- Use resources wisely to ensure affordability


Budget Development Assumptions


- Water: 7.9% rate increase
- BES: 5.15% rate increase
- Other fees and charges, including SDCs: 5% increase
- PCEF funding allocated as proposed
- Charter transition costs remain limited
- General Fund IAs remain at or near FY 2023–24 levels

BES \$452.0 million


WATER \$294.6 million

Total Requested Expenditures - FY 2024-25




BES Requested Budget — \$703.8 million

Water Requested Budget — \$759 million


Condition of Assets by Bureau



Understanding Your Utility Bill

Where does the money go?





Water system, including water treatment, protection of drinking water sources, pipes, tanks, and fire hydrants



Sewer system and sewage treatment, including pipes that keep sewage out of Portland's rivers



Stormwater system, which manages water runoff from hard surfaces like streets, roofs, and parking lots



Portland Harbor Superfund, helping clean up the Portland Harbor



Base charge, to provide customer service, billing, and water meter reading



Single-Family Residential Water/Sewer/Stormwater




Typical Single-Family Residential Monthly Water/Sewer/Stormwater Bill Increases by \$8.88 (= 6.24%)

Effective 7/1/2024




P = Peer; similar water and/or sewer-stormwater system to Portland


N = Neighbor; jurisdiction near Portland. No neighboring utilities operate similar systems to Portland.
