On December 1, 2000, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), pursuant to the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA or Superfund), included a five and one-half mile section of Portland Harbor on the National Priorities List (NPL). The EPA is moving to begin negotiations on an Administrative Order of Consent with willing Potentially Responsible Parties (PRPs) for the performance of a Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS) to determine the nature and extent of in-water contamination at the Site, and to analyze cleanup alternatives.

The Bureau of Environmental Services, working closely with the City Attorney, has been working closely with the various agencies involved in the Portland Harbor Superfund Site. # RESOLUTION No. 35962

Direct the Bureau of Environmental Services to be the lead agency for the City regarding the Portland Harbor Superfund Site. ( Kesolution)

WHEREAS, on December 1, 2000, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), pursuant to the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA or Superfund), included a five and one-half mile section of Portland Harbor on the National Priorities List (NPL); and

WHEREAS, the inclusion of the Willamette River from Swan Island to the Multnomah Channel constitutes an area of significant economic and environmental importance for the City of Portland; and

WHEREAS, EPA and the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) have entered into a joint management plan for oversight of cleanup at the Site, and the EPA will be the lead agency for in-water contamination and DEQ will take the lead for upland contamination; and

WHEREAS, the EPA and the DEQ will be working closely with federal, state and tribal natural resource trustees on resolving natural resource damages to the area; and

WHEREAS, the EPA is moving to begin negotiations on an Administrative Order of Consent with willing Potentially Responsible Parties (PRPs) for the performance of a Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS) to determine the nature and extent of in-water contamination at the Site, and to analyze cleanup alternatives; and

WHEREAS, the City of Portland has been identified as a PRP, and has been invited to participate in the negotiations with the EPA and the other PRPs; and

WHEREAS, the City of Portland has a significant interest in ensuring that the Willamette River and Portland Harbor are restored to a condition that is protective of human health and the environment in a timely and cost-effective manner; and

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Environmental Services, working closely with the City Attorney, has been working closely with the various agencies involved in the Portland Harbor Superfund Site; and

WHEREAS, there is a need for the City of Portland to designate a lead agency for the purpose of negotiating with state and federal agencies and the tribes, as well as working with these agencies and other PRPs. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Council expresses its interest in having the City of Portland play a leadership role in determining the cleanup and natural resource restoration strategies for the Willamette River and the Portland Harbor.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council designates the Bureau of Environmental Services to be the lead agency for the City in managing the City's participation in the Portland Harbor Superfund Site cleanup, including the negotiations with federal and state agencies, the tribes, and other PRPs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Bureau of Environmental Services is directed to work closely with the City Attorney, Planning Bureau, and other appropriate City agencies in representing the City during the Superfund process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, given the importance of these matters to the Council, the Bureau of Environmental Services is directed to report regularly to the Council on the progress of the Superfund Site cleanup, and the cost implications for the City.
