





Lead far from care.




MEET ME ON THE TRAIL

PREAMBLE

SCHEDULE

RULES FOR NESIKA LODGE

USE OF THE LODGE-

Any member in good standing is privileged to use the lodge at any time, and upon proper application may obtain the key for any time other than regular trip days to the lodge.

A key may be obtained from Mr. S. Thouvenel, at his shoo, Morgan Bidg. Barber Shop, Basement, Morgan Bidg., from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M. The name of the member obtaining key will be registered with Mr. Thouvenel and they will be held responsible for the condition of the cabin on that day, or days for which the key is taken. The key must be returned to Mr. Thouvenel not later than Wednesday following the trip.

STAPLE FOODS-

A certain quantity of staple foods, such as flour, sugar, coffee, tea and some canned goods will be found in the food box under the serving table in kitchen. These may be taken and used at the prices shown on the list on box cover. A list of the articles taken will be turned over to Mr. Thouvenel and paid for to him when key is returned.

DONATION BOX-

As there must be some manner of obtaining the necessary funds to keep up the lodge, and also help retire the Gold Notes, and not wishing to place a stated charge for use of the lodge, it has been decided to place a small box at a designated place in the lodge, and anyone using the lodge, either on regular trip days, or at other times, may drop whatever change they see fit into the box—the amount will be left entirely to your own discretion.

RULES-

On account of fire risk, no smoking will be allowed upstairs (sleeping quarters)

When papers are spread out on floor for blankets or bedding, or in any way used on the second floor, they must be cleaned up and burned before leaving. When left lying around they become a fire hazard.

On account of danger of wood mice and rats starting fire by chewing matches, you will please see that all matches are placed in metal or glass container and top securely fastened be-fore leaving.

Please see that all windows and doors are securely locked when leaving the cabin for the day.

Before leaving the cabin those responsible will see that fires in both kitchen stove and fire place are entierly out,—do not leave a single spark, then you will know everything is safe.

On account of danger of water freezing in the pipes during the winter months, it will be necessary to keep water turned off at the supply box at spring, and if this is turned on during the time cabin is in use, be sure that it is securely turned off and the system drained at the opening just west of the cabin before you leave.

If kitchen utensils and dishes are used, see that they are


If kitchen utensils and dishes are used, see that they are cleaned up and put back in proper places when finished with them.


All closet doors in kitchen must be closed and securely fastened against wood mice and rats.

When garbage is put in pail for that purpose, it must be buried in regular "Garbage Dump", or burned in fire place or

No trees are to be cut or trimmed, no underbrush cut or burned unless when so designated or instructed by the lodge committee. No trails are to be built except under the direction of the lodge committee.

If these few simple rules are properly followed by all, we will have a place in Nesika Lodge or which we may be justly proud.






