PHB Budget Advisory Committee

Overview

The PHB budget advisory committees (BAC) is a convening of community partners and staff who review the financial inputs that will compose our upcoming fiscal year budget and advise us on discretionary decisions.

Goals

- To increase community involvement in the management of City resources;
- To gain understanding of PHB and the relationship between the bureau and the needs of the individuals who access its services
- To provide recommendations to PHB regarding goals, priorities, policies and budgets.

PHB Budget Advisory Committee

Meeting One (January 11, 3:00-5:00)

Provide an overview of the fiscal conditions that will impact our budget priorities, including our budget guidance from the City of Portland; we'll answer your questions; and describe areas where we have discretion in our finances that you can help to shape.

Meeting Two (January 25, 3:00-5:00)

Review how your input was integrated in our decision-making, present our final proposed budget, and ask you to sign off on a Budget Advisory Committee letter of endorsement to City Council.

FY 2024-25 Budget Process

The FY 2024-25 budget process will have two key focuses:

- Meeting the most critical needs of Portlanders while balancing fiscal constraints; and
- 2) Carrying out the transition to the new form of government approved by Portlanders.



FY 2024-25 Budget Constraints

The Housing Bureau must:

- Account for a 5% reduction in General Fund
- Incorporate costs related to charter transition
- Limit Decision Packages to items that either:

 1) Identify existing budget resources or external revenue to balance the expenses, or
 2) Include new General Fund only for specific items related to charter transition

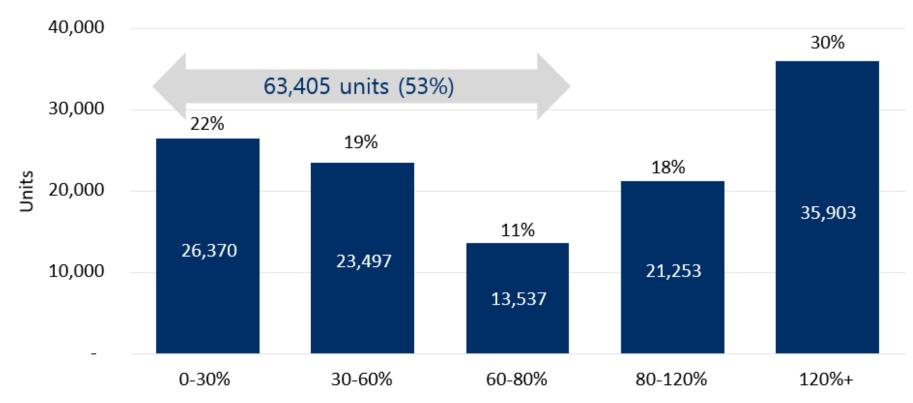




Housing Bureau Priority Areas

Current Housing Need

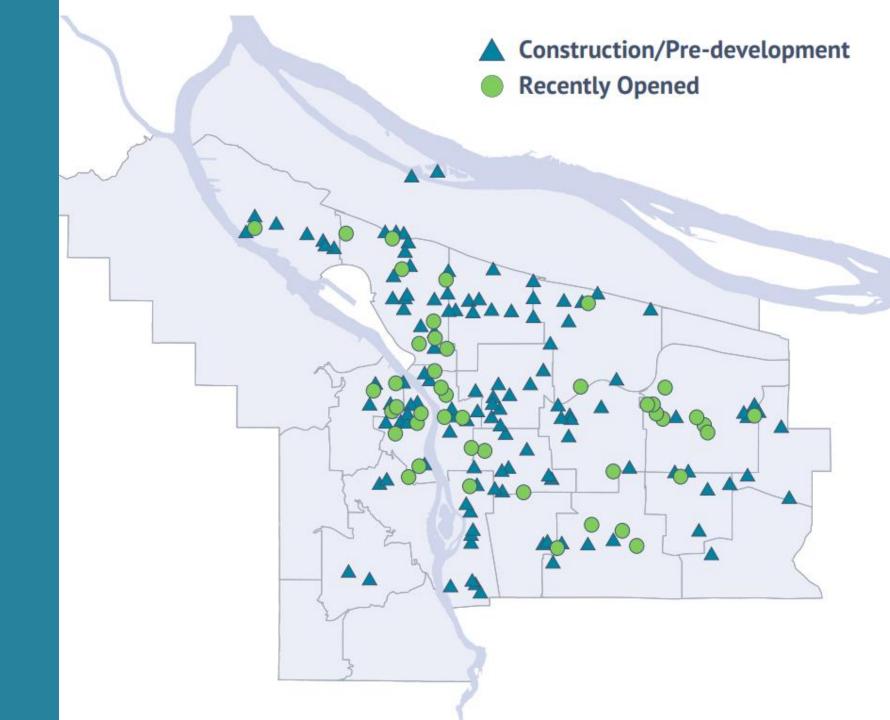
Over the next 20+ years, we will need over 60,000 affordable housing units and over 20,000 moderate income housing units.



2023 Income Affordability Level (% AMI) 100% AMI is \$80,000-\$114,000

- 9,580+ people provided homes
- 3,900+ affordable units
- in development

• 1,277 households (FY 22-23)

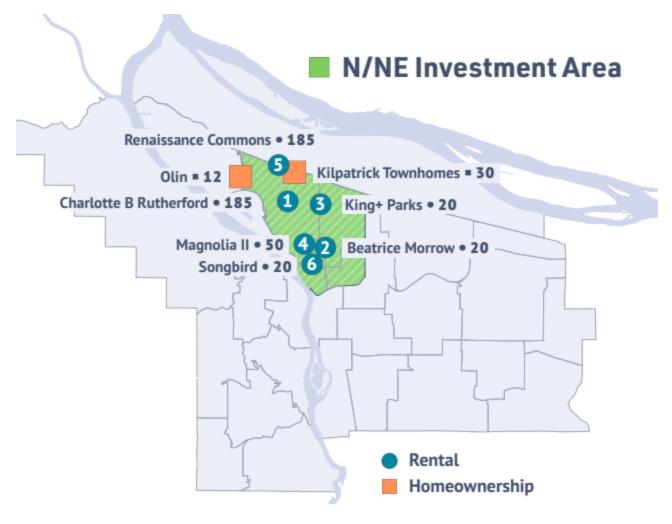
Home Repair Loans and Grants:

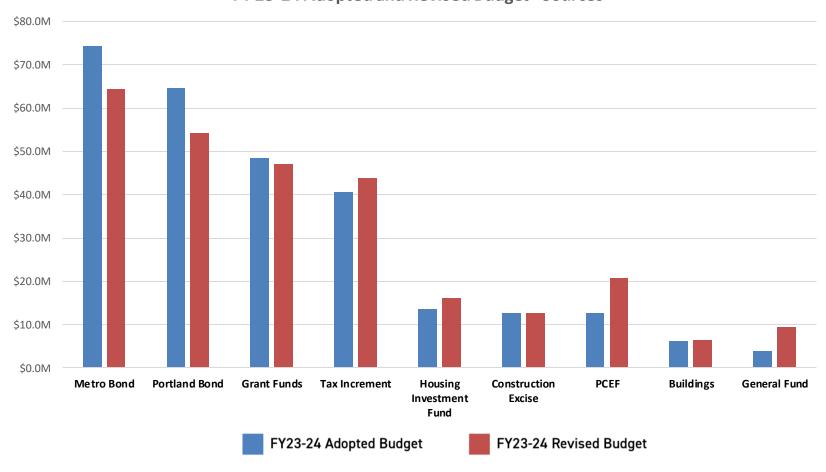
Housing Bureau Current Budget

Funding Sources

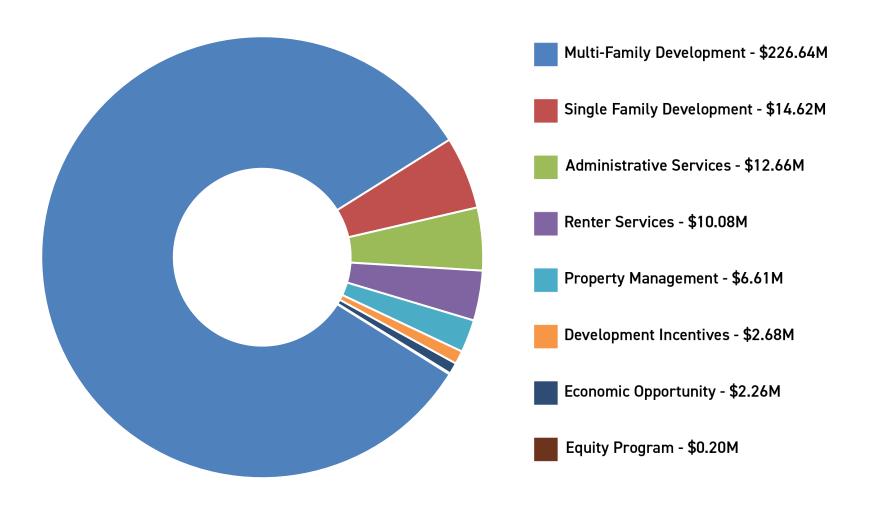

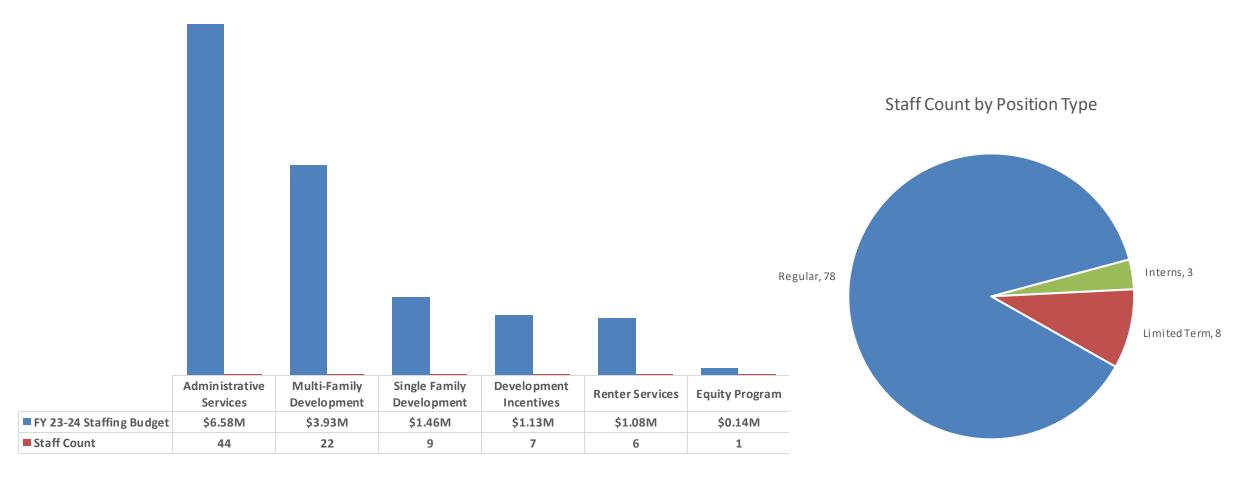


FY23-24 Revised Budget by Program

- > The budget covers 89 positions.

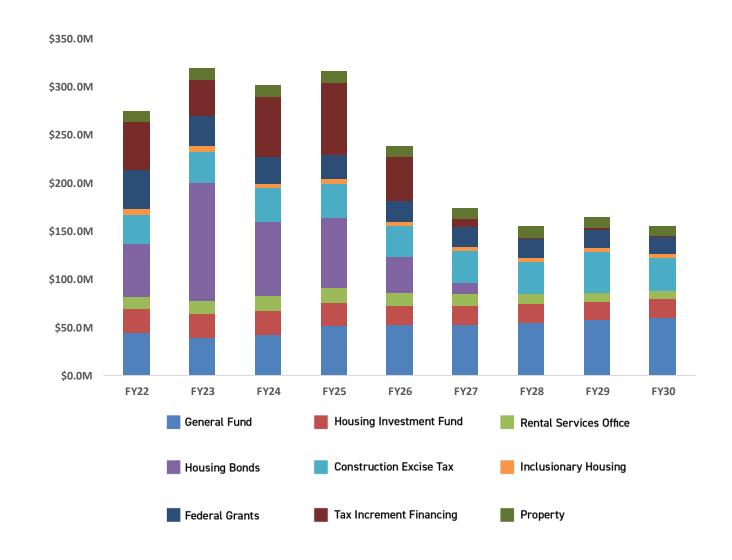


Housing Bureau Financial Forecast

Resource Challenge

Affordable Housing Resource Challenge

- Historically Tax Increment Financing largest source
- Recent bond measures temporarily replaced TIF largest source
- Decline of bond revenue and TIF projected to co-occur

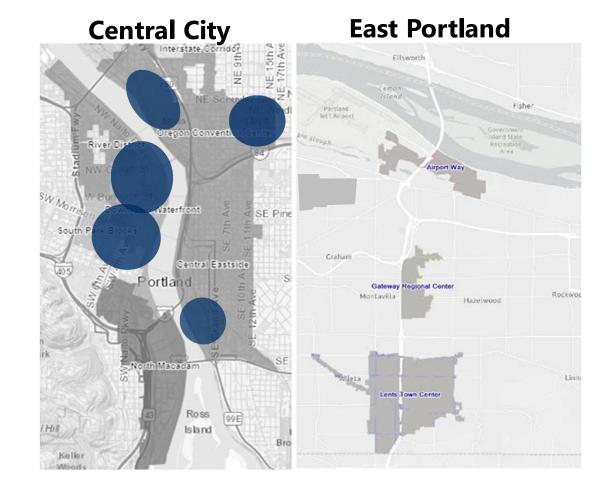


Forecast Trend



TIF Exploration

- In 2023, Council approved \$8
 million 25% of TIF returning to
 the City from expiring TIF districts
 - for the Housing Bureau's FY
 2024-25 budget.
- Recent creation of the new Cully TIF district
- Exploration of potential new TIF districts in East Portland and Central City



Portland Clean Energy Fund

- The Portland Clean Energy Fund (PCEF) is a grant program administered through PHB to provide up to \$60 million over 5 years to regulated multifamily affordable housing projects located in the city of Portland.
- The goal of this program is to raise the bar on efficiency and renewable energy upgrades in new and redeveloped affordable housing projects serving lowincome and other frontline communities.
