TO ALL FIELD DELEGATES,

Fellow Workers:

The National Committee convened Sunday, October 29th, where a thorough analysis of the Union was made. In order to advance and strengthen our Union it is necessary that the following points be immediately put into effect.

The Unions affiliated to the TUUL which should be in the forefront of the struggle for Unemployment Relief for our own members and for the workers in our industry for Unemployment Insurance, we want to point out, as experience has show, that through the unemployed work our unions have been able to get in contact with large numbers of unorganized workers, and rank and file membership of reformist unions. Thus, through the united front on the unemployed field we have been able to draw the workers closer to our union. With the constantly growing of the strike movements, it must be clear that it is a serious menace if the unemployed are not organized and no struggle conducted for their relief, since they can easily be used as strikebreakers.

The NRA is collapsing and this winter is going to be a bitter one for the unemployed and employed as well, most of whom are working only a few months per year. We must immediately take up the unemployed question in all branches and locals and start a campaign for relief. The National Buro of the TUUL, also the NCUC have sent a letter requesting of the NLWU to comply with the immediate campaign that is being initiated by the National Committee of the Unemployed Councils for the Unemployment Insurance Bill. In order to put this campaign in effect, the National Committee must have the support of all unions financially and organizationally.

The National Executive Committee is sending to all locals and branches a five-cent pledge stamp which shall be sold to the membership with a strict monthly accounting and all funds shall be remitted to the National Office. These stamps will be forwarded to all locals immediately. The stamp is good for one year.

We recommend the following:

1. A discussion should be initiated immediately in your local and branch executive, and a delegate be placed in charge of unemployed work.

2. At all meetings there shall be a review and check-up on work.

3. That a committee be elected from the local to be in charge of the campaign for Unemployment and Social Insurance, and connect their activity with that of the unemployed organization in their locality.

In the latest check-up of the union we have at present a membership of approximately 2000 members. With the field so favorable for organization, the National Committee is calling on all delegates and members to co-operate in this drive for 3500 members by December 10th. This quota is small in accordance with the willingness of the lumber workers to build their own rank and file controlled union. It is necessary that all secretaries and delegates start an innediate membership drive.

FIRST NATIONAL CONVENTION

The National Committee in compliance with Section 7 of our Constitution have decided to convene the first National Convention of the NLWU December 10, at 1109 Virginia Street. I.O.G.T. Hall at 10 A.M. The material and call for the Convention will be out innediately and sent under separate cover to all locals, branches and contacts.

CONSOLIDATION OF UNION

Since July 16th, the Union has expanded tremendously in the lumber industry With the NRA collapsing and the workers beginning to realize that the golden promises of the lumber barons of higher wages and better conditions, shorter hours, etc., has faded, and see the necessity of organizing to gain their demands and are receiving our union enthusiastically. Many new branches have been established on a mass scale, but to date haven't crystalized their branch by actual organization. It is necessary that all branches and locals shall immediately check-up their apparatus and see that a bonifide executive committee and officers are elected. **EXEMPLY** Secondly, that job grievance committees are elected and function for the immediate grievances of the lumber workers on the job.

PRESS AND ORG. STAMPS

* In order to stabilize our official organ it is necessary that a drive immediately be made to push the press and organization stamps. The revenue that is received from the papers will not cover our financial burden in getting out the paper. A workers correspondent must be appointed to keep job news coming into the National Headquarters. The Convention must be organized and the National Committee has decided that we will not go to the expense of getting out a special Convention Stamp. Rather, we appeal to all members to buy the regular press and org. stamp. The locals and branches to retain their percent to carry on their work as well as establishing a strike fund.

In order to give the Convention the broadest publicity an abundant amount of leaflets and bulletins must be published. It is not necessary to eleborate on this issue as the National Committee feels very confident that the entire

membership will support the Convention to this degree.

TOUR OF PACIFIC NORTHWEST

The National Committee has decided that a tour of the States of Idaho, Washington and Oregonx and Northern California shall be made prior to the Convention. Two members of the National Executive Committee will be assigned this task. Fellow workers Brown and Murphy will start the tour beginning November 13th. In order to give the broadest publicity to our Union, the locals and branches must immediately start preparations as follows:

1. Engage the largest hall possible and available

2. Draft up elaborate leaflet and give broad distribution

3. put posters in conspicuous places where lumber workers gather, etc.

4. A collection committee must be organized in each meeting and a local chairman. NOTE: Where new locals and branches cannot mimeograph leaflets, the National Office shall be immediately notified, sending addresses of and name of Hall, place, time, etc.

The following rour schedule must not be changed unless absolutely necessary, by notifying the National Office whether the dates can be complied with or not. In order to make our convention the biggest and best we must all contribute our efforts vigorously:
