**Please extend the Portland's Large Tree Amendment**. With climate change, increasing development, and a growing biodiversity crisis, we need to protect what trees we have. There is a lot of pressure for affordable housing and development costs, but we should not compromise livable habitat for other species as well as the health and safety of our communities. We need to safeguard large trees and habitats that we have within our city and reward developers for building designs that work to save trees and develop in ways that help preserve our urban forest. "Trees 20" in diameter and greater make up just 13% of Portland's urban forest but provide 59% of the value in benefits to public and ecological health." (Portland Parks & Recreation)

After the heat dome in 2021 killed residents, the city is still having difficulty maintaining ways to protect its most vulnerable people. "Portland's tree canopy provides shade and other cooling effects, but it is shrinking, both city and independent studies show." (Oregonian, 2022)

Please continue the legacy of the Large Tree Amendment. Even as we save trees we are still losing more trees to development every day. We need to put protections into place for nature and those species or people that are not being heard. Let's do the right thing and continue to protect trees in Portland. We never know when we will have a disease break out or some other issue where we will lose trees. We need to have a diverse, healthy, and strong urban forest to support a healthy vibrant city.

We need to think of ways to reward developers that work around trees and homeowners that do the same.
