This course was selected for its unique ability to offer live fire training that meets NFPA standards 472, 1072, 1405, and 1005. This facility offers live fire training and uses actual flammable liquids, a real-life training compared to trainings that only offer propane fueled live fire training. The use of actual flammable liquids in these live fire training scenarios gives the students actual "real life" experience not only with the fire behavior but how the Purple-K dry chemical agent and foam extinguishing agents work against these fires. All other propane fueled training facilities give the students a false sense of unrealistic fire behavior and extinguishing agent capabilities. Due to environmental concerns training of this kind is not offered in the Pacific NW; the LBM does not have training opportunities to use specialized extinguishing agents. Live fire trainings at TEEX using these agents will increase proficiency and firefighter safety. The 3 day training will certify 3 members and re-certify 12. This training meets the Oregon DPSST training requirements for Land Based Marine Firefighting and some requirements for Hazmat awareness and operations level certification.

Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project. Waivers When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements.
