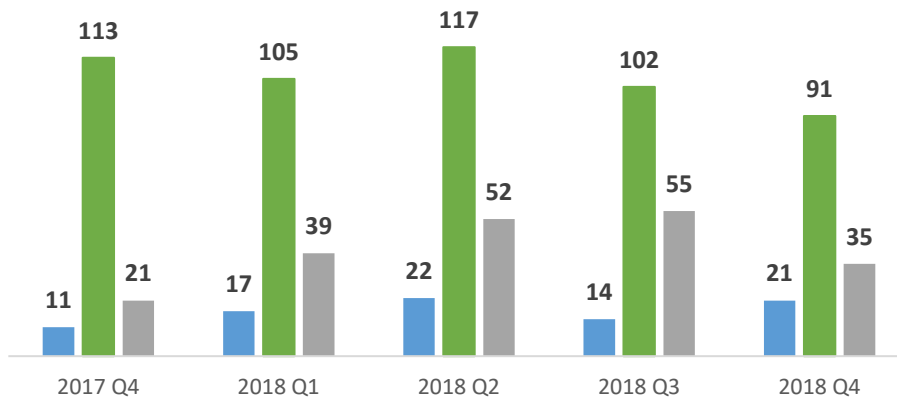

**Preliminary Count of Bureau Complaints,
Community Complaints and Commendations**



IPR and Internal Affairs received 91 complaints from community members and 21 bureau complaints that did not involve community members during October, November, and December of 2018. Community members also filed 35 commendations during that period.

Community Complaints

Seventy-nine of the community complaints were received by IPR and eleven came through Internal Affairs. IPR opened three cases as independent investigations, Internal Affairs is investigating fifteen cases and intake is ongoing for eleven complaints. Forty-six complaints were administratively closed, most commonly because no misconduct was identified. Sixteen complaints were referred to officers' supervisors for investigation. No complaints entered mediation or were referred to a precinct commander for follow-up.

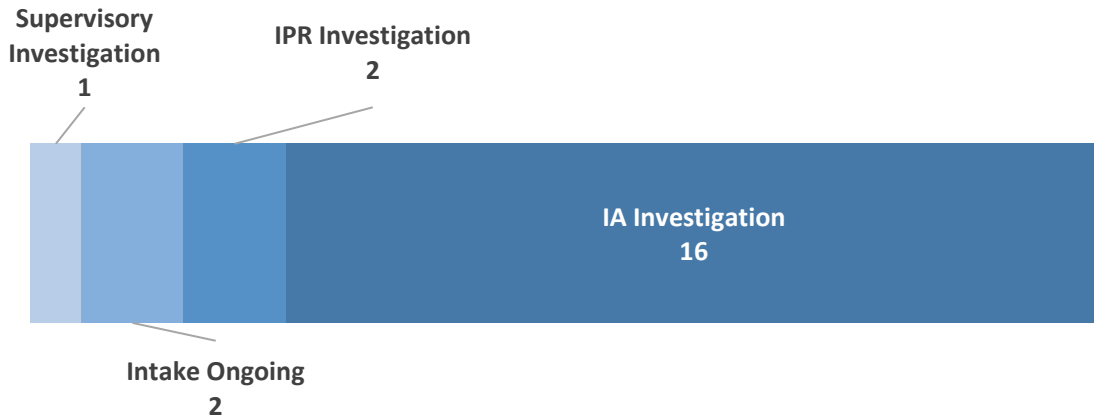
Status of 2018 Q4 Community Complaints



Bureau Complaints

Of the 21 cases reported by bureau members in the fourth quarter, 16 are being investigated by Internal Affairs and 2 by IPR. One case has been referred for supervisory investigation and intake is ongoing for two complaints

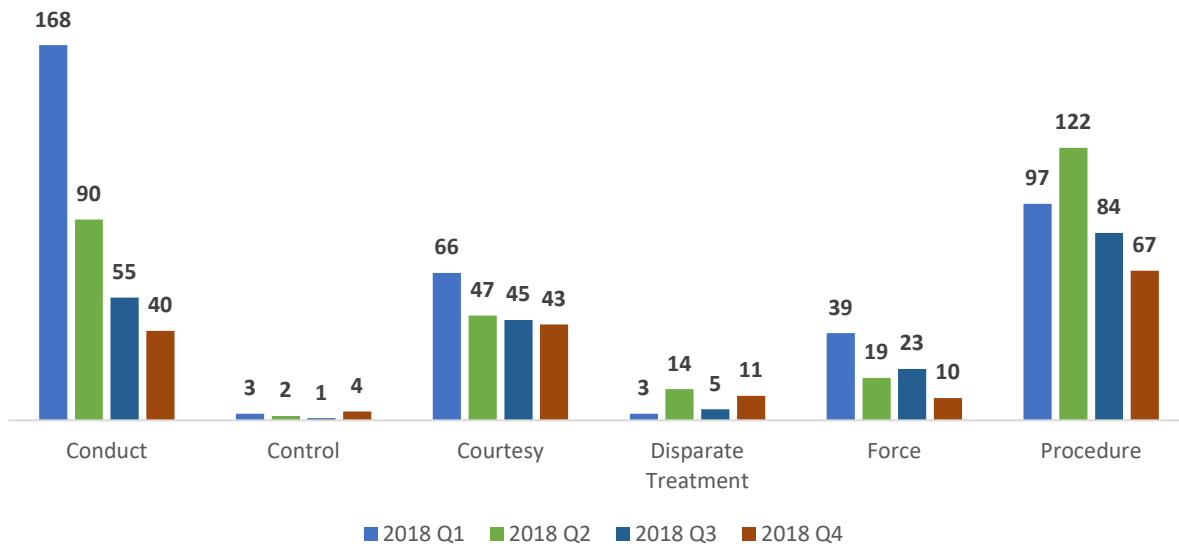
Status of 2018 Q4 Bureau Cases



Community Allegations

Though many cases are still in progress and additional allegations will likely be added, community complaints made in the fourth quarter of 2018 contained 175 allegations.

Preliminary Count of Community Allegations by Category



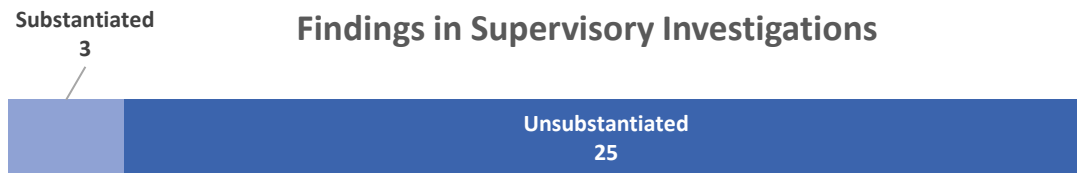
Findings in Community Cases

Findings were completed for 88 allegations (from 32 community cases) in the fourth quarter of 2018. Three percent (3) of those allegations were sustained.

Supervisory Investigations

Cases that are referred to supervisors for investigation also receive findings. In the fourth quarter of 2018 findings were completed for 49 allegations from 28 cases sent for supervisory investigation. All of these allegations dealt with potential conduct, courtesy or procedure violations.



Members who have already received a substantiated finding within the last year regarding the same or similar type of misconduct are no longer eligible for supervisory investigations and subsequent complaints will be assigned as administrative investigations.
