PSC purpose, purview and lens

At the PSC's retreat last fall, Commissioners created 6 categories of the Vision of the Commission's role:

From Title 33:

The Planning and Sustainability Commission is empowered to perform all duties assigned to it by State law or City Title 33 on behalf of the City Council. (33.710.020)

The Planning and Sustainability Commission advises City Council on the City's long-range goals, policies, and programs for land use, planning, and sustainability. In making recommendations and decisions, it considers the economic, environmental, and social wellbeing of the city in an integrated fashion. The Commission has specific responsibility for the stewardship, development and maintenance of the City's Comprehensive Plan, Climate Action Plan, and zoning code. The Commission is committed to effective public involvement and leadership in its work and in the decisions it considers. (33.710.040.A)

The Planning and Sustainability Commission has all of the powers and duties which are now or may in the future be imposed upon City planning commissions by State law, by this Title, by the City Council, or by the City Charter. The Commission's powers and duties include:

1. Holding hearings and making recommendations on all policy matters related to the Comprehensive Plan; the Climate Action Plan, the zoning code; significant transportation and sustainable development policies, projects, and issues; street vacations; sign regulations, and renaming city streets;

2. Advising the City Council on plans and policies regarding such issues as land use, zoning, housing, energy, transportation, urban renewal, urban design, equity, economic development, public buildings, climate change, sustainable development, environmental protection, resource conservation, and other policies of City-wide interest;

3. Articulating and guiding the City's long-range goals, policies, and programs for developing and achieving sustainable communities; and

4. Developing opportunities for community members to learn about principles, policies, and programs that promote sustainable practices and development.
