670 **TIME CERTAIN: 9:30 AM** - Transmit the Lents and Kenton Target Area Action Plans (Report)

> **Discussion:** Martha McLennan, Neighborhood Revitalization Manager, Bureau of Community Development, said these are short term, very concrete plans which reflect strong grass roots efforts. She said the plans will be forwarded to those Bureaus that can help with their implementation and to the Planning Commission so that they can be fully integrated with the District Plans currently being developed.

Mike Mignano, 2615 SE 109th, said the Lents Plan focuses on revitalization of the area between 82nd and I-205. While the City is

being asked to provide seed money, most of the improvements will be funded by the private sector. He described some of the improvement projects, including a paintathon, that have already been undertaken.

Mayor Clark said he was happy to see such optimism, particularly in the face of decreased federal funding.

Nick Sauvie, 3534 SE Main and staffperson at SE Uplift, said one of the most exciting aspects of the revitalization plan is the high degree of neighborhood interest. Major areas of concern in Lents are creation of a clean and attractive neighborhood, improved safety, and revitalization of the Lents Commercial District, which was severely disrupted when the I-205 freeway was built. He said the City is being asked to provide seed money to stimulate private investment in the areas of housing rehabilitation, community organization and a targeted Code enforcement program. He said the neighborhood hopes to work with the Portland Development Commission to develop a commercial revitalization program.

Commissioner Lindberg asked if the funding requests were part of the proposed budget.

Commissioner Kafoury said the funding requests will be submitted as part of the Neighborhood Initiatives program which will be available July 1. Neither the Lents or Kenton plans are in the current budget but the intent is to tie funding for all future block grant money to development of neighborhood plans such as these.

Mayor Clark said a plan is necessary in order to get the input of all citizens and not just a few individuals.

Commissioner Kafoury said there will also be requests for funding to other bureaus such as Transportation.

Larry Mills, 1406 N. Winchell, said this neighborhood action plan has the potential to revitalize the Kenton community, which has been in a downward spiral for some time. He said the success of the program rests directly with the community itself. He said the plan requires only a modest dollar investment considering its final goals.

Jim Lynch, real estate broker in the Kenton neighborhood, emphasized the large amounts of time and effort residents will provide in **cont**rast to the small amount of money requested from the City. He said they propose redevelopment of the Kenton Business District, including renovation of the Kenton Hotel and rehabilitation of 24 housing units.

Commissioner Blumenauer said the specific plans and relatively lowbudget, high impact items which are being proposed provide a blueprint for the bureaus to follow.

705 Tentatively grant appeal of Lillian Hastings against Hearings Officer's decision to deny application to establish nonconforming rights in order to use the building at 210 NE 28th Avenue for flexible commercial and light industrial uses (Findings; 91-00797 NU NE)

**Discussion:** Cay Kershner, Clerk of the Council, noted that the findings had been distributed earlier.

704 Tentatively overrule Hearings Officer's denial of appeal of Charles W. Lawrence, applicant, for a comprehensive plan map amendment and a zone change in order to construct a building for an auto repair business at 4411 SE Belmont (Hearing; Previous Agenda 640)

**Discussion:** Tom McGuire, Planning Bureau, said because Council tentatively recommended a change in the zoning which differed from the one originally requested by Mr. Lawrence, renotification was required and further testimony must be allowed.

Commissioner Kafoury noted that Council had already tentatively approved a compromise zone designation agreed upon by the Sunnyside Neighborhood Association and Mr. Lawrence, and now needed to decide how much time to allow for testimony.

Council agreed to allow those wishing to testify to speak for two minutes each.

Tad Everhart, 613 SE 41st, #33, opposed the zone change from R1 (Residential) to CM (Mixed Commercial). He said he plans to build three passive solar row houses to the north of Mr. Lawrence's property and believes that the 45-foot height allowable under CM zoning could put their proposed homes in the shade.

Commissioner Lindberg asked about solar access protection in the Code.

Mr. McGuire said there are restrictions for residential zones, but not commercial.

Martha Wheeler, 930 SE 31st, longtime Sunnyside Neighborhood Association activist, opposed adoption of the compromise zone change agreed upon by Sunnyside and Mr. Lawrence. She argued that Comprehensive Plan housing goals should not be compromised and contested Mr. Lawrence's claims that his property is unsuitable for residential use.

Shirley Stone, 728 SE 45th, asked that R1 zoning be retained on this block. She said she is opposed to any additional on-street parking.

Charles Lawrence, applicant, said he believes the CM zone is workable and will provide residential and commercial use on property he purchased a long time ago in the belief that it was commercial.

Commissioner Blumenauer asked how high he planned to build.

Mr. Lawrence said just two stories.

Commissioner Kafoury moved to adopt the revised compromise agreement, noting that it had been arrived at in good faith. Commissioner Lindberg seconded.

Tom McGuire said the findings would be heard at the May 6 session.

Mayor Clark said he would vote no because he believes the property should remain residential.

**Disposition:** Tentatively reapprove zone change to Mixed Commercial (Y-4; N-1, Clark) Applicant's attorney prepare findings for May 6, 1992 at 2:00 p.m.
