even a drop of water of the garbage can find its way into the streets; the lid closes tightly so as to shut off all foul odors. If these carts were used, scavengers could be given longer hours for making their delivery at the crematory.

# BACTERIA FOUND ON CITY STREETS.

Microscopic examination has demonstrated that plates exposed at the curbs were more heavily laden with Micro organism than ones exposed six feet above the curb. This accounts for the greater susceptibility of infants than adults to diseases of zymotic origin. Obviously unclean streets are very unsafe play-grounds for small children. Street and sidewalk sweeping creates air currents which pick up the dust and dirt and foul the air; it disseminates the dust and germs. In my opinion adequate and copious flushing, as done in some Eastern cities is the only method which effectually cleanses and minimizes the organisms on them.

### BACTERIA IN MILK.

An investigation conducted during the past summer by the Rockafeller Institute for Medical Research, found that when cows were kept under the best condition in clean stables and carefully groomed, the milk taken immediately cooled below 40 degrees F., and kept at that temperature during transit, contained from 10,000 to 100,000 bacteria in each teaspoonful. Certain milk brought from groceries of the tenement districts yielded as high as 600,000,000 bacteria in each teaspoonful. The grave danger, but their presence in great quantities indicates uncleanlarge cities, has become a great problem, particularly during the hot quality of milk used. The above figures explain the necessity of milk inspection.

Murrain, a common disease among cattle, is in reality tuberculogis.

and the sale of milk from such cows should be prohibited. It is not advisable to drink unboiled milk, unless it can be obtained from an absolutely reliable source.

#### FOOD INSPECTION.

Portland is still possessing the distinction as a city of modern progress that does without food inspectors. The ingestion of unwholesome food is a known source of many of our most fatal diseases, and it should be an important branch of the work of a municipal health department to render impossible the offering for sale of food products that are not pure and fresh.

This vital subject should also receive the attention of state officials, and safeguards taken, that would make less the possibility of foodstuffs being sold that are in any way contaminated.

Some dairymen use preservaline to keep their milk sweet. Unscrupulous butchers use potato flour and freezene to keep meat and fish during the summer months. These preparations are mixtures of boracic acid, and the use and sale of these deathly poisons should be prohibited.

We have no city chemist, and with the present working force of this office, these important matters can receive but little attention.

To carry on work effectively, it must be done in a thorough and systematic manner. This would require about three inspectors to devote their entire time to the inspection and examination of foodstuffs. All articles of food that are taken into the system without being cooked, such as milk, butter, cheese, fruits, etc., should be carefully examined, not merely an ocular but a chemical and microscopic examination should be made if deemed necessary by the inspector.

# Plumbing Inspector

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Portland, Oregon:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the annual report of the plumbing inspector's department for the year ending December 31, 1902.

During the past year there has been a great increase of new buildings in this city; the work has been principally resident buildings, and remodeling of old buildings; the extension of the public sewers have greatly increased the work in this department.

To the efficiency with which the duties of this department are performed does the general health of the city and community depend, for when such have poor drainage, the air of the city is more or less contaminated with foul gases emanating from defective sewers, and house drains. When these escaping gases find entrance into the dwellings from unsanitary construction, there is a lowering or the vitality of the inmates of such dwellings, and a consequent increase of sickness from their inability, as a result of such weakness, to successfully resist exposure to contagion. Pure air is just as necessary for the enjoyment of bodily vigor, as pure food and water. The following statements cannot be refuted. That health is of the highest importance to the welfare and prosperity of a community; that contagious and infectious diseases which arise from unsanitary plumbing and drainage are the most costly and disastrous calamities both to business interests and personal health (to which mankind is exposed). That diseases from sewer gas frequently results fatally there is no question. The maintaining of privy vaults within the city limits is declared a public nuisance, they are epidemic breeders, and intolerable nuisances and should be banished. In the past the only means this department has had in which to ind where such nuisances were located, has been through complaints made by citizens, and in this way often found on property which has been for years within the limits of a sewer. In order to locate and remove such nuisances from all parts of the city. I would recommend the an inspection be made of every lot and block in the city.

Your honorable body are to be commended for the aid you have given in granting petitions for lateral sewers upon the application of one property owner where the same was shown to be needed, and trust you will not relax in your efforts until every part of the city B properly supplied with sewers.

There are other parts of the city, such as Brooklyn, where it B found impossible to construct cesspools in the greater part of this district; on sinking for cesspools, we find it impossible to reach grand on account of (so much) surface water which drains from the bight localities, which the lower sections have to contend with, leaving 10 way to dispose of the drainage and sewerage in this thickly settle district, where these property owners have endeavored to construct cesspools, it is found during the rainy season, these cesspools become full of water and overflow so frequently, that the property becomes a burden on the owner. We have been called to the various parts of this district repeatedly to investigate cellars on account of foul older arising from seepage water which finds its way into the basements buildings. Some parties have gone to a great expense to remedy this but it has proved to be a fruitless experiment. I would recomment that this district be sewered as soon as possible. Cesspools and pit vaults cannot be condemned too strongly; they are the most proli cause of disease, and should be dispensed with at the earliest possible date; that where filth accumulates disease breeds, as is proven by the fact that the large majority of contagious and in fectious diseases and reported from the districts where sewerage is yet unprovided.

During the past year the department has only had two inspectors to respond to the calls for inspection of Plumbing and drainage; as our city covers a territory of forty square miles, each inspector has had as area of twenty square miles to look after. This is too large an area to inspect the work in a thorough manner, and insure the protection of the public for which this deportment was instituted. I herewith sumit a tabulated report of the work done during the past year:

There will also be required new material in the shape of alarm boxes and line construction in the fire alarm telegraph service. The rapid growth of our city, with extensive business improvements in all directions requires that additional facilities for the protection of property be added to the department's service, and if the estimate submitted for 1903 is allowed, or provisions made to secure the amount asked for, the City of Portland will rank second to none in fire protection.

To the Monorable the Board of Fire Commissioners, Portland, Oregon:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting herewith my annual report of the operation of the Fire Department, during the year ending December 31, 1902, being the twentieth year of the Paid Fire Department of the City of Portland.

# ORGANIZATION AND EQUIPMENT.

The Fire Department as now constituted, under the control of your honorable body, consists of:

One chief engineer. One assistant chief engineer. Two district engineers. One secretary. One fire alarm repair man. One superintendent of fire alarm telegraph. One hydrant man. Seven steam fire engine companies, manned by sixty men. Four chemical engine companies, manned hy ten men. Four hook and ladder truck companies, manned by thirty-four men. Five hose companies, manned by twenty-six men. Total 138 men. Sixty-three horses. Three reserve engines, all in good condition. One reserve hook and ladder truck, "Hayes" fourth-class, in good condition. One two-wheeled hose cart, in poor condition.

Two supply wagons and one battery.

# AUXILIARY VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANIES.

Our Fire Department is supplemented by the following volunteer fire companies in suburban districts, to which we have furnished respectively, hose reels and a village truck, with the following amounts of hose:

Fulton Park Hose Company-One hose reel and 500 feet of rubber hose.

Sellwood Hose Company—One hose reel and 500 feet of rubber hose, together with one volunteer aerial hook and ladder truck, equipped with four Babcocks.

Multnomah Hose Company-One hose reel and 00 feet of rubber hose.

Portland Heights Hose Company-One hose mel and 600 feet of rubber hose.

# FIRE HOSE IN SERVICE.

In the Paid Fire Department we have 22,000 feet of cotton rubberlined hose and 1,400 feet of rubber hose. In addition to this we have in the auxiliary fire companies as above a total of 2,700 feet of rubber hose, making a grand total of 26,100 feet of hose in actual service.

# RECOMMENDATIONS.

Under this head, I desire to offer the following recommendations, trusting they may receive your consideration and approval. For the proper protection of our city, I recommend the installation of: Two engine companies.

One truck company.

One water tower.

One fire boat.

Three thousand feet of 21/2-inch cotton hose.

Twenty-two hundred feet of 11/2-inch cotton hose.

One fuel wagon, kept loaded with coal, supplied with swinging harness would greatly improve the service.

I would recommend that the question of having the Water Department set all fire hydrants, said hydrants afterward to be under charge of Fire Department, be presented to the Honorable, the Board of Watef Commissioners. This service can be performed more economically by them, than by us, at all times, and particularly in cases where hydrants can be set at the time water mains are being laid.

I cannot refrain from renewing my oft made recommendation that the Fortland Fire Department should be full paid, instead of adhering to the part call system.

In closing this report, I desire to tender my thanks to His Honor, Mayor Williams, the Council, City Auditor, City Treasurer and the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners for the active interest they have manifested in all matters pertaining to the success of the department. I desire also to thank the Chief of police and the members of his force for the manner in which they have assisted this department in the discharge of its duties on all occasions. I also desire to express my thanks to the secretary, and officers and members of the Fire Department for faithful performance of duty and hearty co-operation in improving the discipline and work of the department.

# Superintendent Fire Alarm Delegraph

#### Portland, Oregon, December 31, 1902.

To the Honorable Fire Commissioners, City of Portland, Oregon-

Gentlemen: The annual reports for 1900 and 1901 consisted principally of epitomes of the defects in the Fire Alarm Telegraph System. The conditions have become so serious that I would like to call your attention to those reports and in this report discuss the subject still further, for the failures in the operation of the system during this year have arisen from the same causes that then existed. When it is remembered that each year shows an increasing number of calls and that each additional call means an incressed probability of failure in the operation of the automatic fire alarm apparatus, and the growth of the city constantly increases the danger of great conflagrations, it will readily be appreciated that the Fire Alarm System, upon which the whole department depends, should be kept abreast of the increased demands made on it. That the necessity for improvement may be shown, it is necessary to show the defects that exist. In this, as in all automatic fire alarm systems, the danger that two boxes will be pulled in at the same time and on the same circuit and that they will interfere with each other, thereby causing the call to be lost or incorrectly received, is always present; and the probability that this will occur increases vastly more rapidly than the number of calls. This is the great and principal source of failure, and has manifested itself time and again in this fire alarm system, and if it is not removed, sooner or later the loss of a call will inevitably cause a disastrous conflagration. An attempt has been made to prevent the boxes from interfering with each other, by equipping the majority of them with so-called "Non-interfering devices." These devices are inherently inadequate, for should the non-interfering devices work properly when two boxes are pulled simultaneously, one box or the other will be cut out and the call therefrom will be lost, instead of both calls being received. If they do not work properly, the boxes will interfere with each other and the calls from both will be lost. The impossibility of giving these devices, scattered over at least thirty square miles of territory, close and constant supervision introduces such an element of unreliability that from this cause they become a menace. The records kept for the last four years show that these devices have caused more calls to be lost than they have caused to be properly transmitted. Should two boxes be pulled simultaneously and on different circuits, the automatic "Non-interfering repeater" will cause one box or the other to be cut out and the call therefrom will be lost. I trust that I have made it plain that the system as a whole is inherently inadequate, aside from any defects in construction or lack of care on the part of those who are responsible for its operation, inasmuch as there are no provisions made for receiving more than one call at a time. At present it is necessary for a box to transmit its number slowly, so that it may be counted by the "call men." To avoid delay, the apparatus responds to the first call from the box, unless the call received is obviously incorrect. There have been many instances where false runs have been made, becaus the first call from a box has been incorrectly received, and there have been other instances where apparatus has remained at home from the same cause, the men paying no attention to the second, third or fourth calls. This is another inherent defect, for it is impossible to build infallible machinery and no matter what care is exercised, it is impossible to produce absolute reliability. It might be stated as a fundamental principle in fire alarm telegraph work that all calls from a

box should be received before the department responds. When cities have reached such a size as Portland has done these difficulties become a serious menace; the practice is to do away with all so-called non-interfering devices, place the boxes on one set of circuits, the bells, whistles, house gongs, etc., on another set of circuits. To prevent interferences, no two contiguous hoxes are placed on the same cir-

cuit: each circuit is separately attached to a register in the central office, and an operator placed in charge, whose duty it is to receive the calls, rectify any errors and transmitthem to the department on both bell and box circuits. By this method as many separate calls can be simultaneously received as there are "box circuits." That this method may be as rapid as the one in which the department responds to the first call from the box, it is necessary to run the boxes at from four to eight times the speed employed in Portland, and that the companies may receive all the calls from a box before responding, each engine house is supplied with a "box circuit" register, as well as the slow time gongs and indicators. An attempt has recently been made to produce these same results by substituting automatic machinery in the place of an operator. To do this each box is supplied, in the place of the present non-interfering device, with a "Non-interfering succession" device. This is a device which is supposed to prevent two hoxes from interfering with each other, when pulled simultaneously, and to cause the hoxes to successively send in their calls, thereby producing a system capable of receiving two or three calls simultaneously, according to a certain time element in the succession device. The central office is supplied with a machine known as a "transformer." This machine automatically receives the calls from the hoxes at a high speed and transmits them to the "bell circuits" at a low speed. Aside from the great difference in cost of equipment for the automatic method, I believe that the "Non-interfering succession devices" are open to the same great objection that our present non-interfering devices are, namely, the impossibility of giving them that care and supervision that will insure reliability. There are at least thirty-five old boxes in service that are worthless, heing unreliable in the highest degree; nor is it worth while to attempt to repair them, for they were built nearly thirty years ago and it would cost more to place them in proper condition than new boxes can be purchased for. At least one hundred boxes should be installed in addition to the present boxes, as that many would only supply present needs; however, before this is done the present system should be remodeled in such a manner that the inherent defects will be eradicated. I submit you approximate estimates for remodeling the system by either method:

# MANNUAL METHOD.

It will be noticed that the cost of changing to a "Succession" systen is \$20,350 00, while the cost of changing to the Mannual system is \$11,315.00; a difference in favor of the Mannual system of \$9,005.00. It Will also be noticed that the difference in the cost of 100 additional boxes is \$5,000.00, making a total difference in cost of \$14,035.00.

By the time these are installed, this, together with the interest it would earn, would maintain operators for years to come, and as the operators are needed for the telephone service, as well as the Fire Alarm Telegraph service, I must recommend and urge that the present Automatic Fire Alarm System be converted into a Mannual System, and that one hundred additional boxes be added to the present equipment, practically as herein set forth, and that operators be employed to care for both the Fire Alarm Telegraph and the telephone service.
