


Goal: process agreement on February 28

- What are our metrics for prioritizing or determining allocations for programs and projects?
 - Required:
 - Meaningful GHG emissions reductions
 - Meaningful community benefits
 - Others?
 - Benefit to PCEF priority populations
 - Implementation capacity/readiness
 - Relationship with existing programming
 - Who is implementing
 - Scale e.g., holistic development focused on a geographic area
 - Coalitions and collaborations, e.g., CBOs, government, labor, industry
 - Leadership, innovation, and education
- What information do we already have in order to make sound recommendations?
- How can we move forward expeditiously while managing the integrity of the fund?









The Climate Investment Plan (CIP) allocates \$750 million in climate investments over the next five years.

The plan includes allocations to 16 strategic programs, a tree maintenance reserve fund, and to the Community Responsive Grants (CRG) program.

Strategic programs may be implemented through partnerships with nonprofit organizations, **government entities**, or businesses.

The CRG program is the designed to exclusively invest in projects by community based nonprofit organizations.

Climate Emergency Workplan – Strategies and Actions

- Reduce carbon from the sectors that produce it (like transportation, industry, and buildings)
- Reduce carbon from the consumption of food, goods, and materials
- Sequester carbon in trees and green spaces
- Build Portlanders' resilience to the impacts of climate change, focusing on those most vulnerable

Resilience actions



We must also help Portlanders become resilient to day-to-day impacts of climate change like excessive heat, wildfire smoke, power outages, flooding and more. Our actions must respond to the reality that Black, Indigenous and communities of color are being hit first and hardest by these events.

WHAT'S NEXT:

Most of the priority actions in this plan will require City Council consideration. City bureaus and departments will approach Council with specific requests over the next three years.



Process considerations

- Near term budget deadlines for FY 24-25
- Opportunities to expand on programming that is doing well
 - Early outcomes from adopted CIP programs will take 2+ years
- Implementation capacity
- Sequencing:
 - Committee makes recommendation
 - 2. Council adopts/amends/rejects recommendation
 - 3. Any balance of available funds incorporated into future allocation process

Considerations for soliciting, evaluating, and recommending allocation proposals:

- Solicitation
 - How do you want to call in proposals for additional funding allocations?
 - What are sideboards or criteria you want to use to ensure any additional programming aligns with or compliments the Climate Investment Plan, Climate Emergency Workplan, and our local capacity to implement?
- Evaluation
 - Are there evaluation criteria that are more relevant given the solicitation criteria?
 - How much time are Committee members interested and willing to commit?
- Recommendation
 - How do you want to make a recommendation once you've evaluated proposals?

Draft options for consideration

• Option 1:

- Solicit proposals with intent to allocate remaining forecasted funds (\$158M) in time for Mayor's Proposed Budget.
 - Rapid timeline
 - Narrow window for proposal submission plans will need to already be largely understood and developed
 - Supports earlier climate action while remaining CIP programs take longer for rollout
 - Less inclusive

• Option 2:

- Solicit proposals with intent to allocate a portion of remaining forecasted funds (\$XM of \$158M) in time for Mayor's Proposed Budget
 - Rapid timeline
 - Narrow window for proposal submission plans will need to already be largely understood and developed
 - Supports additional early climate action for projects and programs that were excluded from first allocation process. Supports earlier climate action while remaining CIP programs take longer for rollout.
 - Creates opportunity for subsequent process that may be responsive to feedback from RFP #3 review process and or allow more community collaboration.

• Option 3:

- Develop process that supports more collaborative proposals in time for the Fall BMP
 - Longer timeline
 - Creates opportunities for more collaboration and larger form projects, more inclusive
 - Opportunity to be responsive to feedback from RFP #3 review process

Modified consensus decision making process

- **Proposal** put forth for consideration by Committee member
- **Temperature check** each Committee member indicates how comfortable they are with making an affirmative decision
- **Discussion** additional discussion if needed
- Amendments Committee members can offer amendments to the original proposal
- **Decision** each Committee member can 1) affirm the proposal, 2) stand aside, or 3) indicate that "no" they do not support the proposal. Note that standing aside is counted as a decision to affirm for the purposes of approving a proposal.

The following minimum number of affirmative decisions is required for a decision to represent the position of the PCEF Committee.

- When 6 or 7 Committee members are present : 5 Affirmative decisions
- When 8 or 9 Committee members are present : 6 Affirmative decisions
