Bottled water is banned in Commission Leonard bureau and Amanda Fritz emailed her support. Portland will be in good company in the ban. Toronto's ban includes bringing all plumbing up to code in city and school buildings; San Francisco \$ 1/2 million per year Seattle's ban \$58 thousand per year; Chicago's ban includes a tax on the plastic bottle; the province of Ontario; the United Church of Canada's 590,000 members want to stop buying bottled water; New York state after Illinois to ban bottled water from government agencies; Venice, Italy wants its citizens to drink the "Mayor's water" (Italy consumes the most bottled water in the world).

I challenge the members of Portland's City Council to read Stop the Next War Now .

Thank you again for the honor of your time. I would rather be swimming. Knowledge about bottled water has already gotten large numbers of people taking the right action. Hope can be found in the fact that living in harmony with nature has been done before. And finally to live green we must bring our city, our state, and our country to CODE PINK. Aloha.
