


Amend Parks & Recreation Code to update and add Park Rules, align with Charter transition, and allow civil penalties



How we got here

- Staff began this review in 2022
- Over 12 months, conducted internal meetings with Parks Natural Areas and Land Stewardship staff, and Park Rangers
- Analyzed top community complaint data and Park Ranger nuisance behavior report data
- Parks Board Discussions
 - Presented to Parks Board in 2023 and 2024
 - Held working sessions with interested Board members



Overview of the updates

Safer parks

- Addressing consistent community and staff complaints
- Adding civil penalty tool to address certain park rule violations that impact the visitor experience and park resources

Clearer language

- Resolving conflicts in the code
- Adding plain language and clarity to reduce confusion
- Addressing new and emerging technology

Charter alignment

Conforming to new Charter



Notable updates

- 1. Charter-required updates, including technical changes and code clean-up
- 2. Prohibit the release of aquatic life in parks
- 3. Clarify that fireworks are prohibited; allow enforcement of smoking rule
- 4. Prohibit abandoning vehicle or vessel in a City park; prohibit off-road driving
- 5. Allow use of barbecue grills and stoves in designated areas
- 6. Clarify the animal section to include livestock
- 7. Prohibit the take-off/landing of drones, with some exceptions per state law
- 8. When a permit is denied, the City Administrator to review and decide
- Prohibit the use of skateboards/wheeled devices from grinding, sliding, or launching, but clarify that otherwise wheeled devices are allowed in parks
- 10. Allow e-scooters and e-bikes in parks with specific rules for use, including time, place, and manner through Administrative Rules
- 11. Allow the City Administrator to promulgate Administrative Rules for parks for management purposes, like docks, metal-detecting, field use, permits

Park rule enforcement FY 23-24



26,000 issues resolved through voluntary compliance

1,800 camps and provided over **1,500** referrals to shelter or services



4,000+ calls for service

Rangers can respond to civil, behavioral, or societal issues in parks



458 exclusions or ejections issued

When necessary,
Rangers can require
a person in violation
to leave a park for a
set period of time



280 issues referred to BOEC

Rangers refer serious issues with a criminal nexus, and serious medical problems, to BOEC

Less dumping


The City Administrator
