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Apologize. So my hope is that the city implements, standards for residential properties to reduce light pollution and protects it, protect its residents from faulty, excessive lighting.

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It seems that South Hillsboro has implemented some residential light trespassing standards, and I sent this over to the castle for the reference, also International Dark Sky Association they're they're also a useful resource.

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They have a fixture. Of a fixture seal of approval program which outlines lighting components, specifics based on their use and settings.

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So my hope is that eventually the city of Portland implement some light trespassing standards similar to the city of Hillsborough, so essentially, what can help me to write this?

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So the owners behind my building on that 1,664 southeast Amino Street, in Portland.

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They have floodlights which shine into the units of spring water flats, apartments, and directly into my second story unit.

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So I work to find some resolve, and I recently rented this apartment, and since then I've tried to reach out to the phoneer of the property and their property manager just share strategies to remediate the situation.

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So letters and advice on how to lessen the light intrusion

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So, going further. My hope was that after a few conversations and a letter to the owner and his property manager that they'd implement strategies, namely, installing emotion detector using amber colored lights approximately 220 kelvin using low brightness, light

Approximately 1,550 to 450 lumens, or implementing fixtures that prevent, light from trespassing beyond the property components like shields and angling the light downwards, so that it wouldn't stream he on the property their argument is that

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She's 87 years old, is it she? She 87.

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I don't. Timeless, she does, and she's inspiring to the community.

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Last, but not least, my friend Margo, you don't know her.

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It's not important, but I do, she's been there, and I appreciate it.

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So I I just the long way of saying maybe too emotionally, maybe 2.

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Personally, this isn't just another proclamation.

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This is about who we are who we are as a community.

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The contributions our employees to this community and unbridled hope for the future

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And with that I will turn this over to our authors and our presenters from Can, who will read this year's Black History Month Proclamation.

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Thank you. Thank you. Mayor and commissioners

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Whereas the city of Portland ticks pride in joining Americans throughout the country in recognizing February the twentieth, 23 as Black History month, and whereas, black History month recognizes and pays tribute to the contributions that African Americans have made to American history and their struggles

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for freedom, inequality, and deepens our understanding of just how intertwined our histories are, and whereas the theme term for 2,023, black resistance allows us a moment of contemplation and reflection on African-americans fight against historic and

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ongoing oppression in all its forms, including physical, mental, academic, professional, legal, political, and social, and whereas blacks have found ways to operate outside of the system and foster hope within our own communities to promote and empower black people, to persevere in spite of the intensity of white

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supremacy that we endured daily and whereas we give respect and honor to those on whose backs were built the foundation of today's civil rights movements at the cost of their blood. S.

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Sweat, tears, and sacrifice, sometimes figuratively and sometimes literally recognizing the frequency of comparison to the black experience that many movements have relied upon and included in their narratives.

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And whereas the black voice refuses to be silenced as a people, we will continue to rise, evolve, and elevate to higher heights and levels, with no regard for the literal and theory of hurdles that have been set before us for generations our truth and our voices cannot be

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Muted, our voices, our powerful influential, and encouraging, and our truth, writes the real narrative of the black experience, and whereas we recognize that many tools and weapons of oppression are designed to be self-inflicting, and unfortunately were successfully distributed by their beneficiaries of black

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Self-destruction. From the time of the creation of the animosity between the house and the field negroes to the drugs and guns epidemic that currently play our communities and neighborhoods, and is and is exploited for profit and whereas the black community still experiences the

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Trauma from a health care system that was developed on the premise that the negro is less human than the white man, that mental health concerns in the black community were something to be either hidden or accepted, that emotional fatigue is communicated as weakness in relation to the idea of

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The strong black man and resilient black women, and that the pursuit of spiritual health has been characterized as cartoonish, outdated, and irrelevant, and whereas we are a resilient people, refusing to be victims in downtrodden standing strong uniting and

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Rejecting the systemic belief that we are less than, and undeserving of humane treatment that includes being treated with respect and dignity as the minimum.

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And whereas we were bail against extra legal vote, systemic racism, discrimination, suppression, Russian and any type and any treatment against the black diaspora that neither honors us as a people nor empowers us to embrace our truth build ourselves up and have allies that we'll reject the

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racist foundation that our nation was built upon, and continues to perpetuate, whereas the attacks on the Black family have been intended to harm the African American community in many instances they have created deeper, more determined roots from which a foundation of incredible strength resilience beauty creativity.

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Love and unity has grown supporting growth in the areas of education, science, medicine, arts, sports, finance, politics, and whereas there are a few, if any, beings more beautiful than the loving touch of a strong black mud, the kind encouraging words, of a strong black father, the genuine respect and consideration of a

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Strong, understanding child, and the African-american is prepared to go to battle for what should be rightfully ours.

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This preparedness is a part of our narrative, and has cultivated our courage.

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Drive, resilience in the face of adversity and inequality, all of which is the identity of the Black Family, and whereas black resilience, brilliance, innovation, and power can be seen woven throughout our existence, and will continue to rewrite the narrative of the black

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family and continue to break their years, challenge the status quo, and create opportunities for our contributions to be highlighted and embraced, and whereas we, as a people, are saying no more of the same, our humanity matters our struggle matters our triumphs matter our lives, matter and our black experience

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matters today we celebrate our blackness without reservation or hesitation.

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Pride and honor, and listening. Now, therefore, let it be resolved.

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The city of Portland and Portland city council do hereby proclaim February 2023, to be black.

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His history. Month in Portland, and encourage our residents to observe this month.

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Thank you all. Really appreciate. Thank you.

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There's been public testimony on this item. Is there any further discussion?

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I'd also like to acknowledge the planning and sustainability commission for bringing forward this project.

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This project will ensure that new residential development provides the infrastructure needed for future demand of electric vehicles, and it allows for a

more equitably balanced expansion to those who would otherwise not have access to this infrastructure and it also ensures that our new

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Residential developments will have the adequate infrastructure.

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As we continued the transition towards Evs in Portland, so I enthusiastically vote.

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Thank you. Commissioner Rubio, and thank you. Bps team.

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There you are! Back there! Take a bow, colleagues, by implementing these recommendations, Portland can remain at the forefront of electrical vehicle revolution, and contribute to the fight against climate change by reducing the transportation sector's carbon footprint this

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Legislation to me is about access. Too often the emerging green economy is not accessible to the working class.

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This is a great step in that direction. Availability of ev infrastructure will attract business and investment to the city supporting Portland's electrical vehicle.

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Ready code project and its recommendations is crucial for creating a cleaner, greener, and more sustainable future for our city ivory.

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I Gonzales, I did not originally anticipate having much to say on this, I've historically been a strong advocate for electrification.

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Ev adoption in my household, how to ev vehicle for a number of years, trade it for a bike, for more exercise and a little bit of household economics.

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I do want to make a few observations, and on the thinking behind this, and as we approach future code requirements that would impact multifamily, specifically you.

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So we're really at a forefront of a conflict at times between affordability and our responsibilities with respect to climate change.

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And I want to test some assumptions just at least put them on the record with respect to climate change, I think many of us in the Portland Metro make assumptions that we have a great deal of energy coming from Hydro, and while that's true, we looked it up this morning Pge, is still 25%

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Generated by coal as of 2,020 over 20%.

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Now gas. Pacific power is 46, almost 47% coal, as of 2,021, and 18.4%.

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Now gas. And so I think we need a level set as a community in embracing electrification, while that feels like that's the future that continues to drive certain energy consumption than suboptimal in.

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I'm down with the direction I just wanted, that we're clear on that when we're talking about electrification over the short medium term.

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Now, I want to turn to affordability. I mean, this is real.

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The real crisis of the moment for the city of Portland, and while the incremental impact of this ordinance or this change is fairly small, particularly when you're looking at the difference between the state and the city standards, I don't anticipate this is going to significantly drive up new development

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Costs and that's you'll see how I vote here in a second.

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That's ultimately how you get comfortable on this.

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But I do want to document a couple of pieces here. Portland is far behind on producing adequate housing supplies.

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The recent regional housing study need in all analysis showed that the Metro needs 225,000 units over the next 20 years.

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And we're currently using 60,000 units. The underperforming towards that goal.

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This is a significant gap in the metro area. Governor Cotex, executive order establishing a statewide housing production goal we are far behind that in the metro area there is substantial work.

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We need to do, and every incremental decision we make, it needs to be with those in mind.

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I think we need generally speaking, in the city of Portland, to consider pausing new requirements that may add cost or complexity in the development of multifamily or any housing stock until we are on track to meet our long-term supply goals and that's a general observation encourages all to think

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About that. And again, this is an incrementally a small is going to have a small impact on cost.

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Potentially a small impact on the permitting process. But it has been a death by a 1,000 cuts in the development of multifamily in the metro area, and in recent years many venerable goals have been pursued, but have incrementally driven up.

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Costs have incrementally made it more difficult to get through the permitting process.

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I think with that. I you know there are some other pieces that I'd like hopefully as we're looking forward to things that impact multifamily development.

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Some assessment on the potential impact on reduced number of units for each incremental action.

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It'll be very, very specific. So the projected costs on this may be 1% on the overall construction cost of a multifamily development, but you add the 1% to the 1% to the 1%.

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You know we've disted the bird safe glass ped.

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Pdx. The inclusionary zoning all good things, all trying to do good things in in the community, but each of those incrementally drives up cost and complexity, and I just like us to think about that can we quantify the impact on the number of units generated with each of these

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Incremental steps again ultimately, I don't think this has a significant impact by itself, but it is part of a broader issue that I like us to keep focus on.

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With that I vote I maps. I want to thank Mr.

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Rubio for her leadership on this item. I also want to recognize and express my appreciation for the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability for further work in this important space.

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I want to also would like to take a moment to recognize the work that Peabody has done in partnering with Bps to figure out how we can build an electric future.

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I think I hear the concerns raised by my colleague Renee Gonzales, around the trade-offs between building, affordable housing and building towards a green future.

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I believe that it's possible to strike our right balance between the 2.

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I think that our future is electric. And this is an important step in that direction.

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If we move towards electric, I think we are in a much better space to achieve our climate goals.

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I want to state that I and Peabody are going to be deeply committed to helping make this future a reality which is one of the reasons why, in coming months, Pea-BoT will bring an ordinance before this Council, which I think may address some of the concerns raised by Commissioner

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Gonzales will bring forward a proposal to bring Eb.

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Charging to the right of way, which allows folks to engage in this.

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Do technology without adding costs to a new multi-filled housing.

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I look forward to introducing this idea to this council and to the public in the coming months, but in the meantime I both I wheeler good work, mission good work, Commissioner Rubio, and to your team.

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I think this was a very reasonable and pragmatic but important step for it.

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I vote the ordinance is adopted. Item 1, 1, 5, a report, except the year 7 bond Oversight Committee report on the 68 million dollars, 2,014 parks.

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When the parks replacement bond passed in 2014, which is almost a decade ago, and the ballot measure called for an independent oversight committee.

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Last week we heard from the staffs overview on this, and today we'll hear from the community Committee in keeping with that measure the Bond Oversight Committee was established in 2,015 members of the oversight Committee are pointed by each Council Member and they represent the Portland

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community, the purpose of this committee is to review the work of the Portland Parks recreation in carrying out the promises and projects of this bond measure.

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The committee report being presented today was created in response to the seventh annual report on the parks, 2,014 general obligation bond that I just mentioned.

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That was, of course, last week. Hello, Robin! Let's see that report is based on independent research and analysis.

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That includes program evaluation and recommendations for moving forward as a bond program completes their work.

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I know this is really just phase one. As we dig out of decades and decades of neglect, and we are off to a good start.

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I'm thrilled to introduce Committee member.

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David Stezac. He will be representing the hardworking park, spawn Oversight Committee, and he will ensure us that our tax dollars are being spent with integrity, as the voters wish.

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And here you are, David, to tell us more about it. You're remote. Is that correct?

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I am correct. That is correct. Can you guys hear me? Okay.

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Okay, yes, we can hear you loud and clear. Take your way, David.

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Can you see me, too? Am I able to be seen there

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I see you. Yeah.

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Awesome. So we're almost almost face to face. Hello, everybody!

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Mr. Mayor, members of Council. Good morning, my. My name's David Sayzack, president of Southeast Portland, and the chair of the community, led parts replacement bond, Oversight Committee, and I'm very happy to present to you today.

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Our annual report for the 2,021, 2,022 fiscal year, and give you a brief summary of the report Commissioner Ryan, just did a great job of bringing up to speed on the on the bond.

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That was passed in 2,014. And again, this is the seventh year of us creating this report back to you folks.

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Oversight committee continues to receive regular updates from Portland parks and wreck staff and meetings are currently held remotely by video conference and in person.

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Even at recently completed projects, or even projects under construction.

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So that's been a treat. And additionally, information is received via emails.

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And on the parks bond replacement website. The other 3 members of the committee are Carl Chang Karen, lover, Tracy and Brianna Weston Scout.

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This the seventh year the Bond Oversight Committee has the privilege of Savannah's report to the Mayor in the Council the committee would like to share our heartfelt appreciation for all the Ppn.

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Our staff, and for the botan what the bond program has done to keep our city and its amazing parks here for us these last few years, through a pandemic, through extreme weather, events, the parks have remained here and operational for all Portlanders 2022 is a significant year for the

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bond as 2 major projects were finished in the final project began construction as an oversight committee were charged with 3 specific categories or objectives as it relates to the original bond.

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The first objective is adherence to the language of the bond, the second is fiscal accountability, and the third is transparency objective. One. Adherence to the bond language.

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The voters approved, the bonds to fix playgrounds, improve park facilities, improve park safety and improve part accessibility specifically, the funds are for repairs and other capital costs, not operational expenses, as we complete the seventh year of this bond measure 51 of the 52 identified

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bond, projects are now completed. In the last remaining project, amount Taber Yard will be completed this year.

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So a kind of a round of applause that we're we're almost there.

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The criterion has been and continues to be met.

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The bond oversight Committee receives regular updates for review, and is confident that the costs are appropriately spent.

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3 bond issuances were made in an audit of the bond program.

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Performance was completed in 2,019, because, confirming the objective continues to be met for objective to maintain fiscal accountability as a core driver.

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The parts replacement bonds. The dollars are clearly in separately tracked to ensure integrity and accurately of all financial statements.

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Ppnr. Remains fiscally accountable of bond dollars, with a separate tracking system accessible to all staff and administrated overhead, is lower than 10% of the total budget goals.

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Budgets are on target and all categories, except for pools and maintenance yards.

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Currently hilights of some of the fiscal achievements have been that 40% of the value of all bond construction contracts have been awarded to disadvantage business enterprises.

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Minority owned women owed emerging, emerging small businesses and service disabled veterans, business enterprises, 31% of the value of all professional services awarded debate projects were awarded to those covid approved firms far surpassing the original targets.

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Of 20%. So another he's off for that moving on to objective 3 transparency.

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The PP. And our bond team has demonstrated transparency and accountability in several significant ways.

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Firstly, by issuing annual reports which are available all online and this year the executive summary is also in English and in Spanish, secondly, the full performance, audit and completed in 2019 is also available online.

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And it's finding to demonstrate that the bound program has been successful in delivering on the promises made of the community measure 26159, and in Council resolution 37, 0 85.

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Lastly, as more projects are completed in the final project finishes construction.

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The bond community engagement staff have focused on providing regular website updates, construction signage.

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And social media posts about ongoing projects, bond oversight committee would like to congratulate the Ppnr Bond team on its success in the last 7 years.

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And the finish line is definitely insight. Like last year's report.

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We'd also like to recommend a final performance audit be conducted, after all the bond projects reach final completion, and it's findings.

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Be submitted to the bond oversight Committee in the City Council.

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We'd also like to suggest a final public survey and staff survey be taken to gauge the overall success and awareness of the lasting efforts of the 2014 Parks replacement bond.

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It's my pleasure and privilege to serve on the Parks replacement bond oversight Committee, and to present our annual report to you, Mr.

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And if, Mr. Barr, if you would be open to helping me pull together a table like that I'll certainly be there and I just have one more.

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Thank you for that, and I hope just to conclude that for this moment that we look at the assets of why we award to minority business, but learning, minority contractors.

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So when we're looking at building generational wealth so that we bring in the the reasons to do that in how they multiply our economy for generations to come.

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And I know that you know that I think that we have to figure out how to adapt the narrative a bit.

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Yeah, absolutely. This is something you can't do anything about.

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But I've only been on council over 12 years.

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Remember, the first year we had a lot of bids that were under the the market.

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What we projected, and now they're there's a theme of being over 40%.

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And I know that you know why. So if you could just explain to the public why, over the past year, they'd really escalated in that direction on this particular project, you know, it was a combination of 2 things, the scope size of the project change as well, so we're paying for more right but you

Know, inflation has impacted material costs. So if we look at Cpi index, the fit with the fair publishers, you can see alignment with, you know, particular cost areas, raw materials, aggregates.

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What have you concrete? You know the whole gamut cost 30 40%.

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But we are dealing with breathtaking inflation in the area of material costs right now and then.

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In many cases, you know some of these estimates were these engineering estimates were made quite some time ago, right?

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And in many cases our engineering estimates are completed.

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Pre-design right? So once you get into the design phase clearly that might impact scope, there's some uncertainty there.

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We fail to meet that on this project we only have 17% certified.

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Because, you know, the first layer is minority ownership of the business, and then the second is workforce representation, including at the sub level.

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And I just am sort of we don't often ask that question.

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It doesn't appear, but it's it is relevant.

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So just, you know, curious what we know about these number 2, particularly this contract with the last 2.

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We've hit on that from a workforce perspective.

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I could tell you that this particular contract is for dominant Caucasian to Commissioner Ryan's point.

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We do have a workforce challenge from a diversity perspective in our market.

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As far as numbers go and data goes, I was privileged to sit in on a presentation with my colleagues from Prosper and one of the metrics that jumped out from that economic data was that only 6% of businesses in this market were owned by people of color but black people

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Specifically, so again, you look at it, data. And you look at the ability for a farm like West Tech to partner with farms of color.

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And you immediately see their challenges there. But the few firms in the market.

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The question is, are they getting the worker? They are at capacity, and so those few firms in the market will probably tell you resonantly.

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No, they are not at capacity. So what can we do?

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To make sure that the firms that we do have are getting the work that is reflective of our commitment, in alignment with our core values here in the city.

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That's a question. If they're not at 110% capacity, we're not doing our job right.

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So if you only have a few, and then out of capacity, we have to ask ourselves a tough question also, and I don't want to get into discussions around budget and I understand that we're in challenging times here.

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We don't have a disparity study that provides us with up to minute data on our availability of firms.

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We know that the proliferation of firms, particularly brown and black firms, has grown in the last 12 years absent.

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A disparity study. We can't give you concrete data on what the availability of those farms are today.

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I'm miss where I have a question. Director Biko, is there a plan to do a disparity study?

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Yes, council approved, gave permission for procurement to pursue disparity study in April.

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At that time we did not request budget. We requested Budget in the annual request, and December, so again, we know that there are budgetary challenges, and we're not pushing up against that.

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Since then we've looked for grants to, you know.

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Solve our own problem. But at this point, mitigating factor is budget.

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We requested 850,000 for disparity, study, confidence is loaded that would be approved at this cycle.

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What we move forward we stay resolute, and work with council to find that budget so you know, we're working and moving, regardless of that.

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But we know that this region needs a disparity study to understand exactly where we are, and we know that the disparity study is the impetus for firm goals, even if we're not in a in a season where we're going to put 4 farm goals the disparity study

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Is the the legal impetus for providing and adjusting our aspirational goals.

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So if we don't have that, we're working on twitter-year-old data.

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That's a challenge. But again, we're positive happy to you to move forward, using conclusive contracting methods, partnering with our partners, leveraging the data from Prosper.

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But right now we are a bit rudderless on the term of what's out there?

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Who's out there, and having a real quantitative answer and firm answer for the public.

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Thank you. I forget who's asking the question now. I'll just jump in here I see Commissioner Rubio is has her hands up to thank you, Director Taylor, for that background on our lack of a disparity study. 01:37:43.000 --> 01:37:51.000

And here I'm just going to address my colleagues.

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If you pay attention to the contracting space. This is the lack of a disparity study.

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It's an issue. We book we bump up to continually.

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I believe we've authorized a disparity study.

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We haven't funded it. It's a bottleneck towards us, achieving our equity goals.

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I know we are operating or going into a budget cycle or things will be constrained.

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I think I'm basically convinced at this point that the disparity study is something that we should embrace.

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Despite the fact that dollars will be tight, I I look forward to having that conversation as we dive into the next year's budget cycle.

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Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I'll hand the floor back to you.

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And Commissioner Rubio, very good. Commissioner Rubio

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Thank you. Rico. I just have a couple of questions, just so that I'm clear.

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So bringing it back to this contract in particular. So there well acknowledging this sector is, is smaller for for minority contractors that could be sub.

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They still exist, and they do have capacity. In this instance

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So.

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Correct, they do. This is based on. You know, one of the things that I have spent quite a bit of my time on is meeting with local business owners, and they will tell you that they are not at capacity they do. Not.

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They are not at capacity from a the percentage of their portfolio.

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That's city centric. Clearly we know ourselves, have other work outside of the city.

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But the percentage of their portfolio, their goals their sales, targets in the city.

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They're not meeting those sales targets in the city of Portland.

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Okay. And this particular contractor, one of the reasons that they're not using that is because of the low bid.

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And the question about because it's a it's premium pay, and and would essentially create a more expensive project

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Right. The criteria set out on this contract is low bid as a chief of carbon officer on a low B contract 's my assignment to find the best price for the taxpayer, and that's what we did so this particular although albeit I will not speak for West.

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Again the largest segment, largest subcontractor portion of the scope of this contract is concrete, so I would imagine, if he has a relationship with that subcontractor, and they have materials that they can leverage materials purchased.

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Prior to what we're this heavy inflationary period.

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Again from a low, low price perspective. He had a solution, a strategic solution, and he won the bid on the basis of price.

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That was the only criteria used to assess the candidacy of this contractor

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Okay? And because would you Director Taylor, would you?

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Would you agree that just so that I'm clear?

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Then our stated values that probably are listed even on our any of our procurement materials are in conflict with unconscious indirect conflict with with the impact of low bid procurement

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I wouldn't. I wouldn't say that directly in conflict I would say we strive to align with our core values, regardless of what type of contract that we're soliciting to the letter to law, from a Covid perspective, West that construction, and others are merely adhering to the

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letter of the law, the 20% aspirational goal for Covid, not 20% aspirational goal for people of color.

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Right.

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So they are come fully compliant, correct. They are not sitting in juxtaposition of our core values at all, because when they bring up project and they meet the 20% aspirational goal where I'm asking them for 20% Kobe not 20% minority, so it's hard for me to

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say that there and they sit in juxtaposition of our core values, or I miss aalignment clearly, it's our will that we're that we're setting a goal here.

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That's that could. That probably is, not serving the community as well as we could.

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When we say 20% aspirational for covid, not X percentage aspirational for minority.

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So they're doing their job

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Right? Okay. Well, thank you for that clear explanation.

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I think that was really helpful for me.

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Thank you. Director Taylor, Commissioner Maps, sure.

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Director Taylor. I think I want to thank you and my colleagues for digging in to some of the dynamics and dilemma surrounding contracting.

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I think this is an important discussion we had today. But I think it's also important that we not lose the forest for the trees.

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Can you remind us what this project does? And if you're not comfortable, I think I see Andrew in the background, too.

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What does this do? I'm sorry. The the subtle road project. Yeah.

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What's the yeah? Yeah. I would lean on someone from the bureau to get into the grainless specifies of the project.

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I apologize for that yeah, Andrew, you're good.

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Can we do just so? Have like a minute and a half to remind us all the benefits that they're going to come from this lid

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Good morning, Commissioner Mapp. City Council, Andrew Abbey.

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Local Improvement, district Administrator. We put this project together.

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It was called the Worst road in Portland, and this was a challenging project to put together.

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It was a large financial sacrifice from the property owners who were paying their hard earned dollars for the sell.

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Id. The purpose of this project is on several dimensions.

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One, is this is a freight area with a lot of track movement, and the condition of the road is so poor that it is functionally equivalent to an unintended street.

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And there's no storm water management on the street, which puts a lot of runoff on treated runoff into the nearby environmentally sensitive wetland.

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So for that reason Bes is partnering with Pbot financially on this project.

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I just want to say that we differ, that also. A very challenging project to do the engineering on.

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We had fabulous staff work done at gun to get us to this point, and I'm particularly pleased that after 5 years the contraction budget is within budget for the property owners.

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And I just can't stress what a wonderful outcome that is.

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Typically look at these projects going over budget on the bed.

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And I'm extremely pleased with the financial outcome of the project.

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So hope Council will approve this today. And award the contract to Westtech construction.

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Happy to answer any other questions that Council might have. Thank you.

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No, I'm fine, Mr. Mayor, and thank you for that ground again.

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Appreciate it. Thank you. Is there a public testimony?

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No one's saying it. Please call the role

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Mayor when she'd like to. I'm sorry.

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Yes, somebody needs to move, so moves for Commissioner maps.

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Moves. Kind of Second Second Commissioner Ryan seconds any further discussion, seeing none.

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Please call the role. Rubio

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Thank you, Director Taylor, for answering all our questions, and look forward to feature discussions around this

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Ryan. Yeah. Another great conversation. This has been refreshing the last 2 items to have this dialogue.

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Bye, bye, Gonzalez, I maps I want to thank Director Taylor for educating us so much.

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Today, I also want to thank Andrew for his work on this project, which I think extends back 5 years of the contracting conversations we had were very important.

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I think it's also important for us to remember the important and desperately needed infrastructure improvements that this lid will bring, which is one of the many reasons that I am glad to vote.

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I, so I obviously I'll support this, and I appreciate the hard work that goes into it.

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And I'm just doing some thinking out loud as the city consolidates its operations in its bureau operations under a city administrator.

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By the first of January and 2,025, there'll be more coordination amongst Barrows, and I was thinking to Director Taylor's comments about the conflict between low cost bid version developing capacity our construction companies here locally so that we can

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Actually meet the goals that we have established for our community, and I believe that as that consolidation unfolds, there'll be a closer dynamic between Prosper Portland and some of the work we do.

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There around technical and financial assistance and the work that you do around procurement.

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And we've somewhat tied your hands in that procurement is a very specific process, and it is very narrowly prescribed both by statute as well as ordinance and there's not a lot of flexibility that we're giving you here, or much room for creativity so I want

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To think a little bit more about that is, as we begin that process of enterprise-wide management.

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I think there's an opportunity for you to help guide us.

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So just think on that, that's all I'm asking for today.

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But it's just something that struck me as we were having this conversation.

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I vote either. Reports accepted. Thank you. Next, item 1, 2, 0.

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Also a report except guaranteed, not maximum price of \$18,077,498 from Stacy and went back incorporated for construction of the Park Lane Park Development. Project.

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So the Parkline Park Development Project, which is located, of course, in the Centennial Neighborhood, covers 25 acres of land, 20 which are undeveloped.

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That means this is a tremendous opportunity for the city of Portland.

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The remaining 5 acres are home to an existing neighborhood park, surrounded by single family residences, as well as 2 elementary schools.

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The community in this neighborhood is highly diverse. There are a large number of children who live in the immediate vicinity, and it's economically disadvantaged.

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Once completed, this project will be the largest and most developed park in the area, providing a space for cultural activities.

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Picnic sites for group gatherings, children's play and recreation areas for school use, a multi-purpose field for teams, sports as well as room for large community garden.

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I cannot stress enough what a positive impact this would have for that party part of the city.

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It's a really exciting opportunity and director, Taylor is still with us, still hanging us on to tell us a little bit more about this opportunity thank you, Mr. Mayor.

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February the twelfth, 2,020 City Council approved, exemption, ordinance 1, 8, 9, 8, 5, 9 for the Partling development project.

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The estimated construction cost at the time was 8.5 million I was even the conference at the conference level that that was accurate was low.

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There was outreach on this project there was a public hearing, and was advertising a business tribune on January 20, first, 2,020 procurement.

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Then issued a request for proposal on February the 20 seventh, 2020.

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There was also a mandatory, pretty big meeting held on March the fourth, 2,020, and at that previous meeting meeting 7 contractors attended to hear more about the project, and how they can compete.

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The proposal due date was April the ninth, 2,020.

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We received 3, 3 proposals, emery and science, Construction Group, Stacy and Whitbeck Incorporated, and James W.

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Fowler, so 7 contractors attended pre-bid, and only 3 bits were submitted on this project.

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Stasia that had the highest cumulative score, and was a recommended awardee by the Independent Evaluation Committee.

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I would like to know that this was not a little bit contract.

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This was a best value. Sourcing contract alternative alternative, be a contract.

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So we were able to assess this. These contractors are more than just price, no more criteria than just price.

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The city's construction, diversity and inclusion.

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Policy Playing Applies to the solicitation with a 25% aspirational goal.

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And the following is a breakdown of utilization.

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That Stacey, with that submitted in total, they submitted a subcontract plan that had 32% total.

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Kobe participation. I'd like to take this moment to provide a few moments, a few points of clarification for the Commissioner.

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This project, I believe, is our first project executed under the regional workforce Equity Agreement, and as a result of that we were able to utilize a new procurement and inclusive program called the Construction Diversity and inclusion policy.

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As a portion of the regional workforce equity agreement.

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We know regional workforce equity is primarily a device that is going to help us invest in our local workforce an whole general contract is accountable for creating more diverse workspaces, leveraging our contract dollar.

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But there's also a small component of the regional workforce where we're advocating for more contracts to minority.

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So, if you look at it, you, it's a document that's really sitting there to help us leverage our dollar to create more solutions for diverse workforce, but also to a lesser extent.

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There's a contract equity component is component there as well that we want to highlight.

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So this is, if I'm not mistaken, the first contract we're bringing the Council under the regional workforce equity agreement.

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And I wanted to make that clear previously noted that a station that submitted a plan 32% total covid participation of that 32%, 13% were Nbe firms.

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15% were certified. Women on firms, and 4% were emerging small businesses.

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So just by default, 13% is not necessarily ground earth-shattering, but it shows a mark improvement over a previous low-id contracts that we just discussed.

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Stacey, and Whitbick is located in Portland, Oregon, and it's not a State certified contractor.

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They have a current city of Portland business tax registration, and are in for compliance with all the city's contracting requirements.

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Floods are available in the PP. And our system development charge, which is funding through Fy.

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23 budgets I would also like as a point of transparency, to point out that this project is not to exceed at 18.077-00-0000which is substantially above what the original engineering estimate was of 8.5 million, if you have any questions about the

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Procurement process. I am happy to answer those questions at this time.

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Fish or maps. All right. Just a quick question, and we seem to be doing a tutorial on contracting today.

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But I think it's a rich discussion. So there is this interesting contrast that we see today where we had 2 low bid causes where we struggle to achieve our minority contracting calls.

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Then we have this item out of parks which uses a different contracting mechanism, and we achieved our goals

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Why, what let me maybe let me start this way. Why and how were we?

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Did we use the? I think? Rw. Ea. Method here as post a little bit as the will of the Council Council gave us authority to lower the threshold.

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Last year at April, from 25 million. 5 million. So at the 5 million threshold, we can implement the Regional Workforce Equity Agreement Council did that also on April Council gave us the ability to recognize alternative sources for minority so certifications so on this project

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In our construction, diversity and inclusion, policy, we're recognizing more firms of color.

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And also we're leveraging what Council did for us to provide best value, sourcing criteria.

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That would that are that are more aligned with our city core values.

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For example, on this particular contract I believe pricing was 15% 85% came in at other factors.

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So if we look at some of those other factors like corporate responsibility as a result of Council's actions in April, we're able to provide best value sourcing criteria that will incentivize contractors like Stacey and Whitbeck to be more great and more comprehensive in their

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Subcontract subcontract management plans, particularly around diversity and equity.

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So just by default by some of the things that Council empowered us with in April we see the numbers that are changing here, and not only that, look at the breast of minorities impacted by this project, even if these projects are not putting a dramatic amount of work, in each of these

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Shops we have native Americans on this project. We have Hispanics on this project.

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We have African Americans on this project. We have true certified women owned businesses in this project that were started by women and run by women.

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Caucasian women, Hispanic African-american, Asians, Pacific, Hispanic.

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So just by council, giving us the authority to do this differently, we see that contractors are going to the market, and being more aggressive, more comprehensive, and more strategic around, bringing us plans that serve our community.

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Okay, and thank you for so much for that explanation.

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And so the mean difference here is the size of the so projects over 5 million.

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We explored this creative approach to contracting, which seems to be more successful at allowing us to achieve our equity goals.

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On the other hand, I think the water and Peabody projects that we had today were under 5 million, so we didn't have the this option.

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I appreciate that clarification, and I think it's just good information for and this is a real approach.

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We're one of 16 partners, including Metro, Monoma County, that are taking a approach.

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So we have a strong partnership in the region, and using this approach, accountability is is the name of the game.

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Here, and contractors are coming with more creative ways to to serve our community and be more in line with our core values.

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Here at the city of Portland. Hey? Can I ask one more clarifying question?

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So this new approach that we talked about the Rw. Regional workforce equity agreement.

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This is a new approach. This is the first time we've actually implemented it.

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And I think it kind of occupies the same space that a couple years ago we might have talked about community benefits agreement. This would be the evolution of a community benefits agreement 2 key components.

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Here one again. We're one of 16, large municipality or entities. Forgive me if that's not the word calling what you want that are, approaching this the same way, and to that threshold from 25 million to fireman is a strategic differentiating factor here and lastly you know you

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Have to give. You know we have to acknowledge the trades, the unions for their work on developing.

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You know, a a community centric document that put forth really aggressive goals for general contractors, and lastly, creating safer spaces for women.

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So if we're paying a premium here, we're paying a premium for contracts that are going to increase the likelihood of us having diverse work forces and also safer works for safer work.

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Forces, for women work spaces for women. Because this document mandates that trainer of project managers, leaders on construction projects, be trained and safe safe from hate workspaces so it's a comprehensive document, and I think it's going to do wonders.

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For our coming. Thank you, Director Taylor. Thank you.

Item, that's item number 1, 25, please. This is an ordinance amend the planning and zoning code to clarify the rules for shelters, facilitate more shelter options for Portlanders and needs colleagues.

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This is a hearing in the Portland City Council today's date is February eighth, 2,023.

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Good afternoon. Everyone. We're here today today discuss and hold a hearing on a proposal from the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability on the shelter to Housing continuum Part 2.

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These are technical amendments to the zoning code as a follow-up to the first shelter to housing continuum project that the Council adopted back in early 2,021.

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This is a first reading. This item of course we'll hear a presentation from Staff.

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We will take public testimony on the proposal, and have time for council questions as well as discussions.

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Commission Rubio, would you like to share some opening remarks?

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And I believe you may also have some potential amendments to offer

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Yes, thank you, Mayor I'm pleased to introduce this ordinance that proposes technical amendments related to how shelters are regulated.

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The need for these changes were identified by the joint office on homeless services and safe for us village staff.

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As they began to develop shelters and work with operators.

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The original project that rebirth the shelter rules in 2,021 was called the Shelter to Housing continuum Project.

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It expanded, housing and shelter options for individuals and households with extremely low incomes.

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It also created flexibility in citing all types of shelters and expand how shelters could operate as a permanent use prior to that project.

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Most outdoor shelters were not allowed as a permanent use in the zoning code, and could only operate temporarily during a designated emergency.

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So with this product, the primary intent is to reduce barriers to building permanent shelters that do not rely on temporary rules or a declared housing emergency.

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This is a great example of a city bureau being responsive and nimble in the face of our shelter and housing shortage, and I really really appreciate that I like to thank the staff at the planning and sustainability commission who devoted their time to bring this project to

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Us for consideration and I like, and I look forward to hearing from the public on this matter as well.

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But before I pass it on to staff to begin the presentation, I'd like to introduce an amendment so that we can give testifiers a chance to express their thoughts.

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Staff brought the need for this amendment to my intention, and have submitted a memo into the record dated February sixth, 2,023.

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The amendment ensures that Greenway, environmental and archaeological resources are protected while still allowing for outdoor shelters to be established.

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And I've asked the staff to explain the technicalities.

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So, Sandra, can you please share the details and show us the slide with the proposed amendments, please? Oh, thank you.

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Yes, thank you, Commissioner Rubio. So, as you mentioned the amendment contains changes to standards. I'm sorry.

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Could I get you to identify yourself for the record, please?

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Sure apologies. That's okay. Sandra would with the Bureau, planning and sustainability.

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Thank you. Thank you. So the amendment contains changes that are needed for the standards or the rules that apply to outdoor shelters in relation to the Greenway environmental and archaeological resources as shown on this slides as 4 parts to the amendment the first one prohibits

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Outdoor shelters in the Greenway and river setbacks.

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The part B is to apply the Johnson Creek Basin Plan District, South sub district outdoor shelters.

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Part C is to continue to apply the archaeological resources standards in several areas of the city.

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I don't expect any of you to understand what I just said, and Jp.

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Will explain exactly what those amendments mean as part of the presentation.

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Part d is really a housekeeping amendment, which is to replace all of the documents that we next slide.

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Actually please. So we need to replace the original documents that we filed with new documents that reflect the amendment that Commissioner Rubio is putting forth right now.

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So with that, I want to thank Commissioner Review for moving this amendment.

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I think it'll make a big improvement. Thank you.

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Very good. Can I give a second Commissioner? Ryan?

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Seconds will hold it open. Commissioner Rubio, until we've had the opportunity.

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To hear public testimony and hear the full presentation.

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Commissioner, Maps I just want to make sure it's reflected on the record that all of the documents referred to in the motion by staff are included in attached to the agenda.

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Item, so that people watching the hearing can look at those amendments.

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Now we'll hear from Vps staff on the presentation.

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Thank you. Great. Thank you so much for having us today. Mayor and commissioners it's nice to be here in person again, and we're here to hold a hearing for the shelter to Housing Continuum project Part 2.

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This is a group of technical amendments to the original shelter to housing project.

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The project has been recommended to you by the planning and sustainability commission they've already had a hearing on that, and we have the commission vice chair here to present at the end of our presentation.

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These are technical zoning code amendments that to rules that city council already adopted in April of 2,021.

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My name is Sandra Wood, with the bureau planning sustainability, and with me is Jp.

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Thank you both. Next slide, please. Thank you.

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Actually it was the previous slide. Sorry. So the shelters, a housing continuum, a project.

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What we know was passed in 2,021. It created fluxibility and citing shelters, and expanded the city's ability to cite shelters as a permanent reuse, as a reminder.

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Shelters can be operated by a variety of providers.

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The city, the county a nonprofit organizations.

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Religious organizations have been building shelters on their parking lots.

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Next slide, please. This slide shows 3 ways that shelters can be allowed.

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One is permanently, another one is temporarily during as designated emergency, and a third is temporarily without a declared emergency.

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Prior to the housing continuum. The shelter to housing continuum project.

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Most outdoor shelters, such as a saferess villages could only be cited as temporary emergencies, shelters under the zoning code.

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That project created a pathway for shelters to be built and operated without the need for an emergency declaration.

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As shelters, providers began to develop long-term shelters, such as the Kenneth Kenton Women's Village, the new coat presented some unexpected technical barriers to implementation.

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So we have been working with the providers to identify what those are, and the purpose of this project is to basically make some of those make those technical fixes.

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Next please. We have conducted some community involvement with this project.

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Most notably we have participated over the months in the housing, continuum work group, and we have been talking to, and we sent notice to the Coalition offices and neighborhood groups for meetings and held several of them.

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We've been working on an ongoing basis with a saferess village staff and have really appreciate their input.

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Commissioner Ryan, and with a joint office of homeless services on an ongoing basis, of course we sent our public notices for the planning and Sustainability Commission, who held a hearing in October, and then, of course, we're here for a hearing.

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Today. And with that I will pass the next slide over to Jp.

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And he can explain what the amendments are. Thank you, thanks, Sandra, for the record.

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I'm Jp. Mcneil. I'm a city planner with the Bureau of Planning is sustainability, so I'll get more into the substance of the proposals here.

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So the recommended draft contained 4 proposals.

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There's one key change we're calling. And then 3 additional changes that are more technical in nature.

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So the first proposal is an amendment to exempt outdoor shelters from base zone, overlay zone and plan district development standards.

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And what what the proposal does is it creates a blanket, exemptment for exemption, for outdoor shelters from those standards, and instead, we've created a limited set of development standards that apply just for outdoor shelters for maximum

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Height, setbacks and screening. Oh, just the asterisk on that slide is just a note that this is the the amendments sort of plug into this key change.

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So the second change that we're talking about are amendments, the technical ones we're talking about an amendment to clarify how large of an industrial site an outdoor shelter cannot occupy the next proposal includes amendments to exempt outdoor

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shelters that are allowed, uses on a site with an existing conditional use.

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In some cases without triggering an additional conditional use.

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Review and finally, there's a proposal to clarify how shelter operations are regulated under the temporary activities.

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Chapter that Sandra mentioned. So next slide, please. So to dig in a little deeper the outdoor shelter standards.

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This is that key change. It would grant that blanket exemption to base overlay zone and planistic standards and then create a limited set of standards.

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So the standards we're talking about are a height standard.

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So this creates a standard that structures for an outdoor shelter to not be more than 20 feet tall.

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There's no current standard pertaining to outdoor shelters for height.

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And so this is new. The next is the setback standards.

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And so this proposal is for a setback standard of 5 feet from adjacent properties, and this is a change from the shelter to housing continuum project where there is a

setback standard already under the current rules outdoor shelters need to be 25 feet from adjacent

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Residentially zoned properties. And so this is a change from that.

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And because what we heard from shelter operators is that the large setbacks of 25 feet?

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If you're talking about a smaller site and a small-scale shelter it.

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Essentially, it's impractical to impossible to put a shelter on that, because it just swallows up the whole site.

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If it's a larger site and the 5 foot setbacks, those are aligned with typical setbacks in a residential zone.

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Finally, we have our screening standard. Which is there was a screening standard with the original shelter to housing project as well, and that included a standard for a 6 foot fully or totally sight obscuring fence.

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And we're proposing to change that standard to allow for a six-foot partially obscuring fence.

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And if you go to the next slide it will show a little bit more about what I'm talking about.

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So here this is on the you can see the diagram of 2 types of fences.

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This is how it is in the zoning code what we've heard from shelter operators is that there is a general preference for totally sight, obscuring fences, and they provide security and screening for neighbors and residents of the shelters, and if you look at most

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Of the outdoor shelters that are out there today.

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You'll you'll see fully 6 foot fully said, obscuring wooden fences surrounding them.

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The reason we're proposing this change, however, to provide for more flexibility because there have been some cases that we've heard from shelter operators where they find a site with an existing chain link fence on the site and so it's far less costly and wasteful

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To allow them to keep that existing fence rather, and modify with the plastics.

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Slat so that it's partially site obscuring rather than removing the chailing fence and installing a fully sight, obscuring wooden fence.

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It still meets the intent of providing some privacy and security, but at a lower cost.

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Next slide, please. So this is. These are the next 3 of the more technical amendments.

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This is related to outdoor shelter sites, and clarifies that outdoor shelters can be located on sites larger than 2 acres and industrial zones.

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So this amendment just brings the size limitation for outdoor shelters in industrial zones into a alignment with the original intent of the sheltered housing code.

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The intent was for there to be a maximum limit.

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Size, limitation for outdoor shelters of 2 acres.

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But it wasn't intended to necessarily exclude sites that are larger than 2 acres from hosting an outdoor shelter.

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So in industrial zones you often find sites that are going to be much larger than 2 acres in size, and so we're just clarifying that the the outdoor shelter itself is limited to 2 acres, but a larger site the site itself can be larger than 2

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acres, so an example would be, say, an unused portion of a parking lot on an industrial zone site where they just want to use a portion of the parking lot.

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But the site itself is 20 acres in size, and so this says, you can only have a 2 acre shelter, but the size doesn't matter how tall or how large the site is.

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Next side, please. This amendment has to do with conditional use sites, and it would exempt outdoor shelters on sites with an existing conditional use.

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In some cases so what we're talking about here are shelters on sites with a condition, an existing conditional use, an example would be a church.

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And a residential zone, and they want to add an outdoor shelter, which is an outright allowed use for that site up to a certain size.

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And so, when the church was originally built, there was likely to have been a conditional use, approval that went through a conditional use review, and that would have included conditions, say, for the for that church use, for parking area or operations of you operation or hours of use and whatnot and so typically when you make

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a change to a site with an existing conditional use.

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It there's certain thresholds that can trigger another conditional use review, which is a land use review, and it adds cost and expense to a development.

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And so this proposal rate that threshold for for shelters outdoor shelters, needing a conditional use review.

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And those are the cases here on would be on the slide.

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They're adding floor area up to a certain area, adding exterior activity area up to a certain size or removing up to 50% of the parking.

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And so in all other cases where conditional use review would be triggered, it would continue to be triggered.

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But for these exceptions an outdoor shelter.

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Would this? Would not trigger an additional conditional use?

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Review next slide, please, and finally, these are these amendments.

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Clarify rules for shelters that are operating as a temporary activity.

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So as Sandra noted earlier temporary activities, shelter can be, has historically and can still be operated under the temporary activities rules for up to 180 days.

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So this proposal doesn't change any of that.

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But what it does is clarifies that parking areas can be used for shelters operating as a temporary activity, and also just clarifies the temporary structures can be used on a site with a shelter being operated as a temporary activity, and these are just some

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Bureau Development services, interpretations that were cleaning up for that next slide.

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Please. And now these are the amendments to the recommended draft that Commissioner Rubio is proposed, and so these are.

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They're generally just their exceptions to outdoor shelter standards.

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And so, as I mentioned before, the recommended approach that we had was to exempt outdoor shelters from development standards and base zone, overlay zone plan district zones, and create a simplified set of standards for outdoor shelters and so with that blanket

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Exemption. It created a few gaps that were identified that cover important resources, that we want to protect.

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So those are standards related to Greenway resources, environmental and archaeological protections.

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So next slide, please. So this first part of the amendment is to prohibit outdoor shelters in Greenway and river setbacks.

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These apply along the What Lambda River, and so the proposal is to just add the Green Wayne River setbacks to the list of areas where outdoor shelters are prohibited, which now is generally environmentally related areas of the city next slide please part B is to continue to apply

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The Johnson Creek Basin Plan District, South sub-district standards.

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Sorry to outdoor shelters, so the there is a plan district along in a part of the Johnson Creek area, the South sub district has some additional regulations about tree removal and size of impervious surfaces to capture a slow strong water runoff and to help mitigate

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Flooding and landslides in the Johnson Creek Basin, and so the those standards would continue to apply to a outdoor shelter proposed in the South sub district.

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And then the last piece here has to do with the archaeological resources.

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So the the amendment proposes to continue to apply the standards for archaeological resources and some areas of the city.

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These rules provide a process for to survey areas where there's a high probability of having archaeological resources prior to any ground disturbing activities, those would continue to apply to these areas and with that, I'm going to hand it back to sandra for the next portion, I get to do the

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Housekeeping. So part D of the amendment is to replace the documents that show that reflect parts A through C of the amendment, and as our city attorney reminded us, these are linked to the item on the city Council agenda for folks at home to watch and next slide please

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Another, piece of housekeeping is to mention that the record for this legislative project is available at these 2 links.

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Thank you. Last one. Please.

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So finally, what we are hoping that city Council action would be.

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We would recommend that Council vote on the amendment that Commissioner Rubio introduced, adapt a shelter to Housing, Part 2 technical amendments as amended draft, and then amend the zoning code as shown in that draft thank you.

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Very good, and that completes the presentation, our colleagues, before we take.

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I believe we also have invited testimony before public testimony.

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Does anybody have any burning questions that they'd like to to get out at this particular juncture?

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I just have one quick one, and I I suspect I know the answer.

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So this is for shelter that is sanctioned, in other words, sponsored by the city.

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Is that correct? That is correct, and it doesn't have to be by the city.

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It can be the county and non-profit.

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Yes, using sanctioned resources would go through a sanction process and get these approvals.

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Environmental safety setbacks, others it's to get permitted to so you have to be sanctioned and great.

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And I just want to state the obvious. This does not apply to people who are not following the rules, who are simply establishing their own encampments.

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This does not impact that I say that to be very transparent, because I believe it is better to have people in sanctioned rather than unsanctioned encampments for a variety of public health, safety and environmental reasons.

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But this is just one more I will add to the list with that I'll let you introduce your invited testimony.

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That would be great. So we have our vice chair of the planning and sustainability commission here, Erica Thompson, the commission, held a hearing.

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I believe it was in October the eighth, and vote November the eleventh.

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Yes, thank you. Yeah, thank you, Sandra. Good afternoon, Mayor and commissioners.

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My name is Erica Thompson, and I'm a vice chair on the planning and Sustainability commission I'm really pleased to be here this afternoon to share the Psc's unanimous support for staff's proposal on the sheltered housing continuum

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part 2 as Sandra and Jp. Have shared the proposed code modifications are in important step and advancing the objectives of the shelter to housing continuum package that was adopted in 2,021 by removing unforeseen implementation barriers and by expanding

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shelter options for people without housing as with passage of any major policy or code package, there are frequently unforeseen circumstances that are different.

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To predict and identify before the policy is tested in the real world, and I think that Bps has done a really great job of listening to shelter operators to understand where these issues exist with the original shelter to housing continuum package and quickly developing amendments to address them the

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planning and sustainability. Commission had no in-person testifiers for this proposal, and we had only 2 written testifiers.

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As a result, our discussion and deliberations were pretty minimal, and we had no reservations about supporting Staff's proposal.

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So I appreciate your time. Thank you, and I'm happy to answer any questions about the Pse process.

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Power of knowledge.

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Laughter, pay.

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Thank you.

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And maybe just have one conceptual question and bootstraps a little bit off the mayors earlier questions.

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So, if when we're looking at what the zoning and planning code does with respect to sanction camping it, how would you answer a citizen that's concerned about things that occur outside the sanction camp that occur across the street that are arguably outside of the zoning and

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planning. I guess I would kind of welcome your, you know.

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Where does that zoning and planning fit in the in that question about the activities that may occur at a joining property, or in close proximity to a sanctioned camp?

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I think that that's where cross bureau and cross agency coordination and collaboration is really important, because, just going back to the discussion about sanction versus unsanctioned, I mean all of the shelters that would be coming before the Bureau of development services under this

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Modified package, or the original sheltered housing continuum, are trying to follow a process, and they're trying to become sanctioned and to play by the rules.

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And so that's the purview of what we are able to effect and to consider.

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And I hear your point that there there are ripple effects, and I frankly don't know the best way of addressing those, at least not within the you know the zoning code constraints, so it's fair to say the zoning and planning code is not necessarily the place to

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Address, that kind of concern on a joining property of not to say it's not the city's responsibility.

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It's not our collect from responsibility, but it may not be.

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Planning, that's fair to say, of my perspective. Thank you.

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First of all, thanks for your service, because I've been in the weeds in this, and how I'm just surprised to hear that there wasn't more testimony, or I'm sure there's a lot of engaging because I obviously I know through.

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The Saferess village team, the good people that we shine Beacon Village.

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They've been our test pilots, if you will, to see what could improve about this legislation that we passed in early 2,021.

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So clearly they've been actively engaged. It kind of came across as there wasn't.

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I mean, they were actively engaged right? It just wasn't general public coming in?

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Yeah, alright! Alright good. I mean, from the perspective of well myself and the planning and sustainability commission.

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I think it was just the very focused and technical nature of these amendments, and sometimes we do find, with other code efforts that doesn't stop people from coming to the table with their ideas.

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But I don't think that that was for lack of staff engagement and outreach I didn't know when we were going to be here, but I just can't tell you how many times we're like.

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Yes, I'm taking this down, and we well be back, and we'll make fun ofifications. So that's what this is.

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And you've got that feedback. Obviously, you can tell by what I'm seeing here.

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Yes, just wanted to get into the record. There's been a lot of engagement on this topic.

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Yeah, thank you. Thank you. Yes, that's all the invite to touch the one we had.

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I have a quick question, and Staff explained the relationship between the ordinance before us today, and the housing emergency that we have declared.

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So we've declared. I believe, state of emergency around housing.

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Does that state of emergency do these rules kick in after we lift the emergency, or are they in place now?

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They are in place now. So the zoning code, which is about this big, it has rules about permanence, development.

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How big a big building downtown can be mixed.

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Use buildings. What kind of landscaping, how many parking spaces, how much evparking needs to be required?

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So basically the whole zone in code is about permanent development.

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There is a chapter called The Temporary Activities, chapter that lays out what kind of temporary activities can occur.

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Circuses, yard sales, and it has, you know, some some rules about some of those, and then so there is in the zoning code already an allowance for shelters to operate temporarily the Portland building next door.

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I'm sure many of you have volunteered right during the cooling center and the heating shelter that the city opens.

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Those operate under the temporary rules of the zoning code, for up to 180 days, in the case of an emergency, in a place of a declared emergency, like the housing emergency that goes through March of 2,025 the rules the that chapter of the zoning

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Code also rules and allows for those temporary and shelters to operate for the duration of the emergency.

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They're not limited to the 180 days of the regular.

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So there's kind of those 2 types, either 180 days like the cooling on heating shelters or for the duration of the emergency.

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Does that answer your question? It sure does one more question in Staff's evaluation

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Andrew, I'm trying to get a sense of how much urgency is there around passing these now?

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And what's the how long is it going to? What's the process for proving these?

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And are we delaying the onboarding of new to any degree by virtue of waiting to get these approved?

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So the process for approving them is to complete the hearing.

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Today, and close the oral and written record. Okay? And then to pass it to second reading, which would be, we hope, next week.

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And then you vote on it next week, and then they would go into effect on Mark the 30 first is what we have in the ordinance.

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Go ahead. Oh, no, I was just going to say we're at the end of the process right now.

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Sorry, Patricia Definder for Chief Planner Bureau of Planning Assistability for the record.

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Great. Thank you very much. Bye, bye.

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One person signed up for public testimony is that accurate?

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That's correct. Why don't we let that person sign up?

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Are they virtual? Are they here? They're in person.

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It's Michael Spence. Oh, very good, why don't we let Michael testify?

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And then that we can continue the discussion. I, Michael, may have other things he needs to get on welcome.

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Thank you for being here, and if you could just introduce yourself to the records

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My name is Michael Spence for the record. Thank you for your time today, Mayor and commissioners for allowing me to provide testimony on the subject of amending planning, and zoning code, to clarify the rules for shelters to facilitate more shelter options for

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Portlanders in need on behalf of the people of Portland.

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It's an honor to be here, and I'll start by stating that I'm really unaware if anybody has really been taking the time to canvass our neighborhoods, to get a deep understanding of what's happening on the ground pertaining to our shelters.

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However, i've taken it upon myself in. These are my findings here on this poster, as you see in the pictures, we have a serious gap in regulation and policy that harbors safe and resilient communities for all all Portlanders deserve to live in a safe habitats with the basic resources needed

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For survival, in chapter 3. Goal, 3. A. A city designed for people, states that Portland's built environment is designed to serve needs in aspiration of all Portlanders, promoting prosperity, health, equity, and resiliency, new development, redevelopment and public investments reduce

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Disparities and encourage social interaction to create a healthy and connected city a simple walk downtown, walking through the pearl north and southwest districts in our sprawling East Side neighborhoods will show you that that goal is very difficult to meet next i'll touch on

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3 policies directly associated to Central City policy, 3.2 one states that to recognize the city's role as a region's premier center for jobs, services and civic and cultural institutions that support the entire city and region as a fellow portlander, I do find a real lack of services and cultural

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Institutions designed to assist houseless people and other people in need to prevent them from becoming houseless.

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We need to do a better job, and we need to use our 250 million dollars tax surplus from the Moltenoma county tax efficiently and effectively to solve these issues in policy 3.2 2 it states that the city can concurrently provide equitable benefits to human

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Health, the natural environment and the local community. I don't see this as I see this as a failure, actually, for our city Portlanders and tourists aren't spending nearly

as much time downtown which negatively, is impacting our economy causing businesses.

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Small many of them small, to close permanently without the resources for a house's population.

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There's often human feces in urine scene on city sidewalks and on the side of buildings which is direct public health concern.

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No human being should have to defecate in public on the sidewalk, and no human should have to walk through that, and also it's not healthy to have species in urine as they spread disease.

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Policy 3.2 4. It states that the city has the highest concentrations of housing with the diversity of housing options and services, and I'll defer to the pictures you can sneak your own judgment to whether or not these policies are working as a portlander I expect our leaders to meet

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The need of the people by providing safe, equitable spaces for all Portlanders.

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No one should be forced to live in a tent, defecate on the streets, dodge needles, and other types of drug paraphernalia.

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It's dangerous. We deserve better. Our kids deserve better, and our pets.

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We're all Portlanders, and we deserve a suitable habitat where we can all thrive.

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Thank you, and you will find no argument for me I just wanna say thank you for your comments and an engagement on the this is a tough public policy issue to say the least.

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So thank you for being here and engaging on it. Thank you for allowing me to speak.

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Thank you, Michael. It's a great presentation. I'd want to just let you know to just because you're very informed is that the 250 from it goes to Metro, and then it goes directly to the county.

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So we don't have access to that, or here. So it also be good to do this presentation at the county as well I could.

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I respond, yeah, I would love I I appreciate that comment on your understanding with that is that there is a site in Monoma County where folks can go pick up their tents, and oftentimes those tensor then pitched on the streets just all around the neighborhoods in the community you

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Can see on the pictures here, and then we use our taxpayer dollars to then sweep those tents.

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So to your point, I Dan, I do. I'm sorry, Commissioner Ryan apologies.

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I do hear you, and I will go to the county on that, but we also do have to understand that those tents are coming into Portland.

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The city, and then we're sweeping them

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Not yes, longer conversation, not to preview too much. But you may be seeing something from one of my bureaus on the specific question, and the not-to-distance feature.

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Specifically the funding of 10. So thank you for calling it out, and more to come.

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It's my pleasure. Thank you for having us. Thank you.

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Yeah, thank you for being here. We do appreciate it. Thanks, in particular for being here in person.

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Alright that completes public testimony. Colleagues.

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Maybe we could get Staff to come back up, because I'm sure there's probably a couple more questions that people have

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Proof.

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Colleagues any thoughts on the presentation or on Commissioner Rubio's amendment.

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If a knock is good, I am, go, go for it pretty sure, Gonzales, you're up alright.

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These will be fairly specific, I think. Going back to the 2 acre limitation.

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If I understand correctly in industrial. And so the point of so I just want to be clear of the spirit and then I have a followed question.

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The spirit is sometimes industrial locations are going to be larger than 2 acres but you're trying to preserve the right to go shelters up to 2 acres, and in those larger lots is that correct?

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That's correct. That was a spirit of the original shelter, housing project.

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And could you could could you explain the the logic on limiting to 2 acres?

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So if you had a really large, you know, location that was 26 acres.

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Would you know why wouldn't we want to at least consider the possibility of going to 4 or 5 acres?

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Well, partially is because we have an industrial sanctuary policy in the city and the comprehensive plan, and we protect our industrial land for industrial jobs it's one of our biggest job bases and we know people in Portland need jobs for prosperities.

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So that's the main reason is, whenever we allow new uses and industrial zones, we want to make sure that they're not compromising our industrial base yeah, well, I'd also add that the State has land use planning goals.

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And goal 9 has to do with includes policies around industrial lands.

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And I understand. I can't say that I'm an expert on that, but I know that there's a reference in there about 2 8 that talks about there being 2 acres exempting sites that are less than 2 acres from needing to be a goal what is it a goal

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Exception. If it's under 2 acres of site that's on the bureau.

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The the inventory of industrial land. So I'm 98% sure that I'm correct in that.

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So so the 2 acres threshold is sort of bootstrapping off of State guidance on the protection of industrial, ideas. We can refresh our memories on that, and get back to your office about that.

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Yeah, that'd be great. And again, it's just not addressing, not to inadvertently create barriers.

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If for whatever reason, you know, there was a compelling argument for a larger shelter that wouldn't inadvertently create barriers, I guess the related question by our understand correctly, in the state of emergency, however, you know theoretically could you you wouldn't be relying on

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this 2 acre world potentially right? Could you do circumvent the 2 acres in the event of emergency?

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Yeah, yes, that. So the if under the emergency, the there's the section in the temporary activities.

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Chapter that allows for shelters to operate, and it doesn't place any limitations on that on the size.

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So that might be a good balance. We had to do it.

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An emergency. You could go bigger. But you know, in terms of this sustainable shelter there for an extended period of time, you're back to kind of the 2 acre rule

before I would also want to get back to maybe your office a little bit because the State has the States expired.

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So let me jump in here from a Patricia Defnder for a chief planner.

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Basic objective with these rules is to allow for shelters, outdoor shelters, to be able to locate whether or not we have, an emergency declaration.

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The rules under an emergency declaration are generally set aside, due to that emergency declaration.

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This is as Sanders said. Generally the zoning code is dealing with permanent regulations, and how to allow and facilitate the range of uses that are needed in the city on a permanent basis, and so this is intended to just ensure that the zone the zoning

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Code is clear on how you do this in an ongoing way, regardless of an emergency declaration.

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If I may also just jump in here, it it also softens up community opposition or potential opposition by establishing clear standards around setbacks around the

fencing and the visibility or the relative visibility environmental overlays and other issues that people frequently raise as objection to us

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Establishing temporary shelter in the absence of these rules, because we frankly, under an emergency declaration, right now we can pretty much do whatever we want, and I totally understand why that raises concerned on the part of the public.

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So this this is really, I think, a common sense approach to try to take into the needs of the we need in terms of flexibility to address the crisis while acknowledging the community has justifiable concerns that they wanted addressed.

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And now it's clear up front that we will comply with assuming we adopt these, that we will comply with these standards.

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That's correct. And actually, that segues to the last.

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For now question. So if I understand correctly, with respect to Rivers, setbacks under what's proposed here, if you're in a river set back, you're you can't shelter it. You can't get a permit for a shelter under these roles correct correct that's what the commissioner

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Rubies. Amendment ensures. Okay? And so maybe you may have heard of the solid navy.

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Right. We have a lot of boats and the lamit that are essentially permanent residents.

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That is not the city's jurisdiction.

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I think the sheriff, primarily enforces there, and I think it's I'm correct.

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Maybe a State park. Technically, I can't remember jurisdictionally.

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But what would be given any thought to how those folks are accessing structures on the shore.

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And maybe again, it's outside the scope of this. But you're looking at permanent shelter solutions.

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But I just was curious that you thought it all about the interaction between folks on the river and the shore, and maybe the answers were, you just don't want to sanction any kind of camp in that farm.

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I just curious if it came up

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I don't think it came up during our outreach, for sure, but our policies certainly along the Willamette River, and this is why we have the green way along the Volumeet River is to improve access for recreation and facilities along the well, I'm a river so everyone can

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enjoy, and that's why we have this setback. We want buildings to be set back, and we want that to be landscaped and the pathways to be allowed through.

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There. And yeah, it it makes perfect sense, mostly put on the record because I it's sort of a no-man's land in terms of power.

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Interacting with those boats right now it creates its own problems and I, just to be clear, we're not really talking about this.

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We're not necessarily talking about their act on shore.

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We're talking about where we're putting permanent shelters, and they shouldn't be in the Greenways.

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The riverways. That's that's it, for now

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So what we call it sell the name

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Getting your best. Sure. This is more of a comment to Staff and Commissioner Rubio.

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These proposals strike me as being common-sense technical amendments.

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I'm definitely going to vote for them. I don't know if this is technically possible, but if there's any advantage to voting on this as an emergency ordinance, so we can imply implement them more quickly.

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I would be open to that. I'm not quite sure how we get from here to there, or that actually makes sense on the ground.

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But I'll just put it out there. That's something I would be willing to do, and all Commissioner Rubio and Staff figure out if that's possible, or if it would even be helpful, that's all I got

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This is a land use hearing. Sorry. I don't know if that is an option or not to move this to an emergency.

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It is an option. I think you'll want to hear from Staff because of desired implementation.

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Coordination with Bds. But yes, you always can do these at this one. You can.

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Because we've actually revised the findings already in anticipation of today.

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So we don't have to wait a particular amount of time.

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Well that solves that we would need an amendment to the ordinance to change the effective day, correct, correct, we would need to amend Section with this one. Yes, right?

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Because the ordinance itself says, effective day of March the 30 first.

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So we would need to amend that to let me ask a question before we do that.

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Is there any advance to doing it? Think many of the shelter provider is one of the one of the benefits for them is to know what the rules are.

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So if they're citing a shelter, even if it's temporarily, they know what rules we've established.

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So by the passage of next week, they would already know what those rules are, and wouldn't necessarily make much of a difference

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I appreciate the discussion, I'll I put the idea out there.

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I'll let Staff and Commissioner Rubio figure out where to go from here.

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All right. Commissioner Wright.

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Yup. First of all, thank you for bringing this back I have to say.

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The last 2 years I've been on council. This kind of brings together the 2 areas I've hung out at the most, which is permitting thank you, Commissioner Maps, and then citing these shelters.

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And remember when we passed this legislation in the early 2,021, I just thought how perfect this is, all set up.

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It's going to be so easy, and I can't tell you how many times I was on the phone with the very talented and astute Charity Montes, who understands codes so well.

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And if it wasn't for Terry White's agility in Bds it would have even been more of a nightmare.

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So these changes we're making are really a big deal, especially the 25 to 5 feet.

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I can't tell you how many times that was making the design almost merely impossible.

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And this does give clarity. When we were in our many, many, many meetings in Zoom land with neighbors having them adjustments, is going to help so much, but more importantly, I want to lift organizations like Beacon, and we shine and agape the ones that we really want especially our communities

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of faith, to be a part of this emergency, and to adapt with their parking lots.

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And we're finding that if you didn't make these adjustments they were the ones that were really suffering with the current codes we have.

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So, as you said earlier, I think it was you, Erica, that any time you do a really big legislation like this, then you start applying it, and then you learn that you need to make some edits.

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And so these are just perfect edits and so I've appreciate the tone of your urgency.

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Commissioner Maps, because I think we've been acting as if to try to get these built, and I know that the village team really did provide a lot of the fodder to make these amendments and to Update this policy.

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So I'm just so thrilled that we're here today.

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It's really exciting, and I have to say that, the Stiffress village team has actually done.

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They've done 8, 8 shelter permits, and under the current rules.

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And so I know, after these would be in place that would have gone much faster so this is really important, as we look forward to doing with this humanitarian crisis.

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Thanks. Thank you. Commissioner. Commissioner Rubio

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Thank you, Mayor. And I just wanna thank Commissioner Maps for lifting up that suggestion.

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And I just want to sort of pose that question to Commissioner Ryan.

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And Mayor Wheeler, given things that are in the queue.

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If you think that they would make a material difference, that moving the timing up for any of the projects that we have on deck with safe rest, villages, or or some of the other projects, and maybe to to Sandra as well, so if it makes the material difference, I'm open to that but wants to check with

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Folks who are actually doing the work, and no more than I do

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I don't think it makes a material difference from my perspective.

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I'm texting Charity Montes, as we speak, but she's been very involved in this process, and knows all the timelines, so I haven't heard that it would make a material difference, because, like you said once they know what the rules are and that we're passing it then by the

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time. Its reality is basically said. The end of March is a March thirty-first, thirty-first, and we're up well, they'll know in about 5 min.

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Yeah. Okay. Alright.

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Yeah, we're gonna vote on right? He just doesn't become enacted formally until a later date.

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Okay.

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But because there's there's nothing that prevents us from doing our planning effective this afternoon with these rules.

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That is correct, no material difference. March the 30. First.

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Okay. Alright!

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I can. I can validate just directly from charity.

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Montes. No material difference. Yeah.
