3c. At approximately 2:30AM on 9 January 2024, my tenant, Jacob Long, in the basement apartment woke to use the bathroom and discovered standing water in his apartment (Figures 1-3). The entire basement floor was covered: His bedroom and closet, his living room, his bathroom, the closet under the stairs, and the utility room where the washer, dryer, hot water heater, and furnace are located. With a ruler I measured that the water was approximately four inches in depth.

I called 911 Restoration to begin the water removal and mitigation process. Thanks to their work, by the end of the first day nearly all the water on the floor was removed. During their work they discovered that the downstairs toilet wouldn't "take" water, and most of the water poured into it would come back up through the floor drain located a few feet away in the utility room. This led them to conclude the floor drain was the source of the initial water entry.

Also on January 9<sup>th</sup>, Da Vinci's Best Plumbing arrived to help investigate and clear any blockage from my house to the street, if required. His snake tool did not return with any debris or other blocking material. He told me he would return the next day with a snake camera to inspect all necessary and related piping.

Later that night some amount of water did return and recede, leaving behind some solid material which I was told by 911 Restoration was mostly, but not entirely, dirt (Figure 4).

3d. On 10 January I coordinated to have Da Vinci's Best Plumbing, armed with a snake camera, and the Portland Water Bureau's Emergency Maintenance and Construction team on premises at the same time, so they could both witness the live camera footage. The camera was inserted into an access pipe in the front lawn and run south towards the main sewer line under Caruthers Street. It was soon discovered that the ABS pipe under my property gave way to a small section of city pipe under the planting strip which connected to what appeared to be...nothing. There was instead rocks and debris and open space.

The city of Portland workers agreed that something was amiss and began the process of digging up Caruthers Street to further investigate. They excavated a square hole directly adjacent to the northside curb of Caruthers. As seen in the attached photos (See Figures 5-8), the first leg of pipe owned by the city of Portland (beginning under the curb strip and extending a few feet into/under Caruthers Street) was unearthed, but it was crushed and connected to nothing. A sinkhole had formed and washed away the last leg of pipe that was supposed to connect to the main sewer line under Caruthers Street. One city worker proclaimed "I've been doing this a long time and I have never seen anything like this." Another told me "this is clearly a city problem, you should file a claim."

11. On 10 January the city was able to install a temporary pipe from the curb to the main sewer line under Caruthers Street. A more permanent fix will require further excavation to backfill the sinkhole but the crew had to end work to prepare for the winter storm approaching the Portland metro area. This terrible timing has the further effect of forcing me to stay in a hotel from 9 to 15 January. I am back home now, though I have no heat, so I may return to a hotel in the coming days.

Additional expenses:

- I was unable to work for, to date, three days, forcing me to use 27 hours of PTO.
- Hotel expenses, 9 January 15 January.
- Fuel expenses (to/from hotel), 9 January 15 January.
- My tenant has chosen to move out entirely, so I will be losing rental income for at least the month of February, and possibly longer.
- After water removal and mediation, already a significant cost, I expect the repair costs to be substantial: new drywall, doors, and trim. Painting of the walls and floor.
- Incurred plumbing costs will also be substantial. Pipe snaking, inspection, repairs, and the installation of a backwater valve(s) to ensure that future city negligence will never cause a sewer backup into the house again.
- On 15 January 2024 a licensed HVAC technician inspected the furnace and determined the control board was corroded and irreparably damaged (see Figures 9-11) due to being submerged in the water. He bypassed this control board and attempted to run the blower internal to the unit directly. It did not start or run, and he recommended it also be replaced.
- It is possible my washing machine needs repairs and/or replacing, TBD.
- It is possible my dryer needs repairs and/or replacing, TBD.






