## Subject: Freightliner Strike

At this time there is a strike in progress at Freightliner Corporation on Swan Island. This is in the response to pickets from the Freightliner Corporation plant in California which have put up an information picket line at several of the Freightliner locations on Swan Island. To our knowledge there is a small group of workers and union people from the California plant here in the Portland area that are manning the picket line.

This activity began approximately 3 weeks ago. Prior to the pickets arriving from California, there had been many discussions among the workers at Freightliner regarding the possibility of a sympathy strike. At the time prior to the pickets arriving, the situation was becoming tense among the workers as there were many arguments and some acts of vandalism. After the appearance of the pickets, the local workers were confused not knowing whether they should honor the picket line or go to work. It seems as if the local contract is a 3 year contract which has 2 years to go. Over all there seems to be a lot of confusion among the workers whether they should be on strike or whether they should cross the picket line or if there is any reprisals from their union for crossing the picket line.

The overall violence has been steadily increasing. There has been vandalism such as broken windshields in cars, as well as an arrest for Disorderly Conduct dated 4-10-78, case#78-26268. The overall attitude among the workers is that of tenseness and open hostility among themselves between those who want to continue working and those who want to go out on strike. We can expect this trend towards violence to increase as the strike goes along.

An added factor to the overall strike situation is the presence of members of the Socialists Workers Party, both on the strike line and working as employees. Some of these members have just begun to work at Freightliner and will play a very low-key role until they get off their probationary period. At this time, they do not seem to have much influence on the overall direction of the strike.

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SIR: I WAS WITH OTHER OFFICERS IN THE 6600 BLOCK OF N. ENSIGN OBSERVING A CROWD OF PICKETERS AT THE EAST END OF N. ENSIGN ST. WHERE IT ENTERS ONTO RAILROAD PROPERTY AND THEN INTO THE PARKING AREA FOR FREIGHTLINER CORP. THE STRIKERS (EST. 75 TO 100) WERE POSITIONED IN THE MIDDLE OF ENSIGN ST TO THE WEST OF THE RAILROAD TRACKS LOCATED THERE.

BEGINNING AT APROX OGOD J OBSERVED PEDERSON SLOWLY PACING BACK AND FORTH ACROSS ENSIGN WITH A SIGN (3 TO 4 FOOT LONG HANDLE) IN HIS HANDS. WHEN ANTOS WOULD ATTEMPT TO PASS EAST BOUND ON N. ENSIGN TOWARDS FREIGHTLINGER CO., PEDERSON WOULD STEP IN FRONT OF THE AUTOS CAUSING THEM TO STOP. HE WOULD THEN STAND IN FRONT OF THE AUTOS, PREVENTING THEM FROM GOING FORWARD. WHEN THE DRIV-ERS OF THE AUTOS WOULD ATTEMPT TO ORIVE AROUND PEDERSON, HE WOULD EITHER STEP IN FRONT OF THEM AGAIN OR FEIGN AS THO TO STEP IN FRONT OF THEM, CAUSING THEM TO STOP. ON SEVERAL OCASSIONS OTHER PICKET-ERS WERE NEARLY STRUCK BY AUTOS TRYING TO GET AROUND PEDERSON.

AT APROX 0630 TRAFFIC ON N. ENSTEN HAD BEGUN TO INCREASE. I OB-SERVED ON APROX. 10 TO 12 OCASSIONS THAT AUTOS, SEVERAL IN A LINE, WOULD BE BRONGHT TO A COMPLETE STOP WHILE PEDERSON AND SEVERAL OTHERS WOULD BLOCK THE PASSAGE OF THE LEAD CAR.

ON MANY OCASSIONS PEDERSON WULLO WAVE HIS SIGN IN FRONT OF PASSING AUTUS, NARROWLY MISSING THEM, AND CAUSING THE AUTOS TO STOP ABRUPT-LY OR VEER TO ONE SIDE OF THE OTHER NARROWLY MISSING OTHER MEMBERS OF THE CROWD.

FREQUENTLY ANTOS WOULD ACCELERATE RAPIOLY AS THO TRYING TO AVOID PEDERSON AND THE CROWD OF PICKETERS WHICH MANY TIMES SURROUNDED AUTOS THAT HAD COME TO A STOP.

A DANFEROUS TRAFFIC - PEDESTRIAN SITUATION HAD DEVELOPED AS A RESULT OF THE CONDUCT OF PEDERSON AND OTHERS.

SEVERAL TIMES I OBSERVED THAT PEDERSON, AFTER STEPPING ASIDE TO LET AN AUTO PASS, WOULD STEP INTO THE AUTO AS IT PASSED, BRUSHING THE AUTO WITH HIS LEG AND THEN YELL AT THE ORIVER PULLING AWAY.

## Freightliner loses court order bid

A federal judge in Portland refused Wednesday to issue a restraining order to prohibit the Machinists Union from allegedly pressuring workers at Freightliner Corp. in Portland into honoring picket lines established by union workers from California.

U.S. District Judge Otto Skopil Jr. said in his five-page denial order, however, that he would have issued a restraining order "if I thought I had the authority to do so."

Because of congressional limitations on the court and recent case law, the judge said, "the union is able to breach with impunity its agreement to 'do everything in jts power' to discourage the kind of conduct occurring at the Freightliner plants in Portland."

Pickets from Local 1586 of the Machinists Union, which struck March 15 at the Freightliner plant in Chino, Calif., have picketed Freightliner facilities on Swan Island since last Thursday. They said they were engaging in a boycott because the Portland plants were manu-

facturing parts normally produced at the Chino plant.

Company officials here said the Portland plants are not manufacturing parts produced at the Chino plant and said the picketing by Local 1586 representatives was an "illegal boycott."

Freightliner attorneys Tuesday filed a request for a restraining order against the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers, which represent certain workers at the Portland facilities through its District Lodge No. 24 and Mount Hood Lodge Local No. 1005.

The firm contends that about 80 percent of Freightliner's approximately 1,800 employees in Portland have refused to come to work since last Thursday. It also alleges that at least one working employee has been threatened with murder by an unknown person.

Freightliner of Portland sought a restraining order to require the union to tell Portland plant employees that it would not impose fines or other disciplinary measures on them for crossing the picket lines; to restrain the union from threatening employees; and to require the union to "tell these employee that the firm wants them to report fo work."

Skopil, in his order, said recent cases establish that the federal court. have jurisdiction to enjoin a strike only where the underlying dispute is subject to mandatory arbitration provisions of a collective bargaining agreement.

He noted that the collective bargaining agreement between the union and Freightliner in Portland contains no provision requiring the parties to arbitrate the issue of appropriate settlement of the Chino labor dispute.

The judge also observed, however, that the agreement does provide that, "The union is not in favor of sympathetic strikes and will do everything in its power to prevent them during the term of this agreement."

Skopil remarked in his order, "While an arbitrator or other trier of fact will probably find that defendants (the union) have breached this promise, it is unlikely that defendants will be able to respond in damages (even if such damages are ascertainable, a questionable proposition)."
