Collaborating for Climate Action Process and recommendations



Two-step process

Two steps

1. Letter of interest
2. Invitation to submit full application

Letter of interest phase

- Over 50 letters of interest submitted requesting over \$2.4 billion in funding
- Ten applicants invited to submit full proposals requesting \$511.5 million



Full application review

- Scoring panels composed of committee members, BPS staff, external community members, and subject matter experts
- Internal and external expert technical validation of proposed measures and savings estimates
- Staff portfolio development
- PCEF Committee recommendation
