Support and expand Portland Street Response as a co-equal branch of the first responder system

The Purpose of the Resolution

- Express Council support for PSR
- Clarify Council's intent for PSR to become a 24/7 co-equal branch of the first responder system
- Document PSR's history
- Lay the groundwork for necessary Code changes
- Clarify Council values going into budget discussions



What the Resolution does not do

- Affect bargaining rights in any way, or change the currently-bargained committee
- Affect Portland Fire & Rescue, or firefighters
- Affect Portland Police, or police officers
- Immediately appropriate money towards PSR
- Immediately move PSR to 24/7 service



The Resolution Affirms:

- PSR's ability to respond independently to 911 calls
- PSR's mission of addressing mental and behavioral health crises
- The need for a staffing model that supports providing mental health and peer support to people in crisis
- PSR's access to life-saving supplies in line with de-escalation best practices

The Resolution Urges the Mayor to:

- Maintain and expand shuttling
- Re-establish communications and outreach funding
- Support Council in drafting City Code to include PSR
- Explore designating PSR staff as First Responders

- Launch a search for a permanent PSR
 Program Manager
- Prioritize hiring and training until PSR is staffed for 24/7 response
- Continue to review call types that can be diverted to PSR
- Re-establish an independent PSR program evaluation

The Resolution brings <u>regular</u> <u>Portlanders</u> back into the process of shaping PSR's future:

- There already is a workgroup involving labor,
 which this document does not affect or alter in any way
- This document creates a volunteer PSR Committee:
 - Brings community back into discussions of PSR's future
 - Has no current budgetary impact
 - Does not duplicate existing committees
 - Meets a previously-unmet City commitment
