The application for 4/10/76, the North American Arms 22 Cal. rev. showed an address of 3014 - 18th NE Port. This would show that the individual signing the form was unfamiliar with the street designations in Portland. The application signed on 7/8/75 showed the address of 1963 W. Burnside, #302, Portland, Oregon. The owner of Nick's Gun Shop is currently out of town and we were unable to interview him.

Using the alias, Nancy Jane Whitnack, we cross-referenced that with a Michelle Whitnack from Seattle, Washington. Michelle Whitnack is a member of the Left Bank Book Collective Organization in Seattle, Washington. This organization gives support to the George Jackson Brigade, however, they are not known to participate in the activities of the George Jackson Brigade.

Contact has been made with the Motor Vehicles Division and we will be receiving a certified copy of Sharon Smith's driving application for handwriting samples. All information is being forwarded to appropriate law enforcement agencies.

Received information concerning the January 1977 attempted jail break from Folsom Prison. During the attempted jail break, a vehicle was parked outside the prison walls in which the prisoners were to escape in. Inside the vehicle was found three sets of male clothing and two 12 guage shotguns. Tracing the shotguns, it was found that they were purchased in Portland, Oregon, GI Joes, one, the main store located on North Vancouver and the other, GI Joes, Beaverton Branch. The guns were sold to the above mentioned subject, Sharon Virginia Smith, who also purchased a Walters 9mm P38 and a North American Arms 22 Caliber 8 shot revolver from Nicks Guns. The Walter 9mm P38 was the weapon seized in the Folsom Prison, and reports were that the 22 Caliber had been flushed down the toilet prior to the search of Folsom Prison cells. At this time ATF is contacting the GI Joes in attempting to obtain the gun registration sales form.

On 7/7/77, proceeded to the Freeway Hotel, located at 1963 E. Burnside with ATF Special Agent Vance Johnson. At the Freeway Hotel we made contact with the manager, Roger Castle, who allowed us to look at the past registration records of the Freeway Hotel. In checking through the records, we found a registration card in the name of Sharon Smith, address of 167 Madison Street, Eugene, Oregon, dated 7/8/75, for room number 302. On the back of the card was noted from 7/8/75 to 7/15/75, check out of 7/15/75. SA Johnson seized the card as evidence and issued a property receipt to Mr. Castle. A photostatic copy was made for us. The handwriting on the card appeared to match the handwriting that was on the gun receipts for the 9mm and 22 Cal. revolver.

SA Johnson will keep us informed of his findings, we will attempt to contact Folsom Prison, LT. Johnson in an attempt to receive further details.

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# Folsom Escape Plot Told— Gun, Knives Found Inside

### Remiro Held In Isolation

### By George Draper

Joseph Remiro, one of two convicted assassins of Oakland schools superintendent Marcus Foster, is being held under supersecurity at Folsom prison as a suspect in a mass escape plot, The Chronicle learned yesterday.

The 29-year-old charter member of the Symbionese Liberation Army has been held in isolation since June 4, after a 9-mm automatie pistol and 28 rounds of ammuniion were found in a cell near his.

A subsequent shakedown of the prison's Building No. 1, where Remiro is serving a life term for the Foster killing, turned up 17 prisonmade knives.

Neither Associate Warden Stewart Potter nor officials of the State Department of Corrections would say who had the gun when it was found or how it got inside the maximum security institution.

It was learned, however, that the gun was found in the cell of Bobby Augustus Davis, 36, who is serving four consecutive life terms for killing four Highway Patrolmen in 1970 in Los Angeles county.

In response to questions, Potter said Remiro "associated" with Davis in the prison yard and lived fairly close to him on the same tier of Building No. 1.

Botb Remiro and Davis have histories of attempted escape.

Remiro and his co-assassin, Russell Little, jumped two deputies in the Alameda county jail on March 1, 1975. They gouged the eye of one deputy, permanently impairing his eyesight, and jammed a pencil into the throat of the other.

Davis, who appeared as a witness for Remiro at the latter's escape trial in San Jose last year, has been caught three times with hacksaw blades while in prison.

On one occasion in 15. Davis was x-rayed at Folsom and found to have ten pieces of hacksaw blades in his lower gastro-intestinal tract.

Officials were obviously shaken by the discovery of the automatic pistol and ammunition cached deep inside Folsom, the state's most secure prison.

"This is the first time in Folsom's history," Associate Warden Potter said yesterday, "that a gun has been smuggled inside."

It was learned that the gun reached the prison several weeks before it was found. Potter said no <u>Back Page Col. 5</u>

guards are suspected of helping to smuggle the gun in.

Potter was reluctant to talk about any visitors Davis, Remiro or Kennth Como, another of Remiro's prison associates, may have had in recent weeks.

"It's safe to say they've had visitors," Potter said, "but I don't want to give out the visitors' names. That might jeopardize the investlgation."

Como, who is also being held in solitary since the gun find, is serving time for stealing guns in a 1971 plot to free convicted mass murderer Charles Manson.

The Folsom gun and ammunition were found after a tip in the form of a note was slipped to a guard. But when Potter was asked to describe the exact place where the gun was found, he replied:

"When we got it, it wasn't secreted. That's all I'll say. I don't want to jeopardize anybody's life." Potter said that had the escape plot been hatched the escapers armed with the gun and knives would still have had some difficult obstacles to cross.

Their cell tier in Building No. 1, he said, was under surveillance by an armed guard in a gun gallery while outside the building there are two armed perimeters that would have had to be crossed.

The last time a gun was smuggled into one of California's large prisons was in 1971 when Attorney Stephen Bingham, carrying a tape recorder or briefcase, entered San Quentin to see prison militant George Jackson.

Jackson allegedly returned to the prison's adjustment center from the visit with a 9-mm automatic. In the violence that quickly followed three guards were killed, as were two inmates, including Jackson.

Bingham disappeared but is still being sought on various charges, including murder.

## Found In Cell Folsom Escape Pløt, Gun Linked

A Symbionese Liberation Army assassin, a Manson clan member and a mass police killer are under investigation at Folsom Prison as suspects in an escape plot which was thwarted when a gun was found in one of their cells.

The three are SLA member Joseph Remiro, convicted of the 1974 assassination of Oakland schools superintendent Marcus Foster; Kenneth Como, serving time for stealing guns in a 1971 conspiracy to free convicted mass slayer Charles Manson, and Bobby Augustus Davis, convicted of the 1970 murders of four California Highway Patrol officers in Los Angeles.

The three were housed in a prison unit for escape-prone inmates when the gun was found June 4.

Sources close to the investigations have confirmed that the .9 millimeter automatic pistol and 28 rounds of ammunition were found in Davis' cell the night before an escape attempt was to have taken place.

Prison officials were tipped to the existence of a gun by a note from another inmate who has not been identified.

The discovery marked the first

time a gun has been found in a state prison since George Jackson's alleged escape attempt at San Quentin in 1971. Jackson, three other prisoners and three guards were killed in the ensuing melee, which officials say resulted from a gun being smuggled to Jackson by attorney Stephen Bingham:

One report under investigation in the Folsom incident is that the gun was smuggled in on a prison delivery truck with outside help. Officials will say only that no prison employes were involved.

Folsom associate warden Stewart Potter said today Remiro, Como and Davis are among 10 men still in security lockup as a result of the gun incident. Seventeen were originally in lockup, he said, and another is expected to be released this week.

The 1,800-inmate maximum security prison was locked down for several days during a search for weapons after the gun was found. Seventeen prison-made knives were discovered, but officials did not consider that to be a large number. Potter said the bulk of the inmate population was "very cooperative" during the search.

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# Times \$/31/76 Brigade deserves respect, say leftists

While members of the Left Bank Collective have disagreed with the George Jackson Brigade and some of its actions, the members say the brigade is a group of "serious revolutionaries who have the right to be respected as such," a spokesman for the collective said today.

Paul Zilsel, a veteran activist in Seattle's left, said the brigade --which has claimed responsibility for an attempted bank robbery January 23 and the bloody "rescue" of a man charged with the robbery has the right to have its activities placed in the proper political context of a revolutionary act against the ruling class.

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Zilsel said the collective received a photocopy of the brigade's latest communique in yesterday's mail, postmarked from Seattle.

A Bellevue radio station, KZAM, also received a copy of the communique yesterday, including a corrective dental device supposedly removed from the mouth of John Sherman.

SHERMAN ESCAPED March 10 with the aid of an accomplice. The accomplice seriously wounded a county policeman who had accom-panied Sherman to Harborview Medical Center for further treatment of a mouth wound Sherman suffered in a shootout at the Tukwila Branch of the Pacific National. Bank of Washington.

Two other men, Edward Allen Mead and Mark Edwin Cook, are charged with the attempted robbery and are in custody in the King County jail. A fourth suspect, Bruce Seidel, was killed during the gun battle with police.

Previously, the collective, which runs a bookstore in the Pike Place Market, criticized the brigade for the September 18 bombing of a Capitol Hill Safeway supermarket in which several persons were injured.

That bombing was three days after Ralph Patrick Ford, who worked at the collective, was killed at the same Safeway when a bomb he apparently was arming detonated prematurely.

The brigade, in an earlier communique, said the September 18 bombing was in retaliation for Ford's death and the capture of Patricia Hearst and Bill and Emily Harris.

THE COLLECTIVE said Ford was considering the safety of people when he attempted to place the bomb late at night "so that only mechanical equipment could be damaged."

Zilsel said the collective still is likely to disagree with some of the brigade's actions, but he said the collective is "plad" the terrorist band found shilter from law-enforcement officials pursuing them.

The collective, which has also been active in a group opposing a

federal grand jury probe into the January 23 attempted bank robbery, also urged people not to cooperate with the inquiry, Zilsel said.

The brigade said Sherman, Mead and Seidel were members of the group. It promised to "retaliate" for Seidel's death.

But the group's latest communique has marked the first time any members have been identified.

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## Grand jury may see evidence, judge rules

#### By ROSS ANDERSON

United States Distict Judge Morell E. Sharp ruled yesterday that guns, radical literature and the makings for crude bombs siezed by police at a Capitol Hill apartment in June can be presented to a federal grand jury.

The occupants of the apartment, Helene Ellenbogen, Paul Zilsel and Wayne Parker, had contended that Seattle police entered illegally, and asked that the items be returned.

Judge Sharp, however, said evidence showed that officers acted legally and properly when they forced their way into the apartment while searching for an auto thief June 20.

He said he believed the officers,

who said they had heard of bombthreats for July 4 celebrations, and believed there might be a connection when they saw several weapons, including a shotgun and a rifle capable of being converted to an automatic weapon.

Police said they immediately dropped the search for the car thief and searched the apartment, turning up boxes full of radical literature, gunpowder, fuse and other items which could be made into crude bombs.

The three occupants were arrested and taken to the police station, but never were charged.

The United States Attorney's office wants to present the material to a grand jury investigating radical bombings, but has withheld the evidence pending a ruling on the police entry.

Judge Sharp's ruling opens the door to the grand jury. A spokesman for the United States attorney said the evidence will be presented soon. Judge Sharp emphasized that there is no law against "being a radical revolutionary," but that police in this case had reason to believe they were looking at possible criminal activity.





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U.S. Returns Guns Seized In Apartment

Several guns seized in the search of a Capitol Hill apartment last June have quietly been returned by federal authorities.

The government said experts determined that the weapons — including a short-barreled shotgun, a .30-caliber rifle and several handguns — fall within legal limits.

The weapons were, returned to Paul Zilsel, Helene Ellenbogen and Richard Wayne Parker, who had contended the weapons were taken by police officers why searched the apartmen illegally last June 2' while in pursuit of an auto-theft suspect.

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20th started out like every other long and boring day in the Seattle City Jail. But it got worse, and then better, in a hurry.

As things stood, she faced another 12 months inside. warning, six federal marshalls dragged her out of her cell, choked her into unconsciousness, and forcibly took her prints and mugshot. The prosecutor's office issued a press release saying that the prints were obtained "without injury to the prisoner," and then went on to state that the evidence would be compared to prints taken from an

"Why did they let me out just before Christmas? I don't know," says Whitnack. "I'd like to say it was because of the big public campaign around my case, and their embarrassment at having me in jail, and they were looking for a face-saving way out, but that would be speculation.

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"All I know is they picked a day when both my lawyers were out of town and the magistrate and the back marched when would have stopped the forcible fingerprinting, were on vacation."

Whitnack points out as well' that the reference to the unexploded bomb doesn't make much sense since it would have been more logical to keep her in jail until the comparison of prints had been completed."

The press release by the prosecutor's office was, in fact, part of a continuing official campaign to discredit the Seattle Left among the general population by creating an aura of criminality around political activists.

T<sup>L</sup> grand jury is ostensibly probing the ties of the George Jackson Brigade, a clandestine group that pulled off six political bombings, a bungled bank robbery and a successful jailbreak during 1975 and 1976. (The courthouse bomb has been claimed by the New World Liberation Front, based in the San Francisco Bay area.)

That wasn't the first time the prosecutor had attempted to discredit Whitnack when she refused to give in to his threats. Months earlier, he had announced that he had discovered a housewife who claimed to have seen a woman vaguely fitting Whitnack's description lodged in a tree near a suburban power station that was bombed the next day.

Whitnack recalls: "When I first heard about this housewife's statement, I ran up to Ed Mead (a GJB member then and now in

h), and I said to him, 'Ed, I wouldn't ask you this if I didn't need to know, but was there anybody who looked like me in the Laurehurst bombing?'

"He told me, 'nope, there were no women involved.' Now, since then, friends have gone to look at the tree and they have told me there was no reason to climb the tree to see the power station, and that only one tree thereabouts would hold my weight -I'm neither slender nor athletic — and it lacks branches for its first ten feet."

To this date, Whitnack has yet to be charged for either the Laurelhurst or the courthouse bomb. But the guilt-by-association tactic has had some success in splitting the Seattle Coalition against Grand Jury abuse by driving a wedge between those who give critical support to armed struggle and those who oppose it out of principle or

The Left Bank Book Collective (of which Whitnack is a member), the main antiauthoritian voice in the area, has quit the coalition rather than stifle its outspoken critical support of the GJB. The move to muzzle Left Bank came not from the nervous liberals, but from the Leninists, many of whom are Weather Underground Organization camp-followers who were peddling the WUO's mass party-building line at the time.

Whitnack herself has been critical of those GJB actions which endangered innocent people — like the bombing of a Safeway during business hours.

"Except for the Safeway action, I would rate the GJB's actions as good to real good," she says. "The real good was breaking out John Sherman (GJB member) who was in a The authorities decided to make; an, example and a warning of Whitnack after six months of failure in their witchhunt. Every witness, with only one minor exception, has steadfastly refused to talk to the FBI or the grand jury.

In all, 11 individuals have been subpoenaed, many of whom have only marginal connection to the Left or underground scenes. Four of those subpoened have been single mothers with very young children — an obvious attempt to intimidate a vulnerable group. Police search-and-seize raids on people's homes have followed the same random pattern.

Despite its internal conflicts, the Grand Jury Coalition has mounted an effective campaign, including fairly favorable coverage in the news media and energetic intervention by the National Lawyers' Guild.

"Our basic line is 'Co-operating with the State is like eating potato chips — once you start, you can't stop," says Whitnack.

"They (the authorities) have it in their minds that there's one big conspiracy going on. I think it's more comforting for them to think it's coming from some sort of central command than that folks are acting, independently."

#### Safeway Bombing

Whitnack was subpoened because of her friendship with Ralph "Po" Ford, a Left Bank member who was killed in late 1975 when a bomb he was attempting to place in a closed Safeway blew up prematurely. (The GJB Safeway bombing came in response to Po's death.)

She had lived in Seattle about two years, and before that lived in Sacramento, where prisoners' struggles in Folsom and San' Quentin,

After she went to jail herself, the grand jury offensive seemed to stall, probably because of the adverse publicity over the jailing. Since July, there have been no new subpoenas, although the grand jury continues to sit.

But that's not all; as soon as she went inside, Whitnack got busy helping organize a propaganda barrage about the lack of health care facilities in the jail. When, as a result, she was transferred to the Tacoma jail in punishment, the Seattle women prisoners staged a hunger strike to demand her return. She finally made it back, but mainly because of the string-pulling of her lawyer.

Now that she's out, Whitnack has to try to pick up the pieces of her totally-disrupted personal life. She had been sharing a house with Laurie Raymond (sister of Jill Raymond, who spent 17 months in jail resisting the Lexington, Kentucky, grand jury), and Laurie's two young children. But now Raymond is in jail and could remain there untilsummer on two convictions: destroying federal property at the Trident nuclear submarine base, and "assaulting" six marshalls at Whitnack's contempt hearing. Raymond's two children are temporarily staying with friends.

"My immediate priorities are to settle my home life and to transform my defense committee, Deep Freeze Life Support Systems (P.O. Box 12497, Seattle, Washington 98111), into a defense committee for Laurie," says Whitnack.

"Was six months in jail worth it? You bet it was. The thing they didn't realize was when my energy runs out, my stubbornness \* ÷



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The June 7th issue of the Northwest Passage contained an article arguing ac t the need for clandestine urban guerilla activities in the United States such as have been carried out recently in Seattle by the George Jackson Brigade. We believe that the article was rife with confused definitions and analysis, and that it neither reflected any understanding of the historical nature and role of armed struggle, nor an understanding of the unique conditions in the advanced industrial nations at this time. We would like to present another viewpoint, in support of armed a mons. by revolutionaries now, as an important aspect of the development of the revolutionary movement.

At the outset, we feel it is necessary to define armed struggle and terrorism in a radically different way than was suggested in the NWP. Armed struggle is not of necessity a mass uprising, but rather inby police agents posing as revolutionaries, to discredit the principled ac' of guerillas. The state would like people to see an acts of insurgency as "terrorism" bur revolutions around the world have consistently made the distinction between revolutionary violence against the ruling class, and the terrorism of random violence employed by the state against the people.

It would be nice if acts of "terrorism" never occurred on the left, but obviously on occassions they have. The G.J.B.'s bombing of Safeway last fall was such an action, coming out of their rage at the death of a guerrilla in Seattle, and the capture of the S.L.A. in California. It was not defensible; but mistakes are made in the development of an armed insurgency, and the fact is that the G.J.B. has publicly criticized themselves for the action, and learned from it. When was the last time you heard a police agency apologize for its acts of terror against the people?

cludes a whole spectrum of militant resistance to the ruling class, including bombings, armed occupations of buildings and land (such as Attica, Wounded Knee and Menominee), prisoner breakouts, armed robbery, kidnapping, assassination, assaults on police and military installations, etc. Armed struggle, as carried out by left revolutionaries, may use the same spectrum of tactics here in Seattle as in Latin America, Europe, Palestine, or Vietnam, with the central proviso that the revolutionary must always make concern for the welfare of innocent people a vital part of the planning and execution of actions.

"Terrorism", in its pejorative sense, is armed action which deliberately or callously ignores the welfare of the people, and is not focused on the groups and individuals against which the actor is fighting. It is primarily a right-wing phenomenon, and in addition to the institutionalized terrorism of the ruling class and its police forces, it has been carried out again and again

Given this distinction then, it is important to talk about some of the implicit assumptions behind the initiation of armed struggle. It is by now a trite truism of sectarian Marxist-Leninists that they believe that armed struggle will be necessary, but not now! This particular litany has been repeated over and over again by dogmatists since the successful revolution of 1917 in Russia, in other countries in every stage of technological davelopment, and has been proven wrong repeatedly by armed militants who were not prepared to wait for the "right time."

The rationalizations for this are extensive. In China, after the failure of the Shanghai insurrection of 1927, Mao and a small group of militants went into the countryside without the support of the Chinese Communist Party and against the declared policy of Stalin's Comintern, to begin the armed struggle. Their numbers grew almost continually as the people saw the incredible success which small groups

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One of the underlying elements of the argument against armed struggle is one which is *never* brought out in the open: fear. Undertaking clandestine illegal activities goes against lifetimes of conditioning to accept authority, at the risk of massive retaliation by the state. Facing up to our own fear openly and hon estly, and dealing with each other's fear in a loving and comradely manner goes a long way toward overcoming fear. Trying to hide our fears behind mounds of theoretical evasion and a macho front is a sure way to remain trapped in paralyzed inaction or in destructive competitive games.

Lenin once said "A revolutionary is a dead man on furlough". Any kind of activity which genuinely threatens the state and the ruling class will be met with heavy repression, and always has. People need to be able to say: "I'm willing to struggle for revolution, but such and such is just more risk than I can deal with", without shame, and without being put down in a hierarchy of "more revolutionary than thou" In doing so, they both give sanction to comrades who are taking greater risks, and keep themselves out of situations with which they are not prepared to cope.

In addition, folks need to realize that there is a wide range of illegal activity which goes into revolution, nr t all of which is as risky as carrying out a guerrilla operation. Every revolution has an underground, and not all of the people are combatants— there are technicians, writers, printers, forgers, harborers, drivers, suppliers, and a host of others. They are all equally important, and have always been done by ordinary working people, not mythical hero types. But what revolutionaries must begin to confront is that, whatever they are doing, REVOLUTION IS ILLEGAL!

#### REPRESSION AND RESISTANCE

One of the fundamental errors of the article in the NWP was in suggesting that the Brigade was responsible for the repression which the state has brought down on



the left in Seattle. In fact, the grand jury inquisition and the F.B.I.-A.F.F.-S.P.D. investigations have merely illustrated the fundamentally repressive nature of this state, and have proven that the George Jackson Brigade and other groups like them, are among the viable groups on the left.

The events in Seattle are acquainting many white radicals with the nature of police repression which the Black, Chicano, Native American, and Puerto Rican communities have lived under constantly for decades. Although single mothers are certainly entitled to special support and sympathy from the community in the face of this appalling tactic of selecting them for subpeonas, arguements blaming their plight on the Brigade ignore the fact that this repression and abuse are the status quo in other communities, and will continue until the state which sponsors these outrages is destroyed, a process from which further repression and abuse can be expected in abundance.

Another point which should be considered is why the state is taking the trouble to send dozens of agents in from across the country to track down a gooup of which.

they believe numbers about ten people. We believe the the reason is that the ruling class takes the threat which groups like the G.J.B. pose to the continued existence of the state *extremely seriously*. Furthermore, the indications are that such groups are growing, and that the state is nearly powerless to halt their activities. This fact in itself is an indication of a "base of support" in the community, and one which, if not destroyed, may grow into a permanent base of operations for the guerrillas.

(ne other argument suggested in the NWP article is that people become guerillas because they can't last in the "slow, real work which is needed to turn this country cround"; it being "relatively easy to hold up a bank, shoot police, bomb a few buildings." This is ridiculous. People like Bruce Seidel, Ed Mead, and John Sherman came from long backgrounds of doing aboveground organizing, and clearly see their armed work as a natural extension of their past work. Second Jy, to assert that robbing banks, shooting police or

whatever is "relatively easier" than aboveground work is ludicrous. It just ain't so. At best, the comparison is pointless; for the committed revolutionary aboveground and the fugitive guerilla underground, must both constantly contend with the full weight of the state arrayed against their efforts. What is 'easiest' is primarily a function of the skills of the individual and not the area of struggle in which the revolutionary is enaaged.

Finally, the entire article proceeds on the notion that there is a correct strategy for revolution which can be figured out in detail from this point in time, if we just have the correct theory. Revolution is not an absolute which exists at the end of some length of time, it is, as Marx said, a dialectical process. To assume that it can be anticipated by an enlightened few is to ignore the fact that people make history. The George Jackson Brigade, and the guerrilla movement, are of the people, and they have the right to participate in the process in the way which seems most effective for them. We support them in their decision.

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ef armed militants could have against the state. In

tham, in Laos, in Angola, Mozambique, Alger etc., the pattern of guerilla warfare has invaribly involved a very small group of fighters, outside the doctrinaire left, growing with their successes to become popular revolutionary movements. Cuba is a classic example: the armed struggle there was begun by 8 fighters, survivors of the Granma expedition, and the Cuban Popular Socialist Party (the main communist party in Cuba) denounced them continually as "adventurists" until it became clear that the guerrillas were going to win.

In other Latin American struggles, the pattern recurs. The legendary Tuparmaros (M.L.N.) of Uruquay, whose numbers were believed to be in the thousands, were begun by a group of no more than 12 people, whose first actions included theft of food trucks and food giveaways, bombing of office buildings, and a gun club robbery. The Movement of the Revolutionary Left (M.I.R.), now considered *the* resistance to Chilean fascism, was rejected by the traditional left during the Popular Unity period because of its "extremism". The People's Revolutionary Army (ERP), which is now waging outright guerilla war against the Argentine junta, began as a small urban "terrorist" organization.

Guerrilla warfare has always been initiated by small groups, from whose example other people get the idea and begin to take actions independently. Eventually the groups and individuals begin to link up, and out of growing activity and growing success a movement forms. More people join; the level of activity increases. And for those in the society not engaged in the struggle, the actions produce a change in political climate, a radical challenge to society's assumptions. Actions can be a catalyst for the personal transformation and radicalization of individuals. To fail to see revolutionary warfare as a dialectical process, growing from small to large and continually transforming the material conditions in which it operates, is to ignore the lessons of history.

The ergument that the development of armed struggle must wait until some later time when the people are at that stage simply does not hold up, under examination. We wonder if folks who have this notion have ever considered how people develop the capability to wage a revolutionary war. <u>People</u> simply do not learn these sorts of skills in the abstract against some later time when they might want to use them. The only time people have the time or the interest in developing such skills is when they are prepring to wage war immediately, or are already en gaged in it. Thus preparation and ability to carry out armed stuggle begins when people are used to fight, so that if people are ready to fight, there is no "better" time than the present.

The Red Guerrilla Family, an urban guerrilla organization which has been operating in the Bay Area since early last year, summed it up well when tuey said: We have chosen to join the armed struggle now, because there is no reason to wait. Armed struggle is not a substitute for mass struggle, out a necessary part of it. We do not claim to be leaders or followers, but simply the allies of all people who want freedom and socialism. Together, we will win.

#### WHAT ARE WE FIGHTING FOR?

The author of the NWP article clearly considers a "revolution" to be consumated by the transfer of state power from one ruling group to another. The task of aboveground "organizers" is to sell their particular brand of leadership to the "masses", to gain support and legitimacy for their particular "vanguard in seizing state power in the name of the people. While that has historically been the outcome of revolutions in the undeveloped nations, that is not what revolution in the advanced industrial nations is about,

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
