7. BACKGROUND ANALYSIS

Food Cart enterprises have grown in Portland, with an estimated 696 food carts operating in the Portland City Limits as of January of 2012. The OLCC has received several inquiries from food cart owners for an annual liquor license. Several carts have been granted Temporary Sales Licenses to serve alcohol for a single event.

After receiving an opinion from the attorney general, the OLCC intends to license food carts and food cart pods using the same criteria as for a traditional brick and mortar establishment.

The OLCC is currently considering one particular liquor license for 8145 SE 82nd Ave, dba: Cartlandia. This will set a precedent for licensing out doors premises for the sale and consumption of alcohol as the licensed area is being defined as the footprint on the ground and not an enclosed structure. OLCC staff has recommended the license for Cartlandia be issued with several enforceable restrictions. Additionally, Catlandia has agreed to abide by several provisions voluntarily, which are not enforceable.

OLCC received an opinion back from the Attorney General indicating that nothing prohibits them from licensing a food cart if the license was based on the location (footprint) of the business and not on the cart itself. The statute prohibits a license from being mobile, which is avoided if the location the cart is positioned on is the location of the license.



Attached are the best practices and models the OLCC anticipates using to license these entities, both with on premise and off premises licenses. The best practices they have developed are *suggestions* (*not requirements*), which may lead to rule making at some distant point in the future. However, they are moving forward now with licensing these businesses, and if one of the operations chooses to operate outside the best practices, there is no recourse currently available.

The licensing of Cartlandia will set a precedent for the licensing of the other 698 entities (and growing) to be licensed without clear guidelines. Food Carts are fundamentally different then traditional brick and mortar establishments in that there are no walls to establish "the premises". Food cart operators often do not control the entire premises in which their customers congregate. Food cart operators share seating with other similar entities, and operate primarily out of doors close to or in residential neighborhoods.

There are no uniform standards for how the licensing of these outdoor entities will occur. Therefore, City and OLCC staff will be left to address each location on a case by case basis in an effort to secure restrictions to mitigate certain harm to the livability of the community. Often it will require problems to develop with negative impacts on the community in order to request restriction. Restrictions, although enforceable at the OLCC, can be lifted at any time at the request of the licensee and the discretion of the OLCC, without notice to the City of Portland.

The City of Portland received the application in June of 2011. Because of transitions in staff, no formal position was taken by the City of Portland within the required timeframe and therefore the default recommendation "Favorable" was entered as the City's position. Resolution 36905, passed on February 8th, 2012; marks the official position of Portland City Council. In that Resolution, Portland City council voted 4 to 1 to oppose the licensing of food cart pods and entities unless clear guidelines were developed.

The resolution currently before City Council today directs City Staff to formally notify the OLCC of Portland City Council's position in opposition of any license being granted prior to the adoption of clear guidelines.
