RE: Authorize Intergovernmental Agreement with the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality to serve as Qualified Environmental Professional for the Portland Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund (PBRLF).

Requested Council Hearing Date:

I. RECOMMENDATION

City Council should pass this ordinance to authorize an Intergovernmental Agreement with DEQ to serve as Qualified Environmental Professional for the Portland Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund (PBRLF).

II. BACKGROUND

The United States Environmental Protection Agency's (USEPA) Brownfields Cleanup Revolving Loan Fund provides funding for a grant recipient to capitalize a revolving fund and to make loans and grants to carry out environmental cleanup activities. BES manages the Portland Brownfield Program which provides environmental assessment and remediation assistance on brownfield properties in order to enhance environmental and human health, and economic and community vitality.

The City of Portland was awarded a USEPA Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund grant. With these funds, the City has established the Portland Brownfield Revolving Loan Fund (PBRLF), a financial resource for property owners to clean up brownfields in preparation for redevelopment. The PBRLF will encourage the remediation and reuse of contaminated sites by providing low interest loans and, in select circumstances, grants for site cleanup. The primary focus of the PBRLF will be sites on Portland's east side where proposed redevelopment has demonstrable community benefit.

The PBRLF creates a continual funding source to sustain the Portland Brownfield Program's ability to address the environmental threat of hazardous and petroleum-contaminated sites in our communities through cleanup and reuse. As repayments are made under the initial loan(s), the funds will be revolved, enabling the Portland Brownfield Program to provide financial assistance through additional loans to return other contaminated properties to productive use. The PBRLF will help to fund the remediation required for site cleanup, allow redevelopment projects to go forward, address the lingering threat to public health and the negative effect of 'brownfields' on community vitality, and promote economic development by increasing employment opportunities in the City of Portland.

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The Cooperative Agreement between the City of Portland and USEPA establishing the PBRLF requires the hiring of an independent Qualified Environmental Professional to ensure that all requirements are met for eligibility and funded activities throughout the course of each loan and grant. This Council item authorizes the Director of the Bureau of Environmental Services to execute an Intergovernmental Agreement with DEQ to serve in this role.

III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

BES will authorize up to \$50,000 for DEQ's services during the 5-year term of the PBRLF. This cost will be fully funded using the USEPA brownfield grant awarded to BES (Ordinance 184877).

IV. LEGAL ISSUES

V. CONTROVERSIAL ISSUES

None identified at this time. Organizations supportive of the PBRLF include other City agencies, brownfield property owners, Oregon Tradeswomen, Inc, Groundwork Portland, Coalition for a Livable Future, East Portland Action Plan, Constructing Hope, Oregon Public Health Department, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, property developers, residents, business owners and workers adjacent to brownfield properties, and community based organizations.

Work conducted under the proposed action will involve coordination with the Bureau of Planning, Bureau of Housing and Community Development, Portland Development Commission, City Hall, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, Business Oregon, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Multnomah County, and Port of Portland.
