#### **Overview**

- Portland Children's Levy ("PCL") is a local option property tax measure
- Grew out of a need to increase opportunities for all Portland's children and youth
- First passed in 2002; overwhelmingly renewed by voters 3 times
- 83% of voters approved the 2018 renewal
- Invests \$23 million annually in proven programs
- Tax rate = \$0.4026 (4.062¢) per \$1,000
- Currently funds 91 programs for children from birth thru 24
- Administrative costs limited to 5%; audited annually



#### **Mission**

The Portland Children's Levy strives to:

- Change the trajectory of the disparities in outcomes for children and youth navigating poverty and children and youth of color
- By supporting community-based programs that help:
  - Prepare children for school,
  - Support them to be successful in and out of school, and
  - Eliminate racial and ethnic disparities in child and youth outcomes.



#### **PCL Governance**

- 5-Member Allocation Committee sets policy and oversees implementation
- All grants recommended by Allocation Committee are reviewed and approved by City Council
- Grants are made through a competitive process
- Grant performance metrics include number of people served, level of service, participation and participant outcomes, alignment with PCL mission

## PROGRAMS&GRANTEES

#### **Programs**


- Currently **funds 91 programs** for children and youth, from birth through age 24, in *six program areas*
- Program services include:
  - Home visiting for young children and their parents
  - Therapeutic classrooms and respite care for stressed families
  - After-school tutoring and enrichment
  - Caring adult mentorship that provides group and 1:1 support for youth
  - College and career transition support for foster youth
  - Daily access to nutritious food



### **Community-Based Agencies**

- Supports more than 45 community-based agencies including:
  - Ethiopian and Eritrean Cultural Resource Center
  - Elevate Oregon
  - Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization
  - Latino Network
  - Lifeworks NW
  - Metropolitan Family Service
  - Native American Youth and Family Center
  - Self Enhancement, Inc.
- PCL-funded programs support 750+ jobs at community-based agencies.
- Many PCL grantees provide **first employment experiences** for parents and youth who were once program participants.










### **POPULATIONS SERVED**

### **Populations Served**

- Average of 10,000 children served annually (non-hunger relief)
  - 75-80% identify as Black, Indigenous or children/youth of color
  - 35-40% live/go to school in East Portland
  - 40-45% from homes where primary language is not English
- 12,000-17,000 children and families receive *hunger relief services*




### **Population Served: Race/Ethnicity**

**OUTCOMES** 

#### **Outcomes, 2021-22**

Program Area	Results for some Common Outcomes		
Early Childhood	87% of children met expected developmental milestones.		
Early Childhood	91% of children not on track with developmental milestone(s) referred for additional support.		
Early Childhood	97% of parents/caregivers met parenting goals.		
Child Abuse Prev.& Interv.	86% of parents met parenting practice goals.		
Child Abuse Prev.& Interv.	86% of parents reported increased safety and stability.		



#### **Outcomes, 2021-22**

Program Area	Results for some Common Outcomes		
Foster Care	96% of youth met academic goals.		
Foster Care	100% of youth met positive youth development goals.		
After School	95% of children & youth met youth development outcomes.		
Mentoring	97% of youth met school engagement outcomes.		
Small Grants	92% of youth met academic goals.

### **Community Engagement**

#### PCL Response to Community Feedback:

- Created small grants fund to improve equitable access to Levy funding for smaller organizations with barriers to applying for PCL grants
- Created 12-member Community Council to advise staff and Allocation Committee on community engagement practice, policy and funding
  - Volunteers for this Committee represent and have experience with PCL-served communities:
    - BIPOC
    - LGBTQIA+
    - Children and youth with disabilities
    - Houseless families, and
    - Families experiencing poverty and food insecurity

# **PCL Historical Budget Data**

#### Funds Raised v. Grants Awarded

- Before a competitive funding round, City economist projects revenues for the grant period.
- Fund balance can accrue when revenues exceed projections, and/or grant budgets are not fully expended.
- Grant contracts are paid on a reimbursement basis; staffing shortages impact grant spending.
- Before the 2019-20 funding round, the full fund balance accrued to date was added to projected revenues for allocation in the funding round.
- The pandemic-related staffing shortages impacted grant spending in FY 2021 and 2022 which resulted in fund balance declining more slowly.



# 5-Year Priorities & Long-Term Financial Outlook

- Revenues include an allocation from the Parks Levy to PCL to offset increased compression of PCL
- Levy revenues are projected to be sufficient to meet current grant commitments and projected 2year renewal grants through 2024-2025, assuming voter renewal of PCL
- Upon voter renewal, PCL resources should be sufficient to maintain current program investment levels over next 5 years.



#### **Post-Pandemic Need is Great**

- Children and youth struggled to maintain academic achievement, school attendance, social skills and connections and mental health during the pandemic
- Additional factors of increased houselessness and increased community violence add to disruptions in education
- Post-pandemic, children and youth need community support more than ever
