RECOMMENDATION Ĭ.

> Authorize the Director of the Bureau of Environmental Services or designee and the City Attorney to enter into a settlement agreement with Steve Press.

II. **BACKGROUND**

The City of Portland and Clean Water Services have executed a Wholesale Sewer Service Agreement (COP #30003119) that replaced a 1998 Agreement that was terminated upon the execution of the new Agreement. The Agreement with Clean Water Services provides in part that upon the completion of the City's SW 86th Avenue Pump Station and Appurtenances Project the City of Portland will provide conveyance and treatment of sewage from the portion of the Clean Water Services service area that drains by gravity to the City's Fanno Basin Sewer and the SW 86th Avenue pump station complex. The "pump station complex" consists of the existing Fanno Basin (FABA) pump station located at 6895 SW 86th Avenue and the planned SW 86th Avenue pump station.

September 12, 2012, Washington County gave conditional approval to construct the SW 86th Avenue Pump Station and Appurtenances. In the Washington County Department of Land Use and Transportation casefile #12-174-SU/D/FP, the Hearings Officer received testimony and evidence at the public hearing on July 19, 2012. Residents of the surrounding neighborhood raised concerns and presented evidence regarding impacts on the quality of life and conflict with the character of the neighborhood, loss of property value, the unfairness of developing another pump station at this location, and lack of trust in BES as a result of history with the existing pump station.

The Hearings Officer required BES to meet with any household that has particular sensitivities to the construction to determine what additional measures are feasible to implement in order to reduce specified impacts.

BES Public Involvement staff have met with and spoken to neighbors adjacent to the Upon meeting with neighbors and evaluating their particular construction site.

sensitivities, it has been determined that approximately five households, including that of Steve Press, should receive financial assistance in one form or another from the City in order to mitigate the impacts of more than 2 ½ years of construction.

III. FINANCIAL IMPACT

The established not-to-exceed cost is \$53,000. Funds are available in the Sewer System Operating Fund, FY 2013, Bureau of Environmental Services Project Number E09051. The level of confidence is high for the amount agreed upon by Steve Press and BES.
