Ex-Addicts Warn Of Drug Perils

SALEM (AP) — When you've made the drug scene really big — like from shoot- ing speed to hooked on heroin, to criminal court and the State Pen and Lexington Hospital for drug addicts — when you've made the scene really big like that, you have some thoughts about drugs.

Would you like your hip teen-ager talking to someone like that?

You might, if the someone was Chris Collins or Dick Holleman. And they may be in your kid's school this year.

Addiction Cited

Chris, a 29-year-old former nightclub dancer, is a statues- que redhead. She was hooked on heroin and other hard drugs for seven years. A stint in Lexington is for the real ad- dicts, and she did it and doesn't want your kid to do it, too.

Dick is a tall, broad-should- ered guy who's 38 and has a family, and figures the best years of his life were the first 17. That was when he hit the drug bit and the last 21 have been in and out of prison and looking for the next fix and,

man, what a waste it has been.

They are the personnel for the State of Oregon's new speakers' bureau on drug abuse. Local schools please note, because you can have them talk to your curious students by calling the Alcohol and Drug Section of the Men- tal Health Division, in Port- land or Salem.

Pair Turns Straight

Holleman and Miss Collins are straight now, and both are taking the synthetic drug, methadone, which keeps them off heroin and allows them to lead a normal life.

Almost every young person — regardless of the communi- ty in which he lives — will, before he has completed his formal education, be confront- ed with drugs, says Holleman.

The speakers will be trying to prepare the students for their first offering of drugs so they will know the dangers.

Hard drugs seldom are available around schools, Miss Collins and Holleman told a recent news conference, but marijuana is plentiful in many high schools.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

I, Tom Wilson, member of the Citizens Planning Board, would like at this time to call your attention to the ridiculous and haphazard way the Model Cities' election was conducted. It seems to me that the City of Portland owes the residents of the Model Cities area more of an election than was shown September 27, 1969. X

The premise, I thought and every other citizen I know thought, was that elections were supposed to be made convenient for the electorate. However, I feel that the City let us down by not requesting or seeing to it that all voting precincts in the Model Cities area were open for the residents of the area; this is borne out by the fact that we had such a poor turn out.

I was in a key position to observe this because I was in the streets trying to "drum up" some motivation among the citizens of the Model Cities area to participate in this election, but I would like to be the first one to say that Model Cities' use of only the local eight schools for election purposes is unrealistic - some of the polling places were located three miles from some of the area residents; and as you know and I know it takes a real conscientious voter; a person with invested interest; or a "nut" to travel three miles to cast a vote for something wherein he has not received benefits.

It would be a minimum capital outlay to man these polling places which as I recall has been done repeatedly in one year for the School Board; they were trying to levy taxes for a million and one half dollars and upward. The Model Cities project is worth 17 million dollars and upward to the City of Portland and the residents thereof.

The Regional Office of HUD is bawling us out for not having Governmental agencies participating in supporting our Model Cities effort. This election to me is a shiny example of what they are talking - the lack of cooperation; however, the damage is done now and I would like to request of you when you make your appointments to the Model Cities Planning Board the following names: James "Shag" Thomas who has already served on the Citizens Planning Board with considerable impact and Lawrence Alberti who is very active in the community and acquainted with the problems of the area.



The Election Committee

The Election Committee met October 2, 1969 to certify and evaluate the election. It was the conclusion that the mechanics of the election were very good. There were few problems associated with the polling places, election clerks, poll watchers and ballot counting. We feel the election was fair and honest in every way. The counting was deemed correct and was notarized. Hence, the Election Committee certifies the election and declares those indicated as having the most votes as elected. The votes for each candidate are listed on attached sheet.

The Committee realizes that there may be requests for recounts or other possible challenges. It is the feeling of the Committee that the Citizens Planning Board should handle such requests and dispose of such requests within ~~60~~ 30 days at which times the ballots and stubs will be destroyed. The Committee intends to dissolve itself, but if the Citizens Planning Board desires to look into any problems, the Committee would be willing to reconvene itself for that purpose.

The Committee by no means feels that the election was anywhere near perfect; certainly the turnout was very disappointing. The Committee would like to offer some comments -

1. More time should have been and must be allowed for an election. We had approximately 25 days for the entire election process. Candidates had little time to campaign, particularly, those who filed at the last minute - on September 22. Next year this problem will be alleviated by the Citizens Planning Board's policy of an election every year on the last Saturday of September. However, we would recommend that the final filing date be approximately one month prior to the date of the election. Also we would recommend that the Citizens Planning Board have all rules changes and procedures decided one month prior to the election. The fact that the Citizens Planning Board changed some rules only 11 days prior to this election complicated the Committee's work and probably confused residents.

Report of Election Committee

2. We feel the low turnout was due to many factors. Probably, the main one was the lack of visible activity of the Model Cities Program during the past months. The fact that Model Cities will soon have programs in operation and we will be an ongoing agency should increase the interest and turnout next year. Also, it is hoped that by next year community organizations will be functioning in all areas and that they will be able to assist in any elections.

3. As a Committee we undoubtedly made mistakes. One was lack of television and radio advertising. This, however, was due in part to the lack of time. For TV spot announcements, almost three weeks lead time is required. Radio also requires some lead time. These facts were not known so we did not have any TV or radio advertising. We will know better next time.

4. The Committee was confused as to the status of those receiving the second largest number of votes. Do these people become alternates or not? We would like a clarification from the Citizens Planning Board. The Committee would also like to make some concrete suggestions for next year's election. These are not recommendations, but suggestions we feel should be explored by the Citizens Planning Board.

1) We definitely feel the election precinct boundaries are confusing. In many cases they do not follow school boundaries, and in others the school boundaries themselves are illogical. We would strongly recommend these boundaries be studied and redrawn. If nothing else boundary lines should be squared and put in a straight line to alleviate confusion of both the voter and the election clerk.

2) We would like to suggest the possibility of establishing a run-off election between the two top candidates, two weeks after the election if no one obtains a majority. This would insure that the person elected had a majority and a run-off might create more interest - due to more campaigning, etc. In most cases the winner is elected by a plurality particularly when 6 or 7 candidates are running.

3) We feel 8 precincts were not enough. At any regular primary or general election approximately 50 voting places are provided. We feel more precincts should be made available and a procedure for accomplishing this be established. If this is done it might also solve the school boundary line problem.

4) We would also like to suggest the possibility of candidates filing by petition. A petition would create interest - certify the candidate had some support and involve the community in the filing process. The number of signatures necessary for one to be on the ballot should be kept low - say 25 signatures, but we consider it a possibility worth exploring.

5) If the petition suggestion were adopted, it might also be explored that a person from out of the particular school area be allowed to file if he can obtain the necessary signatures from the area in which he is running. This might solve some residency questions.

We would hope that the Rules Committee or some other appropriate committee of the Citizens Planning Board look at our suggestions. We would hope that next year ^a with more time and better procedures to have a larger turnout, and better election. We would like to thank all those who helped on this election - working long hours for no pay and little thanks. They did a good job under difficult conditions.



Portland's Model Cities Planning Board Tuesday agreed to recommend to City Council that the successor to Commissioner William A. Bowes be a black man.

Bowes died Sunday. Board member Harry Ward offered a motion to the planning board recommending to City Council that E. J. Baskett be named to fill the vacancy.

Baskett, first chairman of the planning board, himself offered an amendment, which passed, substituting the words "a black man" instead of Baskett's name.

City Council is expected to name a successor to Bowes, a 30-year veteran of the council, within a few days.

In other business, the board accepted a recommendation from a special committee that the Rev. Eugene Boyd be seated as a member.

The portion of the Holladay school district where Rev. Boyd resides was incorporated with the Eliot school attendance area prior to the first election for the Model Cities Planning Board by the Temporary Committee for Model Cities. That committee ruled that members of the Model Cities Community not living within the district of one of the eight schools located within the Model Cities Community could incorporate with the nearest school. The part of the Holladay school district where Rev. Boyd lives is closer to Eliot school than Irvington school.

The resolution adopted at the January 16, 1968, meeting of the Temporary Committee, and remaining unchanged to date, states:

Once the boundary lines for the target area have been drawn up, persons residing within the boundary lines but who are not within the elementary school attendance areas will be incorporated with the nearest elementary school ~~(elementary school)~~ in that area.

This resolution and the precedent established thereby is the reason Rev. Boyd has served as an alternate from the Eliot School attendance area for the last 1½ years without challenge.

Your committee conducted extensive interviews with the members of the Model Cities staff, with various members of the Election Committee and with Rev. Boyd and are of the opinion all parties acted in good faith. This Committee also feels the Election Committee, where not directed otherwise by the Citizens Planning Board, followed the precedents established in the first election.

You asked that I comment on two questions which have arisen in the recent election for members of the Citizens Planning Board.

The first question relates to Rev. Eugene Boyd's relationship to Director Alvin Batiste, which is brother-in-law. The contract which the City has with the Department of Housing and Urban Development requires that no official of the City or person who exercises discretionary responsibilities in connection with the project may (a) directly benefit from the project, or (b) have a personal interest in property, contract, or other arrangement, unless such interest is immediately disclosed to the City, and the City has determined that in light of benefits to be derived from the program, it would be contrary to public interest to exclude that person from benefit.

It is my opinion that Rev. Boyd's relationship with the Director cannot be considered a benefit in the program which would cause Rev. Boyd to disclose his relationship to the City. However, so that there can be no confusion on this point, I would recommend that Rev. Boyd write a letter to the *Mayor or* ~~City Council~~, disclosing his relationship to Mr. Batiste and asking if this relationship conflicts with Section 501 of the contract. If that is done, a determination can be made officially and HUD so advised.

Your second question relates to Rev. Boyd's residence. The rules and operating procedure furnished me August 13, 1969, by Dean Gisvold state as follows:

- (i) Each of the following eight elementary school attendance areas shall elect two representatives who shall be residents of the area from which they are elected.

This section adopted the idea that the representative must live within a particular school attendance area within the

Model Cities boundary. A proposal which was adopted by a temporary committee January 16, 1968, required candidates to be residents of the area which they represented.

Because of the clear language in the rules and operating procedures and because there is no ambiguity raised by review of the history of the rule, I must assume that the citizens of the area intend that a candidate must be a resident of the area he represents. Webster's Unabridged Dictionary states that resident implies permanency of abode. Residents when used in a statute will generally mean domicile; however, it is a favorite term employed by legislatures to express the connection between a person and a place, leaving the construction to be determined from the context of the particular enactment.

If residents as used by the Citizens Planning Board is used to mean domicile, eligibility for voting and Board membership would be limited to persons who live within the area and intend the area to be their permanent home. It would exclude persons, such as students, living within the area though for an extended period, who have homes established in other places. If domicile were intended as the criteria, eligibility for voting and Board membership would prove impossible to determine.

I must, therefore, conclude that the Citizens Planning Board intended that the voters and the Board members be residents of the area, with residents meaning the place where one resides, implying something of permanence or continuity at least for an indefinite period. It would be where a man actually dwells and where his wife and children reside, if he lives with his wife and children.

From the letter which you forwarded to me, I gather Rev. Boyd lives within the total Model Cities area but not within one of the eight school attendance areas. If this is so, it is contrary to the intent, as I see it, of the citizens who established the rules and procedures of the Model Cities Citizens Planning Board. I believe it has been the intent that all persons living in the Model Cities area would be represented by two representatives chosen from their particular area by a townhall type vote. If it now appears that the school boundaries do not include the entire area, I would recommend that those boundaries be extended in their logical directions so that all of the Model Cities area is contained in one of the school areas. If this is done, and Rev. Boyd is not then within the school area which elected him, he is ineligible to serve on the Planning Board.

Charges Tuesday by Tom Wilson and R.L. Anderson that there is a City Hall "conspiracy" to deny poor residents of Portland's Model City area — particularly blacks — a meaningful voice in Model City affairs were denied Wednesday by Howard P. Traver, executive assistant to Mayor Terry D. Schrunk.

TRAVER SAID "no lines of communication have been cut off between City Hall and anybody in the Model City area" and he denied that there has been any "conspiracy to keep Model City area residents from expressing their views" to city government.

He added that he could not accept the charges that "we're denying poor people a voice."

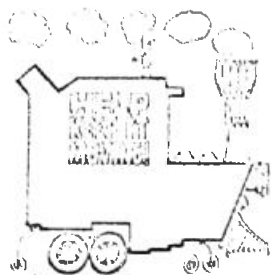
Traver said he was inclined to say that the charges of Wilson and Anderson, who often criticize city government and the Model City program, "should not be dignified by any kind of response."

"Even though we're a little tired of hearing these tirades, it should be emphasized that there is no City Hall plot against Model City area citizens," Traver said.

IRA KELLER, chairman of the Portland Development Commission, who was also a target of Wilson's and Anderson's criticism, commented: "Speaking for the Portland Development Commission, we are much encouraged by the progress of Model City. We are ahead of the program in the rehabilitation of many homes in the area, ahead of schedule on the new neighborhood park in Woodlawn and encouraged by additional funds which have been made available to Portland by the Department of Housing and Urban Development."

Keller added, "I believe there has been remarkable citizen participation in depth by the poor and by all Model City citizens. I am impressed by the real accomplishments of the program."

1970 Election Committee

The 1970 Election Committee has been meeting at least once a week since it was activated, including one meeting at the office of John Weldon, Department of Records and Elections, in Portland.

The following items represent accomplishments to date:

I. List of Candidates

There have been twenty-eight (28) applications filed and certified, representing the areas as follows:

Boise	3	King	5
Eliot	2	Sabin	5
Humboldt	4	Vernon	3
Irvington	3	Woodlawn	2

II. Publicity

A. To date:

1. Model Cities Director Charles Jordan's news conference of August 12, 1970 was covered by the local TV stations, and film clips shown that evening during regular newscasts. Articles also appeared the next day in both the Oregonian and the Oregon Journal. Most radio stations gave a summary of Mr. Jordan's remarks in their newscasts.
2. Flyers were circulated and posters have been placed in businesses, houses, schools, churches, government and social agency offices throughout the Model Cities areas. Announcements were made at church programs.
3. Posters have been placed on the trunks of Rose City taxicabs and will be kept in place until after election day September 26, 1970.
4. A major article will be in the Portland Model Cities Newsletter to be distributed during the week of September 20. News articles will be in the Clark Press papers circulated during the week.
5. During the week daily press releases will be issued to the two daily papers, and to all TV and radio stations in the

Portland area.

6. Each candidate will be furnished, at no cost to him, 1,000 flyers for distribution in his area.
7. Flyers specifically noting polling places and polling hours will be distributed throughout the Model Cities area by the end of the week.
8. Model Cities Neighborhood Organizations have been affording candidates an opportunity to appear at meetings and speak on behalf of their candidates.

III. Polling Sites

1. A permit for the use of each of the eight (8) schools on election day has been obtained from Portland School District No. 1, including janitorial service and furniture.
2. Each area will provide the workers to man its poll on election day. The League of Women Voters will monitor the polling places, and will canvas the votes at the Model Cities office immediately after the polls close at 8:00 p.m.
3. Model Cities Office at 5239 N. E. Union Avenue will be a ninth polling site for absentee ballot voting. Ballots will be supplied upon request to voters of the eight school areas, and upon return to the office will be filed in a sealed ballot box. These votes will be canvassed along with the regular ballots from the eight (8) school polling sites.

IV. Ballots

1. Each area will be furnished ballots listing the certified candidates for that area, plus a space for write-in candidate names.
2. Completed ballots will be deposited in sealed ballot boxes at each polling site, and the sealed boxes will be delivered to the Model Cities office for canvassing immediately after the close of polls at 8:00 p.m.

V. Transportation

Voters requiring transportation to their polling sites on election day may call Model Cities Office phone 288-6923. Several cars and two vans will be available for this service.

2 Blacks See Plot In Model City Bids

Two militant blacks from Portland's Albina neighborhood, Tom Wilson and R. L. Anderson, Tuesday declared they are victims of a "conspiracy" in Portland City Hall to prevent their election to the Model City Citizens Planning Board.

Wilson is a candidate for re-election to the board from the Sabin School area and Anderson is running in the Boise district.

BOTH ARE long-time critics of the Model City program, now in its third year in Portland. They spoke at a press conference at the Billy Webb Elks Lodge in Albina.

Anderson accused Ira Keller, chairman of the Portland Development Commission, and Mayor Terry Schrunk of "paying off" blacks he characterized as "establishment Negroes." He named E. J. Baskett, former Citizens Planning Board (CPB) chairman, Mrs. Hazel Hays and Ellis Casson as being "in the pocket of the PDC and City Hall."

Wilson said the Model City program, "after all these years it never has been in the hands of the people it supposedly was designed to help." He said it is "ironic" that the programs developed by citizens' working committees during the first year of the Model City program for improvements in welfare, the schools and neighborhood redevelopment were "criticized bitterly by Public Welfare, School District No. 1 and the PDC, yet it

is those three agencies which have got all the Model City funds up to now."

HE LUMPED Model Cities and the poverty programs of the Portland Metropolitan Steering Committee together as "pork barrels for highly paid officials and politicians."

"Is City Hall afraid to give the people of the Albina area some say in their own affairs?" Wilson asked.

He added that he has "great hopes" for the Council of the Poor organized last weekend at the Poor People's Conference in Salem, but was apprehensive that "as soon as it shows signs of success, its leaders will be paid off with high paying government jobs."

Anderson, who is free on bail pending appeal of a conviction for arson during disturbances in Albina in June, 1969, said there is a "plot to incarcerate people who are outspoken and critical" of city government.

"Believe it or not," Wilson said, "we are trying to avoid violence. But is violence the only language people will hear?"

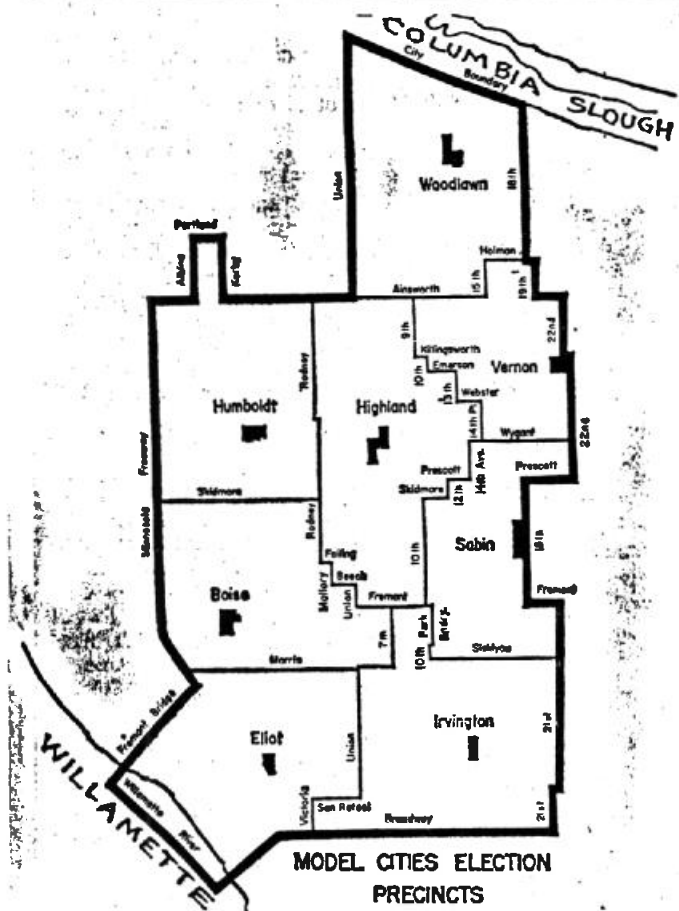

Polls in the election will be in each of the eight elementary schools in the area. Any

Model neighborhood resident who is 14 years or older can vote.

Two elected board members — Mrs. Treva Baker of Irvington and Ronald Moore of Sabin — recently resigned from their expiring terms and were replaced with appointments by their community associations.

The replacements, who face election later this month, are Burnett E. Austin, a railroad dining car worker of Irvington and Theodore Baugh, a Portland Housing Authority employee of Sabin.

Three board members have declined to run for re-election. They are Emmett J. Baskett of King, Mrs. Bobbie Nunn of Woodlawn and Peter Wolmut of Vernon.

However, Josiah J. Nunn, a Jefferson High School counselor, has filed for the Woodlawn post held by his wife, Bobbie, and is the only candidate.

actual cost amounts to only \$3.45. Actual net to The Press is \$169.03 -
an increase of \$37.32 over estimated net.

Regarding that same memorandum: (item 2, second paragraph - COST)
Cost of placards was \$38.00 - a savings of \$2.00 over estimated cost.
Cost of cab service remains the same.

Item 3 was never completed although contact and discussion was held

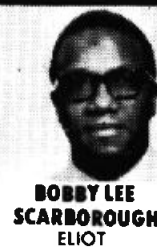

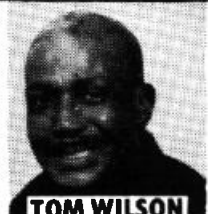

2 Losers Protest Election

Two apparent losers in the election of neighborhood representatives to the Portland Model City Citizens Planning Board say they will challenge the results of last Saturday's polling, it is announced by the Model City office.

Tom Wilson, who received 36 votes to 60 for Mrs. Barbara Friday in the Sabin area, and R.L. Anderson, who garnered 30 votes to 50 for Robert W. Boyer in the Boise neighborhood, told the Model City office Monday they will seek an injunction against seating those elected to represent the eight neighborhoods in the Model City area.

AMONG THEIR objections are claims that the ballot form used was confusing, that sample ballots were not distributed to voters prior to the election and that Model City staff members staffed some polling places.

Wilson and Anderson were joined by three other candidates who were defeated on the basis of reported vote tallies. They are Mrs. Ruthann Fountaine of Vernon, John L. Hartley of Irvington and Richard Dean Yarbrough of King.

Besides Boyer in Boise and Mrs. Friday in Sabin, winners on the basis of returns reported by the Model City office were:

ELIOT, Pastor Edgar L. Jackson, 43 of a total of 50 votes cast; Humboldt, Mrs. Opal Strong, 120 of 189 votes cast; Irvington, Christopher T. Thomas, 90 of 170 votes cast; King, Mrs. Marian L. Scott, 56 of 82 votes cast; Vernon, LeRoy Patton, 70 of 98 votes cast; Woodlawn Joe Nunn, 68 of 70 votes cast.

In the 8 Model City neighborhoods, 910 votes were cast, exactly the same number as in last year's election. Three districts, however, had increased voter turnout — Vernon, Humboldt and Irvington.



To set up ground-work I have broken the Model Neighborhood into its eight (8) voting components since each has an individual situation.

Over the three year period, there seems to be no real election pattern except in diminished voter participation. In 1969, however, it is interesting to note that there was a larger candidate roster than in either of the other years and yet the "low total" was 2. This would lead one to believe that candidates for that particular year were not necessarily campaigners or representative of the citizenry.

In 1970 we started with four candidates but by election time, two had withdrawn leaving Robert W. Boyer to face R. L. Anderson. Boyer defeated Anderson in what would appear to be a fairly balanced voting pattern and we can assume, by work of the candidates themselves, that they both were active in pre-election campaigning. Due to the notoriety surrounding Anderson there may have also been a voter back-lash in favor of his opponent. (Anderson has since challenged the election on a number of counts.)

Over the three year period we can recognize a definite decrease in voter participation (even though we had, as noted, a sizable field of candidates in 1969). It leads me to believe that, among other things, certified candidates did not or could not generate the required enthusiasm with area residents. There are, of course, other probable causes for this small turn-out, but they will be covered in a general way further on in this evaluation.

In the total picture, Eliot has had poor representation in all areas and a diminishing profile over the three year period. This years picture, vote-wise, is severely unbalanced with incumbent Rev. E. L. Jackson running against Bobby Lee Scarborough as his only opposition. That Scarborough received a mere 7 votes would lead one to assume that he did not campaign enough, that Rev. Jackson is, by now, an Eliot "household word" or both.

It is reasonable to assume that Jackson, being a present board member and quite active in other community affairs, had the upper hand , but another assumption might also be put forth -- that area residents saw no clear cut choice in a field of two and therefore were reluctant to take time to vote in what was a lop-sided election.

Taking Eliot just a step further, it might be noted that in 1969 Rev. Eugene Boyd was elected to the board but has, over the past year, registered less-than-adequate attention to board meeting attendance. Interested area residents are sure to have noticed this and I believe that situation can also be a detracting factor. One last point, Eliot is one of the more blighted districts within the Model Neighborhood and yet -- at election time, Irvington and Woodlawn (two of the better areas) are the areas that are slated for "uplifting." This, to an Eliot resident, could also be a "turn-off" factor.

It will be noted that voter interest in Humboldt greatly increased in 1970 with at least a fair number of candidates running. Opal Strong, incumbent, won handily over her closest opposition, George Christian -- 120 to 58. Mr. Christian and Vicki Ida Jones filed after the cut-off date had been extended and it is my feeling that this accounted for a sizable percentage of the increased voter participation. Again, as in Eliot, we can chart the "edge" that incumbents hold over their opposition.

At least three of the four candidates are familiar names in the community -- all active on various programs, committees and/or boards and all, to the best of my knowledge, campaigned vigorously. The fact that Strong and Christian implemented their own voter transportation "shuttles" probably accounts, in part, for the increased voter participation also. X

Once more we have a blatant inconsistency in candidate voting. William Sanderlin, an early filer, apparently chose not to vote or campaign as attested to by a "no vote" next to his name. The quality of the candidate (or the criteria that allows a candidate to be certified) comes under considerable question -- again, a point that we will cover in general later on in the evaluation. It is difficult to believe that voter interest could drop so sharply and then rise so sharply in two consecutive years unless candidate appeal is strongly considered.

As with Humboldt, we have an increase in voter response this year. Christopher Thomas, an attorney, 25 years of age, caucasian, won handily over representative-appointed Burnett Austin, Sr. -- 90 to 53. Austin, prior to the count, would have seemed the likely winner -- a long-time area resident, a family man with three children in area schools and an incumbent. It's to be assumed that Thomas was an active campaigner in an area that is predominantly white middle-class. (As an aside, it might be mentioned that Thomas is associated, in a business sense, with Lee Kell's law firm and every little bit helps -- as we all should recognize. There is, by the way, no intimation here -- simply a fact of life!)

In John L. Hartley, we have a "late-starter" (although he had filed prior to original cut-off date) who might have made a better showing had he begun his campaigning sooner than the three days prior to election. (Hartley expressed an inclination to contest the election after the ballots were counted, but it has not been determined whether he will pursue this course or not.)

We do note a somewhat balanced voting pattern this year as opposed to 1969 and coupled with an increase in turn-out, we might even have an encouraging trend to look for in 1971.

King, as with the majority of areas, showed another decrease in voter interest although the candidate roster (along with that of Sabin) was the largest. Mrs. Scott, a very active community figure, swamped her four opponents with 56 of 82 votes cast.

The King turn-out is poor but might have been caused, in part, by the fact that Candidate Night in that area was not promoted as in the other seven districts. Although a meeting was conducted at Highland Community Center, notification was word of mouth and candidates, with the exception of Mrs. Scott and Judith Aiken were not aware of the gathering. In all cases, except Scott's and possibly Smith's, candidates were little-known and not adequately "seasoned" for campaigning. Once more we have a low vote of 3 -- an unfortunate

but fairly representative picture of candidate profile.

It should be noted that Opal Strong, a Humboldt candidate received one write-in vote in the King area. How can this be explained except for lack of sufficient voter information preparation? It is interesting to see that during all 3 elections, King has had adequate candidate representation (although this doesn't mean quality candidate representation.)

Sabin area, along with King, registered the largest field of choice for candidates and also shows the smallest percentage of decrease in voter participation for the 3 year period of all 8 areas. Barbara Friday registered a surprise victory over two seated board members, Ted Baugh and Tom Wilson--60-44-36. Turn-out was the third highest for the Model Neighborhood possibly showing that youth and a common-sense approach to areas of concern could win over chronological maturity and filibuster.

Wilson and Baugh were active campaigners as was Mrs. Friday, but in Wilson's case caustic, often aimless, criticism of the program may have cost him votes. (Wilson is also contesting the election.)

It appears that, even with a falling-off of voters, Sabin is maintaining as one of the more demonstrative voting precincts and one that can offer up a fair cross-section of candidates. Three young adults (under 25) in a field of five is encouraging and it would be hoped that program education will be developed to keep this spirit afloat.

Yet another area that showed an increase in voting that was substantial -- if compared to the year previous -- and with fewer candidates than in part years. LeRoy Patton, a late filer, won handily over his closest opponent, Ruthann Fountaine, and it could be assumed that, as with R. L. Anderson, Fountaine's "bad press" had something to do with Patton's large vote and the increased voting in general. Leech, who ran last year and got no votes, was

also a late filer but, to my knowledge, did not actively campaign. (Mrs. Fountaine is contesting the election.)

Patton has been active in many community affairs and is a teacher at Adams. (student votes may have helped him, also.)

Vernon, as you know, was a one-candidate area until filing deadlines were extended.

Woodlawn was absolutely unique in its candidate structure. Joe Nunn filed to replace his wife, Bobbie Nunn, and upset his only opponent (running as a "token" candidate in as much as no one else would bother to file) 78 to 2.

The Nunns are a highly respected family in the Woodlawn area, but surely there are other people with ample qualifications that could have prevented this self-perpetuation image.

Voter turn-out has dropped drastically and, as in the Eliot situation, it might be stated that there was no choice of candidates which may well have resulted in lack of citizen involvement. Elections in this precinct were definitely not representative and that should be an area of utmost concern.

Although we did not lose ground in the total picture (1969-1970), it is apparent that we did in district versus district totals. We lost a total of 260 votes in areas where turn-out was reduced this year so in effect we polled 260 votes less than last year. What can be done to prevent this same occurrence in 1971?

In Part One (of my book!!) I have attempted to present a picture of this years elections -- in some cases relying on past years knowledge of candidates and/or area. Part Two concerns itself with stimulating voter interest and the role that Citizens Participation will have to assume if we are to re-ignite the citizen interest.

I cannot be totally objective since the extent of my participation in this years elections was limited to media promotion (and further limited by a late arrival on the Model Cities Program scene). There are areas that I might point a finger at, however, in the hope that elections will be more representative in the coming years.

My first impulse is to say that we/they/someone dropped the ball -- based on lack of resident involvement. With a potential voter strength of 20,000, it is sad to realize we gathered only 910 votes -- less than 5%. It's realistic to recognize that a high percentage of the Model Neighborhood is turned-off, or if you prefer, lacking in social/political consciousness. Motivation is at a low as evidenced by the areas' poor record of voter registration. A deeper problem, although one that is tangent to the first, is a lower educational profile -- not so evident with the upcoming students (although it is still speculative as to how well "today's better educational institutions" are coping with this problem) -- but with our middle-aged and elderly citizens. Therefore, if we are to have citizens participation and motivation we have to address ourselves to these areas immediately (within the limits of the Program, of course)..

Citizens Participation (Agency) is the responsibility to reach affected residents in a meaningful, positive manner -- 365 days a year -- for the remainder of the program so that when Model Cities is no longer a functioning body, the concept will have been adopted and in a position to be carried forward. X

On the other hand, citizens' participation (people) is the desire of the community in question to make its collective powers felt, to guide its own future and, in this instance, to elect its own representatives who will supply the direction that will make the community "one."

People will not come to us -- sad, but true. Locked away in this community "mind" is the thought that Model Cities: is a game; is someone else's program; is a non-productive government cop-out; is a "feather-bed" situation for those of us who hold down staff positions, etc., etc. We have, either consciously or unconsciously, locked ourselves away from the very element we need to reach. These situations will always exist in the minds of some individuals but from a collective standpoint this need not be the case. "Reach out and touch..."

I hate to admit it, but for all the mass media promotion we implemented this year we came up empty-handed. Saturation we need but apparently on a person-to-person basis. If we are really concerned with next year's election, then we must begin to gear ourselves to it now!

We've mentioned the use of radio. Let's do it -- maybe not on a grand scale but on a consistent basis. Every day, if possible. We must be careful, however,

to remember the example set by none-other than Sesame Street -- to teach effectively, we must also entertain. If we represent a "people program" then we must present ourselves as people -- not as just another "agency." Consider expanding our informational half-hour program into a citizen-Model Cities representative dialogue program -- either "in person" or via telephone.

Neighborhood Organizations need our support but we also need theirs. Coordination at top level is important -- not only to carry their approval but to keep tabs on what they are doing. Was, for instance, the Woodlawn Association in any way responsible for an almost one-candidate race? Couldn't they have made a more respectable race out of this year's elections? Could we have helped them in any ways other than what we did? Consider a once-a-month meeting with these organizations. X

Our news-letter is young, it's expensive but it is also necessary. We need input however. We need lively comment and, I believe, a departure from text-book structure. If we mailed to only those we knew would be interested, would grasp, would care then that would be one thing. When we mail to 15,000, however, we have a different ball game. Consider and advise on a more meaningful approach to this project that costs us approximately \$1,000 a month.

We have children in schools who have eager, quick minds. If we educate the children they can lift our load at home. Consider setting up assemblies for guest speakers, films, general discussion. Meet the student leaders and get them involved. Get the teachers involved. Is it possible to set up a situation where school papers could cover and run articles on Model Cities happenings (yes, we might lose our skins a few times, but then our city dailies aren't too delicate at times, either).

There are approximately 140 minority businesses in this community and we need these businessmen. No; they won't all be on our side, but we need their participation in any case. Not just for surveys, or random samplings, but for "pulse." These businessmen know more about the community than we can ever hope to know and we need to tap this "storehouse."

Churches are abundant. We must speak from these platforms -- continuously -- and we need the support of these church leaders.

We have the news media and that is, at least now, not an area for concern since in most cases we are asking for and receiving positive cooperation.

All of the mentioned areas must be hammered at throughout the coming year in order to stimulate and motivate. If we can reach the leaders, they can ease the load. Above all, we need to get to the citizens if we want them to open up to us. After all, we are not Model Cities -- The Mayor's Program, we are Model Cities -- The People Program (with all due respect, of course!). We are "them" -- "they" are not us! If "they" were, we wouldn't be in the position to help -- there would be no one left to help. So, we now have partially laid the ground work within Citizens Participation (agency) for citizen participation (people).

Election time will be here again in another year. Looking over last year's evaluation and recommendations, I think we might have taken some constructive steps from there. The evaluation is attached -- the underlining is mine.


It is unfortunate that election deadlines were extended if only because we lose when we falter -- and falter we did. It would be valuable if we could offer campaign instruction to those interested or in need prior to election time -- candidates and concerned citizens alike.

Could we set up a system of roving polls within each area (if you put it under my nose, I'm likely to see it)? If the people won't come to us, let's go to them.

Criticism has been leveled regarding the desirability of at least two of this year's candidates. What does their candidacy do to our credibility as a progressive program? Rehabilitation has its limits. Can't we strengthen our criteria without strangling ourselves--we do have responsibility to the individual but we also have responsibility to the whole and if necessary, I think we must compromise to truly represent the whole.

Please note in last year's recommendations, the portion devoted to candidacy by petition. Can it be done? If so, why not try it. If nothing else, it would save us the embarrassment of having candidates running but earning not one vote -- not even their own!

Well, that's my input. Rambling and maybe off-center but sincere nonetheless. Maybe there is something in it we can use. We can't afford another election like the two past.

The Election Committee met October 2, 1969 to certify and evaluate the election. It was the conclusion that the mechanics of the election were very good. There were few problems associated with the polling places, election clerks, poll watchers and ballot counting. We feel the election was fair and honest in every way. The counting was deemed correct and was notarized. Hence, the Election Committee certifies the election and declares those indicated as having the most votes as elected. The votes for each candidate are listed on attached sheet.

The Committee realizes that there may be requests for recounts or other possible challenges. It is the feeling of the Committee that the Citizens Planning Board should handle such requests and dispose of such requests within 30 days at which times the ballots and stubs will be destroyed. The Committee intends to dissolve itself, but if the Citizens Planning Board desires to look into any problems, the Committee would be willing to reconvene itself for that purpose.

The Committee by no means feels that the election was anywhere near perfect; certainly the turnout was very disappointing. The Committee would like to offer some comments -

1. More time should have been and must be allowed for an election. We had approximately 25 days for the entire election process. Candidates had little time to campaign, particularly, those who filed at the last minute - on September 22. Next year this problem will be alleviated by the Citizens Planning Board's policy of an election every year on the last Saturday of September. However, we would recommend that the final filing date be approximately one month prior to the date of the election. Also we would recommend that the Citizens Planning Board have all rules changes and procedures decided one month prior to the election. (The fact that the Citizens Planning Board changed some rules only 11 days prior to this election complicated the Committee's work and probably confused residents.)

(*) apparently a re-occurring situation!

2. We feel the low turnout was due to many factors. Probably, the main one was the lack of visible activity of the Model Cities Program during the past months. The fact that Model Cities will soon have programs in operation and we will be an ongoing agency should increase the interest and turnout next year. Also, it is hoped that by next year community organizations will be functioning in all areas and that they will be able to assist in any elections.

3. As a Committee we undoubtedly made mistakes. * One was lack of television and radio advertising. This, however, was due in part to the lack of time. For TV spot announcements, almost three weeks lead time is required. Radio also requires some lead time. These facts were not known so we did not have any TV or radio advertising. We will know better next time.

4. The Committee was confused as to the status of those receiving the second largest number of votes. Do these people become alternates or not? We would like a clarification from the Citizens Planning Board. The Committee would also like to make some concrete suggestions for next year's election. These are not recommendations, but suggestions we feel should be explored by the Citizens Planning Board.

1) We definitely feel the election precinct boundaries are confusing. In many cases they do not follow school boundaries, and in others the school boundaries themselves are illogical. We would strongly recommend these boundaries be studied and redrawn. If nothing else boundary lines should be squared and put in a straight line to alleviate confusion of both the voter and the election clerk.

2) We would like to suggest the possibility of establishing a run-off election between the two top candidates, two weeks after the election if no one obtains a majority. This would insure that the person elected had a majority and a run-off might create more interest - due to more campaigning, etc. In most cases the winner is elected by a plurality particularly when 6 or 7 candidates are running.

* Worth exploring - but expensive without prior "conditioning".

3) We feel 8 precincts were not enough. At any regular primary or general election approximately 50 voting places are provided. We feel more precincts should be made available and a procedure for accomplishing this be established. If this is done it might also solve the school boundary line problem.

4) We would also like to suggest the possibility of candidates filing by petition. A petition would create interest - certify the candidate had some support and involve the community in the filing process. The number of signatures necessary for one to be on the ballot should be kept low - say 25 signatures, but we consider it a possibility worth exploring.

5) If the petition suggestion were adopted, it might also be explored that a person from out of the particular school area be allowed to file if he can obtain the necessary signatures from the area in which he is running. This might solve some residency questions.

We would hope that the Rules Committee or some other appropriate committee of the Citizens Planning Board look at our suggestions. We would hope that next year with more time and better procedures to have a larger turnout, and better election. We would like to thank all those who helped on this election - working long hours for no pay and little thanks. They did a good job under difficult conditions.

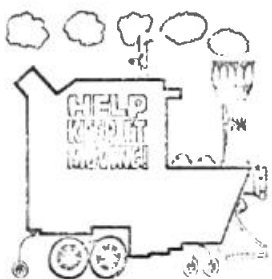

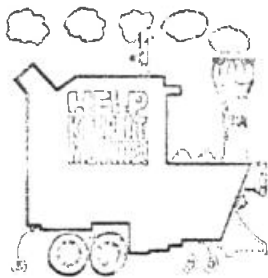

It was moved by Mr. Wilson that the Election Report be moved to Item IV on the Agenda. Seconded. Motion carried.

The Minutes were approved.

Report of Election Committee:

Mr. Lee D. Kell, Chairman, introduced Mr. Ray Coffman, Chairman of the Election Committee. Mr. Coffman made a brief comment concerning the Report.

It was noted that the Report (item I) should be changed to show twenty-seven (27) instead of twenty-eight (28) candidates, since one withdrew.

It was moved by Mrs. Strong to strike out the provision for write-in candidates. Seconded. Mr. Wilson asked for a roll call vote. 10-No, 6-Yes and 1-abstaining. Motion failed.

It was moved by Mr. Jones to rule out proxies, unless they are in writing. Motion ruled out of order by Chair.

It was moved by Mrs. Norman to accept the Election Report as amended. Mrs. Cogan amended the motion to show that a provision would be made to enable shut-ins to vote by carrying ballots to homes, since there will be no ninth polling place. Seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Kell announced that a meeting would be held on October 8, 1970, to develop priorities for the Second Action Year programs.

It was moved by Mr. Baskett to approve all projects listed on the Agenda - STAR, Pre-School Expansion, Timmy School, Portland Childrens Center, and Educational Aides - for Second Action Year funding. The motion was amended by Mrs. Nunn to accept all of the proposals with the exception of Educational Aides, until such time as an evaluation of this project has been completed. It was further amended by Mr. Jones to have the project evaluation brought back to the Board within a time limit not to extend October 8, 1970. Seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Seconded. Motion failed.

A request was made by Mrs. Clara Peoples, that when the Working Committees pass proposals they should not lay around in the Model Cities Office. An original copy should be placed in the files by a reliable person. Copies of the proposal should be given to the Director. Copies should only be given to the Chairman of the Working Committee and persons who worked on it, and should not be given to any one who did not work on the proposal.

It was moved by Mr. Ward to adopt contents of report made by Personnel Hiring Committee. Seconded. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mrs. Cogan to have a letter drawn up from the Citizens Planning Board to the appropriate Committee in HUD, regarding the delay in approval of the Multi-Service Center proposal. This letter is to be written by the Model Cities Agency. Seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Seconded. Motion carried.

Meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m.







June 29, 1970

The recommendations from the 1969 Election Committee were reviewed and evaluated by assigned Citizens Participation staff and a 1970 Election Procedure Draft was written in proposal form. The draft copy of the 1970 Citizens Planning Board Election Proposal was completed June 29, 1970. (Attachment I)

July 6, 1970

A meeting was held in the office of Mr. Lee Kell, Chairman of the Citizens Planning Board. Those present were Mrs. Brenda J. Green, Citizens Participation Coordinator, and Mrs. Lillie Walker, Citizens Participation staff member assigned to the election project. A representative from the League of Women Voters was unable to attend. Highlights of the meeting centered around the discussion for the need of Citizens Planning Board action regarding internal boundaries for the Model Cities area. After the July 6, 1970 meeting, active recruitment of representatives from each of the eight (8) elementary school areas to serve on the 1970 Election Committee began. Names were solicited from Neighborhood Organization chairmen and in areas where organizations were not active, names were obtained from Citizens Planning Board representatives. At this time the 1969 Election Committee's recommendations were reviewed by all persons present. The Rules Committee was requested to clarify boundaries. The League of Women Voters established their role as tabulating ballots and observers at polling sites. Mr. Ray Coffman was elected Chairman of the Election Committee.

July 29, 1970

A request was received from the Citizens Planning Board Chairman for a report of election activities for the Citizens Planning Board meeting, August 4, 1970.

July 30, 1970

A report was compiled by staff and discussed with the Election Committee Chairman.

August 4, 1970

The Election Committee report was given by Mr. Ray Coffman at the Citizens Planning Board meeting. The Election Proposal was approved with the following corrections.

1. Instead of establishing more than eight (8) precincts, insert not more than eight (8) precincts.
2. Candidates age lowered from 20 to 18 years.
3. A decision was made that in the event of a tie vote the Neighborhood Organizations would cast the decisive vote. (See Attachments I and II)

August 10, 1970

A meeting was held at Mr. John Weldon's office (Registrar of Elections) for the purpose of examining official election forms and obtaining useful information to assist Citizens Participation staff and Election Committee with the 1970 Citizens Planning Board Election. Those present were Mrs. Bernice Moore, Mr. John Weldon, Mrs. Lillie Walker, Mr. Coffman. Mr. Weldon volunteered the following list of materials for use on election day. (CDA secured material at a later date.)

1. "Vote Here" signs (posted on the entrance of each school)
2. 16 Tally sheets
3. 16 Statement sheets
4. 8 poll sign-in books
5. Ballot boxes
6. Seals and locks for ballot boxes
7. Stub boxes

August 11, 1970

Election Committee held a meeting at the Albina Branch Library. Two additional officers were elected:

Secretary - Regina Flowers

Accomplishments were:

1. Election activity time table tentatively filled in.
2. Approval of filing application forms. (Attachment III)
3. Press release suggestions made by staff and approved.

August 17, 1970

A meeting of the Election Committee was held at the Neighborhood Development office.

Discussion:

1. Use of absentee ballots
2. 12 volunteers from each Neighborhood Organization to man polls
3. Letter to be mailed to all churches and organizations in the Model Neighborhood concerning election and deadline dates for candidates.
4. Use of media for election publicity.

August 19, 1970

Letter and election flyers were delivered to churches and organizations.

August 31, 1970

The Election Committee met to certify candidates who had filed on deadline date of August 28, 1970 at 5:00 pm.

Twenty-three candidates were certified by Election Committee. It was announced at this meeting by staff that an orientation session would be held at the Registrar of Elections office. (See Attachments IV and V)

September 1, 1970

Candidates that were certified began requesting flyers, based upon their draft flyer. Ideas for posters were developed on draft paper and later (September 20, 1970) displayed on Rose City Cabs and in neighborhood shopping areas for added publicity.

September 8, 1970

The Citizens Planning Board voted to extend candidates filing date to September 18, 1970. (Attachment VI and VII)

September 9, 1970

Election Committee met at the Election Registrar's office for an orientation to train volunteers who would be manning polling sites.

September 15, 1970

Election Committee met to certify four (4) candidates. Of these four (4) candidates one (1) was certified to run in the Irvington area due to a change in his residency he was certified for the King area (Richard Geisert). Progress reports were given from each area representative on volunteers for manning the polls.

September 18, 1970

Election Committee met at Model Cities office at 5:30 pm to immediately certify candidates filing at 5:00 pm, final deadline date. This enabled candidates who filed this late to have seven (7) full days for campaigning. (Attachment VIII)

The Election Committee was informed by staff that one candidate had withdrawn her application on September 17, 1970, at 11:05 am - (Gwendolyn Henderson)

September 21, 1970

Election Committee met to discuss election day procedures. (Attachment IX)

Sample ballot approved. (Attachment X)

September 22, 1970

Report to Citizens Planning Board on election activity. Approval of Election Procedures given to the Election Committee. (Attachment XI)

September 25, 1970

Model Cities staff assignments were issued to all staff member by Citizens Participation Coordinator. (Attachments XII and XIII)

Election Committee reviewed final procedures and made final preparations for election day.

September 26, 1970

Coffee and donuts were supplied by CDA staff to each polling site.

Schedule of volunteers to man polls was posted at each polling site, so that volunteers would know who was to relieve them. (See Attachments XIII and XIIIa)

The Election Committee did remain on stand-by in the event a volunteer was not able to meet his assignment.

Ballot boxes and voting material were brought to the Model Cities Agency by the volunteers manning the polls with the Election Committee representative from the appropriate area. Results of the election were tabulated by the League of Women Voters at the Model Cities office. (8:30 pm - 10:30 pm) (Attachment XV)

One last comment, as you probably noticed the ballots did reflect the misleading phrase "each candidate" when "one" candidate should have appeared. However, only five (5) ballots were challenged and counted void during the tally by the League of Women Voters. Poll workers were instructed early in the day to comment to voters "vote for only one."

1970 CITIZENS PLANNING BOARD ELECTION1. PURPOSE AND BENEFICIARIES

The intent of this proposal is to provide for the smooth operation of the Citizen Planning Board Election and to generate the highest degree of citizen involvement possible.

The participants are model neighborhood residents fourteen (14) years and older, League of Women Voters, Neighborhood Organizations, Citizen Planning Board, Working Committees and the Citizen Participation staff of the City Demonstration Agency. All participants, as well as the City of Portland as a whole should benefit through the election process.

2. CONTENT AND OPERATION

The functional elements of the election proposal are as follows:

- 2-01-01 Inform residents, organizations and interested groups of the Model Cities, Citizens Planning Board election
- 2-01-02 Seek cooperation from and coordinate model neighborhood and city-wide groups and organizations to assist in the election

- 02 Meet with League of Women Voters to ensure continued cooperation in ballot tabulation

- 04 Meet with chairmen of all neighborhood organizations for appointments to election committee, as well as securing cooperation in the distribution of materials and setting up general meetings to afford candidates opportunity to speak to neighborhood groups

- 05 Provide for absentee ballot

- 09 Allow adequate time for election preparation in order that candidates final filing date will be one month prior to election date, thus giving candidates one month to campaign

- 01 Encourage all model neighborhood residents to participate in some phase of the election, whether through voting, distribution of literature or otherwise

3. TIMETABLE

Election preparations will begin no later than July 1, 1970 and will end September 27, 1970. See attachment #1, Timetable Chart.

4. FUNDING

Funds will be secured from the City Demonstration Agency administrative budget.

5. PROJECT ADMINISTRATION

The Citizens Participation unit of the City Demonstration Agency will coordinate the election with the cooperation of the Citizens Planning Board.

6. COORDINATION

As stated in functional element #2 and key activities within this element, the Citizens Participation unit of the City Demonstration Agency will seek to coordinate the efforts and activities of all interested groups and organizations.

7. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The Citizens Participation unit, with the cooperation of the Citizens Planning Board, the Election Committee and representatives of other groups and organizations participating in the election, will attempt to evaluate the election process. The process of this proposal will be measured by answering the following questions:

The CPB has adopted election procedures, utilizing help from LWV.

Brenda Green will prepare a report on the appointed members and the terms which expire at this time. When I receive the report, I'll discuss it with you.

Model Cities Vote Set Up

The Model Cities Citizens Planning Board turned back a bid Tuesday night to eliminate write-in candidates in the Sept. 26 planning board election.

In adopting rules for the election, the board killed a provision for absentee ballots but allowed registrars to obtain ballots from those unable to go to the polling places.

Twenty-seven persons are running for eight positions on the board, one from each of the eight elementary school districts in the Model Cities area.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. in Boise, Eliot, Humboldt, Irvington, King, Sabin, Vernon and Woodlawn schools and will be monitored by the League of Women Voters, which will also count the ballots.

The Model Cities staff will provide transportation to the polls for any who needs it.

In other action at the regular meeting, the board approved extensions through Dec. 31, 1971, of four existing programs, three of them aiding retarded persons.

The fourth is an expansion of education for 80 preschool children, who also are receiving various social services.

The board tabled until Oct. 8 an extension of the Education Aides program, in which 20 persons are being trained to become teachers.

Board members wanted to see an evaluation of the effectiveness of the project before they extended it.

Dear Mayor Schrunk:

You have requested that this office review Article II, Section 8 of the Rules and Operating Procedure of the Citizens' Planning Board of the Model Cities Program.

Article II, Section 8, reads as follows:

When an elected member moves from his school attendance area, his position becomes vacant. This vacancy is to be temporarily filled by the Board upon recommendation from the recognized Neighborhood Organization at the Neighborhood Organization's next regular meeting. The replacement shall serve until the next regular Model Cities Board Election, at which time the position will be declared vacant.

After reading the above quoted language, it is evident that the drafters of said section intended that only a temporary appointment be made to fill a position vacated when a member moves from his school attendance area. The period of said temporary appointment would be from the date of the vacancy until the next regular Model Cities Board Election. The position would then be filled by the election process. Thus assuming that the regular Model Cities Board election is on October 1st and a vacancy occurs on September 15th, it follows that if and when an appointment is made to fill said vacancy, the period of said appointment will only be for 15 days (September 15 to October 1). On October 1st, the position is declared vacant and is filled by the election process.

If this office may be of any further assistance, we shall be glad to render same.

controversy between the State of Oregon and the Federal Power Commission, such as the Pelton Dam case which the state lost in the U. S. Supreme Court.

What is needed most is an early solution to the killing of downstream migrant fish to coincide with the better upstream passage of adult salmon and steelhead now assured. The suit attempting to collect millions from the companies for past losses could delay such a solution rather than hasten it.

Shaping up in suburbia

Critics of aesthetic discord and suburban sprawl have long awaited the announcement by Beaverton city officials that they will evaluate a comprehensive plan during the next 12 months.

Consultants to the plan are Medford planners Langford and Stewart, designers of the state's Willamette Valley Plan, who, by September, 1972, will have spent some \$54,000 in local and federal funds to get Beaverton squared away.

Everyone is optimistic, of course, agreeing generally things can only get better before they get worse. Looking at some 49 square miles of city and surrounding lands, there is talk of wistful vista open spaces, new housing and apartment codes, as well as design review and sign control.

Announcing the program, City Manager Lawrence Sprecher commented: "It clearly tells us that if we want to maintain our present livability, we better start making plans."

Sprecher, an ardent fisherman and well known humorist, has declared he will return trout to the streams as well.

"Beaverton," said the former city manager of Burbank, Calif., "is not an example of poor planning, but of no planning at all." Few will disagree. Where was a comprehensive plan when it was needed, before the deluge that has increased population 212 per cent since 1960?

Sprecher and his planners are confronted with an amoebic non-place, an entity synonymous with "ticky-tacky, honky-tonk and schlock," bisected by railroads and highways, stomped on by shopping centers — identifiable only by the ironic "Welcome to Beautiful Beaverton" signs. Sprecher put those there.

ning projects, proposed freeways and street couplets in a kind of benevolent overkill.

At a recent meeting of the Eliot Neighborhood Planning Association, gathered to hear another planning effort by the PDC, frustrations were revealed. The small audience, predominately old, religious and once patient, applauded a young man who plainly said: "Let's face it, they simply want us out of here. The land we're sitting on is a goldmine."

Extreme perhaps, but the applause was joined by members of the board itself, whose anger bubbled from beneath the loose lid of bureaucratic responsibility. They pointed to the home gobbling Emanuel Hospital project, the swath to be cut by the Rose City Freeway and inevitability of displacement to come with the completion of the Fremont Bridge.

They also point to the establishment "across the river," accusing it of not soliciting participation and representation in the meetings and on the boards where the fate of the city's neighborhoods is decided.

To eliminate apathy and implement ideals on the human level, Model Cities must be seen as a neighborhood and not simply a troubled area; its people not segregated but accepted into the total life of greater Portland.

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Shaping up in suburbia

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If Beaverton can succeed and survive, then perhaps we can look forward to a hopeful reinterpretation of our suburban neighborhoods.

'World across the river'

Last week's election of representatives to the Portland Model City Citizen Planning Board generated about as much response from residents as the coming of the first fall rains.

Less than 800 of some 15,000 to 20,000 eligible voters in the North and Northeast Portland area appeared at the polls, compared with last year's equally disappointing turnout of 914.

Understandably, the response is indicative of growing apathy, often despair, of people whose neighborhoods have been surrounded and infiltrated by, to many of them, enigmatic programs of progress simply beyond the scope of everyday comprehension.

Out of City Hall, the Portland Development Commission and the State Highway Department — "the world across the river," in their language — comes the increasing deluge of plan-

In the absence of Mayor Terry D. Schrunk, I'm responding to your letter to the Mayor concerning boundaries of the Model Cities area. When he returns next week, I'll bring the matter to his attention.

As I related to you on the telephone, I'm checking the records of 1968 for references to the agreement on interpretation of the boundary lines. Boundaries were stated in the Revisions To Planning Grant Application, which the City Council authorized to be filed with HUD through adoption of Resolution No. 30174, adopted February 15, 1968. The boundary description in that document started at a street location and extended "along" various streets including N. E. 22nd Avenue.

I'm advised by Model Cities staff that your name is on their mailing lists and that mailing procedures will be reviewed to assure transmittal of future items.

Dear Mayor Schrunk:

It has been slightly more than a year since the expiration of my term of office as Model Cities Planning Board representative for the Vernon district. It has been indeed a strange year. I have desired to participate as an ordinary resident of the model neighborhood; but to this date I am still excluded from receiving simple information such as the meeting schedule for the Vernon neighborhood association, even though I have made several attempts to get them.

The crowning blow, however, was when I learned that on September 21, the Planning Board had capriciously disenfranchised quite a few of its residents, including me. I am referring to those of us who live on the outer side of the MN boundary streets.

At the beginning of the program, the project steering committee and the City Council agreed that boundaries encompassed entire streets. Reasons included the simple fairness of allowing the outer side people to plan and vote on projects that would affect them. It was because of this agreement that I was eligible to be an elected member of the Planning Board. It was because of this agreement that the Board approved and forwarded to you a traffic safety petition signed by outer side residents only.

I am writing simply because this is another tragic example of the lip-service being paid to citizens participation in the Model Cities program. CDA staff doesn't seem to have advised the Board that their action would exclude citizens. On the other hand, if they did so advise the Board, then its members didn't even notify us affected citizens of their intent!

The new motto of your CDA seems to be "Portland Model Cities - An Achievement in Human Endeavor". After 13 months of citizen participation runaround, it has become obvious to me that the motto applies to the humans of the CDA, City Council, and agencies--certainly not to those humans who are the residents of the Model Neighborhood.

Background Information

(A) Concern expressed by Mr. Wolmut -- (1) As a person living on the east side of N. E. 22nd, he is directly affected by a recent interpretation that the boundaries for the Model Cities run "along" streets and extend to the center of each street similar to census tracts and other property descriptions.

(2) He recently expressed an interest in re-activating the Law and Justice Working Committee and he was invited by the CPB Vice-Chairman to take charge. (Correspondence attached) He now feels that the interpretation precludes this possibility, since officers of a committee must be "residents of the Model Cities area." It is also a matter of principle with him since he has been a dedicated participant in the past.

(3) Mr. Wolmut was elected to the CPB March 2, 1968, from this residential location along with James Thompson, Jr., as representatives of Vernon Neighborhood. He actively served a term as a CPB member.

(4) The existing boundary description was forwarded to HUD by the City Council along with City Council Resolution No. 31074, adopted February 15, 1968. This description lists several streets as the geographic boundaries. (See copy attached) Mr. Wolmut states that there was an agreement at the beginning of the program, between the early project steering committee and city representatives to accept an interpretation which extends to both sides of the boundary streets. He cites his election from the outer side of a boundary street as the precedent coming from this interpretation. (Records are being reviewed to search for any related references.)

(5) The Model Cities Staff reports that his name is included on their mailing lists and they are reviewing mailing procedures to assure that he will receive future items.

(B) Evaluation Data Mentioned By Mr. Peyton -- (1) I presume this is a reference to activities which have been underway in recent weeks to obtain data to be used in planning and evaluation of the Portland Model Cities Program. (Ordinance No. 132943 authorized W. Kenneth Calvin to conduct interviews with community leaders and Ordinance No. 132964 authorized a contract with Bardsley & Haslacher to conduct interviews with neighborhood residents.)

(2) I've discussed this project with Director Charles Jordan and he reports that Calvin has completed his interviews and the resident interviews are nearing completion. The material is being processed internally and nothing has been published at this time, nor discussed in formal sessions to the best of my knowledge.

(3) Mr. Vern Summers of the Human Relations Commission staff recently asked me about this evaluation data. After checking with Mr. Jordan, I forwarded him a note on October 20th to report the status as stated above.

This will acknowledge your letter of October 8th addressed to Mayor Schunk, regarding the withholding of information and the lack of citizen participation by the Model Cities administration.

You have complained of a situation that is of great concern to us. The behavior you describe profoundly affects the total community. We have watched the deterioration of the area since the inception of the program. We too have been critical of the situation which you so accurately described. As an example there has recently been completed a one-hundred page evaluation of the program. It appears that the Mayor's office as well as the director are keeping it under wraps, making sure that the planning board members, other city officials and affected citizens do not see the report.

In view of the present conditions it was good to have you raise the questions. Certainly if the director and the Mayor's office are genuinely interested in the well being of the Model Cities residents they should not balk at interested citizens studying this evaluation report. New directions to the program might produce results that would benefit the entire community.

We sincerely appreciate the effort you made to express your concern. When enough people are willing to make a similar effort then I believe we will see some significant progress toward changing directions.

In response to your telephone request, enclosed is an extract ^{from} ~~of~~ the Amendment to Model Cities Planning Grant Application dealing with selection of the Model Neighborhood boundaries. The Amendment containing this information was prepared in early 1968 and its filing with HUD was authorized by City Council Resolution No. 30174 adopted by the Council on February 15, 1968.

E. REDUCTION OF MODEL NEIGHBORHOOD AREA

- The revised Model Neighborhood area, shown on the boundary description and map which follow on pages 20 and 21, has been modified from the original application in the following manner:

The eastern boundary has been considerably contracted to correspond more closely with the major massing of substandard housing as developed by Portland's Community Renewal Program (CRP). It should be understood that, in contrast to the northern, eastern and southern boundaries, there are no lines of marked change along this entire eastern front. The characteristic is, rather, a gradual transition from poor to good as one moves from west to east. Minor differences in this transitional area account for the somewhat ragged eastern boundary proposed.

Two important changes should be noted. A portion of census tract 32 is retained to include the older housing area around Vernon School and to include Sabin School, a Model School. South of census tract 32 the boundary has been expanded from the original N. E. 18th Avenue to N. E. 21st. This expansion is proposed in order to include more of the Irvington Neighborhood. The Irvington Community Association, a strong neighborhood organization and supporter of this Model Cities Planning Application, strongly urges as much of their area be included as possible. N. E. 21st is an arterial Street which makes a reasonable boundary.

Other boundary changes are minimal.

The net result of these changes has been to reduce the total Model Area population to an estimated 1966 figure of 39,030, to remove from the Model Area some better quality housing and middle-income fringes, and to remove roughly one square mile of non-residential land. This comprises 10.1% of Portland's 1967 estimated population.

REVISED MODEL NEIGHBORHOOD BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

Beginning at the intersection of the North City Limits and N. E. 18th Avenue Extended; thence southerly along N. E. 18th Avenue to N. E. Holman Street; thence East along N. E. Holman Street to N. E. 19th Avenue; thence South along N. E. 19th Avenue to N. E. Ainsworth Street; thence East along N. E. Ainsworth Street to N. E. 22nd Avenue; thence South along N. E. 22nd Avenue to N. E. Prescott Street; thence West along N. E. Prescott Street to N. E. 18th Avenue; thence South along N. E. 18th Avenue to N. E. Fremont Street; thence East along N. E. Fremont Street to N. E. 21st Avenue; thence South along N. E. 21st Avenue to N. E. Broadway; thence West along N. E. Broadway to the Willamette River; thence North along the Willamette River to the proposed Fremont Bridge; thence Northeasterly along the Bridge to Interstate 5 Freeway; thence North along Interstate 5 Freeway to N. Ainsworth Street; thence East along N. Ainsworth Street to N. Albina Avenue; thence North along N. Albina Avenue to N. Portland Blvd.; thence East along N. Portland Blvd. to N. Kerby Avenue; thence South along N. Kerby Avenue to N. Ainsworth Street; thence East along N. Ainsworth Street to N. E. Union Avenue; thence North along N. E. Union Avenue to the North City Limits; thence East along the North City Limits to the point of beginning.
