
DECEMBER 18—SKATING TRIP

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CAMP AND TRIP RULES

Camp must always be left in good order; all refuse to be either burned or buried.

Extreme care should be taken to extinguish the last spark.

Refuse of any nature must never be thrown into

a stream.

Leader in charge of trip is responsible for the party and all parties must abide by his decision in all matters pertaining to the trip.

Coffee, sugar and cream will be furnished by

the leader on each trip.

For information concerning any particular trip, consult your schedule, wherein the phone number of the leader of each trip will be found.

When trips call for registration, same must be made not later than Friday evening preceding the

date trip is scheduled.

Members should always wear their Trails Club buttons on all trips.

Please keep the secretary advised of any change

of address.

Watch the local briefs Thursday or Friday in your newspaper.

A charge of not less than 10 cents will be made

for each person attending a trip.

WEARING APPAREL-

Special care should be taken in footwear in order to insure a comfortable trip. Always wear wool stockings and heavy-soled shoes, or hightop boots with hobnails.

On all camping trips, members and guests must furnish their own blankets and bedding.

NOTE-

The outing committee solicits your co-operation in outlining new trips, and will gladly accept any suggestions in this respect.

RULES FOR NESIKA LODGE

USE OF THE LODGE-

Any member in good standing is privileged to use the lodge at any time, and upon proper application may obtain the key for any time other than regular trip days to the lodge.

KEYS-

Keys may be obtained from Mr. S. Thouvenel's Barber Shop, 108 West Park from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. The names of the members obtaining keys will be registered with Mr. Thouvenel and they will be held responsible for the condition of the cabin on the day or days for which the keys are taken. Keys must be returned to Mr. Thouvenel not later than Wednesday following the trip.

LODGE CHARGES—NON-MEMBERS

A charge of 25c will be made for each day at the Lodge. For those staying more than one day a charge of 25c for the first day and 15c for each additional day will be made.

RULES-

On account of fire risk, no smoking will be allowed upstairs (sleeping quarters).

When papers are spread out on the floor for blankets or bedding, or in any way used on the second floor, they must be cleaned up and burned before leaving. When left lying around, they become a fire hazard.

On account of danger of wood mice and rats starting fire by chewing matches, you will please see that all matches are placed in metal or glass container and top securely fastened before leaving.

Please see that all windows and doors are securely locked when leaving the cabin for the day.

Before leaving the cabin, those responsible will see that fires in both kitchen stove and fireplace are entirely out. Do not leave a single spark—then you will know everything is safe.

On account of danger of water freezing in the pipes during the winter months, it will be necessary to keep water turned off at the supply box at spring, and if this is turned on during the time cabin is in use, be sure that it is securely turned off and the system drained at the opening just west of the cabin before you leave.

If kitchen utensils and dishes are used, see that they are cleaned up and put back in proper places when finished with them.

All closet doors in kitchen must be closed and securely fastened against wood mice and rats.

When garbage is put in pail for that purpose, it must be buried in regular "garbage dump".

No trees are to be cut or trimmed, no underbrush cut or burned unless when so designated or instructed by the lodge committee. No trails are to be built except under the direction of the lodge committee.

Members will be held responsible for any property of the club injured or destroyed by themselves or their guests.

No political or sectarian demonstration will be allowed.

No subscription paper can be circulated nor any article exposed for sale without permission of the lodge committee.
